The official no to High Park edibles

High Park Farms has been given the official no to producing edibles at its Enniskillen plant.

In September, the company applied to dedicate about 7,300 square feet to producing cannabis-based edibles including candy and chocolates inside the Lasalle Line greenhouse. It's zoned as agricultural. The move meant changes to the Official Plan and the Zoning Bylaw of the township to allow the value-added product to be made on the agricultural land.

Lambton County Planner Rob Nesbitt said at the time the production would be considered value added to agriculture and could move ahead.

On Dec. 3, when the cannabis producer went to council, two of the four members present disagreed, saying producing cannabis infused edibles was not a valueadded item, it was a commercial activity.

When Councillor Wally Dunn moved to allow the production, there was no one else who agreed. The proposal wasn't voted on.

Enniskillen Clerk, Duncan McTavish, in a letter to Trevor Brand, a neighbour of the cannabis operation who is an outspoken critic of High Park, says that meant no formal decision was made.

Another vote was taken on Dec. 17, with all members of council present and the application was turned down, with Councillors Judy Krall, Mary Lynn McCallum and Chad Burke voting against the expansion.

High Park has 20 days to appeal the ruling to the Local Planning Advisory Committee. Brand is relieved the expansion into edibles has been turned down. He says the company has yet to fix some of the concerns the neighbours have been raising for over a year.

One of the biggest irritants is the smell of cannabis coming from the greenhouse. Brand says there are periods where they are overwhelmed by the skunky smell.

The Brand's concerns were validated by Health Canada. In a letter to Brand, officials from Health Canada say the company was charged in late June because of the smell.

CEEH gets \$1.3 million from province

Bluewater Health has already started work on upgrades to elevators, a generator and sanitary sewers as well as a new boiler plant at Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital with \$1.3 million in funding given by the province.

Bluewater Health's Sarnia site will also get \$500,000 to replace a diesel tank. Bluewater Health applied for \$5 million

in exception circumstances funding from the Health Infrastructure Renewal fund to deal with some of the infrastructure problems at the hospital which is over a century old.

In April 2017, it had received a commitment from the Ministry of Health to invest millions into the aging hospital over the next 25 years. The first part of the funding was expected to be \$7.5 million.

But as the planning progressed it became clear there were significant issues with the building which needed to be addressed. Hospital officials at one point told Petrolia councillors the electrical system in the

hospital is so bad, if there were to be a problem it could take weeks to repair.

So, Bluewater Health applied for additional funding under the Hospital

Infrastructure Renewal Program.
As first reported by The Independent, the province announced the funding Dec. 18 in news releases from Sarnia-Lambton MPP Bob Bailey and Bluewater Health giving \$1.3 million of the \$5 million requested. Officials expect more "exceptional circumstances money will be in the offing next year to deal with the electrical issues.

"Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital is over 100 years old and this jump-starts the redevelopment project," says Bluewater Health CEO Mike Lapaine in a news

"We are moving through the five stages to address the \$7.5 million commitment we've already received and we expect the next three stages to move quickly. This is exciting as we will see changes in Petrolia immediately.

Some of those changes can already be

Lasalle Agri fined, mayor wants site checked

Warwick Township Mayor Jackie Rombouts is happy it is over.

Lasalle Agri has been fined \$5,000. It's the end of a year-long dispute about the fertilizer company's use of a piece of environmental land near Highway 402.

Warwick Township laid the charge after a pile of biosolids it was storing at the corner of Nauvoo Road and Highway 402 grew beyond what the municipality expected.

Since January – after the charge was laid the pile of pellets made from human waste which is used as farm fertilizer has stretched to about 100 meters of Nauvoo Road. In the past couple of weeks, about half of the fertilizer has been moved from the property according to Clerk-Administrator Amanda Gubbels.

During pretrial arguments in August, LaSalle Agri plead guilty to the bylaw

Rombouts says the township wanted the

fertilizer made from human waste removed from the property and suggested it would ask for a reduced fine if it was gone by the end of November. The maximum fine for the offense is \$50,000.

The mayor says inspectors went onto the site at the end of November and found the material was gone. There are still cinder blocks and traces of the material at the site on Nauvoo Road. "It's a lot better than it was a year ago," says Rombouts. "I would like to have an environmental assessment done on the property...leaving waste behind, I can't imagine that's good for the land."

Rombouts adds the Ministry of the Environment is now aware of the health and environmental concerns of using and the storage of biosolids. She hopeful changes will be made to the regulations. Rombouts says in the meantime, neighbours and the municipality are "very glad it is out of the gateway of our township. It was the first thing you saw coming off the highway – Welcome to Warwick."

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VPP ticket sales grow 1.4 per cent

It was another strong year for Victoria Playhouse Petrolia.

At the end of the season, 33,965 tickets were sold, up by 461 tickets over the year before.

In a report to council, Laurissa Ellsworth, director of marketing, arts and communications, says more seniors purchased single performance tickets this year, however there was a steep drop in the number of adults who went to a single show.

The number of people who went to all six performances of the summer run also dropped

slightly.

The VPP saw a marked increase in the number of tickets sold to groups - including bus tours. Just under 3,000 tickets were sold, up 25 per cent over 2018.

In all, VPP saw about a 1.4 per cent increase in ticket sales.

The extra tickets did bring in extra revenue but are not the full reason for the 3.5 per cent increase. The VPP increased the cost of reserve seats by 3.5 per cent in 2019.

Mayor Brad Loosley applauded the strong season saying taxpayers could be assured they are "not subsidizing the theater; it is paying its own way"

Petrolia councillors turned off by idling bylaw

Town staff suggested the municipality look into a new anti-idling bylaw. Clerk Mandi Pearson says she's been monitoring other municipalities over the last three to five years as they implement the bylaws. It came to a head in Petrolia after town officials were asked to intervene in neighbourhood disputes where neighbours were idling their vehicles to annoy the people next door "in a vindictive way...we don't have control over... leaving a car running for hours at a time; this helps with that."

But several councillors, including Ross O'Hara, pointed out a bylaw without enforcement would not be helpful "if we can't enforce the ones we have now."

Pearson said any bylaw would enforce only when there was complaints, but Councillor Marty Souch believes "it would be more trouble than it is worth." Council turned down the idea by a vote of 4-2.

Slow internet hurts Dawn-Euphemia service

Dawn-Euphemia Clerk Donna Clermont says poor internet service is hurting customer service.

That's why she and Treasurer Scott Gawley are optimist about a proposal by Cogeco which would see fiber optic service come to the municipal office.

Much of the municipality struggles with poor service. Cogeco recently acquired infrastructure in the area and began testing on the current service in the area. Gawley says the internet speed at the office is currently 3.1 megabytes. Cogeco's proposal would provide 30 MB.

The company would charge \$600 per month in a five-year contract. It would require \$20,000 of equipment but Gawley says that cash has already been set aside in reserve. The plan would

not only provide internet service, it would also provide phone service through the internet.

Clermont says staff often has to call residents back because there is so much static on the line they can't hear them.

They also have to get back to them with answers to questions, particularly if it has to do with mapping, because often the internet will not allow staff to look at the documents needed.

"It is really to the point where it is interfering with customer service," she says.

Gawley says the internet would be based at the municipal office but could be extended to the two buildings across the road. He says the fire department also needs better internet to use an app which dispatches volunteers.

Staff will study the deal further and bring it back to council during budget talks in late January.

Centennial needs roof fix

Watford's Centennial Hall's days may be numbered, but it needs some work before it closes.

Warwick Township is in the middle of planning for a new \$5 million hall attached to the Watford arena. Township council agreed to keep the hall open until the new community centre is ready.

AT the Dec. 9 meeting, councillors heard the roof needs work. "The roof of the centennial hall has been leaking for an extended period of time and it is causing damage to the floor and ceiling in various places. A contractor was hired to inspect the roof and perform temporary fixes to minimize the leaking," writes Andrew Maver, public works manager in a report to council.

"Tar was placed around all vents and around roof top unit that may have been the source of leaking. This may be enough to minimize leaking," he says. "However, leaking may continue causing further damage to the structure."

Mayer says the township could install tarps to minimize damage. That could cost about \$8,000, taking into account it may have to be replaced before the new hall is ready.

Instead, council decided to get three quotes on a repair job for the south side of the roof. Maver says that could be more than \$15,000.




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Editorial

May 2020 be a year of growth

2020 has begun and few people have a crystal ball to see what this year and this decade have in store for us. Economist say 2020 is likely to be a good economic year, with most saying it is unlikely Canada will see a recession.

And there are some positive economic signs in Central Lambton; the province has turned on the tap for funding to the Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital redevelopment, giving \$1.3 million to work on some of the infrastructure problems right away. Officials hope there will be more of that to come next year as part of the province's \$7.5 million commitment to move the century-old hospital into the future.

By the spring, Petrolia's main street will see one of the biggest construction projects in decades as work begins on the Kingswell Hotel. Petrolia has long wanted a hotel to attract theatregoers to stay here longer. This is an important step toward it.

And, it appears the construction is part of a bigger movement downtown. A new brewery is set to open its doors and some specialty shops are thriving in the area.

Other Central Lambton communities are also seeing a revival. Alvinston has more businesses downtown than it has seen in years. Plympton-Wyoming and Warwick are taking concerted steps to improve their respective downtowns. Watford is poised to see some major investment as a private company partners with the municipality to revive an entire block of the downtown.

And federal and provincial grant money is beginning to trickle into the area - with a number of major recreation projects looking for cash in the coming weeks.

All positive signs. The only dark spot is the difficult year our agricultural community is coming out of. We can't under estimate the economic impact of a horrible 2019 on our local economy.

The erratic weather, trade problems and strikes will mean less cash for farmers to spend. One estimate put the loss at over \$97 million to farm gate receipts.

Thankfully, the regional economy, though driven by agriculture, is diverse enough to withstand the storm. We can only hope 2020 will be year of growth for all.

Firefighters, family and friends say goodbye to FF#2

Firefighters from across the province, family and friends said goodbye to Tanner Redick.

The 20 year-old Alvinston man died in a collision with a combine Dec. 13 on Petrolia Line. Redick was a volunteer with Brooke Fire Rescue - who wore the number 2 and was a career firefighter with Six Nations.

Dec. 18, about 200 firefighters marched from the Alvinston hall to the funeral home where Redick was resting. Then Dec. 19, mourners filled the Brooke-Alvinston Inwood Community Centre to overflowing for his funeral.

The Alvinston station's Deputy Chief, Kris Redick, Tanner's uncle, urged Tanner's classmates from the Lambton Fire School, to "lean on each other" as they grieve for their friend. "Never loose that connection which is so strong now...also be present for each other."

Redick also shared stories about his nephew, whom college instructors and his current employer said was well on his way to being an exemplary

firefighter.

Redick had been keeping a close eye on his nephew while he was on probation, even calling to wake him when friend's feared he might sleep in.

Redick says even though his nephew had a career firefighting job, he still volunteered. He worked with his nephew for the last time during a fire in Inwood. Five people were burned - three badly. Redick says Tanner had arrived on the first truck and worked to control the fire in the garage.

As Redick was giving him his next task, Tanner became impatient and said "Let's (expletive) go, we've got work to do.' And he left, doing what needed to be done."

Cannabis plant expansions still a concern for neighbour

"Inspectors are currently reviewing responses from the licence holder and have requested that the licence holder provide a corrective action plan to address the escape of odours from greenhouses that maintain roof vents in the open position," says David Pellman director general of compliance with Health Canada in an email to Brand.

"The licence holder has indicated that in addition to the current filtration

system on site, it plans to install dehumidification and cooling system by February 2020, with the expectation that upon installation of the system, the greenhouse environment will be cooler therefore reducing the amount of time vents will be open."

"There are some ongoing issues, for me, they need to be cleaned up before expansion," says Brand.

But he says, even if High Park abandons its plans for edible

production - which would have created 40 new jobs - Brand says there are signs the company will continue to expand on Lasalle Line.

"The company has fenced the property completely," he says. "You don't fence in 100 acres unless you're going to grow (cannabis) outside and I'm worried it is going to exacerbate the problem." High Park has never said publicly it has plans for outdoor production on Lasalle Line.

Neighbours around the hospital received a letter in November saying there would be construction around the hospital until March.

Backhoes have already been at work behind the hospital as preparation for the work began in early December.

"I am extremely pleased that our government is making this important investment in the renewal of CEE Hospital," says Bailey noting CEEH has an important role to play in the health care system of all of Lambton County.

"Today's \$1.89 million investment at Bluewater Health and Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital is another step in our government's plan to build a connected and sustainable public health care system around the needs of patients, which includes investing \$27 billion over 10 years in hospital infrastructure."

The announcement was one of dozens across the province.

Health Minister Christine Elliott announced \$175 million to invest in 131 hospitals across the province.





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HONOURING SENIORS OF THE YEAR

Two familiar faces were honoured as Warwick Township's Senior Citizens of the Year. Joe and Cathy Rombouts who have been organizers with Roy Caley Memorial Silver Stick Hockey Tournament for decades. The couple was overcome with emotion when Mayor Jackie Rombouts announced the award at the Silver Stick 60th anniversary banquet Dec. 18. Joe simply held his finger to his lips unable to speak and Cathy was in tears. Days later, the pair were still emotional about receiving the award. "It was a total shock," says Cathy. "I'm not that kind of person. (Awards) are not why we do things." Aside from being a constant presence behind the scenes at Silver Stick, Rombouts has also been active in minor sports including hockey and baseball in the community.

More grants cut

It's bad, but not as bad as they thought.

Dawn-Euphemia council has finally received word about its Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund grant. The grants were announced in November, however Dawn-Euphemia's was not announced because Ministry of Finance officials were still analysing the township's numbers.

Treasurer Scott Gawley says Dawn-Euphemia will receive \$334,100 - a 14.8 per cent decrease from the year before. That's about \$58,000 less to spend.

It's part of a five year trend which has seen rural municipalities lose millions as the province phases out part of the grant. Mayor Al Broad says it is disappointing, however it was not as bad as expected. Gawley believed the township would lose \$65,000.

Petrolia Discovery, Oil Springs among grant recipients

Petrolia Discovery is one of the Central Lambton organizations getting a helping hand from the Creative Counties fund in 2020.

The committee announced over \$71,880 in funding for 21 projects before Christmas.

Discovery will use \$7,850 to renew displays, create new signs and buy new lighting and audio equipment.

Fairbank Oil Fields received \$7,500 to be used to help host the International Industrial Heritage Conference in the area this spring.

Brooke-Alvinston received \$2,800 to develop a professional cooking program. The municipality also received \$1,000 to help promote the Fair ambassador program in its 10th year.

Oil Spring's Family Funfest gets a big boost with a \$3,000 grant from Creative Counties.

More signs will dot the former hamlets of St.

Clair Township, thanks to a \$1,500 grant.

The Alvinston Arts and Music Festival will create additional programming for the yearly event with \$1,300 in grant money.

The Moore Agricultural Society is starting a new program called "Music - The Universal Language." It's received \$10,000 for the program.

Plympton-Wyoming's Historical Society will have \$2,000 to put up historical murals in the municipality.

And Daytripping Magazine will produce a mural recognizing artist Barbara Perrin. The magazine has received \$4,500 for the project.

The Lambton County Plowing Match received \$3,000 to promote its 100th Anniversary.

In all, officials estimate the organizations receiving funding will spend almost \$300,000 on cultural events in Lambton County with the help of the grants. The next grants will be handed out in the fall.

Convention cash up

Brooke-Alvinston council members will have a little more money to spend on conferences in 2020.

At the Dec. 12 meeting, council passed a bylaw which will keep their meeting pay the same as before but increases the amount which can be claimed for conferences.

In 2019, the mayor could spend up to \$1,500 and councillors \$1,000. But Mayor Dave Ferguson says the cost of conferences and the travel to get there is increasing and the allowance covers just one event. Often the registration and hotel room alone take up the yearly allowance.

In 2020, the mayor will have \$2,500 a year to spend and councillors will have \$2,000.

Council discussed the idea of raising its meeting pay as well, however decided against the move.
