Town ordered to release Baron's severance package

More than two years after Petrolia's top administrator left his job, residents will finally hear details of the agreement which led to his departure.

But an adjudicator for the Information and Privacy Commission has ruled the Town of Petrolia does not have to release the investigators report explaining exactly what happened and which led to Manny Baron leaving his job. But taxpayers will find out how much it cost them.

In Oct. 2017, *The Independent*, in a series of articles, revealed that the then-chief administrative officer owned two buildings which were being used by the town. He didn't disclose that to council and in the case of the former youth and seniors centre, Baron was issued \$5,000 payment for rent and had town staff work on the buildings according to information obtained under the Freedom of Information Act.

Oil Springs, P-town celebrate as Hunters win gold

Dick Hunter says he's never seen his son so emotional.

The Oil Springs man - father to hockey greats Dale and Mark - watched as his sons led Team Canada to a stunning come from behind win over the Russians to claim World Junior Gold.

The outcome of the Christmas tournament didn't seem very promising when the squad lost its very first game to Russia 6-0. Hunter talked to Mark - who is the

juniors' general manager - after that loss. He says Mark was " a little discouraged there. But those things happen."

Mark - in an interview with The Independent Tuesday, says the team was humbled by the loss. "That humility came out; we knew we all needed to double down and get better because the Russians were playing at a hell of a level." He says the disappointed team heard all the critism from fans, and hockey enthusiasts, and "dealt with it the right way" digging in and getting better.

And then just like a good movie, the Canadians and the Hunters had a chance to avenge the loss, in the gold medal game no less.

Dick Hunter was at home in Oil Springs, gathered with family and friends to watch the game.

"It was nerve wracking when we got down 2-0 there," Dick says "When you get down to the Russians, that's never good."

And he says the Russians were a tough opponent.

But Canada's game started to turn when the puck rebounded off the legs of Connor McMichael to get Canada within one. "Sometimes, you get bounces," says Mark "and that was one heck of a bounce." McMichael, he says, has a history of having "good things happen for him in front of the net."

Then, injured captain, Barrett Hayton had a blistering shot that found the back of the net to tie things up at three.

"It was really amazing how well he played in the situation he was in...it showed a lot of drive and passion to be a part of that game," says the general manager.

Lorne Henderson - Lambton's former MPP known for his ability to remember everyone's name once said John Phair knew more people than he did.

That, according to Phair's close friend and Sarnia-Lambton MPP Bob Bailey - is quite a statement.

The former councillor of both

Enniskillen and Petrolia council died Jan. 5 after a brief illness. He was 71.

Bailey has known Phair for years. It was the long-time Conservative who convinced Bailey to run for the MPP's position. Phair had run for the Conservatives in the 2000 federal election.

'We were debating about the 2007 provincial election and he challenged me; 'Why don't you run?' I said, 'Oh god!'"

Phair won the debate and then actively campaigned to get him elected.

Bailey says he talked to Phair almost every day, asking him about issues he faced or looking for information about things going on in the area. "He was a gentleman," Bailey said choking up. "A good friend and a gentleman."

The joy of that big win exploded in Central Lambton and across Canada.

"That's what happens when you put a real hockey guy behind the bench. Gold," said one Twitter

"What a game for Canada, what a game for the Hunter boys, what a game for #PetroliaProud! Congratulations Dale and Mark Hunter and all of Team Canada ... we are so proud of you here at home!" wrote the Petrolia Minor Hockey Association on Facebook moments after the win.

At the Hunters' old elementary school - Lambton Centennial - students were dressed in red and white - anything with a Canadian symbol on it - Monday to honour the men who used to play in the same gym and grew up to win

gold for Canada. And they signed cards for the brothers and posed for a picture to mark the occasion.

Mark and Dale were back in Oil Springs Tuesday. Mark says they looked at all the cards and photos from Centennial students. "That was very cool."

And went to see Dick before

Mark told The Independent


that's something he's going to try to arrange, because he knows Oil Springs and Petrolia fans would enjoy it.

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


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Petrolia ordered to release Baron's severance

Town council hired an investigator, John Fleming to review what happened. When Fleming finished his report, town council passed a motion accepting the resignation of Baron

The day after council officially ended its association with Baron, *The Independent* filed a Freedom of Information (FOI) request asking for the investigator's report, Baron's resignation, which according to council documents came by email, his severance package and his original contract. The town denied access and *The Independent* appealed to the Information and Privacy Commission.

In mediation, the town and Baron did agree to the release of the administrator's contract, but the rest of the matters were heard by an adjudicator.

The town argued, in part, that the Fleming report and the email containing Baron's notice to leave his position should not be released because the report was part of employment-related matters - an area excluded by the Freedom of Information Act. Baron agreed.

The Independent argued that publicly then-Mayor John McCharles said the \$14,000 report from Fleming was an operational review of the entire staff - which under the act can be released.

The Independent also argued that it was in the public's best interest to release the severance agreement.

The town and Baron also argued the severance package should not be released to protect personal privacy and because it contained advice and recommendations to the municipality which can be exempt. The town added *The Independent's* assertion that the public had an interest in the severance agreement did not apply because "there has been wide media coverage and debate surround the matter and that disclosing the small amount of information remaining at the issue would not serve the public interest," according to the adjudicator's order.

More than two years later, on Dec. 19, the adjudicator released his decision. Steven Faughnan reviewed all the documents and ruled the report by Fleming and the email setting out the terms of Baron's departure were part of an employment record and were used by the town in dealing with Baron's future; so they did not have to be released.

But, he ruled the facts of the severance agreement - save any details which may have been found in the investigator's report - were in the public's interest. The town will have until Jan. 30 to provide the documents to *The Independent*.

ings about the ruling.

"While I'm pleased the adjudicator agreed it is the public's best interest to see the details of the former CAO's severance package, it is still troublesome that taxpayers of Petrolia will never have a full accounting of how someone in the highest levels of government was able to so clearly break the town's own rules, enlist the help of staff, receive cash through official channels and still not have any answers from their elected politicians how that was able to happen. Nor will taxpayers know if the loopholes that led to this situation have been closed preventing any future problems," she says.

"It's also disheartening that the current members of council - many of whom publicly stated they wanted the information released during the election campaign - have been silent on the issue since taking their seats at the council table."

The adjudicator's ruling also revealed at least one inconsistency with what members of Petrolia Council told the public in 2017. In the wake of Baron's departure, all of the council statements - including the motion passed by council - stated Baron resigned. However the town's own lawyer in the FOI appeal said the administrator was "terminated" because of the results of the report.

Baron also had a say in the FOI appeal, however he asked his submissions not be shared with *The Independent* out of concerns for his privacy.

In Faughnan's ruling, his reasoning becomes more apparent.

Although the adjudicator did not elaborate on Baron's specific concerns, the former employee argued that under Section 13 of the act, the town could refuse to disclose the information "whose disclosure could reasonably be expected to seriously threaten the safety or health of an individual."

"I acknowledge that the matters he (Baron) sets out are of concern to him and his family," says Faughnan, adding Baron mostly was concerned about the release of the investigators report - which he ruled would not have to be released.

And the adjudicator says Baron "failed to provide sufficient evidence" to withhold the severance agreement for that reason.

About two months after Baron was fired, he became the CAO of Mapleton, where he continues to work today

The OPP charged him with breach of public trust in March 2018.

The case was resolved in Sept. 2018 after Baron participated in the Direct Accountability Program. He admitted an administrative error and gave a \$1,000 to the Petrolia Community Foundation. In exchange, the crown withdrew the breach of public trust

Could Mooretown be the next Hockeyville? Officials with the Moore Sports Complex Renewal Committee hope so.

They're encouraging residents to nominate the community in the Kraft Hockeyville contest which is on now in the hopes of winning \$250,000 toward the \$35 million revitalization of the complex.

St. Clair Township Councillor, Tracy Kingston, is a member of the committee. She says the group is getting ready to launch a number of fundraisers for the massive project. Kingston hopes the hockey community will get on board the social media campaign and boost Mooretown into the running for the cash and the chance at an NHL game

played in the local arena.

Kingston says the committee wants to try everything to reach its stated goal of \$5 million. St. Clair council agreed to foot \$5 million of the bill through taxes and reserves. The community has also applied for a federal and provincial grant for about \$25 million. Those grants should be announced before the spring.

"We can't do this on our own so we have to try everything we can," says Kingston.

The redevelopment plan includes an NHL sized rink as well as a secondary ice pad, a new gymnasium, pool and expanded fitness centre. The complex has had a number of problems including with the roof. There also concerns about an old direct expansion ammonia system -the last of its kind in the province, which needs to be replaced.





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Editorial

The public still deserves an answer

There are many things that are disappointing about *The Independent's* appeal to the Information and Privacy Commission.

As it states in our front page article, *The Independent* has been working for over two years to try to obtain documents relating to the dismissal of Petrolia's former CAO. His departure came after the paper reported his ownership of two buildings being used by the town. It was never disclosed he owned them. He received public money for rent and used town staff for renovations of the building.

The council of the day hired an investigator to look into the matter. When his report was given to council, Baron ended up without a job.

But the taxpayers will never get to see what the investigator found - how one administrator was allowed so much leeway that he was able to buy buildings and use them for town purposes, using tax dollars without anyone ever questioning what was going on. That's a shame.

What should have happened back in 2017, is councillors should have been straight with taxpayers. They should have said the CAO had been fired for his actions - not resigned as council proclaimed. They should have provided at least a summary of what the investigator found - admitting that something went wrong and telling taxpayers how it was fixed. But that didn't happen.

Instead, this newspaper spent countless hours trying to make the case for the public and waiting endlessly for the privacy commission to render a decision. We had hoped we could share that information in time for the municipal election - alas the report arrived about a year too late.

There is something wrong with a system that isn't fully transparent to the people who pay the bills, that allows request for information to take years to resolve and thousands of taxpayers dollars to hide.

We believe the current council could still make an effort to explain all this, now that the "legal" issue is solved. It could, at the very least, explain how procedures have changed to make sure no administrator could ever do this again.



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Plympton-Wyoming taxes climb 2.5 per cent

Plympton-Wyoming taxpayers will have to open their wallets a little wider.

Council has approved a \$13 million operation and capital budget - increasing taxes about 2.5 per cent.

That works out to \$15.83 for every \$100,000 a house is valued. The median home price in Plympton-Wyoming is just under \$400,000 meaning the tax bill before any increasing assessment fees, will go up \$63.32.

Treasurer Norma Roddick-Preece told council the budget contains about \$1.3 million for two new fire trucks. The town recently received word the insurance company would be paying out \$365,000 for a Wyoming truck which fell into a creek during a call. Chief Steve Clemens says there were too many variables to ensure the pumper could be fixed.

A committee is already investigating a replacement vehicle for the Wyoming truck.

The new equipment means the fire department's spending increased six per cent - among the highest in the municipality.

Roddick-Preece says there will also be a significant increase of about \$100,000 in the planning department this year. Much of that comes from the need for several studies. Roddick-

Preece says the official plan will have to be reviewed again, council has asked for a renewable energy study focusing on the changes made to the wind turbine legislation and how it affects the projects already in the community.

There are also some major capital projects planned.


The roof at the Camlachie Community Centre is slated for replacement at a cost of \$50,000. The town has also applied for a grant to renovate washrooms there to make them accessible. Chief Administrative Officer Carolyn Tripp estimates the bill for that will be well over \$100,000.

There are plans to make the administration building in Wyoming more accessible, including washrooms, the seating in the council chamber and providing hearing devices in the meeting room for those who need them.

Another \$52,000 has been set aside for the town's proposed health and wellness centre.

The town has acquired the old TD Bank and plans to make it a community hub, inviting health care providers to the building to provide services for residents. The building is expected to cost the town \$2,000 and \$50,000 is set aside for any renovations.

Plympton-Wyoming plans to use \$1.94 million from reserves for its capital needs

He entered the council chamber just as the meeting was to begin, to a standing ovation from members of council and staff. The councillor, who always actively contributes to budget discussions, didn't disappoint. He took issue with a number of statements, particularly about Mayor Lonny Napper's suggestion to borrow money to improve more roads.

- most of that will go toward the two fire trucks.

The town will continue to increase funding to roads - spending overt \$2.5 million this year alone.

There is concern about a 39 per cent increase in the town's insurance this year. The treasurer will be explaining the issues which led to the \$100,000 plus increase during council's regular meeting Jan. 9.

The St. Clair Region Conservation budget is also up 39 per cent.

Council discussed each section of the budget for about three and a half hours before approving it with only minor changes.

"I think it is a pretty solid budget," says Mayor Lonny Napper. "It meets our needs and what we didn't use last year goes back for taxpayers next year."

Enniskillen Mayor Kevin Marriott agrees saying Phair "thought pretty deep on everything. He took a lot of time on issues. Once he made up his mind, he wasn't afraid to voice his opinion and it was always well thought out."

And Marriott says Phair was respected. "When I thought about him, it was that quiet, solid, levelheaded demeanor of his and he was liked by everyone."

Phair's interested extended beyond politics. He was a history buff and could answer just about any question about his communities oil history anyone had. Former Petrolia Councillor, Liz Welsh, who served with Phair in Petrolia and is also a local historian, says he was one of her most favourite people.

"He was just so interested in all of our history and all the people who made the history. He was genuinely passionate about it. He always wanted to share that; he didn't keep it to himself."

Welsh says Phair would hear an interesting historic item and start researching, even planning vacations to look deeper into what he'd found. "He was always accurate - he would fact check everything."

Dave Hext knew first hand about his near photographic memory of local history. The local historian would have breakfast with Phair and Martin Dillon - who curates the Petrolia Heritage website. They would discuss some obscure fact of the area over a meal and then head out exploring. Hext vividly recalls one trip to Florence where they followed a road which was once a path made by the Indigenous people.

"He knew anybody and everybody in Lambton County. He had a wealth of knowledge. If I asked him about someone, he would have a file on them."

Hext says Phair also had a website for some time called Hard Oil News, which told the regions stories.

The historian, will be missed, says Hext. "He's like the father you wish you would have found out more about him and what he knew."

Phair is also well known in farm circles. He was a freelance journalist for farm papers in Ontario for years, travelling all over Canada and the United States to report on the latest innovations in the industry.

Phair also covered local community events, including in the pages of The Independent.

While his heart was in Petrolia, he had been living in Sarnia for some time. Family members say his greatest joy was is grandchildren. Phair would sometimes bring one of them along on assignments as his photographer.

Visitation for Phair will be held Friday at Needham-Jay Funeral home. The funeral will be Saturday at 2pm.

Finding Out if it's Dementia

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

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

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

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In collaboration with Bluewater Health's Addiction Services program and Withdrawal Management Services, Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital (CEEH) of Bluewater Health began a satellite clinic office for those services in late 2019.

The clinic is located in the Emergency Department on the first floor of the Petrolia hospital and is available on Mondays from 9:00 am to noon.

The new outreach clinic is available to individuals with substance use concerns (any substance). Services include one-on-one support, assessment and referral, and distribution of safe use supplies.

"Our mandate is to serve people aged 16 and older, however we will see individuals younger than 16," said Donna Morreau, Professional Practice Supervisor & Interim Addiction Services Manager, Bluewater Health. "Our team can provide information to anyone about substance use and options for support at Bluewater Health and in the community. They are also able to consult with hospital staff in Petrolia, both in the Emergency Department and inpatient units, who have questions/concerns or would like to be supported in conversations they are having with patients about substance use."

Family support and gambling addiction counselling is also offered by the Addiction Services team in Sarnia, and Withdrawal Management staff on site at CEEH can provide information about those services, as well as referrals for any mental health issues.

If you or someone you know would like to book an appointment, please call 519-464-4400 (extension 5370) or the HOPE line at 519-332-4673. In addition to scheduled appointments, the clinic will also see patients on a walk-in basis and/or inpatients as needed during the clinic days/hours listed above. Please check in with Patient Registration in the Emergency Department when you arrive at the Petrolia hospital.
