## Water line break at CEEH underlines needs for infrastructure cash

Bluewater Health officials say they were prepared to move patients at the continuing care unit at Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital after a water line broke.

The Sunday incident is a sign of some of the major issues with the old infrastructure at the Petrolia hospital according to Julia Oosterman, communications director with Bluewater Health.

Petrolia/North Enniskillen firefighters were called to the hospital, twice, after an alarm sounded. Oosterman says a joint in a water pipe broke.

"In the breaking of the joint, water went everywhere and triggered a sprinklers," she says. That automatically triggered a call to 9-11.

Oosterman says the firefighters and Bluewater Health staff brought everything under control in less than an hour. But they were also prepared for the worst.

With aging, fragile patients in the continuing care wing, hospital officials were concerned.

"There were people on the standby ready to take patients out

of the area if we couldn't get the heating back on," she says.

"We were lucky it wasn't a frigid, frigid night and it didn't take long to get fixed.

"It will happen again," Oosterman says

"This is a much older building and were not...exaggerating when we talk about the infrastructure needs of this facility."

Two years ago, hospital officials shocked Petrolia councillors when they said the needs were dire and a power failure could shut down the hospital for weeks.

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## Wyoming residents may launch investigation into fire dismissals

Angry Wyoming residents plan to launch their own investigation into what led to three senior firefighters being dismissed.

About 45 people picketed in front of the Plympton-Wyoming municipal office nearly a month after the three were dismissed. Since then five other Wyoming volunteers have resigned or retired in protest of the move by Chief Steve Clemens.

Clemens told The Independent there had been two investigations at the department. He reviewed the findings and took action. Clemens, administration and council have refused to explain what happened saying it is a personnel issue which under provincial law is to be kept private.

Council did issue a press release assuring the community the Plympton-Wyoming department is strong and is able to protect the community even with eight fewer firefighters. The unsigned news release also said council backs the fire chief and the town's administrator who came under fire for the move.

Kim Searson is one of the people concerned about what happened. She and other supporters of the department sat through an hour long fire executive meeting. When the meeting adjourned, one of the people in the crowd asked if the committee would let people ask questions.

Carolyn Tripp, chief administrative officer, says people can address the committee as a delegation. That request has to be made the Thursday before the meeting takes place.

As the crowd continued to press to be heard, Councillor Bob Woolvett, who chairs the fire committee, told the crowd he's always open to hearing from community members but "if it has to do with labour relations I'll tell you straight up front, not

regarding labour relations, absolutely not." Tripp agreed; "Just like any other business, we can't talk about HR issues," she told the

Searson was upset. "As residents of Wyoming we are not stopping," she told Woolvett. Searson wants to hire a private firm to do an independent investigation into what led to the dismissals and how it is being run.

"We're certainly not going to resolve this here tonight...we have policies and procedures we have to follow," Woolvett told the group.

## London man charged after Petrolia chase

A London man is facing a number of charges after a daylight arrest in downtown Petrolia.

Lambton OPP say they had a call on Cameron Road in Dawn-Euphemia Monday morning. About an hour later, another call came in about a vehicle matching the description of the Dawn-Euphemia truck. The driver was stealing gas.

Around 10, officers found the vehicle – a four-door red GMC Pickup - on Robert Street at a car wash. There was a man standing with it. When the officer tried to arrest him, he fled on foot.

The Canine Unit and the Emergency Response Team were called, and LCCVI officials were told to keep students indoors.

Blitz – the four-legged member of the Canine Unit – tracked down a man on Centre St. across from the Tim Horton's parking lot just after 11 am. He was arrested and placed in 1 of the 10 cruisers in the

Kenneth Lewis, 39, of London is charged with resisting arrest, escaping custody, theft of a motor vehicle, theft under \$5,000, possession stolen property, operation of a vehicle when prohibited, and two bail violations.



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
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# Editorial

## Let's talk about the VPP plan

We are interested to see if the Town of Petrolia will bring its \$9.2 million plan for renovations to Victoria Hall to the people soon.

The town recently went to Lambton County Council to try to secure a \$1 million grant over five years to refurbish the historic building which houses Victoria Playhouse Petrolia. The plan includes about \$3 million in accessibility improvements, including two elevators - one for patrons to get to the balcony and one for

While accessibility is important, Lambton councillors didn't agree with the town's premise that the plan should be supported because VPP is a regional tourist attraction. While there is no doubt that the theatre is a tourism driver, it doesn't follow that the town's redevelopment plant should be supported. After all, we don't really know what it is. And we're not really sure the powers that be do either.

So far, town officials have spoken about what they would like. To use the word refurbish or renovate is understating what will be done. The interior of the building will fundamentally change, turning the council chambers into a larger area for patrons to enjoy a beverage. The town also talks of building an entirely new office space beside Victoria Hall in place of the current rehearsal hall. Staff has said the town will work closely with heritage experts to preserve national heritage site. They have also said the old and the new may be connected with hallways, which makes one wonder how true the plans will be to the historic building.

Taxpayers have not had a say on whether Victoria Hall needs this overhaul or whether spending a more modest sum to make it accessible would be better. The idea just reappeared, two years after many councillors said Victoria Hall should remain the seat of local

It's time for council to layout the concept fully and then get public input on it. Council should also explain what it is going to do if it gets a generous federal/provincial grant for over 70 per cent of the cost which it has already applied for, if taxpayers think the \$9.2 million plan changes the character of the beloved Victoria Hall.

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## Farm group wants minimum distance for cannabis

Since the legalization of cannabis in 2019, the national conversation has been dominated by stories of the new sector's rocky start.

Business analysts, industry producers and retail owners have all identified causes for the sector's failure to thrive, from hype-driven business models to supply problems to black market competition.

Any new sector is bound to experience growing pains, and cannabis in Canada is likely to make for popular case studies in business schools for years to come.

But on the ground in Ontario, many rural residents have serious concerns about how this new crop is reshaping our landscape.

Cannabis-growing operations are affecting the quality of life for those living nearby.

Neighbours have been negatively

impacted by the light, sound and smell pollution resulting from this industry.

That's why the CFFO has asked Ontario's agriculture minister, Ernie Hardeman, to establish minimum distance separation policies for cannabis-growing operations.

One year in, Ontarians living near cannabis greenhouses, including CFFO members, are voicing concerns about the negative effects on their wellbeing, particularly during harvesting, when the cannabis odour is pervasive.

It's evident that farmers and rural residents living near cannabis facilities want resolution.

In areas such as the Niagara region, for example, communities are banding together to demand workable solutions from government.

But current federal and provincial regulation gaps have put undue pressure on rural municipalities to respond to residential complaints.

CFFO suggests that provinciallyestablished minimum distance separation policies could go a long way toward resolving public concerns.

Regular farming practices in more traditional commodities are already governed by minimum distance separation rules. Cannabis facilities present an altogether different level of disruption, so it's reasonable to establish specialized minimum distance separation policies for the sector.


Understandably, government has been focused on business and safety regulations, but the well being of rural communities also demands attention. CFFO encourages government to adopt regulations that will bring Canada's newest agricultural commodity to order.

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## Lambton considers energy from waste plant

Warwick Mayor Jackie Rombouts believes there is big money in garbage and Lambton should take advantage of it.

She was one of the majority of council members who agree the county should look at being a host to an energy from waste plant.

There are about six energy from waste plants in Canada - about 1,000 in the US. They turn municipal and industrial solid waste into electricity and heat for industry to use or for heating.

Proponents say it is an ecologically sound, cost effective way of waste reduction and energy creation.

Sarnia City/County Councillor Margaret Bird championed the idea. "Waste is a huge issue," she says adding as landfill space is eaten up, it will be even more pressing to find alternatives.

"Man has traveled round to space and the landed on the moon and we still have landfills," she told councillors. Bird adds energy from waste plants are "widely recognized as technology that can mitigate climate change...

"No waste is ever wasted." Sarnia City/County Councillor Brian White agreed.

"It is the opportunity for our municipality to get into the business and earn a little extra revenue."

Rombouts - whose community hosts the largest landfill in the province - is also keen on the idea.

"There is big money in garbage right now and I agree with Councillor Bird the sooner we get started the better."

Rombouts says it takes 10 years to work through the **Environmental Assessment** process.

"At a minimum it takes 10 years to get things off the ground."

She added the Twin Creeks Landfill could be a good partner saying Waste Management continues to increase the amount of waste it accepts.

County staff will investigate the idea and bring the findings back to council.

## TWO INJURED ON MANDAUMIN



Two people were injured after a pickup truck rolled on Mandaumin Road in St. Clair Township. Lambton OPP went to Mandaumin Road around 1 pm and found a pick up truck on its roof and the people had been thrown from the vehicle. Both people were taken to hospital with minor injuries. Police believe the truck hit the shoulder, the driver over corrected and the vehicle went into the ditch, rolled onto its roof and struck a hydro pole. As the vehicle rolled, the passenger was ejected. The road was closed for two hours while the hydro lines were repaired.

## Bluewater Health officials say infrastructure in better shape now, still needs work

Since then, the province has provided about \$1.3 million in emergency funding to help deal with the aging infrastructure and Oosterman says it has helped.

"We are not in the truly catastrophic state we were in a year-and -a-half ago.'

Since receiving the provincial cash, the sewer systems, generators, water lines, and electrical panels have been renewed.

"In the next few months we'll be completing preparation of the area for the new boiler room," she adds.

And, Oosterman says Bluewater Health will be heading back to the province for more cash.

Originally, officials were looking for \$5 million to upgrade CEEH's

infrastructure, so Oosterman says it is likely the hospital will look for \$3 to \$4 million to complete the needed work.

"We're grateful a lot has already been done," she says. "But this (breakdown) does not come as a total surprise.

"While it is a little frustrating (to wait for funding) we're hopeful we can continue to work with Queen's

"We're building an infrastructure foundation...that is so strong we can build on top of it for the whole new redesign of the hospital.

The province has already committed \$7 million to a 25 year plan to completely renew the campus, starting with a redesign of the emergency department.

"While we all want to see a

new ED because that is what the average person can see, what is so critical is that we are able to run the hospital and not evacuate people because there is no heat."

Oosterman says Bluewater Health will likely apply for more infrastructure funding in May.

It can take months for the provincial government to review the applications.

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## Lambton turns down Petrolia's \$1M grant

Petrolia's bid to get financial help from Lambton County taxpayers to renovate Victoria Hall has failed.

The town is looking to raise \$9.2 million to make the building accessible, create more space for the bar area and add a new office beside the historic building to house council chambers. Officials have said the project includes two new elevators - one for patrons and one to make back stage accessible - and more washrooms.

Last month, officials asked Lambton County councillors to approve a grant of \$1 million over five years for the project saying it is a regional facility which brings tourist to the entire county. It was a refrain Mayor Brad Loosely repeated during the March 4 county budget meeting.

County councillor's major financial decisions at budget involved grants requests including Petrolia's \$1 million ask and a five year plea for \$10 million from Bluewater Health.

Loosely told councillors Victoria Playhouse Petrolia draws about 40,000 patrons per year including 90 tourist buses. "That generates about \$6 million in the community," he says.

"I can't state enough how important the elevators and additional washrooms are to attract more people to the heart of the county."

But councillors were roundly opposed to the move.

Sarnia City/County Councillor Mike Stark says other theatres have found creative ways to raise money for their renovations. "It is important that all cultural facilities are supported however there is a limit," he says noting Sarnia's Imperial Theatre took out a line of credit for its renovations.

"The VPP should have done, and probably is, looking at alternate means of financing." Sarnia Mayor Mike Bradley agreed saying "The county is becoming a bank of choice."

Other politicians were worried about the implications of giving funding to the town for a capital project.


"This sets a dangerous precedent," says Warwick Mayor Jackie Rombouts. "Other communities have large capital projects that attract tourism. If this goes through," she said before the vote, "we're building a new recreation centre and we would be in line next year."

Rombouts won't have to get in line. Council turned Petrolia's request down.

The Forest Kineto Theatre, which was looking for \$75,000 for it's accessibility renovations, was also turned down. And councillors also put a stop to a \$10 million grant for Bluewater Health - at least for now.

Hospital officials asked for the public support over 10 years saying there were major needs at Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital in Petrolia, a new withdrawal management unit will soon be built and the cancer care unit needs upgrades.

While the items are important, Bradley says, Bluewater Health officials didn't give enough specifics to hand over \$10 million. "I don't see this as a pressing need," he says. "They need to define to us what the costs are going to be and what is still needed.

The costs they have given us are so general - just give us \$10 million."

Stark agreed. "This is not an endless pit of money," he says.
Enniskillen Mayor Kevin Marriott

Enniskillen Mayor Kevin Marriott was among the majority of councillors who want Bluewater Health to clarify what is needed. "If it had said \$300,000 for Petrolia ... I would have supported that."

Plympton-Wyoming Mayor Lonny Napper disagreed.

"We had a little problem and we fought for years to save our hospital in Petrolia. It's very important to support it"

Loosely also wanted to see the \$10 million approved for Bluewater Health saying the needs are great.

"What people aren't remembering is there is still another \$5 million just to bring up the electrical equipment alone," says Loosely.

"It's very important to have that hospital function.

"It's unfortunate that maybe it wasn't clarified enough what needs to be done...but Petrolia needs that work done."

County councillors also asked staff to layout a policy for what sort of things the county will contribute to particularly from municipalities.

Loosely says that would have been helpful for the town when looking for money for the VPP project. "They need to tell us if you're going for a grant it has to meet a certain criteria but the county didn't do that," says the mayor.

And he questioned the premise that giving money for Victoria Hall renovations would lead other municipalities to ask for county money for recreation facilities. "You cannot compare our theatre to a parks and recreation facility; this has a huge spinoff in the region," says Loosley.

Tourism Sarnia Lambton, in its 2018 annual report, says sports events are

the largest driver of tourist to the region generating half of \$63 million of tourism dollars each year.

## Lambton passes on 3.42 per cent tax increase

Enniskillen Mayor Kevin Marriott has voted against a number of Lambton County budgets in the last five years.

He's a firm believer in keeping any tax increases to the rate of inflation.

So this year, when Lambton County Council passed its \$220.7 million budget without making any changes with a 3.42 tax increase, it was a bit of a surprise to see Marriott vote in

But he says he's satisfied Lambton County staff have done all they can to keep costs low.

"As I have been known to say in the past, if we had no downloads (from the province), we would be at two per cent," Marriott told *The Independent* after the March 4 budget session.

County Treasurer Larry Palarchio one of the biggest pressures facing the county is downloading from the provincial government.

The public health unit's budget alone increased over \$907,000 just because of the changes the province made to the funding of some programs.

That's driving the \$3.5 million increase in spending.

Palarchio says "1.37 per cent of this increase is strictly due to provincial government downloading."

Palarchio says staff was able to limit spending to a 1.3 per cent increase.

"Our costs are lower than inflation," he told county councillors recently.

And he says the county is getting a little extra revenue.

Because property values are increasing and new homes are being built, Lambton has seen its biggest increase in assessment growth in five years. Palarchio says that will amount to almost \$800,000 in new money.

Councillors took about an hour-and-a-half to go through the two-inch high budget

Much of that time was spent

on dealing will grant requests. (See story on page 7.)
Councillors asked a number of

questions but made no suggestions to trim spending.

Marriott says there was much to be done because the main reason for the increase is a reduction in provincial funding.

"It's kind of hard to argue with staff because without the downloads it (the 2020 budget) would have been at the rate of inflation," he says.

"I sometimes wonder if the downloads are as big as they say they are; I think sometimes they (county staff) even have a hard time knowing the real numbers until the end of the year."

And there is concern of what is to come; the province brings down its next budget March 25 and it could have even more impacts in Lambton.

So, Marriott believes, this budget is as good as it gets for

"What we have in front of us is what it is, I would have liked to see it lower," he says.



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## Optimist hope to build pavilion with grant

Brooke-Alvinston is stepping back from applying for a lucrative local grant and backing an application from the Alvinston Optimists instead.

Each year, the municipality looks for items within the budget which might be eligible for the Alix Foundation grant. It's given to Lambton county communities and service groups for projects which improve life in the area.

The Optimist have been working for several years on a project to improve the Brooke-Alvinston-Inwood Community

Centre. At first, it included indoor renovations, a new canteen and an outdoor pavilion. But as the costs of the project rose, the club decided to build a pavilion only for now. It will include two accessible washrooms.

Optimist building committee head Les Douglas recently came to council to say the group is ready to start construction this spring and it's banking on getting a grant from the foundation to reach its goal of raising 75 per cent of the costs which are around \$300,000.

The club, with the help of a grant writer paid by the municipality, has already applied for a federal and provincial grant

for the project. Douglas told councillors he wasn't getting a "warm fuzzy feeling" they would be successful.

Mayor Dave Ferguson suggested the municipality and the Optimist apply for the Alix Foundation grant together with up to \$80,000 going to the pavilion project and the rest to the renovations of the arena's community centre and hall.

But, Clerk-Administrator Janet Denkers says council and the service club decided not to make a joint application for the funding. The municipality won't apply for a grant this year, hoping to give the Optimist a better chance, she added.



## Oak wilt is next big tree problem

David Nisbet says oak wilt is the most immediate threat to Ontario's

The manager at the Invasive Species Centre says the disease is already causing problems in Michigan.

"It's been found 500 meters away from Windsor Ontario...it is so close to our shores we really need to take action now to protect our oak trees.

Nisbet says it is deadly. "It will kill a red oak tree in as little as four weeks." Emerald Ash Borers - another invasive species which has taken out thousands of trees in the region, takes up to two years to kill a tree.

Nisbet says oak trees are found all over Ontario, particularly in urban areas.

"There are a lot of street trees that are oak and they're popular in municipal parks. The acorns feed squirrels so they're important ecologically."

Nisbet has been able to follow the

path of oak wilt through Michigan where arborists have been dealing with the invasive disease for a number of years.

He says they've been successful in stopping it in some places.

"Oak wilt will spread through root connections

through the ground, so if they can break those connections..with the infected tree, you can stop it." Nisbet says in Michigan, arborist are digging trenches around infected trees to separate the root systems and give the other trees a chance.

He recently told members of the Southwest Woodlot Association in Alvinston the best protection against the disease is to plant a number of different species so one type of disease won't wipe out the entire tree canopy.



## **Risk of COVID 19 low in Lambton**

Lambton Public Health officials say the risk of getting the novel coronavirus here is

The health unit is monitoring the situation as the number of cases across the province continues to rise.

"At this time, the virus is not circulating locally. However, given the global circumstances, Ontario is actively working with municipal and health partners to plan for the potential of local spread," says Lori Lucas, a supervisor at public health.

Lambton County councillors recently voiced concern about how the community would handle an outbreak of COVID 19. Sarnia City/County Councillor Mike Stark was concerned with funding cut backs to the tune of \$900,000 from the provincial government, local health agencies might not have the resources they need.

"I wanted to voice my concern to this potential - you don't want to raise alarm either because you (public health) seem to have it well under control," says Stark.
"The province deals with it by bringing

doctors to the microphone but ...it never talks about the financial cost.

"We're going to be presented with a huge bill (when this is over) but there is not going to be anyone else there to fund it but us."

Andrew Taylor, general manager of public health, says there is money set aside in the

county for situations like this which could be accessed quickly. He added it would be likely the province would reimburse governments after the fact.

And Taylor says public health has a plan in place to deal with any new disease. It was used during the SARS outbreak and concerns about H1N1 influenza in the last

Public health also urging businesses to make plans to protect their workforce.

A few prevention measures include: inventory of resources and access points for hand hygiene and disinfectant of surfaces promotion and education of frequent hand hygiene, cough/sneeze etiquette, and social distancing including staying home when

Individuals at work, school, in the community and at home are encouraged to practice these measures to reduce the spread of illness.

Those with COVID-19 may have little to no symptoms. You may not know you have symptoms of COVID-19 because they are similar to a cold or flu. Symptoms may take up to 14 days to appear after exposure to COVID-19.

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

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## Eagles begin championship hunt


The East Lambton Atom AE squad opens its OMHA final against the Mariposa Lightning this weekend with a pair of home games.
