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'There is going to be hardship...we're trying to intervene now'

"There is going to be hardship... we're trying to intervene now so a lot of sickness and illness don't happen."

That from Lambton's Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Sudit Ranade, as all levels of government restrict the movement of people to stop the spread of the novel coronavirus known as COVID-19.

Officials had been watching the spread of the flu-like virus first in China in December and then across Asia and into Europe. Ontario had its first confirmed case Jan. 25. Health officials kept track of the confirmed cases but March 12, public health officials were finding cases of COVID-19 that they couldn't trace back to travellers. That meant the virus was spreading in the community.

So, one hour after the Ontario Medical Officer of Health recommended it, the Education Minister ordered all publicly funded schools closed until April 5. Students were heading off on March Break travels and the extra two weeks would likely be enough to find any symptoms from the travellers before they headed back to class

The announcement led to a flood of communities closing down public facilities.

By Tuesday, the first Ontario resident died of COVID-19 in Barrie and the number of cases in the province was rising rapidly.

Premier Doug Ford had declared a state of emergency. That closed all indoor recreation programs, libraries, private schools, licensed child care centres, bars and restaurants, except for takeout food and delivery, theaters, movie theaters and concert venues.

"We are facing an unprecedented

time in our history," said Ford this morning during a news conference where reporters called in their questions.

"This is a decision that was not made lightly. COVID-19 constitutes a danger of major proportions. We are taking this extraordinary measure because we must offer our full support and every power possible to help our health care sector fight the spread of COVID-19.

"The health and well being of every Ontarian must be our number one priority."

The premier acknowledge that small business owners are

concerned about losing their livelihoods.

"We won't forget those people," he says. "We aren't going to forget anyone. We're going to spare no expense to protect people's health and their businesses with their support and the help of the federal government."

Families worry as nursing homes locked down to protect residents from virus

Jane Joris says so far, Lambton's long-term care homes have enough supplies and staff to get through the lockdown.

The Ministry of Health ordered all nursing homes into lockdown. That means residents won't be able to have any visitors unless they are dying.

Joris, general manager of long-

term care in Lambton says the local nursing homes were closed to visitors Friday night. Middlesex County started shutting down its homes Saturday.

The only people coming into the homes from outside will be staff. Joris says they are being screened as they enter.

The elderly are the most vulnerable to the flu-like virus which is a world-wide pandemic. Italy has been hard hit by the

virus. It has the second oldest population in the world. The National Health Institute looked at the 105 patients who had died by March 4. The average age was 81.

In the epicentre of the outbreak, Lombardy, physicians report only two deaths under the age of 50.

"We sure don't want to get a virus inside the home it would be devastating," says Joris.

The homes are prepared for a lockdown. Joris says there is

enough personal protective equipment for staff for at least two weeks. And so far, the staffing levels are good. Only one administrator has been self isolating after returning from travelling.

"This is not in our homes, we want to keep it out," she says.
"We need to treat it like the virus is here...we are cleaning like the virus was in the home, we also closed our adult day program so those people have been re-

deployed."

The lockdown has been difficult for families. "I know it's the right thing to do so our residents don't become ill but my mother has been in the nursing home for eleven years and I have been going to see her everyday in the mornings and also in the evenings. I am so upset that I can't visit my mother for this long," says Irene da Silva in a post on The Independent's website.

Oil Springs walker makes a grizzly find

A long-time Oil Springs resident is disgusted by a horrifying discovery she made while out for a walk after church

The woman, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said she was walking on Oakdale Road and saw six dead animals floating in a creek as she crossed a small

"I thought they were dogs, four large ones and two smaller ones, and it looked like their legs may have been bound," she says. "It was very disturbing."

The woman called her brother who called

Lambton OPP confirmed they investigated a complaint on Oakdale Road March 15, about one kilometre south of Courtright Line, and determined the animals were covotes.

"Coyotes are commonly hunted for hide but unfortunately the rest of the coyote is

discarded," said the police report. It did not say if the animals legs had been

No further action was taken.

"Once I learned they are wild animals, I still felt very disturbed," said the Oil Springs resident.

"I realize coyotes are being hunted but it's totally inappropriate to dispose of the carcasses this way. It was a sickening thing to see. Anyone could come across it."

The woman said she believes she might have seen the animal carcasses about one week earlier in the creek but thought they were logs or debris at the time.

It wasn't until the water level came down that she could clearly see what it was.

"This is just beyond my comprehension," she says. "The fact they aren't dogs is a slight comfort but I don't want this kind of disposal of coyotes to be common practice. "Ît's not right."

She has not been back to the bridge and doesn't know if the dead animals have been removed.

"I am so afraid that without us there everyday she will deteriorate and die," says da Silva.

"This will be hard on those who live there. My mum was in Meadowview and it was locked down during her stay," says Jennifer McLean in a social media post. "They look forward to visitors as some are bed ridden and do nothing all day. John and I went and talked to her through the window, luckily

she was on the first floor."

Joris acknowledge it is not idea to isolate the seniors from their families, but an outbreak in a nursing home would be "devastating.

"Don't be afraid to contact us...if you need to contact your family member...the phones may be tied up so be patient," she adds.

Staff at the home are helping to make phone calls and set up video chats to keep residents in touch.

Municipal services curtailed in the age of COVID-19

If you need to do business at Petrolia's Victoria Hall, you'll have to do it by phone.

The Town of Petrolia, like many Lambton County municipalities, is limiting the risk of spreading the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) by closing its doors to the

Laurissa Ellsworth, director of marketing and communications, says staff will continue to be at work, but the public is asked to call or use email for business instead of in person visits.

Plympton-Wyoming, St. Clair and Oil Springs are doing the same thing.

Warwick was one of the first municipalities to take the step of closing its doors to the public.

"While this(COVID-19) is a very serious and fast spreading virus, we can slow it down," said Mayor Jackie Rombouts in a news release. "We are doing what we feel is necessary to decrease the spread of the illness and I am confident that the people of Warwick Township will want to do everything in their power to protect our most vulnerable people.'

Brooke-Alvinston and Dawn-Euphemia are still open to the public but are asking residents to keep a minimum of six feet between people in the office and to stay home if they have travelled out of the country in the last 14 days or are feeling ill.

All municipalities are asking residents to use email and phone to stay connected and. in some communities, there are drop boxes to pay taxes without being in contact with the office staff.

Residents can also pay taxes electronically in some communities.

All of the community centres and arenas have been closed under the provincial state of emergency.

Petrolia was among the first to act, closing

the arena and the Y Friday after the province suggested there should be no one in a gathering with more than 250 people.

Lambton County closed its cultural centres before the province issued the order to shut everything down.

Aside from the 25 libraries, the Oil Museum of Canada in Oil Springs, the Lambton County Archives in Wyoming, the Judith and Norman Alix Art Gallery in Sarnia and the Lambton Heritage Museum in Grand Bend are closed until at least April

Library users can log into the digital resources for eBooks, eAudiobooks, eNewspapers, eMagazines, movies, music all on line.


Tourism Sarnia-Lambton has also closed its doors to the public until April 5. So is Sarnia-Lambton Rebound. Staff will not be on site but will continue to provide telephone supports for high risk and vulnerable clients.

And doctors' offices are limiting the amount of contact people have with others. The Central Lambton Family Health Team's door is locked to patients with officials asking people to call ahead. It is also prioritizing appointments.

"We have to work as a community and help defend against this virus," said Dr. Enoch Daniel in a news release Friday.

"At this point there are no vaccines against this virus, but by being proactive and by taking precautions we can diminish the effects of this virus on our community." The situation around the social distancing requirements from the province are changing rapidly, so officials advise you to call ahead.

Emergency services are still working as normal however municipalities are asking people not to visit fire halls and the police station in person right now.

Mixed feelings over extra school break

In the sunshine, at a picnic table in Petrolia's downtown, three weeks off of school is pretty appealing to Ryan Gruben of Wyoming.

"It's pretty sweet," says the LCCVI student when he's asked about the three week break schools will be taking to reduce the risk of transmitting the novel coronavirus' spread. "Other than the virus."

Education Minister Stephen Lecce made the call March 12, one hour after Ontario's Medical Officer of Health, Dr. David Williams, recommended it and without notifying school boards across the province.

By Friday afternoon, Gruben and his friends were contemplating the whole idea while they sat in the parking lot of Petrolia's grocery store. Gruben doesn't mind the whole idea, but his friend, Rebecca Searson of Alvinston is concerned what life will be like when they return to class.

"It sucks," she says to Gruben. "Do you know how much they're going to have to cram in when we get back?"

What will happen during the two weeks after March Break and when students return April 5 is unclear right now.

Lambton-Kent District School Board officials haven't decided if the school year will have to be extended because of the three week break.

In a letter sent home to parents, John Howlett, director of education, says the

board has been working on its plan which now includes a complete closure of the schools and the day cares associated with them and a full, deep cleaning of the buildings while students are away.

Teachers may use their online learning tools in the break, but the work wouldn't be part of any student assessment.

All field trips in March and April are off and the sports season has also been postponed until further notice.

Educators haven't decided if the school year will have to be extended. But it is clear the shutdown will have a big affect on the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test. It won't run as schedule according to Howlett but the board hasn't determined what will happen yet. Students need to pass the test to graduate. Union officials are calling on the province to scrap the test and the requirement to pass for this year.

Students like Hannah Leroux of Corunna are also worried about their summer plans.

Leroux is a French language student at LCCVI and her options for classes are very limited. She'd plan to take a required English course this summer so she could have two electives during the 2020-2021 school year. Now, she's wondering if she will have that option.

"If they extend the school year, I'll have to drop my summer school plans," she says.

And that makes the break less attractive because it means a lot less choice for her when she returns to classes in Grade 11. "I will only take one elective then," she says.

We must all do our part

A week ago, none of this seemed remotely possible. Today it is our reality.

Petrolia and Central Lambton has joined the rest of the world in the fight against the spread of a new and deadly virus - novel coronavirus or COVID-19. The provincial government has declared a state of emergency. Schools, churches, nursing homes, public buildings, entertainment, sporting events, restaurants and kids program are all shutdown. It's all in the hope of slowing the advance of the virus so it won't overwhelming our health care system.

For many it seems like overkill; a government over reacting like a nervous principal calling a snow day when there is a dusting of the white stuff on the road. But this is not overkill. The threat of COVID-19 is real. Here are some numbers to contemplate. There are 3,100 acute care beds across the country. If the virus mirrors what has been going on in China and Italy, there would be over 500,000 people who would need those beds.

Our health care system would be swamped and doctors, like those in Italy, would have to make difficult choices about who gets treatment and who doesn't. And that will cost lives. Lots of them. Maybe even the life of someone you love.

But it doesn't have to be that way if we all do our part. We don't have to build a bunker and hide away as if the world is ending, but we do have to be smart.

Stay away from big groups. Only go places you have to go, like work and to the grocery store. When you do go out, stay two meters away from people so if they do cough, you're out of the range of droplet spray. Wash your hands frequently using soap and water for about 20 seconds. If you don't have soap and water, use a hand sanitizer. And stay mentally healthy by getting outside and talking to people by phone, video chat or just yelling over the fence. And the Health Minister Patty Hajdu said Tuesday. "There are scared people, there are lonely people, it doesn't take much to reach

This may be annoying or even, for some, frightening, but each one of us can make a difference in our nation's health. We can and must all do our part.

I've been thinking a lot about quality of life these past few days.

As a journalist, I'm keeping pace with the fast-changing rules in the COVID-19 pandemic and passing them along to you. On an academic level, I understand them. On a personal level, like many of you, the affects of the government action are devastating.

I'm a business owner. I worry, like others, about what this pandemic could do to my business. News is always important, but if our advertisers have no customers, they also have no money to advertise. And if they have no money to advertise, I don't have money to keep this enterprise going.

It's a bit concerning, but newspaper like farming - is a difficult business at best and we'll do our best to weather the storm.

For me, the more difficult part of this is the affect this has on my family, particularly my dad.

He just moved into a nursing home with advanced dementia. As anyone with a family member who has gone into a nursing home can tell you, that's not an easy transition. Simply put, he wants to go home.

He can't of course. And now, home can't come to him. At least not in person. Staff at the home have been very willing to get dad to a phone to talk, but with hearing issues, that's not going to help.

We're looking for other ways to connect. We have to for his peace of mind and frankly, ours, too.

We are not alone. I saw a story of a man in Vermont in the US who wanted to be with his wife on their 67th anniversary but couldn't because of a lockdown. Instead he stood on the grass with a sign and waved to her. What sort of quality of life is this for our seniors - kept from family when they need them the most?

You can understand all the science and get the necessity of what is being done, but it makes it no less cruel to those who are now relying only on nursing home staff and don't understand where their family

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No visitors at local hospitals, appointments cancelled

You won't be able to visit loved ones in hospital in Sarnia and Petrolia for a while.

Bluewater Health announced more restrictions as public health officials work to contain the novel coronavirus.

Julia Oosterman, director of communications for Bluewater Health, in a news release, that only women in labour, children, people in palliative care, intensive care or people requiring accessibility accommodations will be allowed one visitor. And they can only

enter after signing in at the nurse's station and may not be sick.

Oosterman says the hospital will only do emergency and life-threatening surgeries. Only emergent and lifethreatening cases will move ahead.

The Pat Mailloux Eye Centre in Petrolia is closed and emergency cases will be performed in Sarnia.

If you have an appointment at any of the clinics within the hospital, including diagnostics and breast screening, it is likely your appointment will be cancelled.

The hospital will be making calls to

reschedule them.

"We will continue to perform surgery on those where time sensitivity is paramount and life-threatening.

"This decision was made collectively with our surgical colleagues and the unanimous belief is that this is a responsible course of action given the current situation," says Dr. Mike Haddad, the chief of staff.

"While we can not predict how long our current strategy will need to be in place, we will continue to coordinate with our medical colleagues to minimize backlog."

No COVID-19 cases in Lambton as assessment centre opens

About a dozen people went through the doors of the new novel coronavirus assessment centre in Sarnia the first day it opened.

But by late Tuesday, not one person walking through the doors tested positive for COVID-19 - the flu-like virus which sparked a state of emergency in Ontario.

Bluewater Health has been given permission to open the site by the Ministry of Health.

Officials say people who have been in contact with confirmed cases of COVID-19 and have symptoms or

people who are in hospital or longterm care and retirement homes with severe respiratory illness will be tested.

Officials ask if you think you may have been exposed to novel coronavirus to call their family doctor first. They're best able to determine if you need a test.

If you do, you'll be given the location of the centre and a form for a test. Then you'll be instructed to go home and self-quarantine. You'll get a call with your appointment time.

If you are very ill, you should go to the emergency department.

Officials say the Assessment Centre is not a walk in clinic - both for infection prevention control reasons,

and the need to ensure that the resources required to test and treat COVID-19 are used on the appropriate patients.

"This will keep symptomatic patients out of the Emergency Department so the hospital can remain focused on the highest acute care needs of this community. Only those meeting the testing criteria will be referred. Most with mild or moderate symptoms will continue to be able to self-isolate and recover at home," says Dr. Sudit Ranade, Lambton 's Medical Officer of Health.

Julia Oosterman, director of communications, says plans are in the works for a site in Petrolia as well.

Wisdom on a pandemic in the grocery aisle

Normally when you walk down the toilet paper aisle at the local grocery store, you just need toilet paper.

But on Friday, Helen Maddox of Petrolia was standing in front of the empty shelves at Heidi's Independent Grocer contemplating the history in the making which led to buying frenzy.

For a while, she talked to some young people. "I told them to take this in, it may never happen again."

For Maddox and many of her generation, the idea of empty grocery shelves isn't knew. She grew up with stories of the depression as a regular staple of conversation. And, living on the farm in Brooke Township as a child, it wasn't all that unusual to run out of bread before the bread delivery man arrived at the door. But they would cope just fine.

"We'd make baking soda biscuits," she told *The Independent* as she leaned

on her grocery cart.

"I've worked in high schools, so I talk to all teenagers," she says adding "they're very lucky they didn't grow up hearing about the depression, about...making underwear from flour bags. That becomes a part of you, it becomes a part of your story."

Maddox has been watching the advance of the novel coronavirus. In January, as it ravaged China, she was talking to Heidi Souddant - the owner of the grocery store - and eerily predicted the empty shelves.

"Back in January...I told her if the virus comes here, will you be getting more Purell (hand sanitizer), because people will panic. I never thought of toilet paper," she laughed.

The run on toilet paper across North

The run on toilet paper across North America has stumped many people. The virus is similar to a cold or flu with respiratory problems - really not a cause to stock up on the white stuff.

But Maddox isn't really surprised at the mad rush to the store.

"I totally understand it. Normally, we don't have to think of our own survival...when we do get to this we have to think about survival.

"We live in the land of plenty, but this is a bit of a wake up call for people. Me included."

Maddox says people become "very aware" that Canadians are "very vulnerable.

"We're still way better off than a lot of places," she says. But Maddox says what is happening today will be a good point of discussion down the road.

"When this (pandemic) is over, maybe people will have a discussion of why not having food security in a country that grows food is a bad idea ... and that 90 per cent of our medicine comes from China."

Until then, Maddox is counting on people working together to get through the measures in place to limit the spread of COVID-19. "There is no point in fear," she says. "Maybe people will work as a community more."

Gladu one of three moving on in leadership race

Sarnia-Lambton's MP says Conservatives tone deaf to pandemic concerns

Sarnia-Lambton MP Marilyn Gladu is one step closer to being on the ballot to become the next Conservative leader

But she's not happy the party is push-

ing ahead with the race as Canadians grapple with the affects of the novel coronavirus.

As public health leaders tighten rules around public gatherings, Gladu says her opportunities to meet potential delegates has disappeared and raise another \$150,000 for the party's entry fee into the race.

Leadership candidates Peter McKay and Erin O'Toole have already met the threshold required for the end of March - 2,000 signatures on their nomination papers. Gladu was frustratingly close early this week after scrutineers

disallowed 600 signatures. So she, and other candidates asked the party to delay the leadership race as opportunities for the candidates to reach the party's deadlines disappeared with the pandemic. It refused.

"A COVID-19 pandemic is not an every day event. The party would be more in tune with the rest of Canada if they postponed the event."

Gladu received word late Tuesday she met the 2,000 signature goal, but she says raising another \$150,000 now, will be tough. "This is not the way I imagined it would be."

Provincial order shuts down conference in Florence

It was a potential public health problem Dawn-Euphemia didn't seem to have the power to stop.

But a conference of 150 people at the Dawn-Euphemia Community Centre in Florence was put on hold when Ontario's premier declared a state of emergency and banned all large gatherings.

Monday, just hours before Premier Doug Ford made the declaration to implement tough measures to stop the spread of the novel coronavirus, Dawn-Euphemia Clerk Donna Clermont told councillors the community centre was booked for the week and about 150 people were expected to

attend the conference including people from the US.

The group rents the facility each year and made the arrangements long before the province recommended people not gather in groups larger than 50 people.

Clermont says she spoke with the organizer twice about the recommendations from the province and Lambton Public Health. Clermont told the organizers there should be a screening process so that no one who had symptoms or had travelled to the COVID-19 affected areas came into the hall. But she didn't believe they were following public health's direction.

"The people did not want to cancel and there was no order (from the province) just a recommendation. We don't have the legal authority to close it down."

That worried Councillor Mark McGuire. "In a worst case scenario, 10 people come away from there infected."

Clermont did tell *The Independent* the township considered declaring a local state of emergency - as Chatham-Kent had done Friday - but because "everything else was under control" they decided against that move.

By Tuesday at 8:30 am, the province solved the problem. Premier Ford declared a state of emergency which included an order of any gatherings of over 50 people had to be shut down. Clermont says staff told the organizers the conference would not be allowed to continue.



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Nemcek's bid to lower Brooke-Alvinston taxes fails

A Brooke-Alvinston councillor's bid to bring down the local taxes failed.

Treasurer Steve Ikert introduced the \$4.46 million operating and the \$1.98 million capital budget in January and a public meeting on the budget was held Feb. 12.

So far, no significant changes have been made and council has a meeting scheduled for March 26 to approve the document..

Mayor Dave Ferguson says the municipality faces a tough job. It lost another \$94,000 in provincial funding this year. That accounts for 3.33 per cent of the five per cent increase.

There are also hikes in insurance rates, the OPP contract and the levy for the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority

"Anything you add on for the cost of living (price increases), it ends up

in the five per cent range," he said recently.

Ferguson was interested in finding savings, recognizing it might be difficult. "We're not looking at doing a lot of big things; we don't have a lot of fat to cut," said the mayor.

March 12, Councillor Frank Nemcek floated the idea of putting off some of the costs of a proposed fire hall. "We're thinking about building a fire hall in Inwood," Nemcek told *The Independent*. The township estimates a one-bay hall attached to the local library will cost about \$200,000. It's set aside enough money in reserves this budget to cover the cost.

"I thought, if we don't put so much of that in reserves, if we need it, we could borrow some money."

Nemcek suggested even removing \$50,000 from the reserve would cut the proposed five per cent tax increase by about two per cent.

"I thought we could bring it down to

the rate of inflation around two-and-a-half per cent."

Nemcek added it wasn't even clear whether the new hall would be under construction this year.

But, his idea was rejected.

That disappointed Nemcek who recognizes most ratepayers are facing large increases because the assessment on farmland has increased so much.

And he says other people in Alvinston are having a tough time financially.

"I know how tough it is out there. I volunteer for the food bank every week, a lot of people talk to me and there are a lot of people who are just scratching by," he says.

"It (a higher tax increase) is not going to break us, but there are a lot of young guys and especially a lot of people in town and they say 'Frank, we can't afford another \$50 a year.'

"It doesn't sound like a lot of money to you and me but...but to seniors it is."

Corrections workers have taken COVID-19 screening into their own hands saying the province hasn't implemented

Jail workers call for COVID-19 screening

Current emergency measures in place at Sarnia's jail in response to the COVID-19 pandemic don't go far enough says a union official representing the workers.

Some restrictions are in place at the jail aimed at reducing the spread of the flu-like virus. Public visitors are now prohibited and professional visitors are restricted.

Also, people with intermittent sentences, such as serving time on weekends, are being given temporary absence permits, allowing them to serve their time in the community with restrictions.

But union officials say health screening for current inmates is sorely

The Sarnia jail has a 98-bed capacity and runs at around 70 percent capacity on average

Ryan Graham, co-chair of the provincial health and safety committee representing correctional and support workers within the Ontario Public Service Employees Union, says workers are taking matters into their own hands by self-screening on an ad

He says health care needs to be more involved.

"Anxiety is through the roof," adding workers are using a verbal screening tool to gauge the health of inmates but it's not adequate.

"The union is not completely happy with it," he says.

Graham says the onus is on inmates to self-report suspicious symptoms, but notes they may not always do so.

"For inmates, there's no reason to give an accurate account of symptoms as they know they will be isolated," he

Graham says physical screening measures should be carried out by a health care professional.

"They (the ministry) need to hire nurses if they don't have one on site," he adds, "They need to be taking temperatures." Graham says workers at the jail are asking for enhanced screening for corrections employees across the province.

According to Graham correctional facilities across Ontario do have enhanced pandemic protocols, but by Tuesday, they have yet to be put in

"There's a big push to get the province to implement the pandemic plan but the ministry is reluctant to implement them," he said.

The pandemic has also disrupted legal proceedings at the Sarnia court house resulting in the suspension of normal operations.

A public website updated Tuesday says those having a Provincial Offences Act matter, or family or criminal court appearance in the March 16 and April 2, do not need to attend court.

Those having matters in March are

scheduled to appear on June 2. People with matters in April are scheduled to appear June 3 and those with matters in May are scheduled for

The website says the new dates will be sent out by mail

June 4.

Ontario Superior Court matters are also suspended.

By order of Ontario Chief Justice Geoffrey B. Morawetz, any accused person who has a criminal matter scheduled for "any type of appearance in the Superior Court of Justice between Mar. 17 and June 2, 2020, the matter is adjourned unless otherwise directed by the court."

The site cautions that those facing criminal charges need to keep upto-date on when their matters will resume. That includes staying abreast of pandemic restrictions, checking appropriate trial websites and consulting with their lawyers.

However, family court remains open and urgent matters, such as child protection cases, will proceed on a prioritized basis.

The website says witnesses; lawyers and jurors should not attend the court between March 17 and May 29, 2020. unless specifically ordered to do so by a presiding judge.

The province says it will use video and other technologies to expedite cases before the courts. The Superior family matters, as well as public health and safety matters will be heard in the

More charges in Oil Springs crash

Lambton OPP say a second car was involved in the accident that killed three Windsor college students south of Oil Springs.

Another man has been charged. In October, the OPP, Dawn-Euphemia and Oil Springs fire departments and Lambton EMS were called to the curves on Oil Heritage Line at Aberfeldy Line. A sedan had veered off the highway in the curve and flipped several times into a field on the west side of the road.

Police photographs posted on social media show the car was heading south and missed the bend in the road, heading into a triangular field between Oil Heritage, Aberfeldy and a short side road leading to Aberfeldy.

The three victims were all 19 and from the Indian state of Punjab. They were studying business in Windsor.

Jovanpreet Singh, 22, was charged with three counts of dangerous operation of a vehicle causing death, dangerous operation causing bodily harm, three counts of criminal negligence causing death, criminal negligence causing bodily harm and obstructing a police officer shortly after the accident. He made a brief court appearance in Sarnia March 2, where the court learned he had changed lawyers.

OPP now say another car was involved in "the events leading up to the crash." Sehajpreet SINGH, 20, of India, was arrested and charged with Dangerous Operation of a vehicle. He was in court March 5 and returns April

Witness watches crash while calling police



'We thought we could do it'

Mooretown Flags goalie reflects on a season without a championship

It seemed as though the Mooretown Flags were destined for championship glory.

And then, the world of sports came to a stop as the rest of the world tried to contain the novel coronavirus.

Jake Wilkins was initially upset when the Provincial Junior Hockey League playoffs were cancelled. The Mooretown overage goaltender says the decision should not take away from the Flags record-setting season. "We will always have that to share," says Wilkins. "We were an extraordinarily close hockey team."

Wilkins, along with Brock Perry, Dawson Vautour and Trevor Bogaert had their junior careers ended abruptly when Hockey Canada pulled the plug on all sanctioned events across the country.

The Flags finished second in the PJHL's Stobbs Division with a record of 33-7,

setting franchise records for most wins, most points, fewest losses and fewest goals against in the process. They had won eight straight post season contests and were preparing to open a best-of-seven divisional final against the first-place Lakeshore Canadiens.

"Obviously, Lakeshore is an exceptional hockey club, but everybody on our team really thought we could do it," said the 21 year-old.

It still hasn't fully sunk in that his junior career is over. "Over the next month or so, I'll probably sink in and become more real," he added.

Wilkins came to the Flags after a less than memorable rookie season with the Dresden Junior Kings. He set records for most goaltender wins in the Flags' history, and he matured and gained lifelong friends. 'Everyone in Mooretown, from teammates to coaches, and trainers, always had your back even when I wasn't playing my best. They were amazing. I never once felt doubt from any of them." Though it's hard not to think of what might have been, Wilkins prefers to look at the season like a glass that is half full instead of half empty. "It was awesome experience for everyone."

"We recognize the tremendous effort that has been put forth all year by individuals across the country as they participate in Canada's game," said Hockey Canada in a release March 13.

"Although it is difficult to process the hockey season ending abruptly, we feel this is the best course of action in order to do our part in keeping our country safe."

Friends and family have reacted to the cancellations on social media with comments ranging from anger to profound disappointment.

"I'm fuming," said one post, while another read "devastation for my 10 year-old and his team."

The Ontario Women's Hockey Association and the Alliance League of Ontario also brought the curtain down on their season last week, bringing an end to championship aspirations by many other area teams.

"So sad... hard to explain to the third year midgets (girls) who have worked so hard and won't get that chance ever again," wrote one parent.

Ontario Hockey Federation cancels spring skates

The body which oversees all minor hockey in Sarnia-Lambton has called off all Spring tryouts in an effort to do its part of slow the spread of the coronavirus.

"The health and safety of all participants in the sport is of the utmost importance to the OHF and its member partners," said the Ontario Hockey Federation in a statement this week.

"As such, tryouts for the 2020-21 season will not be conducted this Spring. Instead

the OHF will provide guidance on when the introduction of the 2020-21 season will begin, subject to the Hockey Canada Board of Directors' future decision when to reinstate all Hockey Canada-sanctioned activities.

"Such introduction will take into consideration ice availability, capacity and other logistics involved in organizing hockey programs."

The federation says it will be in contact with its members when a decision is made to resume sanctioned activities.






