# **Only 100** Lambton tests for COVID-19

There have been only 100 tests done in Lambton County on people suspected of having the novel coronavirus.

And the Lambton Medical Officer of Health says its a direct result of a worldwide shortage of COVID-19 test kits.

There are lots of rumours on social media about suspected cases in the Petrolia, Central Lambton area, but so far none of the tests have come back positive. Lambton Medical Officer of Health Dr. Sudit Ranade says there has been a backlog of testing provincially as well.

Over the weekend, an audio clip of Petrolia paramedics talking about a person with COVÎD-19 hit social media. Ranade says what people heard was paramedics talking about someone they were treating as a possible novel coronavirus patient.

Paramedics screen each person as they attend them, asking about their respiratory health and travel history. If they fail the test, the paramedics take all the precautions they would as if the person had tested positive. "They are treating people who have respiratory symptoms as someone with COVID-19," says Ranade. "There are a number of people who right now have a fever and cough, but they don't have

We haven't had any positive cases coming back, when they come back, you'll hear about it."

However, public health officials are making plans assuming, the virus is already in Lambton County. Ranade says London, Chatham-Kent and Michigan all have confirmed cases already. "With our regular traffic patterns, it is likely here," he says.

But Ranade says without extensive testing it is impossible right now to know for sure. So far, there has been 60 tests done at the dedicated assessment centre in Sarnia.

# Waterville, Huron Web layoff workers due to COVID-19

The economic impact of the fight to slow the novel coronavirus is tightening its grip. Two large companies laid off employees, Waterville TG in Petrolia sent nearly 500 workers home for a week and Huron Web Print and Graphics laid off 73 people without a clear date of when they will return.

In a news release issued Friday, Waterville TG officials say our customers have decided to temporarily cease their operations in order to participate in the worldwide collective effort to stop the spread of COVID-19. So Waterville employees will be off work until March 30. Up to 500 people work at the plant.

'We are aware that this measure has significant financial impacts, and we are working to find alternatives to try to reduce the impact on our employees," says Marie-Douce Pellerin, Human Resources GM. "My management committee and I are not making corporate decisions anymore, but we are ensuring that each of our decisions assures the maximum protection of our employees and of the population,"

adds Benoît Tétreault, the Waterville TG President.

Down Oil Heritage Line, Huron Web Owner Chris Cooke says an unprecedented loss of business led to the layoffs March 19.

Huron Web prints flyers in the US market and many of its customers are large grocery chains. When the United States government started to ask people to stay home to stop the spread of the novel coronavirus, people headed to the grocery stores and started buying up products. The industry soon realized it didn't need to advertise.

# MOH surprised by essential list

Ontario sent more people home in the effort to slow the novel coronavirus, but many people, including Lambton's medical officer of health, were surprised by just who is essential to the economy.

Monday afternoon Premier Doug Ford announced all non-essential business must close by Tuesday at 11:59 pm for the next 14 days. Monday evening, the government released a long list of what is considered essential.

Among those on the list included the obvious, anyone who has anything to do with getting food on your table, restaurants doing food delivery and take out, newspapers, and anything agriculture related since farmers are getting ready for spring planting.

Other essential services included beer and liquor stores, hotels and motels, taxis and all kinds of construction workers, including those working on projects at local hospitals, financial services including the stock

market, mining and resource companies, petroleum companies, real estate agents, environmental companies including well driller and pesticides applicators. In all, the list has 74 categories.

Lambton's Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Sudit Ranade, was a bit surprised so many groups are deemed essential.

"The list is much longer than I thought it would be," he says. "But it reflects the interconnections of what we do.

"I would think it would be a hard task to sit down and say what is essential and what's not and overtime, that list might get shortened."

Online people seemed most surprised, too. "So, what exactly is considered non-essential. Looks like everything is staying open. I don't see any differences," says Lucy

The province is also asking business that can operate remotely to do so. Many businesses are setting rules on social distancing as they continue to operate.

"The grocery stores kept calling and calling and calling saying they did require nserts and wouldn't need inserts for two three four weeks...because there is such a run on stores on both sides of the border, they didn't need to advertise," says Cooke.

"Nor is there (a need) in the foreseeable future.'

Cooke says a million dollars worth of business evaporated in two days. That led to the difficult decision to lay 73 employees off Thursday.

"In 29 years, I have never seen anything like this and I have never been in a position like this."

Cooke says the plant will continue operating on a reduced staff.

'The good news is we intend to stay in business," says Cooke. "I have always said we intend to be the last one (printer) standing, so we are going to operate with a skeleton staff."

'We're in unchartered territory here and I'm not sure what the long term is," says Cooke.

For now, 18 people will stay on and print weekly newspapers - including The

At least one US newspaper has already said it won't print, choosing instead to go online for the duration of the COVID-19

And Cooke is not sure how many community newspapers will survive this seismic shift in the economy.

"This is unprecedented....I don't think everybody is going to get through the other side.

"Most of the weekly newspapers we print are going to print, one weekly newspaper that is not going to print this week or the week after," he says.

"The ones that aren't financially strong there is a potential they won't come out the

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# Power rates cut in half for 45 days

The province is axing the time-of-use power rate structure for the next 45 days.

It's a move Premier Doug Ford says should cut families power bills in half as people self isolate and children are home from school.

Normally, consumers pay between 14.4 and 20.8 cents per kilowatt hour from 7 am to 7 pm. After that it drops down to 10.1 per cent.

For a 45-day period, the government will standardize the rate 10.1 cents-per-kilowatt-hour.

This reduced price will be available 24 hours per day, seven days a week to all

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time-of-use customers, who make up the majority of electricity consumers in the province.

The discount will be applied automatically to electricity bills without the need for customers to fill out an application form.

"We are providing much-needed relief to Ontarians, specifically helping those who are doing the right thing by staying home and small businesses that have closed or are seeing fewer customers," said Premier Doug Ford in a news conference Tuesday.

"By adopting a fixed, 24/7 off-peak rate, we are making things a little easier during these difficult times and putting more money in people's pockets for other important priorities and necessities."

# **Tests for COVID-19 limited in Lambton**

Ranade says another 40 test have been done by other health care providers. "That's changing every day because we are doing more tests everyday. And we're still waiting for lab results," he says.

The province is ramping up lab capabilities. A laboratory in Hamilton is now able to test for COVID-19 and it appears to be making a dent in the backlog. Numbers released by the province showed a marked increase in positive cases Tuesday.

For now, Ranade says Lambton health officials are limiting who receives the test. "The whole health care system is looking around for the supplies," he says. "We wish

we did have the tests but for now, we have to be more practical about who gets the testing and that's out of necessity."

Ranade says people concerned they may have the virus can go to the Ontario government's self assessment site and then, if they have symptoms, they can call their health care provider. That could lead to a referral to the assessment centre. He adds most of the testing is being done when critical patients arrive in the emergency department.

Ranade says in all but the most serious cases, health care providers are telling the ill to stay home until their test results have come back.

# **Stay Home**

Most days in our busy lives, many of us wish for a quiet day at home. We want time to unwind and relax. In the time of the novel coronavirus - we have lots of time just to be still.

Unfortunately, not everyone thinks they should. And frankly - it is going to cost lives.

As you're aware, the province closed schools for three weeks and restricted restaurants to providing only takeout or drive through food services. Companies were asked to figure out ways employees could work from home all in an attempt to keep people away from other people and stop the spread of the flu-like virus which has already infected almost 2,035 people by Monday and killed 24 across the country.

The real concern by public health officials was all of those people coming back from March Break.

There are a number of people who simply ignored those warnings. They apparently feel this isn't serious.

It is. People will die because travellers, who don't feel sick now, will go and do what they want when they want.

You don't know if that person in the Tim Horton's line is just back from Florida or has been back for 13 days and now is starting to feel sick.

You could very easily pick that virus up and spread it around to even more people - and the most vulnerable of our population, our seniors.

It is no doubt exhausting to be isolated. It is frustrating not to go the places we normally go. It will be for some people far more than they can bear financially. (There are federal programs that will help. You can research them online while you are in isolation in your house.)

And for some, the strain on their mental health will be devastating. Reach out to them however you can but at a distance.

If we do stay home, we will save lives. It is that simple.

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# Bracing for the impact of COVID-19 layoffs

Sandra Hartman expects there will be a lot more people visiting the Petrolia Food Bank in the next few weeks.

The manager says it won't take long for people in the service industry - who have been laid off as businesses close to try to stop the spread of the novel coronavirus - to run out of cash. Then, she says, they'll need some help.

"Right now, what I'm hearing from the people I know, is we're all getting by. But the longer this goes on, the more people will be in need.

"Things are getting harder because more things are closing and people are being told to self isolate."

When the food bank opened March 16, there were 30 adults in need with 15 kids to support.

Hartman expects April may be the most difficult month. The federal assistance programs are expected to reach Canadians in May.

And she says it won't be easy for those workers to ask for help.

"Even with so many people in our community not working, it is going to be hard enough to walk through that

Increased traffic is only one of the affects of the flu-like virus in the community. Hartman, like many others, is worried about what she will be able to get to stock the shelves.

"It's difficult getting product right now," she says. "People are stockpiling items. I don't think people know what affect that has on others including food

Hartman says recently she went out to get some things for the food bank and could only find half of what she

And she is also conscious of buying up large amounts of items. "I don't

want to be stockpiling either."

The food bank has changed the way it does things during the pandemic. All the volunteers are wearing gloves. Families are being asked to send just one person to the office. Anyone with any symptoms won't be let in.

Hartman says families are being given a food box but for now, won't be able to come in and make their own food selections.

Even though the food bank is preparing boxes for its clients, Hartman says any donations are welcome right now.


"We will need anything and everything. Sooner or later, it's going to be used," she says


Any food donations that are coming in the door are going into 'quarantine' for a week to ensure if the virus was on the packaging, it would have died.

Hartman says right now, volunteers are serving everyone they can but it isn't clear whether the food bank will be able to deliver to homes if people are sick and in need of support.

"We will help as much as we can with food because that's a stressor."

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# Social services says financial help is available here

Valerie Colasanti wants Lambton County residents to know there is help to get through your personal cash crunch.

The general manager of social services says as more people run out of cash after being laid off during the pandemic, her department is finding ways to make it easier to apply for and get either short-term relief or Ontario Works benefits.

"We anticipate we will see more people as closures continue," she says. "There are lots of people who don't

have money in the bank for more than a couple of days."

With the "sheer volume" of people applying for the federal emergency aid, Colasanti expects there will be a wait to receive benefits and that is where the county can help.

Colasanti says right now, they will help people over the phone without taking the paper work normally required for Ontario Works. She says that can be dealt with later.

Social services can also provide a two-week emergency cheque "until EI comes in," she says.

Workers can also help find ways to deal unpaid power bills.

"There is assistance through Hydro One," she says adding there are a number of resources staff can direct clients toward to deal with their financial issues.

And for the first time, people will be able to apply for help online through the county's website.

Colasanti is expecting a lot of people to be turning to Lambton for help so her department has stopped providing employment programs for now so more people can provide help directly to new clients.

Right now, the office is closed to walk in clients, but Colasanti says people can call 519-344-2057 help.



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# Back home and alone: vacationers return to isolation and restrictions

Dwayne Smith wasn't expecting to be home so early.

And he certainly wasn't expecting to have to ask for help to get his groceries when he returned.

But that's exactly what was happening Saturday morning at Smith's Churchill Line home in Plympton-Wyoming.

He and his wife had been in Florida for some time enjoying their winter getaway in Lakeland with hundreds of other snowbirds. His dad, Harold, was also there with his mom and everyone was enjoying themselves.

Then, Harold's wife had a medical emergency. She was treated well in a hospital there, but had to return to Ontario for further treatment. Harold went home with his wife but Dwayne stayed.

Then, concern about the novel coronavirus began to surface. Soon, Ontario's schools were closing for three weeks and Smith's daughter was hoping her parents would help with child care when she went back to work.

Smith was scheduled to return to Ontario April 3, but as the situation changed minute by minute, Smith decided to head home.

"My wife thought if we were going to get sick, it would be better to be sick here."

He says they were concerned it might be tough to get back into

Canada and by then, Smith's mother was back in the hospital, so they made their way home.

They made it safely, but for 14 days, the couple will be at home, alone, popping out into the garage to pick up the groceries dropped off by the Wyoming Lions volunteers, but not going much farther.

That's exactly what Lambton Medical Officer of Health, Dr.

Sudit Ranade wants. He urging people returning from March Break to self-isolate to stop the spread of the virus. He says this is a critical time to keep it in check.

Ranade says public health has been getting complaints about vacationers returning home and going out in public. He's urging people to handle those situation with kindness. "Shaming people is not going to help. Talk to them saying 'I'm concerned about your health, I'm concerned about my health and the health of my family and friends.' They need to know...but do it with kindness."

Smith believes the regulations are "a little bit of overkill" but he's complying with them so he and his wife can take care of the grand-

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

# Watch for damage to businesses: OPP

If you're closing your business because of the novel coronavirus, the OPP has some tips for you to keep your property safe.

The idea, say officials in the West Region, is to make your property less attractive to

Police suggest removing all valuables from storefront displays and also taking all the cash from the tills, leaving it open with the cash tray out and visibly empty.

Officer suggest you make sure your alarms are working and that your contact lists are up-to-date.

Post on your doors and windows that the building is monitored by an alarm company and that no money is kept on the premises.

They also suggest asking people to call the OPP if they notice any damage.

Police also suggest:

- Clean all windows and floors prior to leaving and note when you've done so (have a log) as this will help investigators should there be a break-in
- Consider a surveillance system which can be monitored remotely by phone/online
- Consider putting a laminate on all

windows/glass to discourage and help prevent easy entry

- Keep some lighting on inside to help with video surveillance and consider lighting on timers if possible
- Ensure all doors and windows are locked and secure
- •Ensure all exterior lighting works and is on - consider motion sensor lights as another
- Remove anything on the exterior which could be used to gain entry to your premises
- including bricks, ladders, poles, and construction materials • Regularly check the building and keep track of when you check, have a log, but go

at different times Police say like your home, if it looks cared for and looks like someone is home or around regularly, thieves will move on to other locations

Police are also asking neighbours and residents to keep an eye on closed businesses and call police if they see any damage.






# Signs of the Times



# Teacher tentative deal draws criticism

Some of the details of a deal between the Ontario government and Catholic teachers are trickling out and high school teachers are voicing concern.

The Ontario English Catholic Teachers' and the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario have reached deals after months of labour unrest.

Teachers said the labour dispute was about cuts to education and Education Minister Stephen Lecce said teachers only wanted a larger wage increase.

"We remain focused on landing further deals, to provide stability and certainty to students, parents, and educators," says Lecce.

It is the OECTA deal that is raising

eyebrows. The Toronto Star is reporting the three-year deal will mean up to 320 more teachers will be in the classroom, with teachers getting a one per cent wage increase and improvements to benefits. But class sizes will inch up to 24.5 students on average and 23 for secondary schools. There will also be two mandatory elearning classes that parents could opt out of after talking with the guidance councillors.

All unions fought against increasing class sizes and any mandatory elearning during the rotating walkouts this winter. There are calls on social media from members of other teaching unions to members of OECTA to reject the agreement saying it is more important to keep class sizes low and avoid online classes

# More restrictions on who can visit hospital

Bluewater Health is further restricting who can be in the hospital with sick family

Bluewater Health is further reducing visiting to ensure a safe and secure environment for patients and staff. Only labouring mothers, paediatric patients, people having surgery, or patients who are end-of-life may have one consistent visitor.

The designated visitors will be screened for symptoms and recent travel, and are required to check in at the nurses' station. Until now, anyone staying the hospital could have one consistent visitor.

"We recognize the impact of isolation for patients and families, and are doing whatever we can to help patients and loved ones stay connected throughout these restrictions.

"We are offering patients other tools to stay busy as we implement best practices to manage anticipated surges in patient volumes due to COVID-19," says Shannon Landry, the hospital's chief nursing executive.

Staff will help patients connect to family with Skype, FaceTime and telephone calls either with their own devices or with devises from the hospital. Bedside TV programming will be offered free of charge for now.

# McNaughton, Bailey part of slimmed down sitting

Lambton County's two MPPs were among a handful of politicians at Queen's Park when legislation to help Ontarians during the novel coronavirus pandemic was past.

Just 24 MPPs, 12 Conservatives, 8 NDPs, two Liberals and the leader of the Green Party were at Queen's Park for an unprecedented sitting March

Lambton-Kent-Middlesex MPP and Ontario's Labour Minister, Monte McNaughton, introduced a bill which ensures workers will keep their jobs if they need to self-isolate, quarantine or recover from the novel coronavirus. It also eliminates the need for a doctor's note to be excused from work. The move is meant to free up time for medical professionals as the number of people infected with COVID-19 rises.

The slimmed-down legislature also passed a bill which would allow municipal councils to hold meetings via teleconferencing. It's a measure which should allow municipal government to continue doing business if members are sick and minimizes contact with other people in a time public health officials are trying to stop the spread of the disease.

Both bills passed unanimously. "It was mission critical to get this done," McNaughton says noting the opposition parties had input before the bill was presented and unanimously passed. "We need to project calmness to everyone out there. We need to allow families to see the

government will be with them every step of the way until COVID-19 is defeated.

"It is incredible to see the country united; the province is united; all levels of government are working together; every political party of every stripe is working together and it is vitally important it continues ... because there is going to have to be a lot of action in the future.'

Sarnia-Lambton MPP Bob Bailey was also in the legislature when MPPs sat at least three seats away from each other. "It was very momentous to be there and to realize the importance of what we were doing.

The legislature has recessed until the end of March, but both Bailey and McNaughton say the work will continue.

McNaughton says there are daily cabinet meetings and 'command table' meetings led by the Health Minister. He also has two calls a week with 100 union leaders and two calls a week with 100 business leaders to get their lay of the land during the pandemic. Everything is being done by phone right now.

Bailey is also fielding a lot of calls, mostly from constituents who are concerned and are looking for information. "A lot of people are uncertain; people are asking us questions and that gives us the opportunity to find the answer. But there are no face-to-face meetings; so far it seems to be working out pretty good."

And while people are concerned, Bailey says he's glad to see people visiting elderly neighbours and offering to help out.



"I was really disappointed," said the Northern Collegiate grad. "But, I felt worse for the seniors on our team," noting that four players from their small nine-person roster, including players from Spain and New Zealand, had their college careers come to an unexpected and abrupt end. Eckerd had won 11 straight games and was 24-5 overall when the season ended.

Whiteye started all

29 games for the St. Petersburg-based school this season averaging 11.1 points and 5.3 rebounds per game. She was in the top 20 in the conference in scoring, rebounds and shooting percentage and cracked the top 10 in three-point shooting, steals and minutes played per game.

She was also named to the Sunshine State Tournament all-star team, averaging 18 points per game including a career-high 27 points in the quarter-finals.

Whiteye doesn't expect to be returning to the sunny south any time soon.

"I'm almost certain they (classes) will be just online for the rest of the year."

In addition to her studies, she will stay sharp with home-based workouts and looks forward to the 2020-21 season, albeit she admits it will likely take on a very different look. "It will definitely be a rebuilding year." She expects to be called upon by her coaching staff to provide leadership to younger players during her upcoming senior season.

The Sarnia Sting would not have been part of the postseason. They finished last in the Western Conference and did not qualify.

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
