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Saying goodbye to a brother: Brooke firefighter dies in collision

Tanner Redick was doing what he loved.

The 20 year-old Brooke Fire Rescue firefighter was home from his first career job at Six Nation Fire and Emergency Friday. He had been to Petrolia to see the fire department's new ladder truck. Redick had worked there one summer and wanted to touch base with Chief Jay Arns and get a look at the bucket and ladder.

He was heading home back down Petrolia Line when his black pickup truck collided with a combine heading to a field near Old Walnut Road to finish the corn.

The call went out to the Alvinston station. Redick's uncle, Deputy Chief Kris Redick, was in charge of the call. "We had firefighters on the scene already," he says. They had been working nearby. They heard Redick's voice over the radio and met him at the truck when he arrived to tell him his nephew was behind the wheel and he was dead. Another firefighter took charge of the scene momentarily. "It took me about five or seven minutes to square my head to what just happened," says Redick. "I was sick to my stomach

because I wasn't helping." So, he went back to work, doing what he could, because that's what he had been trained to do. That's what he'd trained Tanner to do.

The deputy chief says his nephew was like most kids in Alvinston, he played a lot of sports and hung out with friends. At about 16, Tanner mentioned to Redick he was thinking about being a firefighter.

Redick told him; "If you want to do it, you have to change your philosophy of what's important and what's not." Tanner took him seriously and soon he was part of the team at the Alvinston station as a student firefighter. When he was 18, he became a probationary firefighter and as soon as he received all his training, Brooke Fire Rescue gave him his yellow helmet - Number 2.

"When the page went off, Tanner always wanted to be on the action truck," says Redick. "That's the mental attitude a firefighter needs. We say the work is the reward."

The deputy chief says he was hard on his nephew, at the station and at the Lambton Fire School where he is an adjunct professor because there was something special about the young man. **SEE FUNERAL PAGE 3**

Neighbours in the dark as Wyoming area farmland becomes residential

Plympton-Wyoming council is under fire after Confederation Line residents found out a farm field west of town may become a subdivision.

It's part of a settlement between JN Ventures - a company headed by Developer Brad Zantingh - and Lambton County as they work through issues around the Official Plan at the Local Planning Authortribunal in January. Zantingh long has maintained the plan, which limits residential development to specific areas, has devalued his land. He contends the farmland is within the Lakeshore Development area and should be residential.

In October, both the county and Plympton-Wyoming ratified an agreement which could end the dispute. Part of that agreement will see construction of a small estate subdivision in the Lakeshore Road and Townsend Line area.

part of the deal. It had never been contested in the years of Official Plan wrangling.

Hanki only found out that JN Ventures would be able to develop a subdivision there when the county's manager of planning called to tell him about the LPAT hearing.

"It's hard to believe the County of Lambton could include this small parcel of land...I'm in the middle of it and at no point was I approached about it," he says. "If I build a garage...the neighbours are advised. This piece here has been bypassed."

Plympton-Wyoming council Dec. 11, he was told little of the deal would turn 10-acres on Confederation Line into a subdivision. Chief Administrative Officer Carolyn Tripp said the information was part of a legal process and could not be discussed publicly.

Other councillors suggested they were not really aware the Confederation Line property was part of the proposed settlement.

"Our motion did not include this property, it only included the lakeus under the hammer. If we didn't approve their plan, we were taken to court and we were going to be sued."

But Councillor Netty McEwen disputed Wright's claim saying they discussed "the Wyoming" lands" in closed door sessions as early as September. "I still don't understand to this day how that was thrown in to an appeal process on the Lakeshore area.

"I'm really frustrated with the way this came down. We should have been informed," she says. Councillor Tim Wilkins agreed.

Brooke-Alvinston is making plans to move fire equipment out of the Inwood fire hall.

That after Clerk Administrator Janet Denkers told councillors Dec. 12 she had not received a reply to council's request for a one-year lease of one bay at the

hall owned by the Inwood Fireman's Association.

The municipality and the association have been at odds over a lease for months now. The current lease expires Dec. 31 and without a deal on the horizon to continue using the hall, council agreed to start making plans to house the equipment somewhere else. They're also setting up mutual

aid agreements to help cover Inwood while the situation is being resolved. "We've received no response and now we're moving forward," says Denkers.

Fire Chief Jeff McArthur and Public Works Manager Randy Hills have found a number of places near Inwood to store the equipment for use in the area. Denkers and McArthur were at

Dawn-Euphemia Council Monday to make sure if they needed space, some of the equipment could be placed in the Cairo garage. Council gave its approval for the move.

Brooke-Alvinston Mayor Dave Ferguson stressed even with plans being made, the municipality was still willing to talk to the IFA about a lease.

After the meeting, Inwood

resident Mary Ethel Douglas, suggested Inwood is left without a fully functioning fire department. McArthur disagreed. "The Inwood community is better protected now than when I arrived."

Kris Redick, deputy chief of the Alvinston station, agreed. "It's all one service...It doesn't matter if you are in Inwood or Alvinston were here to do the job."



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Tile Yard sidewalks costly: report

There is no inexpensive or easy way to make Tile Yard Road pedestrian friendly.

In February, Sean Pachett came to Petrolia Town council saying there would soon be 70 students travelling from the Glenview subdivision to LCCVI. Most use Tile Yard Road because it is the most direct route. But there are no sidewalks along the busy road. and there is only a two-foot strip of concrete on the bridge over Bear Creek which pedestrians walk on.

The issue has been raised in the past with administrators saying a solution would be costly, particularly considering would be no easy solution to giving pedestrians access at the bridge.

Pachett says there are options, including attaching a pedestrian bridge to the current structure.

Council agreed to look at possible solutions and hired BM Ross to evaluate the road.

Curt Bladon says there are no quick solutions and the cost could reach \$750,000.

Bladon looked at three solution; putting a concrete sidewalk on the west side of the road for about \$180,000, paving the shoulders of the road - about \$315,000 - or building a multi-use paved path for about \$238,500.

"And that doesn't include the environmental costs," Bladon told council on Dec.

"If a plan was approved, you would have to pay for the cost to clear that vegetation out." Trees hang over Tile Yard Road obscuring what lights shine on the road.

"You could add 50 per cent to that (the cost of the sidewalks) maybe."

He says there could be additional costs for environmental studies, approvals or any engineering costs.

Officials with the St. Clair Conservation Authority have expressed concern about clearing out some of the trees in the flood plain.

And while the cost of the sidewalk is high, Bladon says "the biggie is the bridge.

"We can't be funnelling people from the road to that bridge."

Bladon says there is no way to put a sidewalk on the narrow bridge and the county has no plans to do any work on the span for the next 10 or 15 years.

That leaves Petrolia with the option of a stand alone bridge beside the crossing. Bladon says that could cost between \$300,000 and \$500,000. "That ends up being quite expensive."

Councillor Wade Deighton, who runs along the road every day and says something needs to be done, says the cost of a sidewalk is very high. He suggests for the time being, Petrolia look at cutting back some of the trees.

"The trees are encroaching into the roadway and the should be cut back. They're overgrown to the point where I've seen trucks clip them.'

Deighton suggested if the trees were trimmed the lights that are there would provide better coverage for anyone walking in the pre-dawn hours.

Mayor Brad Loosley agreed. "Some of the simple things, like trimming trees and putting in lights, we could. But it is unfortunate not a simple sale."

Other instructors saw it, too. "One instructor at Lambton came to me and said 'He's going to be good, but he's got to get his ego under control.' His parents got a good laugh out of that," says Redick.

Shawn Redick and Jenny Rate, he says, are devastated by their loss. Rate is having a hard time going into her son's bedroom the hurt is so deep.

And his Six Nations brothers are also devastated by the loss. Redick had only one week of probation left before his realized dream of becoming a full-fledged career firefighter at Six Nations came true says Chief Matthew Miller.

"During his academy training, Tanner exemplified in every way exactly what was needed to be an incredibly strong, dedicated and committed firefighter," wrote Miller in a Facebook post. "We are eternally grateful for the time which we had with Tanner; his presence made us a better service and better

at times and wanted to come home. He'd always planned to live in Alvinston and commute for work, but didn't want to pass up the chance at this career position. "I told him he could get his ass kicked there or he could come home and get his ass kicked by me." Tanner stayed.


Wednesday, firefighters from Six Nations and Lambton County will march from the station to the funeral home to pay tribute to the young firefighter with so much promise.

"I feel council did have said, we could have said no, let's go to court. We did have say," says Wilkins.

Minutes show both Wilkins and McEwen voted against the settlement deal in the private meeting. Details of the package are not public yet since the LPAT hearing is still ongoing.

Jason Cole, the general manager of planning and infrastructure at Lambton County, says county staff called Hanki to make sure he knew what was going on and had the opportunity to go to the hearings.

Take time to say thanks to a firefighter

We ask a lot of our volunteer firefighters. That, as Newsman Peter Newman used to say, is not news, it is reality.

There is the obvious - they agree to walk into burning buildings to save their neighbours; they are called at all hours and have to be awake and ready for action at a moments notice; and they have to know what they're doing, so they spend hours on end training to be the best they can be - all for our benefit.

The costs are huge. They lose sleep. They see things no person should have to see. And, often, their mental health takes a beating. A recent study showed about two per cent of Canadians suffer from post traumatic stress disorder. First responders experience PTSD at twice the rate of the rest of the population. It's estimated across the country 70,000 first responders have suffered from PTSD in their lifetimes.

All that is daunting. But now consider the service of a volunteer firefighter in a small town. Not only do they serve their community - they know their community. It's not just a rare occasion that they arrive at the scene of a fire or a car accident and they know the person in distress. When The Independent talked to the deputy chief of the Alvinston station, he named a half dozen times he arrived on the scene to find a friend or relative in trouble. That is brutal.

And yet, in Brooke-Alvinston, those volunteers, even in their grief over the loss of one of their own, continue on. When the pager goes off, even as they wait for Tanner Redick's funeral, they're responding. That is admirable.

Not everyone could be a firefighter and not everyone could give so selflessly to their community like that.

Volunteer firefighters are truly a unique brand of people and sometimes we forget that, until there is a tragedy. So, when you see one this Christmas, take their hand, look into their eyes and really thank them for all they give up for their community.

Brooke-Alvinston neighbours assured no biosolids allowed

Buurma Farms will be able to rezone some of its property on Lasalle Line to rural commercial, but the family won't be able to bring fertilizer made from biosolids onto the property.

Roger Buurma has come to Brooke-Alvinston council a number of times this fall to have a small parcel of land merged with another property and to have it zoned rural commercial.

But neighbours voiced concern the family may bring biosolid fertilizer to the property. The Buurmas own Lasalle Agri and the company has faced problems in Warwick Township after accumulating a large amount of the fertilizer at Nauvoo Road and Highway 401. The municipality there ended up charging the company under the zoning bylaw for running a commercial operation on agricultural land.

Neighbours told council they couldn't spend time outside because of the smell.

Lambton County Planner Rob Nesbitt says the site plan agreement for the Brooke-Alvinston property strictly prohibits what can go on the property which will have a drive shed.

"The applicant is now asking for a limited amount of fertilizer to be stored in the shed," Nesbitt told council Dec. 12. "It must be prepackaged, nonorganic fertilizer meaning no human or animal based fertilizer." Only 10 per cent of the drive shed can hold fertilizer according to the site plan. Buurma says he's satisfied with the agreement saying it gives him the

agreement saying it gives him the flexibility to bring fertilizer in for the business. "We have no intent (to bring in

biosolid fertilizer) and likely never will, just gives us the freedom to do so."

But Nesbitt stressed, no biosolids would be on the property without council's permission and that should satisfy neighbours who wrote to council to voice their concerns again.

"In a legally binding agreement, the stipulated material they are worried about can't be stored on site," says Nesbitt. "If there were a contravention of that agreement the municipality could take action."


Students at Lambton and Chatham-Kent high schools were at home again as the high school teachers union continues to put pressure on the Ontario government during contract talks.




The teachers say the dispute is about cuts to education, including larger class sizes and mandatory e-learning while the province says teachers are only concerned about wages.

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

Conservation authority budget up 16 per cent

There will be a trickle down effect from the cuts to conservation authorities by the provincial government.

The board of the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority has passed the \$8.5 million budget at a meeting Monday. The 17 member municipalities will see on average a 16 per cent increase.

Conservation authority officials say \$150,000 of the \$156,175 increase is a direct result of the funding cuts from the province. They add most homeowners in the watershed pay less than \$5 per \$100,000 of assessment for conservation services. The average is \$3.61. That's the lowest levy of all 36 conservation authorities across the province, even though St. Clair is one of the ten largest landholders in the province. The proposed 2020 will spend \$120,000 less on Flood Control Operations and Maintenance. But there will be some big capital projects this year, including stabilizing the Lake Huron shoreline in Sarnia at a cost of about \$750,000. The authority will draw on reserves for most of those projects.

Dawn-Euphemia Mayor Al Broad was one of two people voting against the budget. He says the township has a 22.9 per cent increase in its levy.

"It passed easily," he told councillors Monday. Petrolia was the only other municipality to vote against it. Both Plympton-Wyoming and Brooke-Alvinston had voice opposition to the budget but the representatives were not at the meeting.

"At \$8.5 million, I thought we could find at least one penny of savings," says Broad.

The budget will be presented at the annual meeting in January.

Frustration as Plympton-Wyoming delays again

'Don't come back, we're incompetent' says councillor

Frustration boiled over after Plympton-Wyoming council again delayed a decision on a site plan for a new business at the former Bonnie Doon Golf Course.

Matthew Ferguson runs Ferguson Estates - an event venue - on the property. He also plans to put in a driving range and a corn maze. That means he won't have to rezone the property but he does need a site plan and that has taken months to work out.

Neighbours questioned whether if the property is properly zoned as an open space, even with a driving range, since the golf and Douglas, wasn't sure the monitoring system would work either saying there plan isn't based on any kind of science.

"This approach isn't even workable," he says. "I urge you to stop to get the noise science right and even get an outside opinion."

And Duxbury added he believes the zoning on the property isn't right because the driving range isn't the same as a golf course and the event venue appears to be the main business. Ferguson Estates had been marketing itself as a wedding venue since June without talking about the proposed driving range.

Deputy Mayor Muriel Wright was concerned enough about the zoning, she asked for the matter to be deferred for the third time so the town's lawyer could be consulted on the issue.

"I want to get this right I don't want any lawsuits, there are conflicts of different reports...I would like to get our own lawyers opinion," she says. Wright, Councillors Netty McEwen, Bob Woolvett and Gary Atkinson all agreed to wait for the lawyer's decision. That angered Councillor Tim Wilkins who had argued the restrictions on the company were setting them up for failure. After the vote, he turned to Ferguson and said: "Don't even come back to us - we're incompetent." He was interrupted by other council members objecting. But Wilkins went on: "This has been to us four frick'n times and now you want a legal opinion? This is ridiculous."



course isn't operating any more.

They're also concerned about the noise coming from the venue. Elizabeth Bellavance and Keith Douglas have told council they could clearly hear the parties when two weddings and a family gathering were held earlier this year.

Lambton County Planner, Sarah Baldwin, says it is properly zoned and she devised a noise monitoring plan which would have required the owners to keep the noise below 50 decibels at all times. Ferguson told council Dec. 11 that's a concern since an idling tractor creates 80 decibels of noise.

Mayor Lonny Napper says Ferguson Estates should not be the only business subject to noise regulation. He believes there should be a town-wide noise bylaw and a bylaw enforcement officer to deal with complaints. Brian Duxbury, the lawyer for Bellavance The Ferguson Estates site plan will return to council possibly as early as Jan. 7. Council has also asked staff to bring back a Noise Bylaw for possible use in Plympton-Wyoming as well as the costs of hiring a bylaw enforcement officer. Warehouse Corn Broom

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



Dawn-Euphemia's insurance jumps 20 per cent

Dawn-Euphemia is facing a near 20 per cent increase in insurance rates and a fire at the Florence Library is partly to blame.

Clerk-Administrator Donna Clermont told councillors Monday the current insurance adjustor - Frank Cowan - will renew the township's current policy for \$113,181 - \$18,473 more than last year or 19.5 per cent. "It's a bitter pill to swallow," she says.

Clermont says the township has had five claims in the past 10 years, and

the fire at the Florence Library this summer. County officials have said the bill for the fire is likely to exceed \$45,000 although the final bill hasn't been tabulated.

Clermont says because there have been a number of significant claims, the premiums are rising. One of the accidents occurred in 2010 and will not be a factor in insurance rates by September.

And while councillors first inclination might be to look for a new insurance policy, Clermont says that might not be a good idea. She says Sarnia went out for a proposal on insurance and found its rates went up 42 per cent. Brant County recently had an 88 per cent increase in insurance rates.

When North Bruce had a 44 per cent insurance increase, it opted to go out to look for a new policy - it ended up paying 66 per cent more.

Clermont added over the past five years the cost of the township's insurance has gone up about 7.5 per cent a year.

"As much as we regret the increase, Cowan has done a good job," says Broad "and we don't have a whole lot of options."


