Corunna parents concerned after positive COVID-19 test

Some parents are expressing concern and are considering online learning after someone at Col. Cameron Public School tested positive for COVID-19.

The Lambton-Kent District School Board posted an alert on its website today saying there has been a confirmed case of COVID-19 at Col. Cameron Public School in Corunna. It is not clear if it was a teacher or student involved.

The notice says Lambton Public Health is working closely with the school community and is contacting anyone who may have been in potential contact with the virus. If you don't receive a call, public health officials say, you were not in close contact.

Classes are continuing and the board is asking parents to "continue to monitor your child for symptoms of COVID-19. If your child is ill, please keep them at home and call your health care provider or local health

As parents gathered up students Tuesday afternoon, one father, who had been contacted about the COVID-19 positive person, admitted he was worried about it.

"It makes us think a lot more about the on-

line learning," he said while waiting for his child. The father asked not to be identified.

"The big concern is we don't know who contracted or where they were in the school," he added.

COVID-19 confirmed in Corunna school

Provincial guidelines say anyone in a cohort with someone who tests positive is "considered at high risk of exposure." An isolation period and recommended COVID-19 test are the next steps for anyone in close contact.

Other parents who did not receive a phone call because their child was not in direct contact with the person, were also considering whether online learning might be a better option for their child.

Four of six parents who The Independent talked to said they would be considering a move away from in-person learning following the news.

At the same time there were parents who remained confident with in-person learning as long as there was only one positive case.

"I thought the school handled it well informing us and I don't have any urgent concerns.

While this is the first COVID-19 case in a Lambton County school, it is among many in the province.

Public Health Ontario says 72 more people in the province's schools were diagnosed with COVID-19 Tuesday. In all, there have been 948 cases of the virus in schools. Right now, 436 schools have at least one case of COVID-19 and three schools have been shutdown.

Ontario is struggling with increasing numbers of people testing positive for the virus, particularly in the larger urban centres.

Tuesday Ontario reported 746 new cases of COVID-19, and 807 Monday.

Lambton also saw two people test positive on Sunday, although only one person is listed as having active symptoms.

And while the news is good in Lambton earlier this week there were no active cases - the Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Sudit Ranade, warns things could change quickly. "There is a low prevalence, in part, because people are taking this seriously.

'We need to pay attention to what is happening in Toronto because this is how it (the pandemic in Ontario) started," he told councillors. "We would expect some rise in the number of our cases because of travel."

Ranade says with the increasing concern, he expects the province will be tightening some of the restrictions in the province. He says "indefinite lock down is unsustainable" and "unrestricted freedom risks an overwhelmed health system.

"Everyone in the world, everyone in Canada is trying to find the right balance." Ranade says there are calls for a lock down and calls to keep the economy moving right now. "In some ways, if everyone is unhappy, then you're close to finding a balance.'

County councillors did voice questions about the province's new mandatory mask order. It requires everyone over two years of age to wear a mask. Sarnia Mayor Mike Bradley says his staff tells him it doesn't contain the same guidance for places of worship that municipal bylaws do. The county will look to Sarnia-Lambton MPP Bob Bailey to clarify the new orders.

Meantime, it appears the province has made some progress reducing the backlog of processing the tests. A week ago, 90,000 people were waiting for results. By Tuesday, that number was down to just over 28,000 with Ontario sending some of the tests out of province.

Jolene DeGurse-MacDonald said at the

time that over the years there have been safety improvements at the corner. In the 1970s, her mother, who still lives at the corner, convinced the local government to install an amber light, a larger stop sign and lower the speed limit to 70 km/h on Petrolia Line. In the 1990's, rumble strips were added, she says.

"The accidents continued. The fatalities mounted."

DeGurse-MacDonald says she has talked with county road officials in the past who say the intersection has not been a priority

Her concerns prompted Lambton County officials to study what could be done at the intersection.

A four-way flashing light has been installed at the corner since then.

Bluewater Health poised to help nursing homes

Officials at Bluewater Health say they've worked through the summer with long term care homes to prepare them for a second wave of COVID-19.

This as Ontario's Patient Ombudsman called for immediate action in long term care to prevent more deaths during the second wave of the pandemic. Cathy Fooks released an interim report recently after getting a large number of complaints about how long term care homes were handling the COVID-19 pandemic.

Families, residents and staff at homes across the province called the office worried about loved ones in homes. "We received over 100 complaints about infection prevention and control in long-term care homes,"

"Caregivers also expressed concerns about lack of communication from hospitals and long-term care homes. Given their inability to visit, caregivers told us that the lack of communication is particularly distressing."

And, many of the complaints were about significant problems jeopardizing the safety of staff and residents. The situation was so dire that Fooks contacted the Minister of Long Term Care in both April and May to express her concerns and explain some of the major issues.

Patient Ombudsman also started active investigations to try to fix problems which were directly hurting residents and the staff, including in homes where the shortage of personal protective equipment was leading to personal support workers becoming ill.

Fooks says "every long-term care home should have a partner organization to provide support for management, infection prevention and control, and staffing to prevent and respond to any COVID-19 outbreaks."

Julia Oosterman, the chief of communications at Bluewater Health, says "this is happening informally in Lambton already."

In May, when Vision Nursing Home spent weeks in outbreak with 10 people dying, Bluewater Health came along side the home and worked on infection control and the use of personal protective equipment. Eventually, some residents were transferred to hospital so the home could undergo a deep cleaning.

And while the Patient Ombudsman is asking for a formal link, Oosterman says the hospital has already been reaching out to homes to help with any ongoing concerns about infection control.

"We've reached out to many of the homes in the community...because the minute an outbreak happens, the hospital will be affected. We need to figure out how to keep people safe in place so, as much as it is possible, we not have outbreaks and we do not have 15 to 20 people coming to hospital."

Oosterman expects if long term care homes are affected in Lambton, they will be better prepared simply because we know more about how the virus spreads.

Aside from hospital support, Fooks also urged the government to make sure essential caregivers remain by residents sides, with proper infection control measures.

Visitor restrictions based on the recommendation and at the direction of the Chief Medical Officer of Health have undeniably been a significant hardship on patients, residents and their families," she said, adding many family members could not make decisions on care for their loved ones because they couldn't enter the home.

Fooks said they heard accounts of long term care home residents and patients dying alone without their families there to support them. "Many of the people who came to our office reported that they meet the definition of an "essential visitor", and did not understand why they were not able to visit or accompany family members who need support to receive health care."

The province has already changed the rules to allow caregivers to be by the family's side even during an outbreak. However some senior's advocates are worried that recently Dr. Barbara Yaffe, Ontario's Associate Chief Medical Officer of Health said local public health officials could stop essential care givers from entering into homes during an outbreak

Fooks says long term care homes also have to do a better job communicating with the residents and their families.

Fooks also wanted whistle blower protections enhanced for workers. She says they received 20 whistle blower complaints from April to June and many were of a "very serious nature" in long term care homes.

Some were about residents not receiving basic care because there simply wasn't enough staff on site.

Health coalition calls for long term care plan

The head of the Ontario Health Coalition wants Ontario to take a page from Quebec's pandemic playbook. Natalie Mehra says the province should

put the full weight of government behind a solution to help long term care weather the second wave of the COVID-19 pandemic. Mehra voiced concern the second wave in long term care is "getting more serious

daily." Nursing homes were the hardest hit in the spring as COVID-19 swept through particularly older homes which had more than one person per room. To date, 1,875 seniors in long term care have died.

Tuesday, there were 66 homes which are in outbreak with 154 residents and 205 staff members who have tested positive for the

"What we have not seen is the change in long term care. Some homes have stepped

up...and really responded very well. "But there is alarming evidence the requirements from the Ontario government for the homes have not improved."

Mehra says there are still health care workers without N95 masks treating COVID-19 cases and there are still many homes where residents are sharing rooms and washrooms which allows the virus to spread rapidly.

"We wanted a cross-province, systematic plan...and when there was one case of COVID-19 in a home, these measures snap into place." But she says there is no clear direction to the homes and despite promises of 3,700 new personal support workers and nurses, those people are not in the homes.

Mehra says Ontario should be following Quebec's lead. In June, it launched a strategy "with the full weight of government behind it" to hire 10,000 PSW and raise their salaries to \$21 per hour for PSWs in training and \$26 for those who are trained and working in long term care. Quebec also beefed up infection control in the homes.

"We need something like the Quebec government has done, where we recruit the staff we vitally need in the homes...and we need a minimum standard of care.'

Petrolia should spend its green to be green

It's been four years since councillors from the Town of Petrolia shutdown the compost site on Maude Street. Residents were disappointed their tree and leaf drop off point was axed with very little consideration of how to fix any of the problems the Ministry of the Environment had flagged - the problems which led administrators to advise council to close the site and outsource composting to Waste Management.

Staff at the time argued it would be far too costly to meet the MOE standards, even though most of the recommendations had to do with better staff training and record keeping. At the time, staff told council the entire area would have to be fenced off costing thousands of dollars - something that was never indicated by the MOE.

But council closed it and the masses cried out for their site. It became an election issue. And now, more than two years after the election, council still dithers.

The issue was supposed to be decided Tuesday, but was delayed again after several residents voiced concern about the cost of the project. They want the town to promoting backyard composting. A report from the director of operations suggested this could be a no-cost solution to the town's composting needs.

Backyard composting may be a very good solution; lower cost, less transportation, and anyone with a yard can do it. But its not clear what the results will be, especially since it appears the town would not invest any money in the project.

For a backyard composting program to work, the municipality should be encouraging it, not just with words, but with cash to show this is important. Free or at the very least, reduced rate composters would need to be purchased by the town. They could be locally sourced. And education is key to making sure people do composting the right way. That takes money, too.

The problem in Petrolia is - and has been for years - not the means by which people compost, it is the unwillingness of politicians to do spend some cash to do what is right for the environment.

Petrolia should live up to its town colours and spend some green to be green. Yesterday.

Trump's catastrophic failure of leadership and empathy

The US election is a little like the accident on the highway - you don't really want to see people in pain but you can't look away. And it is particularly riveting as the candidates move toward the finish line.

But not in a good way.

While I know many of you like US President Trump and what he stands for, I question what he's doing when it comes to the pandemic.

Last week, the president and his wife were diagnosed with COVID-19. Normally, for a man who is 74, this could be a huge problem.

It seems the president dodged the bullet, no doubt in part to have at least a dozen doctors in his hospital in his home - The White House - and one of the top hospitals in the country Walter Reed (the official hospital of the president) using every possible

drug to make sure he pulled through. It's not a luxury most Americans have.

And while Trump knows this, instead of gaining some empathy for those suffering who can't afford the best care, he uses his COVID-19 status to try to show his administration has the pandemic completely under control.

It doesn't. As I write this, 315 more people died today, bringing the death toll in the US to 45,927. That's the highest death rate per capita in the world.

But it is not just about the people who died - if that wasn't sad enough it is about the more than 7.84 million people who have tested positive for COVID-19. Some, like Trump, won't suffer much, thankfully.

Others will spend weeks in hospital and have the effects of the disease linger for months.

Some of those people will have good health insurance to help pay the bill; others will likely lose their homes because they can't pay their medical bills.

In light of this suffering, how does the US president have so little empathy that he purposely tries to paint this virus as something

that "will go away?" From the outside looking in, it seems like a catastrophic failure of leadership. Only Nov. 3 will show if Americans feel the same.

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

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New semi's to be built on site of former Watford school

There is more new housing coming to Watford.

Warwick Township council recently approved a change to zoning rules which will see semi-detached homes built on the former site of the Watford Public School.

Phillip Keightley of MIG Engineering spoke for the numbered company planning to build the units.

He says they plan 19 semi detached homes fronting on Ontario, Erie and John Streets, the foot print of the former elementary school.

The builder needed the approval because the homes will be larger than the zoning bylaw requires.

Front lot widths will be between 15 and 18 meters compared to the current 20 meters in the neighbourhood.

During the public meeting, there was no one opposed to the move.

It's not clear when the construction on the new units will begin.

Christopher Brown, 42, plead guilty to accessing child porn images for 16 years from New Year's Day 2003 to his arrest just before Christmas 2018. But he left Sarnia Court on Oct. 5 with a one year conditional sentence to be followed by one year of probation.

"This is a very unusual sentence. Typically this type of charge involves real jail," says Crown attorney David Rows - who arrived at the joint position with Brown's lawyer Terry Brandon and acknowledged a conditional sentence isn't the expected result for a child porn related conviction.

Rows says the images Brown possessed weren't as "intrusive or aggravating" as material that has come before the court in other cases. He

added that Brown's lack of criminal record, guilty plea, and issues around his right to a speedy trial also factored in the decision not to pursue jail time. Brown has no children but has been married for six years. His wife remains supportive of him.

Brown's lengthy viewing of child porn came to light in November 2018 during an investigation by the OPP's Child Sexual Exploitation Unit. Officers discovered several images and traced them to an IP address owned by Brown. They forwarded the information to Sarnia Police.

On Dec. 19, 2018 Sarnia Police officers executed a search warrant of Brown's home at 8 am and within an hour he was arrested on child porn charges. A forensic examination of Brown's computer found 48 images of underage children of a clearly sexual

"The issue of child pornography is a very disturbing feature of society, and of course does result in very significant consequences if convicted," says

Justice Anne McFadden.

While these consequences won't include jail for Brown, he was still given several conditions to observe. He will be on the sex offender registry for the next 10 years. During this decade Brown also cannot use any peer to peer sharing sites – sites he used to access the child porn.

"That is an important term and an effort to try and reduce the likelihood of this matter ever repeating itself," Rows says.

"I acknowledge my guilt. I have learned my lesson... and I am very sorry," says Brown.

Brown will also have to take sexual offender counselling for the next two years. For the first six months of his conditional sentence he can only leave his house for work with his computer service job and other limited exceptions.

In the final six months he must observe an 11 pm to 6 am curfew. Brown also can't possess any weapons and must submit a DNA sample.



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Putting her best foot forward

Shoes from Fairbank now in Toronto museum

A rare collection of shoes dating back to the early 1900s worn by Clara Fairbank-Ranney in Petrolia are now in the Bata Shoe Museum in Toronto.

Clara married Charles Fairbank in 1900 and the Fairbank mansion was her home for 44 years until 1956.

Two pairs of boots and seven pairs of shoes were donated and date back to shortly after Petrolia peaked as the oil capitol of Canada in the 1890s. It had been one of the wealthiest, most cosmopolitan towns in Canada.

"We are so pleased to receive the shoes," said Susanne Petersen, collections manager for the Bata Shoe Museum. "We've never seen anything like the embroidered boots with the turquoise feathers.'

The turquoise feathered shoes are called "carriage shoes" according to Bata Shoe Museum curator Nishi Bassi. She added that a pair of colourful sandals in the donation "are unlike anything else we have in our collection from this time period."

The Bata Shoe Museum has 13,000 shoes from around the world. Some are over 4,500 years old.

"I am thrilled my grandmother's shoes will now find a very big audience," said Charles Fairbank of Oil Springs. "My grandmother, my

mother and then, my late sister Sylvia, had been preserving these shoes in boxes and closets for more than 100 years.

"When they fell into my possession, I felt they should be seen. I donated them to the Lambton museums, which in turn, donated them to the Bata Museum."

"My grandmother's shoes are not simply fashion items, they are artifacts of Petrolia's stellar

innovation and industry which created wealth. When I was a boy. I chopped wood in the mansion basement for my

grandmother's fireplace. I remember her as a woman of exquisite and expensive tastes."

Fairbank also donated a number of his grandmother's dresses, hats and numerous christening gowns which the Oil Museum of Canada in Oil Springs now has. Some of these will go to the Fashion History Museum in Cambridge, Ontario and some items have gone to Missy's Costume Design in Oil Springs.

After marrying, Charles and Clara Fairbank lived in the yellow VanTuyl house on Warren Avenue then moved with their three sons to the Fairbank mansion in 1912, where Charles' father, John Henry Fairbank who had been Canada's largest oil producer,

was in ailing health. A fourth son was born in 1915.

During her 25-year marriage to Charles, they entertained often and lavishly, sometimes using the mansion's ballroom. A fashionable woman, Clara had the right shoes for a variety of occasions. At the mansion she had hosted such notables as Guy Lombardo, Lord Lascelles (husband of Princess Mary), Pauline Johnson and Earl Grey.

After the 1925 death of her husband, Petrolia's oil dwindled and Fairbank revenue streams would become drastically reduced. In 1927, she married Leo Ranney, an American geological engineer with 300 patents to his name, and his work took them frequently to New York.

Even before the stock market crash of 1929, Clara was cashstrapped and selling properties. She was widowed again in 1950.

Clara was the last Fairbank to live in the mansion, dying in 1956 at the age of 79.

Fairbank says the donation of her shoes will help Fairbank-Ranney's legacy live

Petrolia asks province to ease theater rules

Petrolia council is backing a call to allow more people to come into Ontario's theaters.

Theaters were among the first things to close when the COVID-19 pandemic swept across Ontario.

There have been few live events since then since the province will allow only 50 people inside at a time. And artists are hurting.

"This survival is absolutely at risk," officials from the arts girl Ontario Presents wrote.

"Artists, agents, and many other professionals in our sector have found themselves suddenly and completely without income, with little hope of revenue in the coming months.

"Performing arts venues have closed their doors since March and most are also facing little to no income until January 2021 at the earliest."

Victoria Playhouse Petrolia has also been closed since March, delaying the 2020

It had been hoped some of the Christmas entertainment might be possible in November and December, however with the province grappling with the second wave of COVID-19, the province has clamped down even further on indoor gatherings to just 25 people.

"Many cultural workers have been laid off

or seen their contract hours reduced to nothing, with little hope of work returning in the near future."

Ontario Presents and six other arts organizations are asking communities

call to allow theatres to have 30 per cent capacity in the theatre - similar to churches. The arts organization is asking arts venues

Pitel shares a mother's grief to help others

Debb Pitel is a mom first.

She has four boys including Tyler, who died by suicide in 2001. Her grief, and the grief of her family, spurred her to start Safe Talk, a workshop which gives people the words to ask difficult questions about depression and suicidal thoughts.

But as the country dealt with the pandemic, the Dawn-Euphemia woman says she began thinking more about how she could help others facing depression and suicide because she remembers keenly the struggle they faced and knows the struggle continues.

"As parents...we struggled with acknowledging the problem, recognizing the severity, and finally, finding the strength," she says.

"It's really difficult at that point as a parent to reach out and admit that it was bigger than we were, and that we needed help navigating through finding his answers."

Pitel says the family tried to find help for Tyler for three years, but the mental health care system is deeply flawed.

'We were victim to wait lines and restrictions and inability to find the proper resources that we needed at the time. And that was a journey in

"Over 19 years, the numbers haven't gone down and the resources are not easier to find, and people are still struggling," she says.

"We need to do better."

And while the Safe Talk workshops have helped hundreds of people have "the confidence to have the conversation that everyone is scared to have she felt she needed to do more.

Pitel thought she could help and, with the encouragement of her family, she felt the best thing to do was to tell her story.

"The only way I felt that I could really do more was to share my journey.'

So, she wrote "I'm Still Your Mom" and began selling it on Oct. 6, Tyler's birthday.

Pitel, who often speaks publicly about her family's grief with grace and passion, says it was extremely difficult to put pen to paper. And she says while it seems she 'has it all together', she doesn't.

Pitel "I'm the farthest from that; this has been remembering things that I had put so far out of my current life, including the depth of my grief and remembering details and was very difficult to go back and remember and relive," she says.

"It was incredibly emotional...it came with a lot of emotions. And yesterday, the emotions around dedicating this book on his birthday were as big as the day we dedicated the garden on his birthday, 19 years before that.

"I am not together, I've just been doing it for a while.

"And I have three boys that I survived for. And I still am. They encouraged me to tell my story... this was the time to share it because it still breaks my heart to hear the stories (of other families) and see the sadness and read the post.'

Those seemed particularly difficult during the pandemic, Pitel says. "I just think it was time; as hard as it was, and is, it just seemed like the time."

A hard pass for Wingfield St. one way: survey

Almost 70 per cent of Petrolians say Wingfield should not be a one-way street.

Mayor Brad Loosley asked the town to survey residents after seeing the road construction complete. He said the road seems narrow and making it one-way might help with traffic flow.

Of the 170 people who took the survey, 69 per cent said no. But some people thought it was the best alternative. Others were confused about the timing of the survey.

"This should have been discussed before construction as the design could have been changed to accommodate a one-way street and parking. This is absolutely ridiculous to second guess yourself after the project is complete. This is not a decision that requires public input; that is why you employ experts," said one resident.

Thirty four people who live on Wingfield St. took the survey. The rest were Petrolia residents. Many people thought creating a one-way street would simply be confusing.

Barn quilts and local book attract history buffs

Author Kae Elgie says she wasn't prepared for the enthusiasm her book about the history her family's Dawn-Euphemia homestead.

Elgie spent seven years digging back to complete This Land. Saturday, as part of the Into The Dawn Quilt Tour, Elgie talked to residents about the story of the land. "To say I was overwhelmed by the response is an understatement," Elgie explains, adding she was expecting maybe "five or six" people to turn up at the Czech Hall event. Instead, she was constantly talking to visitors and sold 36 copies of the tome.

The book details the history of the Dawn Mills farm where Elgie grew up with her family. Through extensive research, the former librarian takes the reader back 12,000 years to present day, detailing the property's rich

history.

It took her seven years to write. She wrote four hours a day for the last four years before publishing.

"I can't face writing another book for a while." Elgie says it was "especially gratifying" meeting people who aren't just interested in local history — they want to create it, by researching just as she has.

During her research Elgie was astonished by the different ways people treated the land.

She learned how the Indigenous people were in tune with the land while the white settlers who came to own it saw it as something to be mined

Elgie says she remembers becoming aware of a sandy knoll in the bean field which was part of an ancient portage route for indigenous people travelling between the Sydenham and Thames Rivers. "That trail was there forever,"

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Sarnia man banned from Lambton after assault

Tyson Nethery has been banned from Lambton County after assaulting a woman this summer.

But although the 22 year-old received what the judge called a "lenient" decision – he has just six days remaining of a 125 day sentence – his time behind bars will not be up next week.

Sarnia Court heard that around 11 pm on July 19 an argument started at a Wellington St. apartment complex after Nethery's then-girlfriend asked to see his phone. She had become suspicious of his recent behavior. The pair argued and he eventually went to leave.

When Nethery couldn't find his car keys, the situation turned violent. He shoved the woman to ground and kicked her repeatedly. She ran into the bedroom but Nethery followed and continued beating her.

The woman fought back and plunged her fingers into Nethery's eyes while screaming for help and that Nethery was going to kill her.

Neighbours called police. The

woman was able to escape the apart-

Nethery pursued her into the parking lot but she continued yelling that he was going to kill her. By this time several neighbors had gathered outside, and Nethery took off.

Police arrived and the woman was taken to the hospital for injuries to her face, chest and back.

Nethery was arrested the next day and held in Sarnia Jail. He called the woman at least seven times from the jail in violation of a no-contact order.

"It was a toxic relationship," says defense lawyer David Stoesser during Nethery's Oct. 6 sentencing. "He is ashamed of his behavior."

The woman said Nethery needs to get help including a mental health assessment, treatment for drug abuse, and access to life skills programs.

Nethery was sentenced to 125 days jail. He's been in custody so long, he will only serve one week after the sentence was passed. This will be followed by 18 months of probation where he must not contact or go within 100 meters of the woman, take coun-

selling for mental health and domestic violence, stay out of Lambton County, and report any new intimate partner relationships.

Nethery also received a 10 year weapons ban and must submit a DNA sample.

Justice Deborah Austin says Nethery's history of similar incidents is worrying, and she hopes he'll take this time behind bars to focus on a change.

"You've got quite a record for threatening and assaultive behavior which is concerning," says Austin. She says hopefully Nethery has gained "some insight into what's getting you into trouble and some motivation to deal with your problems.'

"When I get out I intend to deal with all my problems head on," Nethery

When he actually will get out remains to be seen. Nethery will be released from Sarnia Jail next week and immediately transferred to Stratford where he faces additional charges. After that Nethery still has charges in Kitchener to resolve.

New pandemic rules at Watford arena allowing one parent in the stands

The Township of Warwick has updated its COVID-19 regulations for the Watford Community Arena. Effective now, the municipality is allowing one parent, guardian or spectator per player during games

t the rink.

"Parents, guardians and spectators must ensure that they are physically distanced by a minimum of two metres in the stands and are expected to stay seating during their time in the arena unless there is a need to use

the washroom," stated the updated

Parents, guardians or spectators are expected to enter the rink by the main entrance at game time and leave by the west exit five minutes before the ice time is over. If someone is involved in

back-to-back games, he or she is expected to leave the rink by the west exit and re-enter through the main entrance.

Parent, guardians and spectators are not permitted to dressing rooms or the arena lobby except to use the washroom in the lobby.

The total number of people involved in any ice rental remains unchanged.

"The number of players/skaters, referees, timekeepers, music players and parents/guardians/ spectators during a rental cannot exceed 50."

T.J. Brodie is the newest member of the Toronto Maple Leafs' blueline.


