

# Hundreds of homes in planning stages in Petrolia

Petrolia is about to have a building boom and some developers say it can't come soon enough.

Lambton County Planner Rob Nesbitt says there are four plans of subdivision in the works for Petrolia with 356 homes in total. They will be built in a number of phases.

Nesbitt, in a report to Petrolia council Monday, says it is critical that the developers submit all the reports necessary in the next six months, to be approved.

That could be one of the difficulties. Developer Bob Leaper has been working with the county and the town on the next phase of Countryview Estates. Leaper says it is a bit more complicated because of the woodlot on the property. Aside from town and county approval, Leaper needs approval from the Ministries of Environment and Natural Resources and the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority.

And the Petrolia developer says getting those reports is more difficult because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

# Plympton-Wyoming looking for new fire chief after Clemens resignation

Plympton-Wyoming Fire Chief Steve Clemens has resigned. Clemens, who was the first

full-time chief of the combined Plympton-Wyoming department, had been off on stress leave since July.

Clemens was hired in Jan 2017. He was on leave six months later as the municipality hired an investigator after firefighters found a camera attached to a computer in the Wyoming station. The investigation found the camera had been used for things such as video calls. Clemens returned to work and was at the helm of the department when three senior firefighters were dismissed. Those firefighters say they were fired without reason. One had filed a sexual harassment charge after a number of confrontations with another senior officer in Wyoming. The dismissals could be subject to

a lawsuit.

Clemens had resigned Oct. 23 – today – "to focus his efforts on his personal life and to pursue other professional opportunities."

Mayor Lonny Napper, in the

Mayor Lonny Napper, in the news release, thanked Clemens for "his valuable service and contributions" and wished him well.

The news release added the fire executive committee is looking at options to fill the vacancy.

The news comes on the heels of

three months of work at the fire executive committee on some of the internal issues within the department, reworking the Safe Operating Guidelines.

Water and Ice rescues as well as silo rescues and hazardous materials situations were suspended due to lack of training. Other area departments will be called in for help with those types of emergencies. The committee says Plympton-Wyoming firefighters will only resume action

in those situations after everyone completes training by a qualified third party trainer.

And both the Camlachie and Wyoming department have a new health and safety committee – a requirement under provincial law which had not been fulfilled.

The fire committee is also working to provide better PTSD and Peer-to-Peer support for the firefighters and their families, according to committee chair Councillor Bob Woolvett.

### **DRIVER COLLAPSES ON PLANK ROAD**

An older man was taken to hospital after an unusual incident Tuesday on Plank Road. A driver called Lambton OPP after finding a man lying on Plank Road near Waterworks. The man appeared to be the driver of the dump truck and got out of his vehicle and lay on the road while the vehicle was still running. He seemed to be in medical distress. The driver of the car stopped and blocked the way to protect the man. OPP and Lambton Emergency Services were called to the area and were able to help the man to a stretcher and bring him to hospital.

### Wallaceburg man dies at controversial corner

A 92 year-old Wallaceburg man has died in a accident at the corner of Petrolia Line and Kimball Road.

Around 2:30 Wednesday afternoon, police were called to the corner for an collision with two vehicles. One driver was transported to hospital with life threatening injuries. Ernie Miller, 92, of Wallaceburg died there.

Police are still investigating and have not said yet whether charges will be laid.

This is the second accident which claimed a life at that corner in the last six months. In

May, a Glencoe truck driver died in an crash there.

That led to calls from neighbours to do something to improve the corner. Jolene DeGurse-MacDonald wrote a letter to politicians in Lambton urging them to build a roundabout at the corner after seeing dozens of accidents there over her lifetime.

Lambton County councillors agreed to include a roundabout in the 2021 budget for the corner however whether it will be approved is uncertain.

Since the May accident, a four way flashing light has been installed over the intersection.

"The COVID situation hasn't helped," he says. Leaper's required reports to provincial ministries are submitted and since employees are working from home, he simply has to wait for them to notify him.

"I'm really at their mercy as to when, if, and how they're are going to get back to me," he says. And the rest of the process depends on getting those completed reports

And that has dragged out his timeline for getting the next phase of Countryview ready for the builders. Leaper is expecting his subdivision will be among the first approved of the four slated for development in Petrolia. GoldLeaf Development is also planning a seniors condominium unit connecting Valentina Street near the Greenwood Recreation Complex.

And it won't be soon enough. Leaper says developers have "run out of lots" now and are turning people who want a new build away.

Leaper says Floyd Vanderwal appears to be the only developer with lots available six on Petrolia Line near Oil Heritage Road. The lack of available building lots also affects the resale market - people who may have purchased a new home aren't putting up their current home on the market.

With the available housing stock low and demand high, developers are anxious to get moving. And Leaper admits to being a bit frustrated by the situation.

"I understand the need to follow protocols," he says but adds it shouldn't take three years to get the next phase of an approved subdivision off the ground.

"This isn't rocket science," he says.
"We're not trying to do anything complicated."

Leaper is hopeful he will be able to begin building streets in the spring.

And he's hoping by then, it won't be too late.

A study by Moody's Analytics and RPS Inc in late September says average house prices could fall seven per cent as the recovery from the pandemic stalls while economic stimulus from government fades compounding Canadians' debt problems.

"Who is to say the market will be strong in a year or two," Leaper says about the lag time between when Petrolia's newest housing will be ready.

"Will there be the buyers?"



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# SIU investigates after Petrolia man shot

The province's Special Investigations Unit is probing an incident in Petrolia where a 40 year old Petrolia man was critically injured.

Police were called to a home in Petrolia around 7:30 pm Monday for a man in mental distress according to the SIU news release. Police went to the back of the property and secured the area.

At 10:45 pm, the OPP's Emergency Response team went into the rear of the property and found the man with a gunshot wound.

He was transported to hospital where the SIU says he's in critical condition.

"Based on the preliminary information, the gunshot wound is believed to have been self-inflicted," says the civilian agency which investigates reports involving police where there has been death or serious injury.

Three investigators and one forensic investigator have been assigned to the case.

Officials have yet to say whether mental health experts were on the scene at the time.

The SIU's mandate is to figure out whether an officer has committed



a criminal offence. Investigators can lay criminal charges against an officer if they find evidence. They can also close the file without charges being laid.

The SIU is urging anyone who may have information about this investigation to contact the lead investigator at 1-800-787-8529. The Unit is also urging anyone who may have any video evidence related to this incident to upload that video through the SIU website.

# New Glenview homes could go up in 2022

The developers of Glenview Estates hope to build 46 more homes around the golf course.

In the last year, the developers had some of the land rezoned from open space to residential so the development could come together.

Ray Dobbin, who is acting on behalf of the numbered company, says the plan of subdivision will be going to Petrolia council Nov. 6.

The first homes in Glenview Estates were built in the 1990s around the historic golf

course, Dobbin says.

The latest subdivision is tucked between holes 15, 16 and 17 and a pond which is the backyard of the homes fronting on First Street.

Another development of 92 homes is planned around hole 14.

Dobbin says the big concern about these two developments is drainage.

He's been working with the Ministry of the Environment on a plan which would ensure the water quality which will be heading into the existing pond in the area.

Dobbin says the developers are hopeful, with council's approval, to begin construction in the area in 2022.

### Neighbours worried about traffic in new seniors plex

A proposed seniors condominium complex is raising concerns and getting praise.

Goldleaf Development plans a 50-unit condominium development on the land on the corner of Valentina and Edward Street.

The 1,300 square foot two-bedroom luxury units will be built on a private road which the developer will own. It will connect on both sides with Valentina Street.

During a public meeting for the rezoning of the land, neighbour Duncan McTavish said he was concerned about water runoff on his property among other things. "One of my primary concerns is in regards to site drainage, I was prepared to have the component of the servicing peer reviewed

from the perspective of determining how the project might affect the surface water in my backyard," says McTavish. He couldn't do that because the information will only be available after the zoning is approved.

Doug and Kathy Darrach wrote to council concerned the zoning change "would quadruple the number of dwellings in a space designed by the master plan for 11 single lots."

They also voiced concerns about "the traffic nightmare that will be created with the potential of 100 plus cars being added to the already difficult corner of Edward and Valentina."

There were also four letters of support for the project.

Council decides on the zoning amendment at the next meeting of council Nov. 6.

# **Planning process** needs streamlining

It is, in many ways, a good problem to have. Petrolia has developers in the cue ready to build hundreds of houses. Council heard Monday four developments, which will mean about 356 housing units over the next few years, are already in the hands of the

But those are just the plans which the town has in its hands; developers in the area tell us there are multiple other housing projects being prepared which will add hundreds of other homes. With that comes tax dollars and new customers for local businesses.

Petrolia is a sought after community, most likely for developers because there are no development fees. The town is the only place in Lambton which doesn't charge extra fees. Developers are attracted to that.

And it helps that families see the town as a good place to raise children and are seeking out homes here.

That leads to a lot of demand - demand Petrolia can't take full advantage of because the new developments are still being approved.

We're told if you would take a bare plot of land which was just right for development, it would take about three years to get through the planning process. It is amazing developers will gamble on that.

Imagine planning a 90 home development in the peak of the housing boom, spend hundreds of thousands of dollars and hours of dealing with government getting it ready only to find, three years later, the bottom has dropped out of the market and you're project isn't vi-

While developers in Petrolia say they understand the need for well thought-out plans, surely we can do better than this.

The problem lies not just with one level of government dragging its feet, it is the combination of three levels of government - municipal, county and provincial - all with different expectations.

There must be a way to make this system work better without compromising good planning. Local municipalities have to take the bull by the horns and get the county and the province to look at ways to streamline the process. Then, we will all prosper.



FROM THE LAMBTON COUNTY ARCHIVES

Sarnia residents bid farewell to their local 149th Battalion in the spring of 1916. Troops marched from the city hall square to the Grand Truck railway station amid much pomp and ceremony. Though the crowds cheered and waved flags, it was a heart-breaking moment for many who would never see their sons, husbands, brothers or friends again.

## It has taken far too long to correct First Nation water problems

There was an interesting contrast between the news in our corner of the world and Northern Ontario.

Four local municipalities are hoping to get a big government grant to cover the cost of improving the water system. Petrolia's Bright's Grove treatment plant needs a new water intake. It's the last piece of the puzzle to have a completely revitalized system. It's hoping for a couple million bucks to finish the job.

But, while that work goes on residents of the Neskantaga First Nation were packing up their bags and heading five hours south to Thunder Bay. The small community, which has been boiling its water for 25 years because of problems with the system, now had no water at all. There was an oil sheen on the reservoir which brought water to the taps and toilets in the community.

For days those taps were dry and the toilets could not be flushed.

Just picture that for a moment. The situation quickly became a health emergency. The First Nation sent is most fragile members to Thunder Bay after three days. The rest of the community is settling there now.

It is difficult to square how a community in Ontario simply has no water with the abundance of clean water in our areas.

The Neskantaga First Nations is not alone. Figures from the federal government show there are 45 communities in Ontario with long term boil water advisories. That means people can't just grab a glass of water from their tap, like we do. Everything has to be sterilized by boiling first. And they have been doing this for

decades - some communities have been boiling water for 25 years. It is the national disgrace that we hear so little about.

The federal government has committed to fixing water systems in 60 communities across the nation by March 2021. I think we have



an obligation to hold them to it. It has taken far too long for successive federal governments to bring clean water to First Nations.

### No appetite to build or pay for new Inwood hall says survey

The idea of a community hall in Inwood appears to be dead.

The results of a survey on the idea, presented to Brooke-Alvinston council Oct. 22 showed about 70 per cent of the community felt a new space was not necessary.

Councillor Jamie Armstrong asked for consultation with the community as the former Inwood fire hall - which also acted as a community center - was sold earlier in the month.

He was concerned Inwood residents would not have a place to hold family gatherings without the former hall.

About 10 per cent of the households in the community responded to the electronic survey.

About 84 per cent felt the Brooke-Alvinston Inwood Community Centre serves the community well.

About 83 per cent agreed the library in Inwood could be used for small meetings

Nearly 73 per cent of the people said the town should not fund another hall.

And about 86 per cent of the people who answered the survey were not comfortable with the idea of increasing taxes to build or acquire another hall in


A former Petrolia councillor says the town should scrap the idea of a compost transfer station.



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# Honouring Brigden's Sgt. Duncan

## A century later, 'Lambton's Own' receiving proper recognition

Sgt. Clifford Reed Duncan has rested in Brigden's Bear Creek Cemetery since 1921.

Now, nearly a century after Duncan's passing, his resting place is about to be recognized with the proper honors befitting of a Canadian solider.

Rev. Dr. Allan Miller, a retired minister with the Canadian Armed Forces, took up an interest in Duncan during research into his own great uncle's role in Canada's 149th Battalion, which served in Europe during World War I.

Miller's goal is to advocate for any soldier who has passed on to ensure their gravesites are properly marked and cared for, a problem he says is more widespread than many people realize

Clifford Reed Duncan was born in Moore Township in the summer of 1898. Like many men in the area he worked as a farmer in Brigden before enlisting as an 18 year-old in the Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force. The 6'1 Duncan, with light brown hair and grey eyes, signed his enlistment papers on Jan. 6, 1916. The Great War was well underway on several European and international fronts.

It would be more than a year before Duncan actually left to join the war effort though. He enrolled in the 149th Battalion - 'Lambton's Own' – and began his training. Col. Thomas Bradley was in charge of the 149th, and was told to get 1,100 men to sign up for his battalion. The Colonel came close to this mark initially with more than 1,000 men of various backgrounds, even some Americans who had fought in the Mexican Revolution. Whether they were all of adult age was another story.


Retention was also an issue. Of the more than 1,000 men that signed up, only 435 boarded the transport ship left that left for Liverpool in March 1917. Duncan would not be one of them.

A medical issue had been found in the Moore Township recruit, and Duncan was kept behind. But there was still a place for him in the war effort. Duncan, a Private at the time, was transferred to the 122nd Battalion – part of the Canadian Forestry Corps. The Forestry Corps spent the war cutting down trees and even some wood homes (from families who volunteered them for the

war effort) – anything to deliver the required supplies for the Allied forces.

Duncan's new battalion left from Halifax on May 28, 1917, arriving in Liverpool on June 10. Duncan completed his sawmill training in England and set off for France at the end of June.

Duncan remained in France through the end of the war, and was promoted to Sergeant on Dec. 22, 1918. In a tragic turn of events, it was not gunfire, bombs or poison gas that ultimately killed Duncan, but rather the deadly tuberculosis following a severe cold at the end of the year. He was sent to England for evaluation, and then back to London, ON. Duncan was discharged as medically unfit on June 2, 1919.

The discovery of penicillin wouldn't take place for several years, so the best medical treatment Duncan could receive was a spot in London's Byron Sanatorium on Oxford St. West. Duncan was advised to spend a year in the sanatorium, and later passed away July 26, 1921, at just 23 years of age.

Duncan's passing was even more devastating as his brother Thomas – who had enlisted in the air force – had been killed in a training crash at Toronto's Leaside Airfield in 1918. Thomas is also buried at Bear Creek Cemetery, his gravesite bearing military honors. The only children in the family, the Duncan family died off upon the parents' passing.

Now, Miller is determined to make sure the families' service is properly acknowledged.

The process is not easy and even to have Duncan's case considered for honours took extensive communication and documentation with the Commonwealth War Graves Commission – the body that overseas graves of Commonwealth casualties during the First and Second World Wars.

Miller says part of the problem is that all inquiries must go to the commission's headquarters in Maidenhead, England. "We do not have a spokesperson for us when it comes to the research, the immediate things being asked by Canadian families or researchers."

After several months, a breakthrough came when the commission acknowledged the pages of documents Miller provided and added Duncan's name to their official war casualty records. The next step will be a visit to the Bear Creek Cemetery to inspect Duncan's gravesite and make preparations for his proper commemoration.

Duncan will also be added to the World War One Remembrance Book in the Peace Tower at Parliament in Ottawa. "That's a must," Miller

Miller hopes this can take place next year before the 100th anniversary of Duncan's death. In the meantime, he is pleased that a local Canadian hero is finally receiving the commendation he deserves. "Clifford wasn't recognized. He's just there. But now, there will be the recognition," says Miller.

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

## Finding new ways to feed hungry Lancers

Kelly's Cupboard has turned into Kelly's Bins, but the free food service at LCCVI is busier than ever.

Teacher Kelly Knight started stocking a cupboard in her classroom with food several years ago. Students with little to eat, whether it was because they were running late or simply didn't have anything at home, were encouraged to help themselves to food during the course of the school day.

They could discretely sneak into the classroom and grab a bite to eat and maybe pick up personal hygiene items and school supplies while they were at it.

But then came COVID-19 and everything had to change, says Knight.

Students were not able to wander through the hallways to come for something to eat.

And Knight knew there would be many more students whose families would be feeling the economic pinch.

So, Kelly's Cupboard turned into Kelly's Bins. Each classroom has a bin containing snacks and some school supplies. Knight says teachers encourage everyone to take a snack and often pull something out themselves to lower the stigma of using the bin.

"It would take kids a long time to come to my class to get things let alone to get some-thing in front of the class," she says.

"The teachers make sure the class knows

they are for everybody, including the

teacher, that way I'm going to hit the kids who don't have stuff to bring for lunches,"

Organizing the bins takes more work than running the cupboard. To minimize the number of hands on the items, Knight goes out to get the items she needs, then fills each of the boxes herself - using all the proper safety precautions.

And it's also a little more difficult, she says, to figure out what to put in them. Everything needs to be prepackaged and she aims to get something nutritious in the bins for kids who have little at home.

"If they have some crackers and granola bar and a pudding, that might be enough to get them through until schools end," she

And, it is more expensive than normal. Knight says she can spend up to \$500 a week on food items because more students are accessing the food.


Knight says so far, despite the increase in demand, she's been able to meet the needs with the help of the community.

"We go on faith the community will step up...and they do all the time...they come through all the time."

## Roundabout considered at Egremont and Nauvoo

A contentious corner in Warwick may be getting a roundabout.

Lambton County public works staff is recommending the county build a traffic circle at the corner of Egremont and Nauvoo Roads. Warwick Township council asked the county to consider the move saying there have been many accidents at the corner. County staff agreed a roundabout would reduce the risk of crashes at the corner and would be possible because of the large amount of land in the area. It would cost

about \$1.1 million.

But another high risk intersection, Churchill and Mandaumin, is not recommended for a roundabout. The county considered what changes could be made to the intersection after several accidents with deaths there.

County officials say there is not enough land there to create a traffic circle and there are still other measures which could be tried. Officials are recommending more lighting, and a flashing red light over the stop sign. That would cost about \$35,000.

Both items will be discussed during the 2021 budget.

The Legionnaires are also practicing each week in hopes of the puck eventually dropping on a 2020-21 campaign.

The change went in effect last weekend with a maximum of 25 players and coaches on the ice and 25 spectators in the stands at any one time.

"People entering from the

The release says fans must

stay on the side of the stands they enter to and spectators must exit the rink using the same door they entered through. Spectators can not watch from along the glass.

All spectators from an exiting group must leave the arena before the next group can be allowed in.







# House arrest for 'ultimate betrayal'

A St. Clair woman says it is the "ultimate betrayal of a husband to a wife." But in the end, her husband received only a conditional sentence of house arrest and probation.

Sarnia Court heard on Oct. 19 of how the man shared intimate photos of his wife without her knowledge which is a criminal offense.

The woman found the photos in December, while looking for a shopping list on her husband's phone. Instead, she discovered her husband was sending sexually explicit images of her to another man. The men swapped photos and described sex acts in detail. The woman collected screenshots of her husband's conversations as evidence. The man turned himself into OPP in March.

The woman, in her victim impact statement read during the teleconference sentencing, said she was shattered.

"I expected him to love, honor, and protect me. He did not protect me. He did not love me. And he certainly did not respect or honor me."

She told the court it was difficult to describe finding the images. "In that moment I instantly felt like my heart was being stabbed over and over. My stomach had felt like it had been punched. My hands and body shook, and tears rolled down my face. I've never experienced such a strong, physiological reaction. It impacted every part of my being," the woman says.

"I am still sick to my stomach when I think about the conversation... The vulgar, repulsive, offensive and revolting language that (her husband) used to describe what he wanted another person to do to me sexually. I could not have imagined a scenario

more degrading."

And her husband's defense of his actions was worse, she said.

"I'll never forget him saying 'It isn't as bad as you think it is.' When I close my eyes, İ can see the look on his face in that moment, and his voice trying to explain to me what he did was not a big deal, that I was overreacting."

There was no remorse or repentance in his voice or his body language. That was almost as hurtful as his actions themselves. In my opinion this is the ultimate betrayal of a husband to a wife.'

The woman says she is left to deal with ongoing medical issues following the discovery including the loss of sleep, stomach issues due to stress and financial worries. "I live with this every day, and I have to live with this the rest of my life... He broke my heart, and he broke the law. I have changed forever. I've been damaged forever.

"I'm a survivor of a heinous and horrendous act... I hope that one day I'm able to love and trust again... I will move forward."

The husband responded in a monotone saying he was sorry. "I hope to be a better person moving forward.


Justice Deborah Austin did not mince words. "This is a shocking and egregious crime of intimate partner abuse that blindsided an unsuspecting spouse. It is an offense of deep and fundamental betrayal of trust, and it is an offense of exploitation of the relationship between partners.

"He violated her trust in a most demeaning and dehumanizing way. He exploited her both sexually and emotionally. It is a kind of abuse which had a devastating impact.'

The man will be under house arrest for a year followed by 18 months of probation. He cannot have any contact with the woman during the two and a half years. He must also undergo counselling.
