

Petrolia developments on the verge of construction to make plans for sidewalks Heather Wright Nesbitt says officials chose

Several Petrolia developments which are almost ready to put shovels in the ground will have to install sidewalks.

Rob Nesbitt, senior Lambton County planner who works in Petrolia, says subdivisions whose plans of the subdivision haven't been given final approval will have to install sidewalks on at least one side of the road.

That includes the next phase of Countryview Estates. The developers there had argued vigorously against any sidewalks at all. Bob Leaper and Louis Bratanek had said at several public meetings that people don't want sidewalks because it limits the amount of parking they can have in the driveway.

They also argued it would add costs to the developments.

Petrolia's official plan had always required sidewalks however Nesbitt says officials chose to approve new housing without them. Most of the major subdivisions in Petrolia have no sidewalks at all.

At the July 12 meeting, council formally approved an official plan amendment which would require all subdivisions to have sidewalks on at least one side of the street. Main roads will need sidewalks on both sides.

But it wasn't immediately clear who would have to follow the new rules. Nesbitt says four subdivisions in the planning stages now, including Countryview's final phase, will be required to have sidewalks.

"Council right now is fully on board with the requirement for sidewalks and in any of the plans of subdivision that are currently in progress," says Nesbitt.

Bratanek is glad council decided sidewalks were necessary on one side of the road.

PW staff no longer voting Heather Wright a respected political scientist

Staff in Plympton-Wyoming won't be voting on town business anymore.

In February, it came to light the Chief Administrative Officer, Carolyn Tripp, was a voting member of the fire executive committee. That happened when former chief, Steve Clemens, rewrote the terms of reference for the committee.

The fire executive committee talked about the makeup of the committee at the time however they decided to continue on as they were.

The treasurer and public works manager also served as voting members on the water and sewer committee.

At the time, Andrew Sancton,

who has been studying municipal politics for over 50 years, said he'd never seen anything like it. Sancton added there could be an institutional conflict if the CAO was voting when normally council relies on the staffer for unbiased advice.

Monday, at the Fire Executive Committee, the terms of reference were changed, keeping Tripp on the committee but without voting rights. Councillor Netty McEwen joined the board.

Both Tripp and Bob Woolvett characterized the move as an "update" from changes from the past year. When asked if the town consulted on whether staff should be voting members of committees, Woolvett said not that he was aware of.

Sidewalks will be part of every subdivision

Bratanek added the last phase of Countryview would have sidewalks, adding it will be difficult to do since the last phase is in the trees and may mean more will have to be removed to make way for them.

That would mean most of the subdivision on the town's southwest side would have no sidewalks while 71 new lots would.

Nesbitt says even though the town's official plan required sidewalks in new subdivisions, council didn't require them.

But there is no going back to force developers to install the missing pathways

now.

"We can't because the town chose not to implement that policy for certain plans. So, those would have to be picked up. So for example, if there were a development that had occurred, and didn't have sidewalks, but all of a sudden the council starts getting requests by residents saying that they want sidewalks in their area, then it would become part of their normal budgetary process for doing (connecting) links."

Neshitt believes most of the developers

Nesbitt believes most of the developers looking at building in Petrolia are now aware of the requirement.

Woolvett wouldn't say why after nearly four years the CAO's voting privileges were removed, saying only that the mayor had finally got around to replacing the vacant position on the committee.

Meantime, the staff members who had

been voting members on the water and sewer board will also lose their right to vote at committee.

Instead, they'll attend and advise councillors on issues which is consistent with how every other municipality in Lambton County operates.

Another COVID-19 death in Lambton

As many people return to stores and restaurants there is word another Lambton resident has lost their life to COVID-19.

Lambton Public Health says a person in their 90s passed away due to COVID-19 bringing the number of people who have died in the county because of the virus to 66.

Officials would not say if the person had been a resident of Afton Park Place which had been in outbreak since July 13.

It's not clear how many people had been ill there since the public health unit stopped reporting the exact number of people ill in outbreaks if there were less than five.

It also has removed all the information about the number of people who have died

of COVID-19 in long term care homes from the public website.

The number of people contracting the virus remains low. As of Tuesday, there were only five people ill.

Bluewater Health reports just one person in hospital with COVID-19.

As the number of COVID-19 cases decline in Lambton, the vaccination rates continue to climb. As of Tuesday, nearly 75 per cent of all Lambton residents over 18 had one dose of the vaccine. Almost 60 per cent were fully vaccinated. Over 150,000 vaccines have been given here.

As the demand for vaccines dwindles, Lambton Public Health is expecting to close some of the mass vaccination sites. Right now there are four; Point Edward, Clearwater, Wyoming and Forest. It's expected smaller targeted clinics will now be held.



TOWN OF PETROLIA NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF A ZONING BY-LAW AMENDMENT

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Town of Petrolia passed By-Law No. 36 of 2021 on the 12th day of July, 2021, under Section 34 of the Planning Act.

THE ZONING BY-LAW AMENDMENT amends the Town's Zoning By-law 63 of 2017 as it applies to a property described as Part Lot 12, Concession 10. The subject property has a municipal address of 432 Albany Street. The property is located on the east side of Albany Street, between Walnut Street and Dufferin Avenue. The amendment rezones the property from "General Commercial (C1)" to "Residential - 3 (R3-6)". The amendment allows the building on the property to be used for five apartment dwelling units. The R3-6 zone requires each unit to have a minimum gross floor area of 33 square metre. A minimum of 5 parking spaces is also required.

THE KEY MAP shows more particularly the subject lands.

APPEALS to the Ontario Land Tribunal in respect of the By-law Amendment may be made by filing with the Clerk of the Town of Petrolia a written notice of appeal, **not later than the 5th day of August, 2021**, setting out the reasons for the appeal and accompanied by the Ontario Land Tribunal fee made payable to the Minister of Finance.

IF A PERSON or public body did not make oral or written submissions to the Town of Petrolia before the by-law amendment was passed; the person or public body is **not entitled to appeal** the By-law to the Ontario Land Tribunal. **Only individuals**, corporations and public bodies may appeal a by-law to the Ontario Land Tribunal. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

NO PERSON or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law amendment was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to Town of Petrolia Council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Land Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

East Lambton construction behind schedule

Delays getting materials because of the world-wide pandemic is already having an effect on the construction of the \$11.5 million East Lambton Community Complex.

Theresa Klachan, Warwick Township's parks and recreation manager, recently told councillors the materials needed simply aren't coming as quickly as usual, particularly with the reconstruction of the arena.

"Along with two roof top units for the new dressing rooms, there is also availability issues with structural steel and metal deck. Metal deck is required to complete the roof of the new dressing rooms. Without the ability to enclose the dressing rooms, the interior cannot be completed," she wrote in a report to councillors.

"The original anticipated substantial completion of the arena renovations was mid/end August 2021 with the substantial

completion of the community complex following in April 2022," Klachan says. "Due to delays on materials the general contractor has updated substantial completion of the arena renovations to Sept. 30 with a possibility of going into October."

Klachan admits that has some people in the community nervous. "People are looking outside and getting a little stressed there will be no hockey season," she says. But Klachan assured council the arena renovations are the top priority.

In the meantime, a deal has been reached with Brooke-Alvinston to provide ice time for Warwick's users.

Normally, the township waits for the fair to be complete, but the Brooke-Alvinston Agricultural Society agreed to put the ice in early this year since COVID-19 restrictions meant a scaled back fair this year.

Officials in Brooke-Alvinston have not given a firm timeline for the ice going in

Outdoor ice rink planned for Camlachie

The Huron Shores Optimists are thinking hockey already.

The service club is planning a new outdoor ice surface at the Camlachie Community Centre.

Optimist Spokesman Bruce Moulton says the ice pad will have a chiller to keep ice in place from November to March. About 100 people will be able to use the surface at a time.

"We're certainly looking for a lot of public skating and maybe some shinny games and stuff, but it's only going to be 60 (feet) by 120 (feet). So, it's not going to be the size of a regulation hockey rink. It is going to be a nice size for sure.'

Moulton says throughout the pandemic, the need for more outdoor facilities has become obvious.

"There were some ice rinks around an area and they were packed. People were skating out in farmer's fields, because they had that opportunity this year," says Moulton.

So, we know that the kids would like it. And it's for adults as well. It's for people of all ages. And we want to build it as well for kids that maybe need to do sledge hockey, so it will be an all inclusive, multipurpose facility."

Moulton says the club is just picking a fundraising committee. One event has already been organized to raise cash for the project. The Camlachie Summer Send Off will be Sept. 18 at Lamrecton Park.

Moulton says it will be one of many events organized for the massive project.

"It's just over \$400,000 to build," says Moulton. "We're just establishing our fundraising committee and certainly we're looking at getting grants. And then of course, looking for help from the public as well."

Drunken crash near Oil Springs nets driving ban

Lambton OPP had a lengthy search, time and distance wise, when a Lakeshore man crashed his truck and fled the scene near Oil Springs last year. But there were no fleeing the consequences for Aaron Doucet, 25.

It was an early evening last April as Doucet travelled north on Oil Heritage Road, Sarnia Court recently heard. But just short of reaching Oil Springs he crossed into the opposite lane and flipped his Dodge Dakota, the truck coming to rest on its side.

Doucet climbed out of the truck and began running east on Aberfeldy Line. Clad in an orange sweatshirt he was easily visible to witnesses who approached him. Doucet was bleeding from his face but spoke briefly to passersby before fleeing into a bush lot and out of sight.

Despite the short interaction the witnesses noted a strong smell of alcohol on Doucet. Multiple alcohol containers were found littered around the crash site.

Officers and emergency services arrived on scene but Doucet was long gone. With the assistance of the Canine Unit and OPP Emergency Response Team, he was eventually tracked down - more than two hours later and five kilometres down the road.

Doucet was discovered inside a house receiving medical aid. He'd told the unsuspecting homeowners he was injured

crashing his ATV. Police arrived and revealed the true story. They also detected a heavy smell of alcohol on Doucet despite hours passed since the crash.

"This is what I get. I rolled my [expletive] truck," Doucet commented on the ride to Petrolia OPP for booking.

Defence Lawyer Nick Cake says his client has spent the last two years rehabbing after suffering a "catastrophic brain injury" in 2019 when his motorcycle collided with a car. "Mr. Doucet is working as best he can to put himself back to where he was prior to the accident," says Cake.

Doucet's medical circumstances, along with his lack of criminal record, were taken into consideration by Crown Attorney Aniko Coughlan and Cake who recommended a \$1,200 fine and one year driving ban. The justice accepted the punishment.

It ain't over yet

It would be easy to think we're looking at the pandemic in the rear view mirror. But it ain't over yet.

Over the past week, much of life has returned to pre-pandemic times. Kids are out on the streets, biking around with their friends. They can go to summer camp. They can play at the local splash pads and they can join their friends on the local baseball diamonds for a game of scrub or a league game.

It is a balm to the soul for many.

For adults, there are now more moments spent with friends and family and a chance to sit down for a nice meal with them, unhurried and unmasked, to catch up with all we have missed.

Soon, we'll be able to head to the US and our friends there will return to Ontario.

And while it is all so good, there are still echoes of what we have been through that caution us to not let our guards down completely. Another family lost a loved one to COVID-19 this week in Lambton. A man in his 20s died last week. For these families, COVID-19 is still very real.

It's still very real for families of those lost for any reason; while others embrace grandparents and friends, they feel that missing piece.

And, there are the rumblings coming from all corners of the Earth. In the US, COVID-19 rates are as high as last winter. England is struggling too, even though it's dropping all restrictions.

Public health officials warn the Delta variant of COVID-19 still spreads rapidly. This time, it will simply spread in those who chose not to be vaccinated.

So despite all the positives, we are still cautious, remembering that last year at this time, there were some of the same vibes that everything is going to be alright, and then it wasn't.

Our best defense is still to have as many people as possible vaccinated. But where is the plan, provincially, federally and locally, to reach those who haven't been yet? And what about the other problems we face? In Lambton, the medical officer of health has urged politicians to think about recovery for the region - economically, mentally and physically - but so far, we don't see signs of that either. This pandemic isn't over yet and if we don't have some action plans, it won't be for a long time to come.



A Windsor man who, briefly, escaped from police while patronizing the local coffee shop was given a 45 day jail sentence.

Brayden Morency had illegally taken up residence on Eureka Street in April 2019. He'd been on probation for the past three years with conditions to live in a different place.

But this wasn't why OPP officers approached him at the Petrolia Tim

Hortons the morning of April 10. He was wanted by Windsor Police on other matters but had left the region. Officers approached the seated Morency to make the arrest.

But after explaining to him what was happening Morency suddenly jumped up and leapt over the half-wall of the seating area. He fled out the door and bolted across the street, disappearing into people's backyards.

Morency was later found and

rrested.

Justice Anne McFadyen found the

joint submission from Crown Attorney Aniko Coughlan and Defence Lawyer Laura Joy of 45 days a reasonable resolution. The sentence is covered by time Morency has already spent in jail.

Defence Lawyer Laura Joy says her client has prospects following this, noting he's "very artistic and a great rapper." She says Morency hopes to make a career in the industry.

While this matter is now settled,
Morency still faces other legal issues.

No hydro for Alvinston project

An Alvinston couple building a new seniors townhouse complex has run into some problems. And they were hoping Brooke-Alvinston officials might be able to help.

Kevin and Lisa Tizzard are building townhouses on Railroad Line and the construction work is already well underway. But recently, they learned they would need the hydro service upgraded in the area. And it's going to cost quite a bit of cash.

Bluewater Power wants to upgrade the services, placing new poles along Railroad Line from Alley Street. The cost was expected to be around \$57,000. The couple had hoped the municipality would foot about \$40,000, however councillors denied the request saying it would set a precedent leading others to ask for some of their costs to be absorbed too.







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Changes will mean drains can be fixed faster

It will be easier for Ontario farmers to make minor changes to drains on their property.

The Drainage Act regulates every farm drain in Ontario - about 45,000 kilometers in all. Chatham-Kent has about 4,100 municipal drains, about 4,000 kilometres in all. There are about 550 maintenance projects and 45 capital construction projects each year.

The act is one of the oldest pieces of legislation in Ontario. It first passed in 1859 and has only been updated once, in 1975.

Over the past year, the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs has been considering changes. They were passed in June.

Tim Brook, OMAFRA's
Drainage Program Coordinator,
says the big change will be
for farmers looking to make
changes to a drain on their
property. Until now, even the
smallest changes went through
a 180 day process. Brook says
it can now move ahead more
quickly for projects "on one
property, only benefiting one

farmer, and it won't affect other properties in a negative way."

"So, an example of that might be, where a farmer purchases a larger combine or something. And the existing road access crossing over the drain or from field to field is not wide enough to safely accommodate this larger piece of equipment. And so rather than going through the previous, larger improvement process, this minor improvement process is a more timely and cost effective way for these sort of one property specific projects or requirements," says Brook.

The farmer would simply download a form from OMFRA's website, explain the project and the municipality could approve it if it fits the minor project guidelines.

There will also be some changes to larger projects which affect multiple farmers.

Brook says in the old process, completing a major drain project with multiple farms affected could take a year or two. The changes passed in June give a 180 day requirement "from the time the engineer is appointed to getting that report and that design into

council."

Brook adds the new regulations will make it easier for the contractors to make changes when necessary. They'll be able to add 33 per cent more to the cost of the project without returning to council for approval. Brook says while that's a lot of extra cash, it's in line with other parts of the act which give 33 per cent as a benchmark for seeking council approval for cost overruns. "Now it says you have to hold a special meeting to make sure everyone is on board with that extra (33 per cent) cost...So if you're 10 or 20 per cent more, it's in that range where really the municipality can move forward." The landowners foot the entire bill for the drains, although municipalities have the option to spread that payment - which can be tens of thousands of dollars per landowner – over a number of years.

The province hopes the changes will move work forward more quickly. About \$100 million a year is invested privately in drain works in Ontario.

Skateboarders want St. Clair to buy into a new, bigger park

Kicks, flips and tricks look set to be cranked up a notch in St. Clair's largest community.

Nicki Krohn of the Corunna Skateboard Park Committee presented the group's vision of a new 7,200 square foot facility at the Corunna Athletic Park. It would include stairs, rails, ramps, a half pipe and a pump track. "These kids are all craving a place to go where they can call their own," says Krohn. "It provides an opportunity for people to come together."

Krohn says the park would be a good outlet for kids who have been consumed by technology since the pandemic started and be a major boost to their mental and physical health.

There's currently a small skate park on the grounds but it recently

lost one of its signature features, the half pipe.

"To watch it go was difficult for many of the people who use it," says Krohn.

The committee is hoping to break ground on the site next year. They're hoping to build it in the northeast corner of the park at the Queen and Hill Street intersection.

The group has estimated the total cost at \$200,000. They plan to raise half of that themselves,

\$10,000 of which they've already secured, and hope the township can cover the other half.

"I think this is great news for the youth in our area.... I think this is a great initiative," says Councillor Pat Brown.

Town staff will now prepare a report on the proposal, looking at issues such as fencing, lighting, controlled access and liability.

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Bothwell woman admits to breaking into abandoned Dawn-Euphemia homes

A Bothwell woman has plead guilty to a pair of break and enters in Dawn-Euphemia that went awry

Heidi DeHoog, 40, appeared in Sarnia Courts to plead guilty. Her targets were abandoned properties she broke into in the dead of night. But on both occasions, factors beyond DeHoog's control led to her downfall.

On Feb. 2, at a farmhouse long absent of any life, OPP officers patrolling Cairo Road at 1:30 am came across a parked car. A check of the license plate found it didn't match the VIN number.

Investigating further police found a pair of tracks, easily detectable in the fresh snow, that led past a gate down a long laneway to the deserted property. Arriving at the backdoor there was noise and conversation detected from upstairs.

An order was given to come out and eventually DeHoog obliged, albeit "reluctantly," says Crown Attorney Meaghan Jones during a reading of the facts.

She told officers there was another man inside and he soon followed.

Both were arrested for break and enter.

Antiques were the target and

several were found on the pair. Old bottles, cans and even a handwritten letter were among the items recovered.

A search of the vehicle found drug paraphernalia and trace amounts of methamphetamine along with break and enter tools including a night vision scope. No further charges were laid against DeHoog over these items though.

DeHoog was released on bail conditions that she must live at a house on West Bothwell Road and observe a curfew. But just two months later she was back to her late night capers.

In the early hours of April 22, police were called to check a

suspicious vehicle on Bentpath Line. They arrived to find it empty, but the engine block was still warm.

The search for the driver began at the nearby property - a building with smashed windows and numerous tractor trailers scattered throughout the grounds.

Police heard someone running among the trailers and through the building, but in the darkness could not see the person.

So, the OPP Canine Unit was called in.

Just before 5 am the responding dog and officer managed to track her down inside the building and bring the drawn out search to a close

The time of her capture meant DeHoog was not following the 10 pm to 6 am curfew she agreed to to obtain bail.

It's now up to Justice Deborah Austin to determine what DeHoog's punishment will be.

The case was adjourned to Sept. 16 so a pre-sentence report could be prepared to aid her decision.

"We would find it very helpful to understand a bit more about how Ms. DeHoog came to be in this place," says Jones.

Potential sentences could range from a suspended sentence to a conditional discharge.






