Hydrogen plant possible in St. Clair Township

A St. Clair Township company is considering building its own hydrogen ready power plant, in part to prove a cleaner fuel source for its power plant.

Eastern Power has started an Environmental Review on the site of the Greenfield South Power Corporation facility on Oil Springs Line. Brendan Holbein, Eastern Power's environmental manager, says hydrogen "is an alternative energy carrier... to use in place of fossil fuels to

reduce the carbon footprint" which "is becoming a growing possibility with a bright looking future."

Many of Lambton's petrochemical companies already produce it, including Nova Chemicals, CF Industries and Imperial Oil.

But Holbein says this project could reduce the environmental impact of the natural gas power plant.

"We look at hydrogen as a good way to switch over to cleaner fuels, carbon cleaner fuels... Hot natural gas is pretty clean otherwise, but it's fossil and there's

carbon emissions."

Holbein says if the studies point them in the right direction, construction could start in 2023.

He didn't have an estimate on the cost of the plant but did say a facility of that size could create between 15 and 20 jobs once it is up and running.

Sarnia-Lambton Economic Development has been promoting the region as a Hydrogen Hub, hoping the province will give the region the designation. Officials add the province and the feds need to create policies to grow the industry.

Warwick mayor rejects vaccine passport

Warwick's mayor says the province's 'vaccine passports' will create a split society and she wants no part of it.

Premier Doug Ford says starting Sept. 22, Ontarians will have to prove they are fully vaccinated to do a number of things, including eating indoors at restaurants, going to bars, clubs, sporting events, concerts and strip clubs. There will be no restrictions placed on essentials, like grocery shopping or going into retail stores. Take-out dining will also be permitted for people who choose not to vaccinate.

Rombouts, in a social media post, called the practice discriminatory and said she won't be revealing her personal health information. She also won't frequent businesses which ask for proof of vaccination.

The social media post drew a strong response with 4,500 people showing their approval on Twitter.

Rombouts tells The Independent she is not against the vaccine but doesn't understand the need to keep unvaccinated people separate. "So if the vaccine works, and the people who wanted the vaccine are, then they should not have a problem sitting across the room from somebody who is unvaccinated?"

That has already been a concern for some of Rombouts' colleagues.

Community fridge in the works

There will soon be a very big fridge behind St. Paul's United Church in Petrolia with the door open to all.

Larry Leckie says the church is starting a Community Fridge project. A company in Toronto is donating a 12 foot long refrigerated truck to use for the winter months. The church and the Inn of the Good Shepherd will stock the unit with food. Anyone will be able to step inside and get what they need at anytime of the day.

Leckie says the Community Fridge will complement what the Petrolia Food Bank is doing. It gives out food boxes once every three weeks. "This is going to be seven days a week, 24 hours a day," he says. And residents will be able to donate items as well.

The box is scheduled to arrive in October. Before that, the church will hold a community meeting Sept. 22 to explain the concept.

Councillor Todd White, who owns a Watford retirement home, will not be in a room with unvaccinated people. Seniors are particularly vulnerable to COVID-19.

For her part, Rombouts says she is standing up for the people in her community who are hurting because of the vaccine. She says parents of teen in her circles are "afraid to sleep" fearing their depressed children will harm themselves.

Her concern for the plight of school children prompted her to meet with the parliamentary assistant for the Education Minister recently. Rombouts says thanked MPP Sam Oosterhoff that vaccines aren't mandatory "because I think parents, along with their children's health care providers,

should be able to make those choices and do what's right for their individual children."

Rombouts adds "I did express on behalf of my community and a number of parents on the community that masks are perhaps not the best tool, and could be more harmful than helpful at this point." She believes it makes it "difficult to connect with their peers" and engage in classroom discussions.

The mayor added the point of issuing the statement was to "start reasonable dialogue not turn into this divisive, group think where it is us versus them."

Late Tuesday, Warwick Township issued a release saying the mayor voiced personal opinions and the township continues to follow COVID-19 rules .

Hospitals may fire unvaccinated workers

People who work in hospitals in southwestern Ontario will have to be vaccinated or they may be fired.

Bluewater Health, Chatham-Kent Health Alliance, Windsor Regional Hospital, Hotel Dieu Grace and Erie Shores Health Care released a statement Friday morning saying they have “agreed to implement a progressive plan to ensure that all employees, credentialed staff and volunteers... will be subject to progressive policies beyond mandatory education and testing, leading to unpaid leave and/or termination for cause.

“Mandatory vaccination for new staff will also be implemented by all hospitals to support this effort.”

The news release adds medical exemptions will be honoured.

Mike Lapaine, the CEO of Bluewater Health, says it’s clear Ontario is in the fourth wave and vaccines are the best protection.

“Our staff, frankly, are quite tired. Our staff has been through a tough 18 months, and just the mere prospects of a fourth wave is unsettling for many of us. So we want to ensure that every layer of safety we can put in place is in place, and we believe vaccines is a very important one of those layers,” he tells The Independent.

And Lapaine says it is important for the hospitals to be a safe place.

“We are an institution that receives and cares for people when they’re the most vulnerable, when they’re critically ill and we believe that we have an obligation to follow the precautionary principle and use everything at our disposal to ensure we’re there when people need us to be there. And we strongly believe that vaccines have shown they’re very effective at curbing severe illness, and that our staff and the patients being

treated by our staff should expect our staff to be fully vaccinated,” says Lapaine.

Hospitals have been losing employees as the pandemic rolls on, mostly because of burnout. Lapaine believes this new policy will not make things worse. “I think we need to understand that that whole core group is really in the minority. And we’re basically following the science.

“I would also be concerned if one of our staff has contracted COVID and particularly the Delta ... they’re often ill for quite some time, which takes them out of the workforce as well so, there’s two sides to that. We do not want to lose staff through illness and yes, we are risking that some staff may leave. That will be a choice that they will have to make.”

While he doesn’t have exact numbers yet, Lapaine says the vaccination rate among staff is very high. Chief of Staff Dr. Mike Haddad said 95 per cent of physicians at the hospitals in Sarnia and Petrolia have already been fully vaccinated.

“We don’t want to go through that again or see anyone get that sick. We also don’t want to see any care displaced for anyone due to system strain. We can mitigate the impact of a fourth wave, but we’re at risk still. The misinformation hurts everyone in a finite shared health system.”

Lapaine says while the public may not be paying attention to the COVID-19 trends now it “will become real” through the fall.

“We also know that people are quite fatigued with lockdowns and so anything we can do to avoid lockdowns is critical and lockdowns are usually generated by hospitals becoming overwhelmed with seriously ill patients. And what we also know and have real world evidence to support is that the vaccines are very, very effective in preventing severe illness should someone contract COVID.”

Florence remembers Joe, help raise mental health funds

Joe Elliott was always around to help in Dawn-Euphemia.

So when his family approached Bailey Reckman and Ashley Sanderson about holding a charity barbecue in memory of the Shetland man who recently died of cancer, they were all in.

The Grade 9 students were in the centre of the action in Florence as the community stopped by Florence Mills to have a hotdog Friday.

Elliott and his family have sold Pioneer Seeds for seven decades in Dawn-Euphemia. As a seed dealer, Elliott would host a hotdog barbecue each year during Seed Day. So, as his life was ending in August and he and his family planned his celebration of life, Elliott wanted a hotdog barbecue for his friends.

Connie Elliott - Joe’s cousin - says the community support was amazing. “The community has been fantastic through the whole thing. Joe had chosen to do palliative at home because he wanted to see everyone and say his goodbyes,” she says.

“The community was fabulous; meals brought constantly for the three weeks he was home. And then after, it was just miraculous, when he had a celebration of life, the people that came it was it was wonderful.”

But there were a lot of hotdogs left over. So Elliott’s family approached the teens to help. Both Reckman and Sanderson were glad to help after knowing Elliott their entire lives recalling why they liked Elliott.

“I think about how passionate he was about this community we have, and he seemed to always be giving to others in need in our community,” says Sanderson.

“I always think about how kind he is and how he was always there and he’s always willing to help,” added Reckman.

The family and the teens settled on raising money for youth mental health issues. Elliott’s son, Trevor, died by suicide. His cousin says the promotion of mental health “has a special place in Joe’s heart.”

And Sanderson says it is especially important during the pandemic. “There’s a lot of people that are having a hard time with this,” she said. “And I think with all of this, it just helps people to know that they have somebody that they can talk to you and that they can reach out for help.”

Over \$3,600 was raised during the event in Florence. Elliott’s wife, Kim, who works at the Florence hardware store, shared her thanks on social media. “Joe has a huge smile and very proud of the community involvement and result... You have continued to make Joe Elliott’s name honourable.”

We are officially in the fourth wave that we were all hoping to avoid. Neighbouring Windsor/Essex now has the highest rate in the province for the main COVID variant, which is the delta variant, and it is spreading this way. Sarnia/Lambton's numbers may look hopeful, but past projections have shown that cases in our region spike 2-3 weeks behind other areas of the province. We also need to remember that during the height of the third wave, Sarnia-Lambton had the highest cases in Ontario. We don't want to end up there again.

We all want to open up the province and keep kids at school. The delta variant is twice as contagious and more lethal; and children and young adults are now a

leading cause for hospitalization (due to low vaccination rates).

So what does this all mean for you? It means we are in for a rough ride.

But, there is a way out...if everyone gets vaccinated.

You are 99.99% less likely to go to the hospital or the morgue if you are fully vaccinated. If you are fully vaccinated and contract COVID-19, you are more likely to experience minor illness only.

And let's dispel some of the myths:

- The vaccine is extremely safe for pregnant women; no evidence has been found for sterility or fertility issues

- Only 1 in 700,000 blood clot deaths as a result of the vaccine

- If you have had the COVID virus, you still need the vaccine as your immunity is not as good as if you had the vaccine

If we don't all get vaccinated, businesses cannot open up as much, there will be more adult and youth mental health and addictions issues, more healthcare workers quitting due to the stress, and the next variant (and there will be one) could be even worse.

So please.

Get fully vaccinated if you haven't already done so. Mask in public places, even if vaccinated. Distance as best as you can. Get your kids vaccinated when the under 12 vaccine becomes available.

Let's prevent another lock down.

We can agree to disagree

Warwick Mayor Jackie Rombouts says she doesn't want to live in a divided society but that train has already left the station.

The East Lambton mayor put out a personal statement on social media Sunday saying she would not be revealing her personal health information nor being part of the 'vaccine passport' program which goes into place Sept. 22 in Ontario. The provincial government says people will have to show proof of vaccination to get into some places - mostly those where COVID-19 transmission is more likely; restaurants, bars, nightclubs, big sporting events and gyms.

The system is, in effect, a lockdown 'lite' for people who don't want to be vaccinated. In Canada, people can choose whether or not to be vaccinated, but that doesn't mean there will be no consequences. Proof of vaccination to do some things is one of those.

Rombouts says it's discriminatory and she won't be a part of it; she won't disclose her personal health information and she won't go to businesses which want her to. She doesn't want a "split society."

Rombouts - like everyone else - is allowed to have an opinion. And some people - a lot on social media - agree with her.

The problem is long before she decided to speak out, society was split; the pressures of COVID-19, whether you're concerned about its spread or believe it's a big conspiracy, have put everyone on edge and frankly, it only seems to be getting worse.

Rombouts wanted to promote a discussion without "group think or us versus them" attitudes creeping in. Very few people can do that right now.

We fear that's not going to get any better as the number of COVID-19 cases again begin to rise and pressure builds.

What do we do about this great divide in our community, our province, our nation and across the globe? It sounds trite, but a little bit of kindness and understanding would go a long way. You don't have to engage in violent verbal battles with everyone you meet. We can agree to disagree. It might help ease the tension in our communities and in our own personal lives.

Sitting MP not scheduled for local debates: why not?

The federal election has been occupying some of my thoughts recently - an almost welcome change to writing/talking/living COVID-19.

And while people are voicing concern about people throwing stones, literally, at Justin Trudeau or the possibility Erin O'Toole will change the gun laws (likely since he's a former military man with the endorsement of the lobby group for Canada's gun owners), I've been thinking about the riding of Lambton-Kent-Middlesex.

This should be one of the most interesting races in southwestern Ontario, however, it's getting little attention and it's not about to get much better.

Lianne Rood is the incumbent Conservative MP. She won the riding with 49 per cent of the popular vote last time around. And you would have to be practically dead not to realize that right now in southern Ontario, there are a lot of people who don't want Trudeau as the PM anymore.

But the Liberals have put up a high-profile candidate (at least in the Lambton part of the riding) the medical offi-

cer of health, Dr. Sudit Ranade. He led the community's COVID-19 response and is probably the most quoted person in Lambton since March 2020. That's a good base to start from. Also, he's a pretty smart guy who knows how to deal with people and the media.

Normally, the NDP candidate doesn't impress me much during federal elections. They often seem like a person who was convinced to run because no one else would. But this time around Chief Jason Henry from Kettle and Stoney Point is on the ballot. I've listened to him speak a number of times and he's thoughtful and passionate about his community.

Both Jeremy Hull and Kevin Mitchell of the Green and PPC, are businessmen who would no doubt add to the flavour of debates.

But here's the problem; it appears Rood isn't going to be part of any debates. She turned down an opportunity given by The Independent, the Lambton Federation of Agriculture is still waiting to see if she'll grace their presence next week and the other

candidates tell me she's not confirmed to be a part of any debates and has already missed one in the largest community of the riding, Strathroy.

I have to wonder why that is?

The only debate Rood appears to be doing is a federal debate on agriculture Sept. 15. It makes me believe she has her eyes set on bigger things, like being minister of agriculture in a Conservative government. And while agriculture is very important in her riding and it certainly would be nice to have a local voice in the portfolio, would it do any good?

If she's not willing to engage with the public during an election campaign when she needs their vote, will she talk to them when she's in power?

Hospitals explain new mandatory vaccine policy for staff

EDITOR: *The following letter was issued as an open letter to the community.*

Bluewater Health, Chatham Kent Health Alliance, Erie Shores Health care, Hôtel Dieu Grace Health care and Windsor Regional Hospital were recently among the many hospitals in Ontario which moved forward with a staff vaccination policy.

Unfortunately, COVID-19 cases are continuing to increase again in our communities and across the province, with the most severe impacts affecting those who are unvaccinated.

As of August 29, 2021, Windsor-Essex had the highest number of active COVID-19 cases in Ontario - at 119 cases per 100,000 in population, compared to the Ontario average of 40.3 active cases per 100,000.

Over the same time period, Windsor-Essex also had the highest number of new COVID-19 cases in Ontario - at 101 cases per 100,000, compared to the Ontario average of 32.6 new cases per 100,000. (Source: Ontario Government Open Data)

In Chatham-Kent, Sept. 2, there were 18 new cases in the community and eight hospitalized.

There were 13 active cases in Sarnia-Lambton, up two from the previous day. Past projections have shown that cases in Sarnia-Lambton spike two to three weeks behind other areas.

During the height of the third wave, Sarnia-Lambton had the highest cases in Ontario.

The vast majority of our hospitalized COVID-19 positive patients in Erie St Clair hospitals are not fully vaccinated. This is consistent with the provincial trend.

As health care leaders, we need to do everything possible to continue to safeguard our patients, families, communities and those who provide their care. We are grateful to all those who have already been vaccinated. It is our best defense against this virus and the best effort to lessen the impact of a fourth wave.

Effective Sept. 7, the provincially announced **Directive #6** - which is consistent with our previously announced policies - requires all employees, credentialed staff, contractors, learners/students, and volunteers to provide evidence of full vaccination or the completion of regular testing. Anyone who is not fully vaccinated will also be required to complete a mandatory education module on the COVID-19 vaccine unless a medical exemption is provided.

However, Directive #6 sets a minimum standard to meet. It can be influenced by local conditions. Our goal is to have our vaccination rates at 100 per cent.

After reviewing the conditions with our respective boards, the five hospitals of the former Erie-St. Clair LHIN have collectively agreed to implement a progressive plan to ensure that all employees, credentialed staff and volunteers (not including those with an accommodation for medical exemption or under the Ontario Human Rights Code to full vaccination), will be subject to progressive policies beyond mandatory education and testing, leading to unpaid leave and/or termination for cause. Mandatory vaccination for new staff will also be implemented by all hospitals.

Each hospital will announce a deadline for all impacted employees, credentialed staff, contractors, learners/students, and volunteers to confirm they have been vaccinated, or face an unpaid leave of absence and/or termination of employment and/or privileges.

This decision was not taken lightly. However, it is the right decision to protect our patients, colleagues and community whom we are obligated to ensure receive safe, quality care while we do everything we can to reduce the potential risk of COVID-19 amid the delivery of vital health care services.



The Plympton and Wyoming Agricultural Society, formerly known as the Plympton Agricultural Fair, was formed in 1846. It is the oldest fair in Lambton County.

The first fall fair was held on the farm of John Fisher, Lot 14, Concession 8, Plympton Township. It was located there for many years and on February 22nd, 1907 it was moved to Thames Street, Wyoming, and later to Main Street. A hall was erected in 1911 and extra land was bought in June 1926 for race tracks.

The current day fairbuilding was erected in 1973 by Wilpstra Construction Ltd, on Part of Lot 15, Concession 2. The building was clear of debt by 1977 and was used for community dances, local banquets and the Wyoming Business Association with their very successful trade shows.

Since 1846, the Plympton Wyoming Agricultural Society has been an integral part of the local community. In its early years (1929) - the Society would sponsor a St. Andrews Supper for 75¢ a plate with a noon luncheon the next day of 15¢ a plate.

Times have definitely changed, and now we can host weddings and corporate events of up to 350 people with modern amenities such as a Large Screen Projector, a complete sound system, ultra high-speed internet and a newly expanded WiFi system. With a modern fully-equipped commercial kitchen, the Agricultural Society carries on the tradition of our forefathers, as always being a place where serving lots of food for very reasonable prices - "is just the right thing to do."

In 2011 we can all remember the Snowmageddon that took place in our area. Once again, the Agricultural Society was called upon to become a designated Emergency Warming Centre for all of the stranded motorists that were unfortunate to be stuck in the storm. The helicopters brought in people from along Highway 402 to seek warmth and a bite to eat.

Our grounds have been utilized for training seminars, the annual Truck and Tractor Pull, and hosting various animal shows, clubs and sports teams. As fall turns to winter, you can utilize our numerous out-buildings for indoor storage, at a reasonable rate.

In 2021 we were asked to become one of the designated COVID-19 vaccination centres for rural Lambton, and again we were honoured to take our place in history offering our familiar hospitality to the community.

Stop gobbling up farmland: OFA

The Ontario Federation of Agriculture is worried the current provincial government is gobbling up farmland for development.

Crispin Colvin of the OFA told Lambton County councillors recently only eight major countries in the world, including Canada, are self sufficient for crop production.

“That’s a very small number of countries that have to supply food to 9.8 billion people by the year 2050. So, we simply cannot continue to lose agricultural lands at a rate of 175 acres a day. And we have, as an organization, a deep-seated concern with the recent proliferation of ministers zoning orders. To date, I believe there’s in the neighborhood of 57 that had been issued.”

Municipal governments can apply to the minister of municipal affairs to ignore local planning to build industrial projects. It used to be rare, but the current Conservative government has used them extensively including in a competition to draw Amazon to build a warehouse near Toronto.

Colvin told councillors the OFA is concerned the Conservative government will continue removing some of the most valuable farmland in Ontario from production.

“Once the farm is turned into a shopping center, or a warehouse or a subdivision, it’s never going to produce food again,” he says. “The bottom line is we’re down to less than five per cent of Ontario’s land base that can be suitable for agricultural.”

He added, “the minister did order the minister zoning in order to protect Glen Abbey golf course, so I find it fascinating that he’s willing to protect the golf course from development but we don’t care about food.”

Colvin says the OFA is trying to build support among municipalities to convince the current government to stop overriding planning rules to keep agricultural land for food production. And he says municipalities have a role to play.

“Zoning orders short circuit your long established planning principles and your policies and it is short sighted.”

Councillors agreed and will be sending a letter to the minister.

‘Do we need to do this every single meeting?’

Lambton County councillors will acknowledge the Indigenous people who lived here before European settlers arrived before each council meeting.

But not all the politicians agree the act of reconciliation is necessary at every meeting.

County councillors first agreed to post the Land Acknowledgement in county buildings in July. It reads: “We acknowledge that this land on which we are gathered today is part of the ancestral land of the Chippewa, Odawa, and Potawatomi peoples, referred to collectively as the Anishinaabeg. It is through the connection of the Anishinaabeg with the spirit of the land, water and air that we recognize their unique cultures, traditions, and values. Together as treaty people, we have a shared responsibility to act with respect for the environment that sustains all life, protecting the future for those generations to come.”

But county councillors didn’t approve the idea of the warden or other councillors reading the acknowledgement at each meeting. Lambton Shores Mayor Bill Weber asked for council to reconsider the idea Wednesday which council approved but not without opposition.

Three councillors, Sarnia City/County Councillor Margaret Bird, Oil

Springs Mayor Ian Veen and Petrolia Mayor Brad Loosley wanted first to delay the vote and later asked the acknowledgement only be on the top of an agenda in written form.

“I would be alright with this being on the head of every agenda,” said Veen. “And that way, councillors would have time to take it and truly reflect on what’s being said. I don’t believe that we need to say it in every meeting.”

“I have to question why wouldn’t we do this once or twice a year? Do we need to do it at every single meeting?” said Loosley.

“My other concern is are we setting a precedent for other groups that may want to come and say ‘I want this read for me or for us every meeting?’”

St. Clair Mayor Steve Arnold voiced concern he didn’t really understand the acknowledgement. “I, for one, do not understand what ancestral land we would be talking about, and how we would ever do it without having their consent,” he said.

Arnold suggested members of the local First Nations educate county council. Sarnia City/County Councillor Brian White thought it was a good idea “so that when we read these words at the beginning of every meeting, they’re not just empty words, that we truly understand and can process the value of the words.”

The Indigenous leaders will be asked to provide an education session in the future.

Vaccine protestor tests positive for COVID

Lambton Public Health are asking people who might have been at a vaccine protest at Mike Weir Park Sept. 1 to watch for symptoms of COVID-19.

Officials say someone who attended the protest “focused on COVID-19 vaccines and youth” tested positive for the virus.

“The individual was contagious at the

event, and indicated they had a lot of conversations with fellow protestors unmasked for greater than 15 minutes,” said Lori Lucas, Supervisor of Health Protection in a news release.

“They also noted that physical distancing was not being observed.”

“We are now encouraging anyone who attended the event to monitor for symptoms. If symptomatic, individuals should isolate immediately, and get tested at their earliest convenience.”


