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Take Two: Lambton goes blue

After a 36 day campaign, not much has changed on the federal political landscape.

Conservative Marilyn Gladu, the incumbent Conservative, easily won the Sarnia-Lambton seat Monday night.

Gladu will sit for a third term in the House of Commons after raking in 24,835 votes in the 2021 Federal Election - that's 46.2 per cent of the popular vote.

In Lambton-Kent-Middlesex, Lianne Rood, the Conservative incumbent, was returned to office with nearly 49 per cent of the vote.

And the Liberal Party holds the balance of power, forming a minority government with 158 seats. The Conservatives exit the election with the same number of seats as 36 days ago, 121. In the local ridings, the People's Party of Canada which harnessed the frustration of people tired of the pandemic - garnered between 11 and 15 per cent of the vote, with at least one of the candidates expressing disgust that voters would return Justin Trudeau to power.

In Sarnia-Lambton, Gladu was declared winner of the riding about an hour after the polls closed.

Her next closest competitor, the NDP's Adam Kilner, garnered 21 per cent of the vote - 13,567 votes less than Gladu and about 1,000 votes less than he earned in the 2019 election. The Liberals Lois Nantais brought in 19 per cent of the vote with 10,264 votes with all but one poll reporting. The Liberals also lost around 2,000 votes over the 2019 results.

Even Gladu didn't poll as strongly as in the 2019 campaign, with 3,788 fewer votes this time around. Green Party also took a hit, losing about a third of its vote haul in 2019.

Voter turnout was down from about 69 per cent of eligible voters to 58 per cent this time around, but some of those votes may have been parked with the PPC's Brian Everaert.

Everaert, running for the party for the second time, harnessed anti-pandemic lockdown sentiments to pull in 6,114 votes this time around - about 11.4 per cent. That's up from 1,587 last time around.

The local campaign was chippy at best - and according to Gladu - "toxic" at the worst. While she didn't point directly at Everaert, she did say there were "lies" about her and her positions throughout the campaign. That's something she says has not happened before.

For Gladu, the win was bittersweet. The Conservatives were shooting for a majority government and potentially a cabinet position for the former leadership candidate.

Instead, the party ended up with the same number of seats as the last election. And that

stung a little. "It's tough," says Gladu. "But I think what I've shown in the last six years is that as opposition MP, I got \$300 million in funding for our riding. So being a collegial MP, to work across the aisles, I can line up to where the government's agenda matches Sarnia-Lambton's agenda, and get what we need for the people here."

In Lambton-Kent-Middlesex, where Rood - the incumbent drew 49 per cent of the vote, she raised eyebrows after declining to appear at any all candidates debates. She told reporters she was ill for the first debate in Strathroy, but then made a choice to go door-to-door instead.

"With it being COVID...we had to approach this campaign a little differently than other campaigns in the past."

'And having been elected and only serving for a few months before COVID, the COVID pandemic hit, I really haven't been able to get out to talk to people one-on-one in this riding," she told supporters at her campaign event in Thedford after she had been declared the winner.

"From the very beginning our goal was to get out and have as many conversations with as many people as possible across Lambton-Kent-Middlesex, and I'm proud to say that with my team of volunteers, we have managed to get to 10,000 houses to knock on doors. We've made over 6,000 phone calls.

"It is a huge feat to do so many houses in such a short time. And so we were able to connect with so many people."

Pressed by reporters who asked whether a debate would have been a good venue to explain the party's ideas, Rood said "I can reach more people door-to-door

on my campaign, and I did just that; 10,000 doors and 6,000 phone calls. I couldn't reach that many people ever in a debate. And I'm proud of what our team has accomplished throughout this campaign.'

With 99 per cent of the vote counted Tuesday, Rood had claimed 49 per cent of the vote - the same result as the 2019 election.

Sudit Ranade, Lambton's Medical Officer of Health who ran for the Liberals, came in second with 21 per cent of the vote and the NDP's Jason Henry brought in 18 per cent of the vote.

"I got a little bruised up at the polls...good indicator that 95 per cent of the population in Lambton-Kent-Middlesex voted the exact same way as the last number of years," said Henry - the chief of the Kettle and Stony Point First Nation on social media.

"My family gave me a mandate to raise our voice and in that I was successful.

"I will continue on my journey with my family and community, the objectives have not changed and we will continue to fight.' Meantime People's Party Candidate Kevin Mitchell, who just one week ago told about 400 people in Inwood who had gathered to see leader Maxime Bernier, the polls showed him 1,000 behind Rood, finished about 22,200 behind the incumbent.

He won 6,114 votes for about 11 per cent of the popular vote, more than tripling the young party's vote count in 2019.

Mitchell, on social media, said he was "extremely disappointed in Canadians from coast to coast today. "For all those that have chosen to keep the blinders on and not see the tyranny that is happening all around us, you deserve exactly what is coming your way," he said, adding PPC supporters, "are the few that can go to bed each night knowing we did everything we could to fight for our children and our country."

Municipal staff in St. Clair worry as vaccine passports come into effect

Petrolia officials aren't anticipating vaccine passport problems Alex Kurial

St. Clair Township is pleading for civility toward staff members as Ontario's vaccine passport comes into effect while officials in Petrolia expect most parents will be fine with the new rules.

Starting Wednesday anyone wishing to enter a non-essential business or facility must show they've received both doses of the COVID vaccine and 14 days have elapsed or be refused entry.

This includes arenas like the Mooretown Sports Complex. That means municipal employees will be left to enforce the rules for a program that does not have complete support of the public.

"We expect it to be not very pleasant at first because there are some people that are not vaccinated," says Kendall Lindsay, director of community services.

"The arena is where we're ex-

pecting most of the issues with the public coming in."

He says there's already social media chatter asking what leeway will be granted on the new rules. The vaccine passport is a provincial order, so full enforcement is mandatory.

For now, participants in organized sports like hockey can be unvaccinated.

The same goes for coaches, trainers and volunteers.

This is temporary though; the Ontario Minor Hockey Association has mandated everyone aged 12 and up be fully vaccinated by October 31 to be allowed to continue in the sport.

There's no more grace period for spectators though and that's what worries Lindsay.

"My concern is that people are going to be belligerent to staff."

Lindsay says bringing in outside security for the first few days was discussed but the minor hockey association pleaded against this saying they thought it would make an already charged situation worse.

Instead, they volunteered to have parents and executives assist with enforcing the vaccine rules during ice time.

Lindsay says with this extra help they shouldn't need security but he'll be keeping an eye on the situation.

In the meantime Lindsay says anyone acting belligerently will be issued an arena ban via a no trespassing order and have the matter referred to the OPP.

"We need to have a zero-tolerance approach to frustrated patrons who act inappropriately towards township staff or volunteers due to this new provincial mandate."

The township will also be drafting an official policy for staff and volunteers on how to deal with abusive members of the public.

Lindsay says he, Coordinator of Community Programs Michelle Rottier and Coordinator of Facilities and Parks Sue Knight will be working nights for awhile to make sure any potential abuse doesn't fall solely to young volunteers or other arena staff.

"I'm scared that something might happen on the first day," says Mayor Steve Arnold.

"The last thing I would ever want is for somebody to take a swipe at one of our great staff and somebody ends up being hurt. That would be just awful."

Lindsay says problems often arise because people think the township or arena developed the vaccine rules, when in reality they're mandated by the province. "Hopefully everything goes well and we can just get kids on the ice to skate and we won't have to worry about too much."

"But if it isn't I want to be prepared to make everybody safe," says Lindsay of the township's enforcement plan.

Meantime, in Petrolia, officials are hoping education will head off any incidents.

Laurissa Ellsworth, director of marketing, arts and communications, is reminding people using town facilities the new vaccine passport takes effect Wednesday and the town will have to follow the provincial rules.

And, she says, they have thought if there are any issues, it may be at the arena, where there is the most traffic.

"For the arena specifically there's been a little more talk of making sure that people are really well informed. So by the time they do get to that front door, that we're not facing push back," she tells *The Independent*.

Ellsworth says organizations like OMHA and Skate Canada have made their vaccine expectations very clear.

"I think a lot of the organizations have been working through this on their own and are in support of it. So a lot of people that have registered prior to even our announcement or today are just ready for it based on their own organization's policies."

Ellsworth adds at Victoria Playhouse Petrolia, where patrons have been in house since early September, there has not been any concerns about the pandemic rules. She doesn't expect that will change with the vaccine passports.

In St. Clair, township officials say there are areas of lower concern like the golf course, where people must be fully vaccinated to dine inside but can still play a round outside without their shots.

The community halls have decided to avoid the issue altogether by stating they wish to remain closed until the new year.

Lindsay says they "don't want to be responsible for screening these vaccines or making sure everything that happens in their halls is falling under regulations."

The lone exception is the Brigden Hall who say they want to remain open for their Beaver and Scout meetings and some other weekly gatherings. Lindsay says they'll be a good case study for the rest of the halls come 2022.

MOH debunks Lambton councillors COVID denial

Lambton's Medical Officer of Health is shooting down a "study" used by COVID-19 deniers.

Sarnia City/County Councillor Margaret Bird during a county council committee meeting Sept. 15, raised a "study from Cornell University" which claimed the COVID-19 virus had not been found in 1,500 people who died of what officials deemed to be the virus.

Then she asked Acting Medical Officer of Health Dr. Christopher Greensmith if he had a physical sample from a patient where she could actually see the COVID-19 virus. Greensmith, looking a little confused, pointed to the statistics gathered by Lambton Public Health and the province.

Sarnia Mayor Mike Bradley chimed in that the 69 people who passed away in Lambton should be proof enough that COVID-19 exists in the community.

Later, when another county committee met in a separate session, Greensmith said he'd looked into the study Bird had talked about. Associated Press, he said, found it was a widely shared, fraudulent hoax.

"There is no foundation to it at all. It's difficult to understand where that would come from. We do have COVID in Lambton."

Get back to work

There is a bitter taste in many people's mouths after the results of the federal election rolled in Monday. They're angry that a \$610 million election over 36 days ended with the same result.

After 36 days of campaigning, debates, platforms in glossy covers, anger and frustration - and yes even literal rock throwing - Canadians went to the polls, cast their ballots and returned many of the same people to the same jobs as held by them 37 days ago.

That's the case in the two ridings in our readership area where both Incumbent Conservatives Dave Epp and Lianne Rood returned to the House of Commons. Rood was returned with relatively the same margins as the first time around. Epp on the other hand, had a tougher time of it this go round, loosing about 5,000 votes compared to the 2019 election.

He can thank the People's Party of Canada for that, it garnered 14.6 per cent of the vote this time - over 7,700 people went purple.

The PPC also had a strong showing in Lambton-Kent-Middlesex, with about 6,600 votes or 10 per cent of the vote - but not enough to make a dent in Rood's support.

While that scene played out in many ridings, the result was still the same, the Liberals under Justin Trudeau will be the governing party.

So was it a gigantic waste of money as many people believe? We're not sure. First, it is always a privilege to be able to vote - doing so is never useless.

We think Canadians have sent politicians of all stripes a very clear message - the same one sent in 2019; we're not convinced any of you should be running the country - how about you work together instead.

Apparently it was a message that needed to be repeated.

What should the parties take from all this? What they're doing isn't working. People are frustrated and tired of the same rhetoric from politicians who say they represent the people and instead do whatever their party dictates. In rural Ontario, they're tired of being ignored for the vote-rich urban areas.


In fact all electors, we would guess, are tired of being seen as a vote to be purchased. How about some long term planning and fairness for those who need help the most? That might lead to a majority government.

The 1995 Quebec Referendum, where we came within a whisker of losing the country, was also a nail biter. I can remember watching late into the night, talking with

Lambton officer guilty of search teens personal info

A Lambton County OPP officer plead guilty in Sarnia Superior Court Friday to misusing his power by performing numerous unauthorized searches of personal information while on the job.

Craig Johnston, 34, entered his plea to one charge of accessing police databases without authorization, remotely by video before Justice Michael McArthur three years after he was charged. He received an absolute discharge avoiding a criminal record leaving a chance of returning to active duty.

Johnston's ordeal is far from over though as he still faces a Police Services Act prosecution to decide the future of his employment with the OPP.

Johnston has been suspended with pay since February 2018 after his infractions were discovered.

During the summer of 2017 Johnston was assigned as a mentor officer through the OPP West Region Police Ethnic and Cultural Exchange program (PEACE) with Aamjiwnaang First Nation. Johnston's student was an 18 year-old girl from Aamjiwnaang interested in becoming a police officer.

Over the course of July and August Johnston did several record checks on the girl as well as two men, a former and a current boyfriend. At times this was done in the presence of his young partner and the information shared with her.

Court heard the personal information obtained, along with Johnston's personal advice, were "factors leading to (girl's) decision to end her relationship (with current boyfriend), believing it was good for her goal of becoming a police officer."

Record checks by police made for personal reasons and unrelated to a case are illegal under the Criminal Code.

As for why Johnston was looking up the girl in the first place, Defence Lawyer Nick Cake says his client "suspected that a complete background check had not been completed on her prior to her acceptance into the program."

"He really didn't know who was

seated beside him and who he was involving in his day-to-day life as a criminal investigator," says Cake, noting the girl herself "did nothing to raise Const. Johnston's suspicions. This is not a question of her personal integrity."

The Crown didn't buy this excuse, arguing for a conditional discharge as opposed to Cake's request for an absolute discharge. The former would come with probation conditions.

"If there was a concern with regard to the student the direction was to contact the PEACE coordinator... not to do your own searches," says Crown Attorney Brian White.

"This isn't a momentary mistake... This is a repeated mistake," White says of the four searches Johnston did. "Why would you need to continue to screen this student repeatedly?"

Johnston also "used the system in her presence both to show her how it works as well as to show her how social media and association on social networks may be a detriment to the police application process," says Cake.

Cake highlighted positive reviews Johnston received from OPP. He's described as an "asset to the OPP, meeting expectations and at times exceeding them... without a doubt one of the hardest working and most proactive officers within Lambton County," read one report from the department.

Čake also says his client has been taking counselling since the incident came to light and "gained insight into his triggers and has an understanding of how his decisions affect others around him."

White continued to push for the more serious sentence based on Johnston's position in the community. "The concern here... is the importance of safeguarding the overall integrity, confidentiality and security of the personal information that's been trusted to police officers," he says.

The Crown also suggested the collateral damage the incident could have on relationship building between the police and First Nations people.

"The Aamjiwnaang First Nation puts considerable trust in putting forth their Indigenous youth for this program. To respond to that in a way of suspicion toward the youth... and to have this kind of level of mistrust of this youth right from the get-go and then continuous mistrust throughout is concerning," says White.

Cake denied Johnston's actions had anything to do with race.

Johnston spoke briefly before McArthur departed to make his judgement. "I would like to take this opportunity to say I am sorry... My decisions in the summer of 2017 put a dark cloud over my career and my life in general."

"I've taken the time off to really evaluate who I am and how I got to where I was... I want to get back out there, I want to continue to be a police officer," says Johnston.

Following a brief recess McArthur returned with his decision. "The aggravating factor as raised here by all parties has been the fact that Mr. Johnston did this as part of his police duties," says the justice.

But he says it's a situation with "basically no violence or harm intended." McArthur also noted Johnston's time in therapy, his obeying of court orders and collateral consequences suffered.

"You" ve basically lived your entire life in the same community where this issue now comes up and undoubtedly that has had its own embarrassment," says McArthur.

He felt an absolute discharge was in the best interests of both Johnston and the community, adding he thinks the case will send a message to other officers not to try anything similar.

"I can imagine this has been a hard and difficult lesson... You have gone through an ordeal unfortunately of your own making," McArthur said."It's this court's impression that you've done an exceedingly good job at addressing matters and I want to thank you for the steps you've taken in your career and particularly with respect to matters that can assure the people and the public that you might be serving in the continued future," concluded McArthur.

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

Fairbank Oil celebrates 160 years of production

It's a milestone not many businesses have reached.

Fairbank Oil is celebrating 160 years in business this year.

The family owned oil company was started in 1861 by John Henry Fairbank. It's been run by successive generations and has been operated by his great grandson, Charlie, since 1972.

JH Fairbank arrived in Oil Springs in the spring of 1861, without any cash to his name. The surveyor found hundreds of men toiling in the fields trying to find oil. He set to work.

When the oil boom in Oil Springs faded, Fairbank struck oil in Petrolia. The boom in Petrolia lasted four decades, and he eventually became one of the founders of what today is known as Imperial Oil.

One hundred and sixty years later, Charlie Fairbank still sells his crude to Imperial Oil. The 320 historic wells in

Oil Springs produce about 24,000 barrels of crude each year.

The Fairbank Oil fields are part of a Canadian National Historic Site with the Oil Museum of Canada. They hope

A Corunna man avoided jail time for cocaine trafficking after the court recognized changes he's made since being arrested.

Chris McArthur, 23, plead guilty to trafficking the drug in June. The January 2020 police raid in Sarnia where he was arrested yielded 13.45 grams of cocaine along with Xanax, codeine and \$1,000 cash.

The cocaine, worth about \$1,350, "is on the lower end" of the trafficking spectrum according to Crown Attorney Brian Higgins. The prosecutor adds McArthur has no criminal record and "hasn't been in trouble since he was arrested." has improved "in terms of employment and lifestyle and motivation."

The Corunna man also acknowledged how this has changed him.

"Being arrested was one of the best things that happened to me. It's allowed me to get my life on track and get back to working."

"I'm doing a lot better and I don't perceive myself committing any crimes in the future," says McArthur. A joint submission between Higgins and Defence Lawyer David Stoesser established a nine month conditional sentence. McArthur will spend the first five months under full house arrest and the final four on a curfew. After that he'll be on a year of probation.

"You have recognized the value of

something that you're putting behind you and moving forward in a more constructive way in your life," says Justice Deborah Austin.

The justice says she has "confidence that you have taken this all very seriously and have been showing your compliance with the court system from your time of arrest."

McArthur's sentence also includes a 10 year weapons ban, he must forfeit the items seized by police and will have to provide DNA to the court. He also has to stay away from three specific people, go to counselling for substance abuse and pay a \$200 fine.

OMHA says teen players will have to be double vaccinated

Despite being given the leeway to exempt players under the age of 18 from being vaccinated in order to play this season, the Ontario Minor Hockey Association says it would rather take a cautious approach.

Following a weekend meeting, the body which oversees many minor hockey associations across the province, including Petrolia, East Lambton, Mooretown and Lambton Shores in our readership region, says it will continue to require all players 12 and up to be double vaccinated by the end of October.

"The Ontario government considers its regulations to be a baseline and allows organizations and businesses to supplement further measures to ensure the health and safety of participants," stated an OMHA news release issued Monday.

The release went on to say that the decision was made after a presentation of Ontario's Medical of Health, Dr. Kieran Moore, that indicates indoor sports, including hockey, remains a high-risk activity for the spread of the virus.

"The OMHA's Board of Directors have reaffirmed their commitment to provide the safest environment possible for our participants, to minimize the spread of COVID-19 and to mitigate further restrictions and disruption to programming." As of press time, the Alliance Hockey of Ontario which oversees among others, the Lambton Junior Sting "AAA" program is also requiring all its players 12 and up to double vaccinated by the end of next month.

Effective Wednesday, September 22 Ontarians had to show proof of vaccination downloaded from a provincial website to dine indoors, go to bars and night clubs, concert halls, theaters, and arenas to watch sport events.

An Ontario Ministry of Health spokesperson recently told *The Independent of Petrolia and Central Lambton* vaccinations for those under 18 to play sports are not necessary because the province wants to promote physical fitness and mental wellness among its young people under the rules developed for the vaccination passport from the provincial government.

"Children and youth under 18 will not be required to show proof of vaccination to enter the indoor areas of a facility used for sports and recreational fitness activities solely for the purpose of actively participating in an organized sport, in accordance with guidance published by the Ministry of Health on its website," officials told *The Independent*.


