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# 'A whole lot of shovels in the ground'

McNaughton predicts more infrastructure projects as PCs win majority

"There is going to be a whole lot of shovels in the ground.'

That's from Monte McNaughton, the Lambton-Kent-Middlesex MPP elect. Mc-Naughton, a cabinet minister in the Progressive Conservative government, easily reclaimed his seat and predicted Ontario is poised for growth.

McNaughton talked about the redevelopment of the Sydenham Campus of the Chatham-Kent Health Alliance as one of the key Conservative wins in the riding.

"And there's further expansion of natural gas projects, further expansion of broadband. I mean, by the end of this term, we're going to have every single household in the province of Ontario connected to broadband, a high speed internet, so that's going to benefit the people from Middlesex.'

And McNaughton says he'll continue to build relationships with trade unions. The Conservatives widely touted the endorsements of more than a half dozen construction unions including LIUNA, pipefitters, sheet metal workers, boilermakers and electrical workers, as one of their paths to electoral victory June 2

# Plympton-Wyoming teen charged after threats close LCCVI for a day

Lambton OPP have charged a 16 year-old from Plympton-Wyoming in the wake of threats which closed LCCVI for a day.

June 2, Lambton-Kent District School Board officials called in the OPP after graffiti was found in a bathroom which was under renovations. While officials downplayed the idea, sources

told The Independent the threats made were linked to PRIDE Day activities which were expected to take place the next day.

Students were kept in the classrooms and bathrooms were off limits while officers investigated. And after consulting with police, the board closed the school building Friday concerned about the threats.

we follow the direction of local police regarding matters of school safety," said Director of Education John Howitt in a memo to parents.

Howitt says the board acknowledges that while they want everyone to feel welcome at Lambton-Kent schools – that is still not always the case However, Howitt cautioned against "heavily linking" the incident at LCCVI with PRIDE day activities while police were

investigating the threats.

In a news release Tuesday, OPP say a teen – who will not be identified because those 16 and under are covered under the Young Offenders Act which protects their identity – was arrested Monday night and has been charged with uttering threats and mischief

officials said in the news release. "The OPP take these incidents very seriously and will continue to work closely with the school boards to help identify the individuals responsible when these investigations arise. Criminal charges will be laid when suspects are identified in these matters

# **Enniskillen man wants** dirt bike track curfew

Corey McKinnon says there needs to be a curfew at the dirt bike track that borders his Enniskillen property on the Marthaville Road.

He made the request at the Township of Enniskillen Council meeting June 6.

"I have never heard anyone say they moved to the country to enjoy the sound of dirt bikes," said McKinnon.

The track was built only 20 feet from his property line and he says the noise can reach over 120 decibels.

He can still hear the noise while he is inside his home with the doors and windows closed. He has even had his sleep disrupted at night and can hear the dirt bikes when he gets up in the morning. The track, he says, was not there when he purchased his property.

But the owner of the track disputes McKinnon's claims.

Kristen Kelvin was also at council and said the track has only been used three times this year, twice after school for two to three hours and once on a Saturday afternoon for two hours. "The most dirt bikes that

have been on the track are

four, because I have four children," Kelvin said. The dirt bikes vary from 65 cc to 250 cc. she said.

McKinnon said he has a number of photographs of the activity on the track, saying at least one shows 10 dirt bikes on the track.

Mayor Kevin Marriott said McKinnon has called him a couple of times about the issue. McKinnon said he had a list of names of neighbours who are also concerned about the noise issue.

"I know you have mentioned some names but I don't think I had anyone contact me," said Marriott. The other four members of council all said this was the first time they had heard of this issue.

McKinnon said he would gather the signatures of other concerned citizens and submit it to the township. Council will wait for this additional information before moving forward.

The Township currently has an off-road vehicle bylaw, which limits offroad vehicles being driven from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. from Monday to Saturday. This only applies to two specific areas in the township and this Marthaville Sideroad location is not one of them.

# Warwick to acknowledge Indigenous land rights

Warwick Township is joining the ranks of municipalities acknowledging the lands of Indigenous people.

At the May 30 meeting, council adopted a land acknow-ledgement policy which will see the head of council read a statement before each meeting.

It acknowledges Warwick is located on the traditional lands of the Anishnabe and other Indigenous nations in Ontario "whose footsteps have marked them for centuries." The acknowledgement also promises to "strive to educate residents about our history through programming and events. We pledge to our First Nations neighbours that we will not tolerate systemic racism and commit to advancing reconciliation by building trusting relationships and fostering ideas for future consultation and partnership opportunities.

The acknowledgement will also be posted public areas in the public areas in the township, including the arena, community hall and library.

OPP officers and firefighters completed a 100 kilometre walk from Grand Bend to Corunna in an effort to raise awareness and cash to place defibrillators in public buildings. Four first responders, OPP Sgt. Patrick Armstrong, Det. Sgt. Dave Matheson, OPP equine care specialist Sam Crozier, and London Firefighter Bob Geilen - wearing his bunker suit - left Grand Bend early June 4 and arrived in Corunna Sunday morning. The group only stopped for about two hours during the 24 hour trek. The effort was for the Dave Mounsey Memorial Fund, which raises money to place defibrillators in public buildings. Mounsey was an early supporter of the program. He died of injuries in a collision while on the way to an emergency call. To date, six of the donated defibrillators have been used to save a life. The walkers brought one to the Corunna Legion in the name of Corunna's own Graham Eslmie. He was a Sarnia firefighter who died five years ago of cancer.

# **Developer plans 69 unit Alvinston subdivision**

Brooke-Alvinston council has approved the rezoning of 12 acres of farmland in Alvinston which will pave the way for 69 new housing units. And not everyone is excited with the news.

Steve and Deb Durham of Norwich purchased the land and plan to build 19 single family homes, 30 semi detached homes and 20 townhouses in the Broadway/Lisgar area.

It would be the largest housing development in Alvinston in decades. The last large development would have been on Broadway when about 20 homes were built.

Lambton planners voiced some concerns, including the entrance to the subdivision

would be very close to the neighbours' homes, but said those issues could be resolved as the Durhams submit a plan of subdivision. But some neighbours were not pleased

with the concept. Several, including Susan Upshall, wrote letters. Upshall who lives beside the proposed entrance says the development will "transform a quiet, naturalized pretty spot into a barren, busy thoroughfare - precisely the urbanization and commotion I moved to Alvinston to avoid."

Mayor Dave Ferguson says the land was always zoned for homes, but the rezoning will allow a higher density. He added the lots will still be relatively large.

It's not clear when construction would begin.

# An electoral problem

Ontario has another Progressive Conservative government even though the majority of Ontarians couldn't be bothered to vote. Elections Ontario says 10,760,433 people voted; that's about 43 per cent voter turnout - the lowest in Ontario's history.

Since the 1970s, the people of this province have exercised their right to vote fairly faithfully with the highest turnout around 66 per cent and the usual turnout anywhere from the low 60s to mid 50s.

Our previous low was in 2011, when Dalton McGuinty returned the Liberals to power with a minority government for his third term. At the time he gained 37.6 per cent of the popular vote with 48 per cent of Ontarians casting a ballot. He had 53 seats.

Doug Ford, on the other hand, gave the PC's a commanding 83 seat majority government earning just 40 per cent of the votes cast with 43 per cent voter turn out. In all, about 1.9 million Ontarians in a province with 10.7 million registered voters gave Ford his majority. One calculation shows the PC's increased majority was endorsed by just under 18 per cent of the eligible voters.

On the flip side, the Liberals once again failed to gain enough seats to be an official party and the NDP lost nine seats yet the two parties - with very similar platforms - had the votes of 2.3 million Ontario voters - That's still only 21 per cent support.

Clearly, Houston, we have an electoral problem.

There have long been calls to reform the 'First Past The Post' voting system. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau even acknowledged the problem saying he would introduce proportional representation. He didn't. Doug Ford, when asked about the obvious problem after Thursday's election said there was nothing wrong with the current system.

It's obvious why both Liberals and Progressive Conservatives don't want to change - they have learned how to win with the least votes possible to hold onto power. Proportional representation would hold them to account and have them share power.


As long as we continue to return the established parties to power, it unfortunately isn't going to change and neither will the way they govern.

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# **Conservatives cruise to victory in Lambton**

The Lambton-Kent-Middlesex MPP was given much of the credit for moving the party toward labour. McNaughton told reporters he spent 100 days meeting with union leaders across the province when he became the Labour Minister. He also championed an issue important to the skilled trades - the need to draw more young people to the industry.

By the time the election rolled around, several construction trades announced a Ford-led government would be good for labour.

McNaughton told supporters in Mt. Brydges on election night his vision of bringing members of the trade unions into the party paid off.

"Leading this change in our Conservative family at Queen's Park hasn't always been easy, but you stuck with me and our hard work tonight has paid off; for the first time ever eight major construction unions representing tens of thousands of men and women who build Ontario endorsed Doug Ford and the Ontario PC party for the first time in history."

McNaughton told his supporters at the Mt. Brydges Legion that came at the expense of the NDP and Liberals; "The reason for this is crystal clear; the Liberals and NDP are migrating to boutique social issues of the woke elites. They care more about statues and street names than good jobs with pensions and benefits," he says. While the Conservative were able to win the support of trade unions, several major organizations threw their support behind either the NDP or Liberals.

The Ontario Federation of Labour, which has over 1 million members and the Ontario Public Service Employees Union, with about 180,000 members, endorsed the NDP. The Service Employees International Union which represents health care workers - endorsed Liberal Leader Steven del Ducca in his riding.

These unions want the government to repeal a bill which caps wages of public sector workers at one per cent in a time of rapidly increasing inflation. When The Independent asked

McNaughton how he would deal with those unions he said; "I think where you can find common ground, you have to work here together. And we've been able to find common ground with the unions that represent tens of thousands of workers, you know, always more work to be done on this file. But, you know, it's pretty historic what we've done and we're seeing in the election results."

McNaughton's win in Lambton-Kent-Middlesex was expected; even the NDP candidate, Vanessa Benoit, who came in second, more than 16,000 votes behind him, admitted she knew going in McNaughton would be nearly impossible to unseat. But as she campaigned door-to-door, people were

talking about their concerns for health care and the cost of living.

"It makes me makes me wonder what happened, whether it's voter turnout, or you know, what it was that made things tip that way? And I don't have the answer."

Elections Ontario said this was one of the lower voter turn outs in recent memory. Elections Ontario says 10,760,433 people voted - about 43.03 per cent voter turnout.

McNaughton told reporters he would like to continue on as the Conservatives Minister of Labour, but that was up to the premier-elect.



# Bailey wins fifth term as Sarnia-Lambton MPP

#### Elated.

That's what Bob Bailey was feeling after being re-elected to serve his fourth term as MPP for Sarnia-Lambton. "I am elated. I am very happy," said Bailey told his supporters as it became clear he would win this election in a walk with 52.7 per cent of the votes - a total of 21,183 ballots.

"People ask me why I am running again," said Bailey. "Because I am not done yet."

He pointed to three initiatives which he would like to see completed, twinning Highway 40 from Wellington Street and Indian Road in Sarnia, the construction of a new withdrawal management centre in Sarnia and the Water Treatment Plant upgrade for the Town of Petrolia.

The money is there for the withdrawal management centre and the water treatment plant, the work just has to be done, he said. Bailey, known for his folksy ways, added he put a lot of time into campaigning to ensure the victory. "I have been to every restaurant and every small town." Bailey said to supporters during his acceptance speech getting a laugh from the crowd. "I should start a food column. My waist line says I should back off." While Bailey was elated to be reelected in a Conservative majority government, others who ran this time around were surprised by the strength of his win. The NDP's Dylan Stelpstra placed second but gained just 23.6 per cent of the vote. He says that number didn't reflect his internal polling nor what he

was hearing as he campaigned. He and his NDP volunteers were able to knock on a lot of doors and they heard from a lot of "good people" who are not happy with the direction the province and the government is going. Stelpstra said people told him they didn't plan to vote for him, but yet he would have a 10 minute conversation with them giving him a chance to correct some misconceptions about the NDP platform and in some cases, sway their vote.

Stelpstra the conversations and the local polling had him expecting more than the 9,492 votes the NDP captured. Stelpstra said it is possible the low voter turnout could have had an impact on his numbers.

And he recognized he didn't have a high profile to start the campaign. "People were getting to know me," said Stelpstra. He says while the next provincial election is four years away, he would consider another run at the

percent of all votes province wide with Sarnia-Lambton candidate Keith Benn coming in fourth in the riding with 2,719 votes.

It wasn't hard to get people involved with the fledgling party, Maniuk said, as there were enough unhappy people. Maniuk said people are not happy with the federal or provincial governments, suggesting the Premier Doug Ford and his Progressive Conservative government have "behaved like Liberals." One of the criticisms of the New Blue Party is it was splitting the vote. This is something Maniuk rejects saying the Progressive Conservative Party has "slid right to the left" leaving the New Blue Party as the only right wing party left. The Progressive Conservative party has increased its number of seats and strengthened its majority government so "there will be more of the same," said Maniuk, in the next four years. He feels the New Blue Party is well positioned to build on its momentum in the next election. "We are already looking to the next one," he said.

In the meantime, Stelpstra is hoping the Ford government will "continue to listen, especially to those who are left behind and forgotten."

The New Blue Party - whose signs were prominent across Central

Lambton - received 6.8 per cent of the vote, organizers are excited about the party's future.

"The future looks bright," said Bob Maniuk, campaign manager for Keith Benn and Sarnia-Lambton Riding Association president for the New Blue Party. "You always hope for the best, but for a first time outing, I am happy with the campaign."

The party managed to nominate candidates in all 124 ridings but failed to win any seats. It received 2.72







### Florence residents okay testing

Officials in Dawn-Euphemia are pleasantly surprised with the number of Florence residents ready to test their septic systems. In a report to council, Clerk Donna Clermont says 21 homeowners have agreed

to a dye test to determine if their private septic systems are working well.

The township is working with the Ministry of Environment to determine the source of pollution in the Sydenham River.

Thirty years ago, the MOE flagged a problem: some samples had 1,000 times the allowable limit of E. Coli and Phosphorus was 100 times higher than the ministry guidelines. That problem has persisted for the 30 years and is caused by private septic systems which are leaking But finding a solution has been difficult and costly. A sewage treatment plant would cost millions and a less complex system proposed by the municipality was also over \$1 million. And there was no guarantee of provincial funding to help build it. The cost, politicians said, was simply too

Clermont recently sent out a letter to the affect homeowners, hoping but not expecting - to get Florence residents to volunteer for the testing. If there is a problem, homeowners will be expected to repair it at their own cost. That could cost tens of thousands of dollars. Clermont said 21 had

signed up for testing in June. Clermont is hopeful more residents will step forward.

The township expects some homeowners will avoid the testing. They'll use inspection cameras and send homeowners a report of their problems with orders to fix them.It's not clear when that testing will take place.

Hunter Campbell's first ever throw at OFSAA wasn't what he had hoped but it didn't stop him from placing in the top five across the province.

The Grade 9 LCCVI student faulted on his first discus throw en route to place fourth in the Men's Novice Discus Throw.

"I was not going to let it get me down," said Campbell, as he described the feeling he had after he faulted on his first throw at the OFSAA Track and Field Championship in Toronto June 4. This was especially difficult because

he had to wait for the other 23 competitors to throw before he got his next chance.

"I did something I should never do," Campbell said, as he looked down at his feet during his second throw to make sure he didn't over rotate. That throw was 40.42 metres, good enough to put him into the next round. He then threw three more times,

42.43 metres, 42.68 metres and the final throw and his personal best, 43.02 metres. He was in third place at one point but moved down to fourth as others bested his mark.

Campbell's win very special for LCCVI's discus coach. The coach is Hunter's dad, Joel, who has been a track coach 16 years. He is proud of the teen's accomplishment. "Getting out of the West Regionals is very hard," said Joel. "You have to have a lot of focus.'

This is the first year Hunter has competed in discus. He started to train for the sport last summer. He started to throw once or twice a week all summer then practiced again in April as the track and field season approached.

Joel stressed Hunter was motivated to learn and was always the one who asked to practice. And there was a team approach to Hunter's training, as discus throwers Joe and Brendan Wilson also had a hand in his development.

Joel coached Brendan in his first year

of coaching at LCCVI in 2005 and Joe gave some of Joel's first training as a coach. "I can't thank them enough," said Hunter of the Wilson's, saying it was a big deal for them to be involved.

Hunter will be taking his weight training more seriously, as he has an eye already on next year's season. He noticed many of his opponents were much bigger than him at OFSAA. He will be a member of Sarnia Athletics Southwest Track and Field Club where he will continue his training over the summer. He hopes to take up shot put and javelin as well. It will still be a few years away, but

competing for a Canadian or American university is a goal. "It would be a dream to get to that level," said Hunter.

But for now, Hunter and his coach are happy with this year's results. "It is nice to know that I am the fourth best novice discus thrower in the province right now," said Hunter.




