Expert 'highly recommends' Old Plympton hall should be restored

Experts say a well-preserved rare example of historic architecture may be lurking beneath the battered exterior of the Old Plympton Township Hall.

That's from a building pathology report done for the Town of Plympton-Wyoming by Dr. Christopher Cooper of the consulting firm Edifice, who "highly recommends" the building be restored.

The hall on Egremont Road was built in 1869 and was the seat of the former Plympton Township municipal government until the mid-1950s. It was also the first site of what is now the Plympton-Wyoming Fair. In the 1950s, it became a community hall run by volunteers. But the structure is need of significant repairs. When capital improvements were suggested by councillors to make it a more attractive rental, they were rejected.

A report by Public Works Manager Adam Sobanski said up to \$365,000 in repairs would be needed. That's about the same amount of money needed to rebuild a replica onsite.

But council voiced concern about tearing down the original seat of Plympton's government. Lambton County officials suggested the building pathology report to see if the building could or should be saved. The town received a Creative County grant for the study.

The report, which came to council June 29, is a laundry list of problems, from broken concrete to rotted wood and missing shingles and a existing universal washroom which is "inadequate and should not be used by the public," according to Cooper. The consultant suggested the shed on the site – which he said was in "miserable shape," could be taken down and made into an accessible washroom using some of

Watford workshop costs nearly doubles

There will be more construction at the Watford arena but not everyone is happy about the idea.

Warwick Township Council approved the construction of a workshop for the arena. It will provide storage and maintenance space for the Parks and Arena operations and will cost \$728,500.

"I am not in favour of spending over \$700,000 on a workshop," said Councillor Wayne Morris during the June 20 council meeting. "I know you can build a lot cheaper than that ... under \$200,000 I bet you. I'd like us to rethink

The township originally budgeted \$300,000 for the workshop that will be attached to the arena, according to CAO Amanda Gubbels. "The workshop itself ... it did come in with a bid at \$579,000, with the construction price increases, those were the market prices we received back."

Gubbels said the contract also includes two other parts which will help with the construction of the East Lambton Community Centre.

Gubbels says \$120,000 was required for storm water work "which is required as a result of the site work at the ELCC site." It would include drainage around the building and in the north parking lot. It will also ready the parking lot for

There is also \$29,000 to build a garbage enclosure. Gubbels suggested those two items were originally under the ELCC project.

Despite the explanation, Morris was still uncomfortable with the additional cost. "It's a quarter of a million dollars more than what we budgeted. We're spending a lot of money as it is.

"The workshop hasn't been at the arena in the past," he added. Gubbels said two consultants reports pointed out it would be more efficient to have the workshop at the arena although what kind of savings that would bring weren't

"I think we're building a Cadillac and we've already spent so much money and I don't like spending this much more.

Trevor Jarrett, the municipality's treasurer, said he understood the reluctance to spend so much more. "The treasurer in me says no; the businessperson says you're not going to get it cheaper," he said adding putting it somewhere else might require more land that would add to the cost of the project.

Jarrett added the township has just over \$5.2 million in unencumbered reserves which it can use to cover the additional costs.

Council approved the project. The project is expected to be complete this year.

the materials from the shed and in a style similar to what is already there.

The consultant couldn't look at the foundation or the attic since there was no way to get to either. And Cooper did not say how much the repairs would cost.

While councillors universally noted the problems outlined in the report, Cooper's report suggested the building could be preserved.

Cooper says the building now is "very much different" from the original. He believes underneath the current batten board exterior, the insulbrick put on the building as early as

1930, remains. And under that, Cooper says the original wood siding may be well preserved.

The consultant says municipal buildings at the time were built in the Gothic Revival style "with the rarest in existence today the Carpenter Gothic Revival Style, due to their ephemeral nature being wrought in wood.

"This building once exuded this amazing style notes replete with a Gothic Head front entry and full height Bothic Head windows.

"The original historic fabric (board and batten) may be completely intact below the insul-brick as well as the framing for the original Gothic Head

windows," he writes. Usually, Cooper says, the insul-brick was simply put on over the existing building "which could be in very good condition as it would be well preserved under the insul-brick skin.

"I would highly recommend that the building be brought back to its original character and form as the building is in very good condition."

Cooper adds "this building was very sophisticated for its time and should be represented as such."

Town staff will be working with Lambton County officials to see what should come next. That report will be given to the new council in the fall.

Plympton-Wyoming nixes sale from councillor

Plympton-Wyoming council has turned down a plan to buy snow equipment from the company owned by a member of council.

Public Works Manager Adam Sobanski told council June 29 that with the addition of sidewalks in Camlachie, staff was looking for snow clearing equipment for the winter. He went to the Kubota dealer in Reece's Corners who said the equipment would cost \$42,000.

As staff investigated, Sobanski says he found out Councillor Tim Wilkins

of Wyoming Tree Service used the model the town was considering. "We asked their opinion on how it worked for them. He invited us over to look at it and that's when we became aware that the company was planning to sell them and they offered it at that (\$25,000) price," he told council.

Sobanski says works staff examined the unit and said it was in good condition for a used machine and had relatively low use by the company. So, he presented the idea to council as a stop gap measure until a new piece of equipment could be purchased.

Wilkins declared a conflict in the discussion and didn't comment on

it. Other councillors questioned whethering going to a used unit was a good idea or if it really met the needs of the municipality.

But Councillor Mike Vasey said it simply wasn't a good idea. "I'll be the bad guy and say to buy something local businesses involved with the council, unsolicited without a tender ... is going to play - whether it's a good deal or not- I don't want to go down that route because it's going to put us under a microscope.'

Council decided to pass on the equipment. Staff has said it will use the backup plow from Wyoming when necessary.


Barn dance makes a return this weekend

Four Lambton OPP cleared after man's nose broken during arrest

The director of the Special Investigation Unit says four Lambton OPP officers did "what was reasonably necessary" to arrest a man in St. Clair Township despite breaking his nose and a bone in his face.

Joseph Martino cleared the unnamed officers in a report today.

On March 1, Lambton OPP were notified of a stolen pickup. They also suspected where it might be going. So around 8:30 that morning, one officer went looking for the truck at a rural property police knew had stolen goods.

The police officer saw a 32 year-old man, who jumped into the pickup in what Martino says was an attempt to flee. Two of the officers reached him "just as he reached into the driver's seat area and started the ignition."

Two of the officers tried to wrestle him out "through the open driver's door" but the man "would not release his grip of the steering wheel despite being punched multiple times," says Martino in the report.

Police told SIU investigators the man continued to struggle as officers got him out of the truck and they continued to hit him as they tried to hand cuff him.

When they did arrest him, they brought him to the Petrolia OPP station where video surveillance shows "blood around his nose, scrapes to the right side of his forehead and swelling around his right eye."

The man refused medical attention, but was later taken to CEEH and then Bluewater Health where he was diagnosed with a broken nose and possibly a fractured orbital bone. More injuries were discovered later in the week.

While the injuries were clear, Martino found police acted within the law saying "police officers are immune from criminal liability for force used in the course of their duties provided such force was reasonably necessary in the execution of an act that they were required or authorized to do by law."

Martino added;"Given what the officers knew of the area – that it was known to house stolen items, the complainant's presence in the area, and the complainant's flight into the

stolen vehicle at the sight of police, it appears the officers had grounds giving rise to a reasonable belief that the complainant was implicated in a theft-related offense" and the OPP officers were "within the range of what was reasonably necessary in the circumstances given the nature and extent of the complainant's physical struggle."

Four years in Watford drug bust

A Watford man who ran a "very substantial" drug business from his parents home has been sentenced to four years in prison.

Hunter Thorton, 20, plead guilty to possession of cocaine for the purposes of trafficking, possession of cannabis for the purpose of selling it, possession of psilocybin for the purposes of trafficking, possession of Xanax for the purpose of trafficking, and the possession of a stun gun without a licence and was sentenced June 24.

Justice Deborah Austin characterized Thorton as a "mid-level" drug dealer saying the drugs were "in a very substantial quantity which has implications for the community as a substantial supply source for drugs of

harmful impact in the community."
On Sept. 20, 2020, Lambton OPP
moved into Thorton's family home
and found over a kilogram of cocaine
– some of it in his bedside table, long
with 472 tablets of Xanax, Ecstasy,
LSD, homemade cannabis edibles
including 470 packages of edibles,
marijuana, cannabis-infused vape pens,
cannabis shatter, liquid codeine, digital
scales with cocaine residue, and two
stun guns in his bedroom, backpack
and a shed in the backyard.

"The inescapable conclusion here is that Hunter Thornton was operating a large illicit drug store out of his family home," Austin said during the hearing adding "Thornton's motive was acknowledged to be money or profit.

"He was not an addict or user of any hard drugs... He admitted that

it was the lure of easy money that attracted him and, clearly, he was able to buy himself a car, an ATV, a trailer, expensive shoes and clothing with the proceeds of that activity.

"His role is considered significant, and his choice to be involved deliberate."

But Austin also noted Thorton's arrest seemed to be a "wake-up call and a turning point" and since police found the drugs.

Thorton, who left North Lambton Secondary School without completing Grade 12, has been working at a Strathroy auto parts plant and according to the managers is "a hard worker" who likes his job, says Austin.

While the crown suggested a prison sentence of up to eight years, Austin says Thorton is young and has taken the "concrete steps" of "strong work ethic, employment, and a demonstrated shift away from the illegal drug activities and associations" as well as having the support of his family.

Austin says she sentenced Thorton to four years and two months in prison "with a heavy heart" adding he will "be an excellent candidate for parole at the earliest opportunity."

The justice "strongly recommended" the Watford man be placed in a minimum security setting with access to education so he can complete his high school diploma and possibly learn a trade.

Thorton is banned from owning a firearm for 10 years and must submit his DNA to a federal data bank.

The charges laid in the drug raid against his family have all been dropped.

Time for pay review

Pay raises for politicians are always a thorny issue. In Ontario, the Ombudsman used to decide pay increases for MPPs. That doesn't happen anymore. Instead, legislation requires the province to balance the budget before any politician gets a pay increase. As a result, those we elect have not had a raise since 2008 according to the current Integrity Commissioner in a report released just before the June election.

"Continuing to tie the lifting of the freeze to achieving a balanced budget is problematic for all MPPs," wrote J. David Wake after hearing concerns about their static salary from some MPPs. "After the next election, I respectfully suggest that the government consider lifting the freeze or re-establishing an independent arm'slength process to review MPP salaries."

At one time, the rule was MPP salaries should be 75 per cent of their federal counter parts. With wage freezes in place since 2008, you can bet that's not the case anymore.

So we arrive the new sitting of the Ontario Legislature and the unveiling of the new cabinet. It's bigger by far than the premier first installed in 2018 - 30 members of cabinet compared to 21 in 2018. And there are 43 legislative assistants compared to 21 in 2018. At roughly \$165,000 per cabinet minister and a pay bump of over \$16,000 for parliamentary assistants, that's a \$1,862,800 increase in spending or about 56 per cent higher than 2018. We knew there was record inflation, but that's a bit much.

One could draw a couple of conclusions from this; either the Progressive Conservatives vastly underestimated what it takes to run Ontario's government and decided to put the people in place needed or, as the NDP has suggested, there's some gravy-training going on with 73 of 80 MPPs making more than the basic salary

The more likely scenario is the provincial government knows it will not be able to balance its budget in the next four years, so it's giving as many MPP extra cash as possible to get around the wage increase issue.

The premier should take the Integrity Commissioner up on his suggestion to re-think MPP salaries. We think setting a wage with predictable increases once would be far less politically charged than giving a select few plum jobs to earn extra taxpayers cash when its likely not necessary.

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Lambton MPPs have extra work

Both of Lambton's MPPs have roles in the new Ontario government.

Premier Doug Ford and his cabinet were sworn in by the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario June 24. Lambton-Kent-Middlesex MPP Monte McNaughton will continue on in his role as Labour Minister. McNaughton will have added responsibilities with immigration being added to the title. McNaughton is expected to work with the federal government on immigration issues to try to draw more skilled workers to the province to fill the

Friday, the premier appointed 43 parliamentary assistants, including Sarnia-Lambton MPP Bob Bailey. Parliamentary assistants support ministers with legislative and committee matters, including special. They also build relationships and communicate government initiatives across the province, according to a government news release.

Bailey, who was the parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Government and Consumer Services in the last government, will now be the assistant to the Solicitor General. MPP Christine Hogarth will also be parliamentary assistant to the Solicitor

The government faced criticism for appointing 18 more MPPs to extra duties. There are also nine

more cabinet ministers in this term than at the beginning of the term in 2018. Both of those positions come with an additional salary. The base salary for MPPs is \$116,500, while parliamentary assistants earn an extra \$16,600 and cabinet ministers earn \$165,850.

With the appointments 88 per cent of the Conservatives now hold titles which entitle them to a wage increase.

Peter Tabuns, interim leader of the Ontario NDP says it's "shocking" the premier "is inviting MPPs to climb aboard his gravy train two at a time — doubling up on parliamentary assistants on several portfolios and giving dozens of Conservatives a big pay bump when ... Everyday Ontarians are getting crushed by the rising cost of living.

PW says okay to concert in the park

Badfest is coming to Lakeshore Community Park and at least one Plympton-Wyoming councillor has some concerns.

Brent Blais, Kraig Durco, Matt Tourigny and Josiah Tobey are the rock group Bad Men Association. Last year, they hosted Badfest in a backyard in Camlachie raising some money for Huron House Boys Home.

But the group wanted to do something bigger this year. They've planned a seven-hour, six band edition – complete with vendors and a beer garden - with the hopes of drawing 1,000 people to hear six acts.

But they needed permission of town council first.

Some councillors, like Gary Atkinson, at the Camlachie Community Center

were concerned about the large number of people expected to the community park. "If they have 1,000 people they're looking at probably 500 cars ... one of my concerns is where the parking would be," he said during the discussion June 29.

Mayor Lonny Napper said in the past these types of concerts "ended up in a nightmare" with people jumping security fences and bothering the neighbours.

Deputy Mayor Muriel Wright expects there will be some complaints, as does Councillor Bob Woolvett.

'This is a residential area out there and we don't really have any guidelines on our part for this kind of a discussion whether you can have parties that are whatever alcohol," he says.

"These are residential neighborhoods

we would know what goes on there and that it is designated, but this is a community public park ... I'm not so sure it will go over very well."

CAO Carolyn Tripp has been speaking with the band and says they are well organized with insurance secured and a plan to set up the park including more washrooms and fencing. Tripp says "they're being conscious of the noise concerns with the neighbours," adding they'll stop the music at 11 pm as the bylaw states.

Council gave staff the green light to continue working with the Bad Men Association on the concert with Councillor Mike Vasey suggesting they spend more money on security.

"I'd like to see some kind of security bond put up for damage and for cleanup the next day," he says.






