#### Petrolia says townhouses okay, development moves forward

A townhouse development in Petrolia is one step closer to reality, despite the concerns of the neighbours. And there will be more housing units than originally

Peter Bakker of Bakker Design and Build based in Watford originally asked for 66 large townhouses on a 10-acre plot in a field in the area of Third, Fourth and Kentail Streets. But neighbours in the single family neighbourhood voiced concerns about the poor drainage in the area and a "wall of townhouses" in their backyard. Council turned down the original proposal in June.

Bakker, who has owned the property

for three-and-half years, understands the neighbours concerns. He has been working with the town as it tries to deal with the water problems in the area. The town has begun the process of improving the streets in the area this summer after a consultant created a stormwater management plan. "We've helped out with that design process, to try to incorporate everything.

July 7, the town held a zoning hearing where residents were surprised by a statement from the mayor and clerk instructing them they were not able to talk about drainage issues during the hearing, but could ask questions about the new plan

It includes 17 townhouses with 76 units, eight semi-detached dwellings and two

single family homes.

Allison Mevis – one of the residents concerned about the development - voiced concern they weren't able to speak about the concerns about water in the area, since that is one of the main issues. Mevis also pointed out that while the community is considered low density now, with the revised plan the development would be considered medium

Mevis pleaded with council to delay the decision. "I know this is going to pass...we just want information first," she said.

Resident Cristie Archibald was also concerned councillors didn't want to talk about the historic drainage issues in the

## Lambton politicians question rising OPP costs

Lambton municipalities are facing extra policing costs after the OPP ran a deficit of over \$86,000 in 2021.

And another \$126,000 deficit is expected

And it has some politicians balking. Over the past few months, the Lambton Group Police Services Board has been talking about the shortfalls it faces – first the cost of renting the St. Clair office for the OPP and later for COVID-19 cleaning

Two municipalities forwarded COVID-19 funding provided by the federal and provincial government to help with the costs. But municipalities are now receiving a second letter from the police board saying the cash didn't eliminate the deficit and they'll be on the hook for more money.

Murray Jackson, the chair of the local police board, in a letter to municipalities, says over the years, the board has found ways to fund not only the Corunna detachment through grants but has been able to buy extra equipment. "Historically, we have, when possible, provided surplus back to our member municipalities."

Jackson says between 2017 and 2021 municipalities shared between \$32,000 and \$45,000 which was returned to them from the OPP.

But he says there are fewer grants available to pay for the added office space and revenue sources – like police checks for people working with vulnerable people also slowed to a crawl during the pandemic cutting revenue from about \$70,000 to about \$12,000 in 2021.

Jackson says the Corunna office is important for the OPPs operations.

The Corunna detachment office, Jackson says, ensures people in all parts of the county get service within 20 minutes and helps ease pressure on the Petrolia detachment. Seventeen officers work out of the Corunna office; Jackson says if the board closed the office, there would be no room for them in Petrolia.

Jackson issued an invitation to the municipalities to talk about the issues in the hopes of putting together a joint pitch to try to find extra funding with the help of Sarnia-Lambton MPP Bob Bailey - who is now the parliamentary assistant to the Solicitor General.

Warwick Township councillors want more information before they sit down to talk. And Councillor Wayne Morris isn't ready to open the municipal coffers either.

"I don't think we should pay anymore - first of all, there are only two townships that paid (the initial request for COVID-19 funding); I'd like to see other townships get theirs in before we give any more money. And I want some justification.'

Warwick Treasurer Trevor Jarrett agreed saying the letter comes "without proper justification, other than here it (the deficit) is. Supporting documentation would be appreciated, at least from my standpoint."

Warwick is asking the OPP for more information about where the deficit comes from before the meeting.

Petrolia councillors won't join the meeting at all, even though Mayor Brad Loosley acknowledged "I think there's some good discussions that need to take place with police service...as we have a contract already. And yes, we're going to end up picking up that cost, whether we contribute (voluntarily) or not."

The municipality is expected to pay \$15,238 more because of the policing deficit.

They basically are asking for more money again," said Councillor Ross O'Hara. "Is it just going to increase, increase, increase? I have a problem with it."

Councillor Grant Purdy questioned whether the OPP could apply for grants. Jackson, in his letter, said the OPP was not eligible for the pandemic grants municipalities received.

Councillor Marty Souch said the town has to set and follow a budget and so should the OPP. Souch says the funding request the town received from the OPP "is what we based our budget on and that's what we go on.'

However, as Jackson pointed out, provincial legislation says without any additional provincial funding, municipalities will be forced to pay the bill.

It's not clear when the meeting will be held and if other Central Lambton municipalities will agree to attend.

Archibald says the town "keeps shutting down the drainage conversation" saying its not part of the rezoning for the development even though "this conversation is not a new conversation; it's a very old conversation."

Archibald says this developer would be allowed "to build new homes on top of the field, that still drains into the backyards."

Both Bakker and town officials have said before any construction began the drainage problems would have to be solved.

Bakker adds both the town

and government bodies like the Ministry of the Environment and the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority have to be satisfied there was a plan to deal with the water on the site.

Councillors, before approving the zoning which will move the development ahead, assured residents they "had been heard."

Clerk Mandi Pearson added there will be another public meeting in the future after the developer submits a plan of subdivision.

Bakker hoped to move the project forward this summer. The original plan was valued at about \$33 million.

#### Petrolia man faces dozens of charges

A Petrolia man is facing over 30 charges after an incident in March.

Lambton OPP are just releasing information about an incident in St Clair Township which was the subject of an investigation by the Special Investigations Unit. Once the SIU invokes its mandate, details of what happened cannot be released until the investigation is complete. Four officers involved in the arrest, where the suspect's nose was broken, were cleared by the SIU which said they'd use reasonable force to try to arrest the man trying as he tried to drive off.

OPP said on March 1 around 8:10 am, the OPP found a stolen vehicle and trailer on Courtright Line in St. Clair Township. Someone was seen near the pickup and tried to flee when officers arrived. The man was taken into custody after resisting arrest.

OPP investigated multiple thefts and break-andenters throughout Lambton and were able to link them together. The value of property that has been recovered and returned to the owners is more than

Cody Price, 32, of Petrolia, is facing 31 charges including 13 counts of possession of stolen property obtained by crime, six counts of break and enter, flight from a peace officer and resisting arrest.

Nomination forms and full particulars of the nomination process can be obtained from the office of the Clerk in which nomination papers must be filed.

Where more certified candidates are nominated for an office than the number required to fill the office, an election will be held.

If, by 2:00 p.m. on Friday, August 19th, 2022, the number of certified candidates nominated for an office does not exceed the number of vacancies, those nominated will be acclaimed to office. Additional nominations for any remaining vacancies will be accepted on Wednesday, August 24th, 2022, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.

#### Less wheat, higher prices

Lambton County's wheat fields are not likely to bring in record yields, but high prices for the grain could be a saving grace for local

That's according to Kevin Marriott of the Grain Farmers of Ontario.

Many Central Lambton farmers are chomping at the bit to get into the fields, but Marriott says many need to wait just a bit longer.

"It looks ready but it is not ready," said Marriott as he is waiting for the wheat to fully mature before taking it off his Shiloh Line fields.

"Essex County is just taking their winter wheat off now," he told The Independent on July 5. "Usually farmers can count on being 10 days later than Essex." This would peg the start of the

harvest at July 15. Most wheat harvests begin in mid July.

There was one exception to that a few years ago when it was extremely dry and the harvest started between July 6 and 8.

While the weather is good now, the winter weather has played havoc with some of the wheat. Marriott says only 60 per cent of the usual acreage survived the wet fall and winter.

Lambton had the third highest wheat production in the province behind Middlesex and Huron Counties. Almost 94,000 acres were harvested with 92.4 bushels per acre yield.

"Even in the wheat that is left, it might not be 100 percent," he said. "The quality of the wheat we won't know until we get the combine out."

The upside is prices are strong. Wheat prices have seen historic highs at \$13 a bushel, but have

recently taken a tumble to \$9 a bushel. The high prices might have farmers choosing to harvest wheat that they might otherwise leave in the field any other year,

said Marriott.

The high price is a result of what is happening overseas with the war in the Ukraine, he added. Ukraine is one of the world leaders in the production of wheat and is having a hard time getting its crop from last year to market amid the invasion by the Russians.

## Council races taking shape Weather Wright with incumbent mayor Dave Ferguson

The municipal election races are heating up with incumbents and would-be municipal politicians across Central Lambton are giving notice they're ready to run for office.

In Petrolia, current councillors Joel Field and Don Welten, submitted their papers to run for another term. Ross O'Hara, and Liz Welsh are also

Brad Loosley and Richard Poore are in the running for mayor in Petrolia.

There are also some candidates for councillor in Brooke-Alvinston. Incumbent Frank Nemcek has filed to run for another term on council. And two people who were on the ballot before, Les Douglas and Vanessa Beniot have also filed their papers. The municipality will also have a mayor's race

taking on incumbent councillor Jamie Armstrong.

In St. Clair Township, the race is getting crowded in Ward One. Five people are seeking one of the two seats; Charles Mortley-Wood, Cathy Langis, incumbent Pat Brown, Holly Foster, and Bill Moran. Only Bill Myers, has filed papers to run in Ward Two - the former Sombra Township.

In Enniskillen, Judy Krall and Chad Burke are seeking re-election so far.

There is also a candidate for council in Dawn-Euphemia. Paul LeBoeuf, who served in the 2014 council before moving north, has filed to run this year.

In Oil Springs, incumbent Ian Veen is the only person running so far. He's filed to become mayor for another

There were no new nominations in Plympton Wyoming.

#### Farm equipment dealer gets okay for expansion

Nauvoo Road in Alvinston is a construction zone - but it's not the street under construction. Brooke-Alvinston council recently approved an application from Kucera Farm Equipment which will see two new buildings erected along the busy corridor this summer according to Administrator Janet Denkers.

A 3,200 square foot building will be erected

south of Railroad Line. It will house a wash bay for the equipment dealer to clean its own products.

The company is also building a 17,500 square foot warehouse north of the current building at the same time.

A parking lot for 38 vehicles is also part of the project.

Denkers says construction began on the project once council gave its approval.

#### Roundabout and paving underway in Central Lambton

Lambton's construction season is well underway with a couple of major road projects getting

Construction starts Monday on Lambton's second round about. Lambton County Council agreed to spend \$3.3 million to turn the corner of Nauvoo and Egremont Roads into a roundabout. It was originally expected to cost \$2 million.

Pre-construction work began Monday with the

road detours beginning July 18. and is expected to last until October.

Drivers will also find traffic slow on Oil Heritage Road in both Plympton-Wyoming and Enniskillen. The county is repaving the stretches between Lakeshore Road and Aberarder Line and from Wyoming to Discovery Line in Petrolia. Traffic will be moving through the area although it will be slow.

The projects cost about \$2.6 million and complete the repaying of Oil Heritage Road.

## Editorial

#### The OPP will get their cash

You can't really blame Lambton County politicians for their frustration of being asked for more cash from the OPP. No one wants to pay more after being given a price for a product.

But the discussion over budgets at the OPP is either a bit of political theater or shows a lack of knowledge about police funding. Or maybe it is both.

Over the past few months, the OPP's board - the Lambton Group Police Services Board - has been grappling with a deficit - about \$86,000 in 2021 and another \$126,000 expected for this year.

The money problems first came to light when there was a dispute about who should pay the cost of the Corunna OPP office. Until this year, the OPP was able to find grants to pay for the additional space. Those grants dried up. Municipalities were asked to contribute to the rent. Most said no.

Then the OPP came to the municipalities asking for money to help cover pandemic costs. It seems the provincial government didn't think the first responders - who were on the front lines of the pandemic - didn't need extra cash for things like cleaning. Each Lambton municipality was asked to send along \$5,000 from their pandemic cash - only two did.

That left the OPP with a big deficit, one they expect the municipalities to pay off.

Both Warwick and Petrolia councillors expressed concern about the prospect of paying more. Warwick wanted to see the actual numbers and reasons for the deficit before giving a reply. Petrolia won't even meet with the OPP saying they should be following their budget, just as the town does. That's not exactly the way things work with the OPP.

In this province, municipalities cannot refuse funding to the OPP or any police department.

Other municipalities have tried to force departments to trim budgets - fought them on increasing budgets to the highest level - only to have a provincial arbitrator tell them to shell out the cash.

Lambton is fighting a losing battle. The OPP will get their cash, whether they protest or not.

Maybe their best bet to at least reduce the amount we will all have to pay is to work with the OPP to find cost-cutting solutions.

## Ron Plain made a profound impression on me

I can't recall how I met Ron Plain and I'm not sure I could recount any of our conversations either. But I know he made a profound impression on me.

Plain was a force of nature, a man determined to make sure his community stood up to the colonial powers which had relegated his people to the lands we now call the Aamjiwnaang First Nation.

Plain and his environmental buddy, Ada Lockridge, worked with Eco-Justice, suing Suncor in to get the Ontario government to recognize the mix of emissions coming from the plants along the St. Clair River were having disastrous health effects on his community. Eventually, the province listened and changed the regulations. Plain was also one of the drivers

behind the Idle No More movement in Sarnia, organizing the blockade of products coming out of the chemical plants and bringing national attention to a bill which would weakening Indigenous sovereignty. For many people, Idle No More awakened them to the injustices our neighbours

Ron Plain did that for me. We would occasionally meet for coffee and I'd listen and ask questions in an effort to understand what his community's history. He was angry about the way the lands along the St. Clair were taken from his people. He was angry about the epidemic of cancer in his community caused by emissions.

And of course he had a right to be

But as angry as these things made him, he was still willing to sit down and explain what my history classes never even touched on. His words helped me understand the depth of our Canadian tragedy. And it made he made me want to do better as a Canadian, to help right the wrongs of our history.

#### Southside moves ahead on 61 home Courtright project

Courtright is about to experience a building boom.

Southside Construction's is ready to turn the sod on Courtright Landing. It is a plan to build 61 homes on vacant land bounded by Sixth, Main, and Eighth Streets and Emily Ave.

Originally, Southside Construction hoped to build the homes and include granny suites on the property. The company billed it as a way to provide more affordable housing.

In October 2021, township council disagreed saying standalone secondary housing is not legal in St. Clair Township.

The company resubmitted plans for 61 homes, this time without the granny suites. Township council approved

the plan with little comment Monday and will sign a plan of subdivision agreement.

It's expected the infrastructure work - building roads, stormwater systems, sewers and street lighting - will cost Southside about \$1.8 million. It also faces \$105,349 in municipal fees - including for planning and engineering services - to be paid to the township.

As building permits are issued,

Southside will also pay \$6,583 in development charges per home - a total of \$401,563 for the project.

Southside has also agreed to build a 1.8 meter fence along shared property lines of homes around the development on Emily Ave and Main Street.

Dozens of neighbours submitted letters of complaint about the development when Southside proposed the granny suite.

## NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF AN UPDATE TO THE COMPREHENSIVE ZONING BY-LAW FOR THE TOWN OF PETROLIA

**TAKE NOTICE**, that the Council of the Town of Petrolia passed By-law No. 36 of 2022 on the 11th day of July, 2022

**THE PURPOSE AND EFFECT** of this By-law is to amend By-law 63 of 2017 as it applies to part of a property described as West Part Lot 15, Concession 10. The subject property is generally located east of Fourth Street and south of Third Street. The intent of the proposed amendment is to rezone the larger part of the property shown in the following Key Map from "Residential - 1 with a holding provision (R1-h)" to a site-specific "Residential - 3 (R3)" zone with a holding provision. The proposed amendment would allow most of the property to be rezoned to be used for townhouse dwellings. Four (4) semi-detached dwellings are also proposed.

The amendment would also rezone the smaller part of the property shown in the following Key Map from "Residential - 1 with a holding provision (R1-h)" to "Residential – 1(4) (R1-4)". The proposed amendment would allow two lots in a proposed plan of subdivision to have a minimum frontage of 12 metres.

The Council of the Town of Petrolia has adopted this By-law and is now circulating it in accordance with Provincial Regulations.

**APPEALS** to the Ontario Land Tribunal in respect of the By-law may be made by filing with the Clerk of the Town of Petrolia a written notice of appeal, **not later than the 2nd day of August, 2022**, setting out the reasons for the appeal and accompanied by the Ontario Land Tribunal fee made payable to the Minister of Finance.

**IF A PERSON** or public body did not make oral or written submissions to the Town of Petrolia before the by-law was passed; the person or public body is **not entitled to appeal** the By-law to the Ontario Land Tribunal. **Only individuals**, corporations and public bodies may appeal a by-law to the Ontario Land Tribunal. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

**No person** or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to Town of Petrolia Council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Land Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.



That's about to change after Enniskillen received a Trillium grant to build new washrooms.

The plans include building a cement block washroom next to the existing pavilion at Marthaville Park.

Enniskillen received \$218,800 from the Trillium Foundation to build new washroom

When the project was put out to tender, there was only one bid. Agri Urban Building in Dresden, but it was enough.

Agri Urban Building submitted a bid of \$208,100 when the harmonized sales tax is

The Trillium Foundation had set aside \$188,800 for construction with \$20,000 for design and engineering and \$10,000 for

Both the signage and the design spending came in under budget with only \$500 needed for signage and \$6,000 being spent on engineering with \$4,000 set aside for construction inspection.



The Trillium Foundation allowed them to move the unused funding to construction, which allowed them to cover the Agri Urban Building construction bid with \$200 to spare in contingency.

Township Clerk Duncan McTavish was not surprised more bids did not come in as the tender requested that the bidder be bonded. Contractors are also hard to come by though the pandemic.

Councillor Mary Lynne McCallum heard it was an issue of timing as some of the potential bidders were waiting for subcontractors to give them pricing.

It is anticipated construction will begin in September and be completed by the end of

#### Mobile home on the move



A St. Clair Township man has until August to remove a mobile home from his property.

Brian Beaudoin wanted to attach the mobile home to a garage on the St. Clair Parkway property south of Courtright Line and make it a legal second dwelling. Monday, he came to council to ask for permission to keep the mobile home and attach it to the garage with a carport.

Beaudoin had been working with planning staff for six months. But just 10 days before the delivery of the mobile home, staff told him it didn't meet the township's standards. Any secondary dwellings have to be either in a basement, garage or as an addition to an existing home, says Planner Ian MacDougall.

Despite the ruling, Beaudoin's trailer

was delivered to his home since he'd already paid the \$10,000 for transport.

Neighbours were surprised by the move. Deborah Brander says she and her husband, Ron, watched as the unit was placed near the garage May 12. They filed a complaint with the township six days later.

Brander opposed the idea asking council to "enforce the bylaw instead of reinforcing a single homeowner

who chose to privilege their own desires over everyone else and put their own rules in place."

Councillors unanimously backed up MacDougall's original decision denying the request. Councillor Tracy Kingston said the mobile home "just does not fit" the township's guidelines for second dwellings.

Beaudoin has until Aug. 1 to remove the unit.

## Dog-Gone

#### Long-time dog catcher retires after 30 years

It began 30 years ago and it comes to an end today. Vicki Kyle, a woman who has provided animal control for a number of jurisdictions, is calling it a career.

Kyle started helping her father with his animal control contracts he held with various municipalities decades ago. She took on this work permanently when he passed away.

She's been the person on call for animal control for 10 different municipalities, including Enniskillen, Warwick and Petrolia and parts of Chatham-Kent, Elgin and Middlesex counties.

"It was a wonderful job," Kyle said, saying it wasn't necessarily difficult but it did take a lot of her time since she was always on call.

"I think I spoiled them," she said of the municipalities who came to rely on her services.

While many people would know Kyle from her work catching loose dogs or enforcing local bylaws, she also re-homes dogs through the Glencoe Animal Shelter.

The animal shelter in Glencoe is currently up for sale. Kyle plans to travel while also "do nothing for

awhile."

She has a daughter living in the United States who she looks forward to visiting.

Kyle doesn't believe she will be idle for long, calling the next stage in her life "retirement for now."

"It is going to be fun," Kyle said.

Meantime, Lambton municipalities are working together to find a new animal control officer. Enniskillen will use a local dog kennel and its staff to provide animal control for six months until a permanent solution can be found.

Jeff Dewhirst was appointed as the animal control officer at the July 4 meeting, while the Sarnia Humane Society will provide shelter services. Dewhirst already runs an animal control business in Brigden.

The municipalities in Lambton are now waiting for Adelaide-Metcalfe to strike a deal for animal control services. In the past, they've simply arranged their own contract with the dog catcher.

Enniskillen will have until November to have discussions with anyone who shows interest in the request for proposals.

The township expects it will cost about \$1,000 this year.

If there are any violations of the animal control bylaws, McTavish says Lambton County bylaw enforcement officers handle them. However that rarely
