Farm-flation as costs double

If inflation is making a dent in your spending power, consider Lambton County's farmers.

They're finding the cost of their most basic inputs have doubled from last year.

"The cost of everything has increased," said local dairy farmer Kevin Forbes, who owns and operate Forbesvue Farms with his wife Melissa on Waterworks Road in Lambton County. His biggest increases in expenses have been fuel, feed, and fertilizer as inflation has hit his operation where he has a herd of 200 cows which produces 7,000 litres of milk a day.

The cost of fuel has taken a huge jump. In the first seven months of 2021, he spent \$25,000 in fuel; that cost has jumped to \$49,000 over the same time period in 2022.

Another huge increase has been fertilizer, which has jumped from \$585 a tonne last year to \$1,075 a tonne now. Forbes said this is not only due to inflation but tariffs put on Russia due to the war in the Ukraine.

The tarriff, he says, "didn't hurt Russia.

It hurt the consumer instead." The United States are pulling off these tariffs, something which Canada has failed to do as of yet, says Forbes.

The price of feed for his cows is also rising. Canola meal is added to a dairy cow's diet to provide protein. Last year it was at \$514 a tonne, and has increased to \$617 a tonne. He feeds his herd of 200 head, a half a tonne a day.

Forbes says he can find some ways to save by managing the amount he uses for fertilizer. But reducing his fertilizer in trying to save on costs, can mean lower yields and less crop to sell.

While inflation has affected his expenses, crop prices have also climbed. Forbes says the soybean crop shows promise, but it needs some rain. The area has seen a lack of rain so far this summer leaving much of the area with drought-like conditions.

Many dairy operations try to grow as much feed as it can for its herd. If the yields are lower this season, there will be an increase in cost to fill the gap, he said.

'They're just struggling'

The problems of the people coming through the doors of the Petrolia Food Bank are sadly familiar.

One woman quit her part-time job because most of her pay cheque was going to pay for the gas to get there.

Seniors who once gave cash and food to the Petrolia charity, are now turning to the charity for help because their pensions are shrinking.

Another family which had broken the cycle of poverty 10 years earlier had to walk through the doors again.

The manager of the Petrolia Food Bank says says in a time of rising inflation, the working poor and the elderly are increasingly using the pantry for help.

Before the pandemic, there would be about 20 to 25 families come to the door Monday morning for help. "Now we're seeing anywhere from 20 and one week we had 47 families come through on the Monday," Sandra Hartman says.

Inflation in Canada hit 8.1 per cent in June - the highest rate in decades. Most people notice the price increases at the pumps and in the grocery store. Hartman says for the working poor, that increase is enough to throw all their finances out of whack. Hartman says there is a "trickling effect" to each increase.

"It is just - they're struggling; they're all struggling."

And the first thing people who are struggling do to save some cash is cut their food budget because, Hartman says, they know they can get help at the food bank.

"They can't afford produce is the main thing," she says. "They expressed to me that it's easier for them to eat unhealthy foods. It's cheaper to buy unhealthy foods than it is to have your milk and your produce and your meats."

And in the last few months, Hartman and her volunteers have been trying to find ways to help the people who are now homeless in Petrolia.

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Food bank use just one part of problem

Hartman says about six clients are either living rough outside or in their car. There are more that are couch surfing - moving from home to home to find a place to rest.

"If there's somebody that's living in their car, we can't really give them foods that they really need to cook like rice. We don't give them frozen stuff. We just try to adapt it as best as we can," she says.

Valerie Colassanti knows how hard it is to find help for people without a home. She's the general manager of social services in Lambton County and during the pandemic had to deal with huge increases in the number of people without a home.

People who had been living with friends were forced out on their own as people isolated to stop the spread of CÔVID-19. At one point 250 people in Lambton needed emergency housing.

While Colassanti says many people have found a home, there are still just under 100 people in the county without a permanent place to live. "People can't afford to have someone stay with them now," she says. And it is very costly to go it alone. If the person is receiving social assistance, they're getting just \$733 a month to live on. That barely will cover half of the cost of the average rent in Lambton.

"With the rent increases and all food inflation, there is just no money left."

So, Colassanti says, many people with Ontario Works are left to search for food. "People are spending all of their time going from food bank to food bank, from soup kitchen to the next place, ... they spent all of their time trying to get their basic needs. So even if someone's looking for work, they also have to make sure they're finding food to feed their family."

Even the most careful budgeter can't get around increasing food costs, Colassanti adds.

"They're already buying those, you know, those products, the cheapest product they can. So now what do they do when those go up, there's nowhere for them to go other than the food bank."

The struggle to find food or substituting cheap food for produce will lead to more problems down the

"If they're not eating properly, then of course, their health starts to deteriorate. And again, if you're struggling all the time, and you're constantly worried about how to feed your family, how to pay your bills, then you also can start to have mental health crisis. So that is on top of the housing insecurity, and it's very troubling.

Colassanti says the most efficient way to help people who are struggling is to increase the amount of money people can receive from Ontario Works.

There hasn't been an increase since 2016 when the provincial Liberal government upped it by 1.5 per cent. Inflation since that time has increased 18.25 per cent.

During the provincial election in June, there was some push to have the rates paid through the Ontario Disability Support Plan increased. The Conservatives - who were re-elected pledged to increase the \$1,116 monthly rate by 10 per cent.

There was never any discussion about increasing the rates paid by Ontario Works.

Colassanti says between the rising prices, the lack of affordable housing and the mental health issues facing people with lower incomes, there are no quick or easy answers to improving life for those with the least.

"There just isn't the affordable housing and it takes time to build affordable housing," says Colassanti. "It takes dollars from all levels of government to build affordable housing. And it's not just affordable housing, we need affordable housing supports. Some people need support to assist them, particularly those struggling with mental health issues or addiction issues.

"So we'll need dollars from everywhere. It's going to take time." And if government's don't act quickly, Colassanti says the crisis is only going to deepen.

"If we continue to see inflation increasing and the rates don't increase, I think we will have more people living rough."

Hartman agrees adding she's expecting to see more working poor walking through the doors. They're just everyday people... They're somebody that works in our community that we probably have all seen at their job."

And she calls that heartbreaking.

Farm inflation soars with fuel, fertilizer rising

All those increases mean there is less cash to spend on things like tractors and new farm pickups. And when Lambton County's agriculture industry turns out over \$582.72 Million in total sales - a number estimated by the Lambton Federation of Agriculture in 2016, decreased spending has spinoffs in the community.

Even if there is a little cash left to spend, like everyone else, farmers are facing supply issues. In Forbes' case, he ordered fans for his barns. They were suppose to be to him by last May but he has just got them installed. The fans help keep the cows cool and comfortable and will affect his overall milk production.

Most tractor dealers have not seen a new 2022 piece of equipment on

their lots. New tractors next year are expected to go up by \$40,000 next

The increase in interest rates will also have an effect on some farmers, said Forbes, as the dairy farming is capital heavy and many farmers need to carry debt to finance their operations

And while the economics of farming are difficult, Forbes says farmers are resilient.

"We will continue to produce a high quality product," said Forbes. Many of the larger operators are a little more progressive, as they look to ways to be more efficient.

He added if this keeps up, there could be some farmers who choose to exit the industry.

"There is a high level of stress in dairy farming," he said.

Condemning our neighbours to poverty

We are relatively fortunate in Petrolia and Central Lambton; while we are all feeling the affects of inflation in our everyday lives, we are still managing for the most part. But there is a significant and growing portion of our population which is not managing and we should all be concerned.

As you have read, people in our communities who make the least money are struggling significantly. Consider someone making minimum wage - even at 40 hours a week, they're taking home just under \$1,800 a month. If they're new to the rental market, they're likely to spend two thirds of that income on a place to live. With \$600 left to spend for the month, they have to deal with the rising cost of gas - if they're lucky enough to own a car - utilities and of course, the rising price of food.

If you need your car for work, you pay that bill first. You also need power and water to live, so those bills are next. You can easily see how someone making minimum wage is going to run out of money in a hurry. And when they do, the stop buying food. That's why the local food bank is seeing an increase in the number of people who have jobs coming to their doors for help. It's also why both the food bank and the new Petrolia Refrigerator are available for support. So many people need help.

And that's just the working poor. Now consider those who are using Ontario Works or the Ontario Disability Support Plan - they get \$733 and \$1,116 respectively to live on a month. If they get a job to try to make life better, the government reclaims their cash right off the top even though they face a host of new costs to have

The amount we provide to people on social assistance hasn't changed since 2016. The rate of inflation has increase 18.25 per cent since then.

It is beyond time for our province to provide meaningful help and increase what it provides to those who have no other place to turn. To do otherwise is to condemn our neighbours to a life of poverty.

As citizens, we should be telling politicians they must act now. It shouldn't have to happen to you for it to matter to you.



It seems would-be municipal politicians are taking their summer break - with just over two weeks left to register to be a municipal council candidate, few have filed papers for the jobs in Petrolia and Central Lambton.

Warwick Township, two more people have joined the race for councillor -John Cowenberg who was defeated in the last municipal election in his bid to be the mayor - and Sharon Plunkett. She's a newcomer to municipal politics.

In Brooke-Alvinston, Jeannette Douglas has filed her papers to be a councillor for a third term.

There have been no additional candidates in Petrolia, Enniskillen - where only incumbent councillors have filed to run for office - Plympton-Wyoming and St. Clair Township in the past week.

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Feds confirm cash for tourism and rec projects

Visitors to Victoria Playhouse Petrolia will soon find 100 inch screens near the stage.

It's part of a \$116,825 grant from the federal government announced Wednesday.

Peter Fragiskatos, parliamentary secretary to the Minister of Natural Resources, was in Petrolia to make the formal announcement for Canada Community Revitalization and Tourism Relief Fund grants which were formalized earlier this spring.

In Petrolia, the VPP received \$116,000 for two projects says Laurissa Ellsworth, director of marketing, arts and communications for the town. One project will see 100 inch screens mounted beside the stage. They'll show announcements and sponsors before the show and Ellsworth says the screens may also

enhance plays in the future.

The grant will also extend the run of the final program of the season – When Irish Eyes are Smiling which is scheduled to run until Oct. 9.

Fragiskatos also confirmed a \$699,000 which will be used to enhance the Petrolia Y. That project – which has yet to be presented publicly nor approved by council – will cost about \$932,000 in total.

The federal government had placed a very short timeline on the expenditure of the money, however Dave Menzies, director of facilities and community services, says there is some discussion about giving municipalities more time to complete the projects because of supply chain issues which are slowing construction projects across the country.

The Kineto Theatre will receive about \$48,000 to complete the facade renovation of the Forest Theatre and Lambton Shores receives \$123,700 to

Firefighters will be out looking for smoke alarms

Time is of the essence when a fire breaks out. A working smoke detector gives a person the precious time needed to escape.

That is from Petrolia/North Enniskillen Fire Chief Jay Arns.

The department will be conducting a door-to-door campaign until the end of August to visit with residents and provide public education.

"Education is key," said Arns, adding there is a disturbing trend of fire fatalities recently in Ontario. Officials said in May there had been 27 people die in fires in the home in Ontario in 2022

The Ontario Fire Marshall's Office reports most fatal fires occur at night when people are asleep.

The department began its campaign last week and the goal is to visit 250 to 400 homes.

Arns expects that number will be exceeded this year.

Public education is an ongoing activity throughout the year. Whenever the department is in a home, firefighters always check to see whether a smoke detector is in working order.

Every home must have a working smoke alarm by law on every floor and outside all sleeping areas.

A CO alarm is required in every home built after 2001 or if there is a gas fired appliance.

There has been a lot of advancement in smoke detectors in recent years, said Arns. A wired fire detectors will set off all detectors in the home, making sure all of those in the home are alerted

fast. There are some detectors, which use Wi-Fi with an alert being sent to your cell phone.

All smoke detectors should be checked monthly to make sure they are in working order. A good rule of thumb is to replace batteries in the spring and the fall when the time change is being

The units should be completely replaced after 10 years.

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A Place for Healing

A Dawn-Euphemia family is pouring their love and faith into a cabin in the woods after the death of a beloved son, brother and husband

Three Oaks Cabin to be a haven

Diane and Al Bergsma's life changed forever November 23, 2020. But the Dawn-Euphemia couple say God is turning their pain into purpose to make a place of healing for farmers and first responders.

Dalles Bergsma died by suicide 21 months ago. No one knew the stress the farmer and first responder felt - he hid it all with humour and a smile. His death devastated the family and his brothers and sisters at the Dawn-Euphemia fire department.

But in the weeks and months that followed Dalles death, Al and Diane were moved to act. They and their children started planning for Three Oaks Cabin - a place in their woodlot where first responders and farmers could go to deal with the pressures they face.

While it took some time to get the approvals to use the woodlot, this spring, Dawn-Euphemia and the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority signed off on the project. A log cabin kit has been purchased and a website has been launched to talk about the vision the family has to help those under pressure.

Diane says farmers and firefighters will be able to use the cabin for free to reflect on what's going on so "to take time to digest the fact and acknowledge the fact that I'm not

in a good spot. I'm not doing my

of contact. One has specific training with farmers. "A counselor who is familiar with the struggles in farming is much more valuable for a farmer to speak to someone who understands the stressors being anxieties, the triggers. So we have several counselors who are very well versed in the farming community. We have some for the first responders who are very familiar and trained in assisting people in the first responder world; we would like to add one or two more."

Bergsma says the family is in the process of being registered as a charity. It's ordered

Bergsma says the family is in the process of being registered as a charity. It's ordered the log cabin materials and hopes to begin work in October. A lot of the labour will be done by volunteers, so the cabin may not be ready until next spring.

But she is looking forward to the good Three Oaks Cabin will do. "If one family member can live more with more resilience or more coping skills, then that has ripple effects in that family, which will have ripple effects and how those children grow up, which will have ripple effects in their future families...We'll never be able to measure the success of it, because we don't know what might have been with the people that we hope to help. But we will leave that in God's hands.

The cabin is already helping. Bergsma says the work is healing for the family. "I think God is giving us a lot of purpose and the pain and there is a sense of healing that our loss is not for loss - it's for other people's healing and then it makes our loss more bearable - it's still a loss, it will always be a loss - that makes it more bearable if we know that living without him here for now transpires into a place of refuge for other people who have opportunity for healthier living."
