Family overwhelmed with Petrolia's generosity after fire

Funeral home repairs likely to take months

A Petrolia family is feeling the love of the community after a fire destroyed their apartment at Needham Jay Funeral Home.

Laura Hodgins, her husband, Jason, and their two children, Peter, 7 and Indy, 16 months, fled their apartment after a fire broke out in the sunroom Aug. 10. Hodgins - who is the funeral director at the Petrolia Line facility - and her young family lost everything in the blaze.

While they tried to take in what had happened, people in Petrolia began offering help almost immediately. The Community Life Centre at New Life Assembly offered clothing and toys for the family. Strangers bought gift cards to help replace items which were lost. The owners of Petrolia Home Hardware - Lana and Jason Mullins - brought Dips Ice Cream to their parking lot for a fundraiser. And an online GoFundMe campaign was launched.

Tuesday, Hodgins was reflecting on the generosity of the people of her town.

"Over the past five days, we have experienced and abundance of unmitigated kindness and generosity from our beautiful Petrolia community. Perfect strangers approaching us to help in any way they can, fundraisers organized in the matter of hours by family and friends and local businesses...We're a pretty quiet, private family, and don't know many people in town, but that has changed drastically over the past five days. I'm so happy we lived here and we look forward to living here again as soon as possible," she said in a text.

Few new faces in Election 2022

Barring any late August surprises, it appears many communities in Central Lambton will see the same faces around the municipal council table.

With just days before the deadline to file papers to run in the Oct. 24 election, most municipalities have only a handful of new people running with the some communities barely able to get enough people to fill the chairs around the table.

As of Tuesday in Petrolia, two people - Brad Loosley and Richard Poore - are running to be mayor. Loosley is the incumbent, Poore is a newcomer to politics although he was an administrator with the town until his retirement.

All the current councillors are seeking re-election including Grant Purdy, who filed his nomination papers Tuesday. Former councillor Liz Welsh is also running. There is just one political newcomer nominated - Shalen Hunter.

Few new faces, some raises this election

In Plympton-Wyoming, it appears Netty McEwen will be acclaimed as deputy mayor. At press time, the long-time councillor and former administrator was the only person vying for the position.

There is a race for mayor with Deputy Mayor Muriel Wright and Councillor Gary Atkinson hoping to replace the retiring Lonny Napper.

But in the councillor's race, just four people had filed their papers for five spots on council by Tuesday.

In Enniskillen, the entire council have declared their candidacies, including Mayor Kevin Marriott. The cash crop farmer has has served on Enniskillen Township Council for the past 26 years, including seven years as deputy mayor and the last 11 years as Mayor. While he wants to continue serving the people of Enniskillen, Marriott also has his sites set on another run at the warden's chair.

"After talking to some county counselors, they're all like, 'well, you have to run again, because that's kind of been the standard in the past that, the warden goes for two terms. So I guess I felt some encouragement that way," he says.

It's likely Marriott will get the chance to represent Enniskillen at county council again since with three days left to file nomination papers, it appears the entire council will be acclaimed.

Four of five Oil Springs council members hope to be back on council - and its a pretty good shot they will be. Oil Springs acclaimed its council in 2018. So far, Ian Veen has filed papers to run for mayor again and incumbents Larry Wagner, Connie McFadden and Adam Veen have also re-upped.

There is one newcomer here as well, Jason Newport.

In Dawn-Euphemia, there are a lot of familiar faces as the clock ticks away on nominations. Al Broad is the sole nominee for the mayor's job. Current councillors Ann Gray, Jason Myer and Mark McGuire are also in the running. And a former councillor - Paul Leboeuf - has also tossed his hat into the ring.

East Lambton has a couple of interesting races with potential for new councillors and even a new mayor. In Brooke-Alvinston Incumbent Dave Ferguson faces a challenge from Incumbent Councillor Jamie Armstrong for the mayor's chair.

Frank Nemcek and Jeannette Douglas also plan to run again. But there are a number of newcomers hoping to win a seat including Les Douglas, former NDP Candidate Vanessa Benoit, Craig Sanders and Jenny Redick have all filed nomination papers.

There's also an election for mayor in Warwick where Incumbent Jackie Rombouts faces a challenge from former mayor Todd Case.

All the current members of council are looking to reclaim their seats, however there is also two newcomers and a former councillor in the fray - John Cowenburg has filed his papers as has Sharon Plunkett and Bill Davies.

In St. Clair, three people are hoping to fill the shoes left by the retiring Steve Arnold. Ward One - the former Moore Township - is a horse race with six people running for two positions. Just three people hope to fill the chairs of those in the former Sombra Township. And it appears Steve Miller will remain the deputy mayor.

Nominations close Friday at 2 pm.

Fire damages likely take months to repair

While the Hodgins' family tries to pick up the pieces, the Mailloux family is also working to restore their business.

The Petrolia funeral home is closed for now, with Needham-Jay working out of its Wyoming Chapel for the time being.

Stave Mailloux is confident the building.

Steve Mailloux is confident the building - including the apartment - can be restored.

"I have been through the entire building. The second floor is where most of the fire damage is, particularly in the kitchen and dining room. The main floor of funeral home has no fire damage, but has extensive water damage. All indications are the building is still sound and will be used again," he tells The Independent.

How long those repairs will take isn't yet

known. "as far as time line until reopening I do not yet, but is safe to say it will be measured in months."

While the restoration takes place, Mailloux says they'll continue providing services.

"We have moved our office into our Wyoming location for the time being, as well we have had very generous support of other local funeral homes, allowing us to use their facilities.

"The community's response on has been wonderfully supportive, I am feeling really blessed to be part of this community."

Petrolia/North Enniskillen Fire Chief Jay Arns says it appears the fire started in the sunroom although the department has listed the cause as undetermined. He estimates the damage at about \$400,000.

Bailey sees confidence in economy

Sarnia-Lambton MPP Bob Bailey says there is confidence again in the economy.

That from the local MPP as the Conservative government reopened the Ontario Legislature with Throne Speech Aug. 7.

And while Bailey believes there is confidence in the economy, there is a problem - nearly 370,000 jobs are unfilled. "Ontario is facing a generational labour shortage with the lowest rate of unemployment since 1989," said Ontario's Lieutenant Governor Elizabeth Dowdeswell, in a speech written by the government and delivered by the Queen's representative.

Bailey pointed to the partnerships with the unions - which the Progressive Conservative touted during the June election - as a way for the government to get people retrained to fill those jobs.

The labour shortage also includes a shortage of health care workers. Bailey pointed to the Bachelor of Science-Nursing program at Lambton College, which began in 2019 with collaboration with the University of Windsor, as a way to train more nurses locally. The Ontario government also has eliminated requirements for Canadian work experience which was a roadblock for internationally trained health care professionals trying to get accreditation. Bailey believes this will make it easier for health care professionals to come to Canada and get to work as soon as possible.

Bailey said there have been investments made to retool auto plants to be able to manufacture electric vehicles in Windsor and Brampton in future.

Last March Diageo announced plans to build a distillery in St. Clair Township to produce Crown Royal

whisky. The distillery is expected to employ 90 people.

To keep the economy moving, Bailey says "it is important to keep the international border open."

One of the other trouble spots in the Ontario economy is housing. The cost of homes have increased about 15 to 20 per cent in the last two years.

The speech from the throne reiterated an election promise to build 1.5 million units over 10 years.

"I am glad to see movement on housing," said Bailey.

After the Throne Speech was delivered, the Ford government reintroduced its pre-election budget. Critics called on Premier Doug Ford to change course and address the growing problems in the province's hospitals. Over the summer, large and small hospitals have closed departments and bumped surgeries because of staffing shortages made worse by burnout caused by the pandemic.

The Health Minister Sylvia Jones said she'd directed the College of Nurses to make every effort to register health care workers as quickly as possible.

She added the government has all options on the table - including some private options - to reduce wait times.

Included in the budget is a five percent increase to the Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP), something which was Bailey was pleased to see.

It is the first time ODSP has been increased since 2018 and it will amount to \$58 more a month. That brings the monthly allotment to just over \$1,200 - far less than the average rental cost in most communities.

However advocates and other politicians including the Green Party have called on the province to provide a living income for those on disability. The Greens promised during the election to raise disability rates by 50 per cent.

Barstool Sports calls Rough and Rowdy 18 "a night of boxing with non-stop haymakers, absolutely zero defence and no headgear." The full card will include 20 fights.

Things to keep in mind when visiting your local emergency department

Just like the temperatures this summer, you have likely heard that wait times and volumes in emergency departments (ED) across the province are also rising. Locally, we are seeing more patients daily, at both Sarnia and Petrolia EDs, than we've ever seen before. Daily average ED volumes have increased 41% in Sarnia since January 2022 and 71% in Petrolia over the same period of time. And while wait times are higher than usual and we're certainly feeling the crunch, Bluewater Health EDs and our staffing rates are faring well in comparison to our provincial partners. I'm happy to report that our ED staff schedules are covered into October 2022.

While this is certainly good news, we are still doing our best to cope with the higher than average daily volumes. Our emergency departments are NOT first-come first-served — we see those most critical cases first. In Petrolia, we only have one physician on at a time, and if we have a serious case, it could mean a longer wait for those less in need. We ask for resident's patience as we navigate the higher-than-normal volumes, and know that you will be seen.

Sometimes, it can mean less time waiting for the care you need if you consider all of your care options first. Always ask your primary care provider for minor issues. Most primary care providers in Petrolia and Central Lambton strive to provide same day/next day access. Don't have a primary care provider? Consider calling Health Connect Ontario at 811 (formerly Telehealth Ontario), or visit one of the walk-in clinics available throughout Lambton County.

The first sign of belt tightening

It may be the first sign of what many politicians have been expecting since the money taps turned on during the COVID-19 pandemic.

After hearing about a meeting between Lambton County officials and the Minister of Long Term Care, Paul Callandra, it seems the money spigot may be turning off.

Lambton County Warden Kevin Marriott and his team went to a municipal conference in Ottawa. Government ministers often meeting with scores of municipal leaders during the event. The local politicians come prepared to pitch their important projects. In Lambton, a big ticket item is long term care. Lambton's homes are aging and the county is planning to build a new Meadowview Villa.

That's going to cost big bucks - over \$50 million by some estimates.

So, as they have always done, municipal leaders met with the minister to explain the project so when the ask comes across his desk, he might remember why it was important to Lambton.

Marriott said the discussion with Callandra was frank and interesting, but there were no solution.

In short, when Lambton went looking for cash, Callandra said the province had committed lots of money to long term care and it wasn't ready to shell out more right now. In a time when the largest generation - the Baby Boomers - is heading into retirement, that's not very reassuring.

It's also a much different tone than what the province has used for the last two years as long term care struggled through the pandemic. During that time, the premier often repeated the province was building 30,000 new long term care beds.

And indeed, the province has announced lots of new homes to private providers usually in the Toronto area.

Perhaps the re-elected government is pulling back a bit, wanting to reign in some of the cash which was flowing during the pandemic. While we might need to tighten our belts, long term care, in our opinion, is not the place to do it.



Don't kid yourself, Ontario's health care system has problems

Our family recently got an up close view of life Lambton's hospitals and while there are lots of wonderful, caring and professional people who do there very best every day, it seems there are simply not enough of them.

Our story is probably a lot like yours. My husband, Barry, has been hobbling around for a while. Earlier this year, his doctor said he needed his hip replaced. He was scheduled for surgery

While we were on vacation we got the call. There would be no anaesthesiologist available that day. Staffing

Thankfully, Barry's surgeon could get him in Friday instead. A couple days early is far better than a couple months later, so we headed home, got a good night's sleep and arrived at Bluewater Health bright and early.

The health care staff we met along the way were wonderful; everyone answered our questions, treated Barry with care and respect and were very professional. But it was easy to see they were doing their best to get to each bedside as soon as they could but sometimes, that took a little while.

But what I found most unusual about the experience was how empty the hospital's surgical unit seemed to be. I hear from all kinds of people about how long they are waiting for surgery. And it seemed to me Bluewater Health could accommodate a lot of patients at a time. I counted 20 beds for people waiting for day surgery in the unit we were in.

But I only saw two other people waiting for surgery with us. I noticed a couple more as we headed to the surgical floor for Barry's recovery.

Even with what appeared to be a scaled back schedule, it seemed the staff on hand were run off their feet trying to get the job done.

And because of the staffing shortages, people you love may not be as lucky as Barry and have their surgery in a timely way.

There are no

quick or easy solutions to staff shortages. The Health Minister told reporters this week they're looking at everything - including privatization to solve the problem. That will only make things worse.

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Sympathy but no solution from LTC minister

It was a frank discussion with few easy answers.

That according to Lambton Warden Kevin Marriott who was part of a delegation meeting with the Minister of Long Term Care, Paul Callandra, at the Association of Municipalities of Ontario conference in Ottawa Tuesday.

Marriott and his team wanted to talk about some of the problems facing

Lambton as the population ages. Recently, county council approved moving forward with planning a replacement for Lambton Meadowview Villa in Petrolia. Last year, officials estimated it would cost about \$50 million.

Marriott met with the minister hoping to make him aware of the funding need in Lambton.

'We asked about the money that we need for rebuilding...and the government is saying they've got some other ones that have already been set to go

that they've got to finish first, before they can look at any other rebuilds or additions," says Marriott.

The minister freely admitted there was a staffing problem in long-term care, Marriott said, but instead of providing answers, he asked Lambton officials if they had solutions.

Marriott says the county has been having a difficult finding and retaining health care workers in the homes particularly in the last two years.

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Zion Line fix will have to wait another year

The cost of fixing Zion Line has ballooned another to nearly \$550,000.

Warwick Township had planned to repair the road last year. During the Freedom Convoy blockade of Highway 402, Zion Line became a detour route and the road was damaged further.

A project that was expected to cost \$269,000 increased about 60 per cent to \$429,000.

Council called for tenders for the work recently and received five bids.

The lowest was \$549,000 - another \$117,00 more than first expected.

Treasurer Trevor Jarrett in a report to council suggests rising costs and supply chain issues are the likely cause of this increase.

Council decided to defer the project until next year, hoping to get a better price by looking for one contractor to complete a number of projects.

Three percent cost of living increase in Warwick

Employees and municipal council members in Warwick Township are getting a three percent wage increase to cover the increasing cost of living.

In a report to council, CAO Amanda Gubbels says council approved the increase July 11 and it took effect Aug.

"Cost of living adjustments are one piece of a competitive wage structure in Warwick and are a valuable tool to ensure that the work completed as part of the 2020 wage study and the CUPE wage scale do not fall behind market rates.

"If COLA rates are not applied regularly, there is risk related to retention

of current employees and the ability of the Township to recruit new employees in the current challenging recruitment market," she said in the report.

The increase should not have an affect on the budget since the township set aside four per cent for a cost of living increase in the budget and there are a couple of staff vacancies which have saved about \$52,000.

Driver on three wheels damages 80k of roads

Heart Full of Cash wins provincial award

What started out as a pandemic project has lead to provincial recognition.

Lambton Centennial teacher Steve McGrail has been given the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario 2022 Children's Literature Award for his book A Heart Full of Cash.

McGrail wanted to write an inspiring kids book and decided there was no one more inspiring than his student Cash McKinnon. The 12 year-old has cerebral palsy but participates in as many sports as he can, most notably cross country events. The book tells the true-life events of Cash's hard work and determination to run at the annual cross country meet - a goal he reaches with the help of his coach.

"Unfortunately, we continue to live in a society where, every day, individuals face barriers that exist due to ongoing systemic discrimination," says ETFO President Karen Brown.

"Steve's heartwarming story teaches children about the obstacles some individuals face and demonstrates what it is to have the heart of a champion."

This is not the first time the book received accolades; Heart Full of Cash was also nominated for The IODE Jean Throop Book Award in the spring.

And, as the book about him receives an award, McKinnon is also being honoured.

The pilot of a private helicopter made an emergency landing in Grand Bend.

They all walked away

Nick McCaan likes to watch the helicopters take off from the old tennis courts at Oakwood Golf Resort next to his house.

But even the 11 year-old could see something was going drastically wrong Aug. 11 just before 9 pm when a private helicopter began taking off.

Dressed in his pyjamas and bathed in the red emergency lights surrounding the helicopter, McCaan explained how he watched as the helicopter lifted off, but then - instead of going straight up over the trees like normal - the helicopter started moving "back and forth" and then went sideways out of his view.

"I heard a bang and then I didn't hear

the helicopter sound."


Officials with the Grand Bend division of the Lambton Shores Fire Department say the private helicopter with four people on board, was trying to lift off when the engine quit. The pilot was able to safely land a few hundred feet away in a small yard.

The helicopter fit just between the side of a house on Oakwood Lane and Highway 21 on the outskirts of Grand Bend. All four people walked away without injuries.

Michelle McCaan, Nick's mother, says the pilot told her he struggled to get the helicopter over the trees because of strong gusts of wind. And she added he had to be a skillful pilot to miss the houses, the busy highway and the hydro wires to set the failing aircraft down safely.
