Fired PW firefighter seeks \$120k in damages

A former Wyoming firefighter is suing Plympton-Wyoming for \$120,000 because "moral damages" for the "bad faith" actions of the municipality when she was fired.

Carrie Ann Wilson was at the centre of a controversy which bubbled over at the Wyoming fire hall in Feb. 2020 when four senior firefighters were fired by then Fire Chief Steve Clemens.

Clemens' tenure had been controversial. According to Wilson's statement of claim filed in late July, Clemens was creating conflict in Wyoming by moving fire memorabilia out of the fire hall, reducing training and reducing the debriefing sessions held after major incidents.

In 2017, Wilson found a computer which had been set up to record firefighters in the station. An investigation launched by the town's lawyer said the move was an accident.

Then, Wilson's claim says, the chief didn't investigate two incidents of harassment.

Lambton OPP say one person has died in an accident at the corner of Courtright Line and Inwood Road. Around 11 Tuesday morning, a feed transport traveling east on Courtright Line collided with a white SUV – broadsiding it. Firefighters from Alvinston were called in immediately. An air ambulance was called, but six people were rushed to hospital by Lambton paramedics by land instead. A turn signal on the transport could still be seen blinking an hour after the accident occurred. Police were not commenting on the cause of the crash.

Former Petrolia teacher sentenced to a year in jail for sexual exploitation

"Teachers must live up to that trust that parents and students and families and society placed in them to guide and teach students and not to abuse them."

That from Justice Deborah Austin as she sentenced a former Petrolia teacher to a year in jail after being found guilty of sexual exploitation.

Austin said the 12 month jail sentence for Gillian Boere, "is necessary to send a clear message that teachers must respect a clear boundary, not only in relation to the students they directly teach, but also to those students who volunteer for in or around

their classrooms or classroom activities, or preparation, in co-op, programs and field trips and coaching."

Boere was found guilty of sexual exploitation in a Sarnia court on Jan. 28 after four encounters with a teenaged boy over the summer of 2019. Sexual exploitation charges are laid when a person is a position of trust or authority to a minor according to the Criminal Code.

Boere was an elementary school teacher in Petrolia but the teen was not her student. There is a publication ban on any evidence which might identify the teen including how they knew each other.

Court heard the encounters began after the break up of Boere's marriage. The teen visited her home and she began to cry. He asked her if she needed a hug, which lasted five to 10 minutes. The two then shared a kiss before the teen left. Court heard she told the teen not to say anything about the incident because she could be in trouble.

There were two other sexual encounters, one which the judge found sexual touching had taken place the other where there was intercourse. The teen distanced himself from Boere after having sex in the 34 year-old's car in August.

Boere who had faced four charges was found guilty of the single count of sexual exploitation.

In her ruling Tuesday, Judge Austin says it was Boere's responsibility to make sure

a caring gesture during a difficult time was only that. Boere's marriage was falling apart at the time, Austin said.

"Crying and sharing her personal difficulties was an extraordinary situation to be placed in, (and) put them in an intimate context that was unfair, unequal and confusing...

"As an adult acting in her capacity as a teacher - however difficult and painful her situation - her clear duty was not to seek or accept any sexual contact with a young person as a means of coping."

Austin also denounced people who would shame or blame the teen, saying he had been exploited by an adult he trusted.

Plympton-Wyoming faces a \$120,000 lawsuit from former firefighter

The first was at a debris fire at a home in August, where a senior officer arrived on the scene and began yelling at Wilson, the claim

Wilson says she tried to calm him but he "shouldered his way" past her. Wilson told several firefighters about the incident but didn't report it "out of fear of reprisal."

Then in September, Wilson was on a pumper truck which crashed in a farmers field as it responded to a car fire. Wilson- a lieutenant and the senior officer at the scene - made sure everyone got out and was okay.

Moments after, the same senior officer who held the same rank arrived and started to berate Wilson.

She described the confrontation in an interview in June 2020.

""We were both face-to-face by that point. He was then yelling about the truck that was on fire and why we weren't putting that out. I explained that it was just going to burn out.

"He yelled at me about who was IC and who was in charge of this. And I screamed, I was very agitated at that point, and yelled that it was my call. I was in charge. I was IC and I was leaving

"And it was at that point that other firefighters stepped in to

physically pull him back. And I left the situation."

Wilson's claim said he had to be "physically restrained" by other firefighters.

The verbal assault caused Wilson "to be afraid for her safety" and triggered a panic attack which was treated at hospital along with minor injuries from the crash.

Wilson told Clemens about the incident at the hospital, and said he would investigate - according to the court document - and several days later Clemens told her the officer would not be attending fire activities for a time.

In December, at an officers meeting, Clemens announced the man's return. One of the firefighters said he hoped the senior officer would "quit hitting women" on his return.

The chief launched an investigation of the comment saying it could be defamatory. That lead to an investigation of the shoving incident in August.

Throughout the investigation, Wilson's claim says the lawyer hired to investigate questioned all of the firefighters involved about their loyalty to former fire chief Mike Vasey.

On Feb. 11, Clemens called Wilson to the fire hall to talk about the reports conclusions. By then, the document says, she knew one firefighter had already been fired. She brought another firefighter with her as support, but he was forced to leave the meeting. Wilson wanted to record the meeting with Clemens and the lawyer but that wasn't permitted.

Wilson's claim says she was fired, but given the option to resign within two days if she signed off on a package which gave her four-week's pay in lieu of notice and severance pay. Volunteer firefighters in Plympton-Wyoming made \$5,000 a year at the time.

Wilson says she felt pressured to accept the deal on the spot.

The next day, The Independent broke the news of the firefighters being fired and four others being reprimanded. Clemens confirmed to *The Independent* three veteran firefighters, Wilson - a lieutenant, Sr. Firefighter Jason Lyon and District Chief Jeff Scott were dismissed after two investigations into what at the time he called workplace health and safety issues.

The dismissals ignited anger within the department.

Four firefighters resigned and retired immediately after the dismissals.

In all, 16 firefighters left the Wyoming station - at least eight because of the incident.

In the damages lawsuit, Wilson says her family - including a long line of firefighters - heard of her dismissal through the media.

Wilson's claim says the way the town carried out the termination "unnecessarily, unreasonably and foreseeably cause Wilson mental distress" including damaging her reputation, caused sleep disruption, PTSD and a major depressive disorder and added the acts were "malicious, high handed, callous and oppressive."

The town has 20 business days to

say whether it would defend itself. ČAO Carolyn Tripp said she could not comment at all on the lawsuit.

Since the incident both Scott and Lyons, who were fired with Wilson, ended legal proceedings against the town with a brief news release which thanked each of them for their long-time service to the community.

Teacher sentenced to one year in jail

'Adolescence can be a confusing and challenging time for young people as they grow and mature, navigate friendships, peer groups and discover their sexuality," said Austin. Reading from case law she added; "To exploit young teenagers by leading them to believe they're in a love relationship with an adult reveals the level of a morality that is of great concern.' In this case, this young person was clearly put in a situation of emotional confusion, turmoil conflicted loyally, secrecy about the relationship as he testified. There was stress and confusion for him about how to extract himself. These are all aspects of emotional abuse and distress."

Austin added that all placed pressure on the teen and his family who faced "shame, blame and even being called out publicly" at a wedding in the aftermath as rumours circulated in the community after media coverage of the charges.

Boere's lawyers wanted a conditional sentence however the charge of sexual exploitation has a minimum sentence of 90

There were many letters submitted to the court which talked about Boere's skills as a teacher and her contributions to the community.

"These characteristics are all noted, but they also reinforce why the trust was high. While she was a trusted and respected teacher, community member but for this offense, they reflect how painful it is when such a high trust is breached in this way," said Austin.

Austin found that while Boere wasn't the teen's teacher, she was acting as a teacher in a position of trust during their interactions, that Boere was more than double his age and that a message needed to be sent about the position of trust teachers hold in the

community.

"It is important for this court and its message in this sentence to stress that there must be clear boundaries for teachers engaging with students, not only with the students that they teach, or even the students who attend their schools, but also in their other broader roles as teachers including supervising co-op placements supervising student volunteers in school related activities before or after, inside and outside the school buildings, including in classroom preparations or field trips and the like. It is arguably more important to emphasize these boundaries of trust when these interactions are in a less formal, less structured and more casual context, not only in a school or during classroom teaching hours but whenever and wherever their role as a teacher is engaged," she said.

Boere did not speak during sentencing, however she did send a Facebook message to the victim and his family when she was found guilty saying "I will never forgive myself on how this has affected him, ever."

Boere was also sentenced to a year probation after serving her sentence. She must also submit a DNA sample to the Data Bank and Boere be listed under the Sex Offenders Registration Act for 10 years.

Boere was fired in March 2021 by the Lambton-Kent District School Board. The College of Teachers says Boere is still a member in good standing but "On Sept. 6, 2020, the member undertook that she will not seek or engage in any employment for which a Certificate of Qualification and Registration is required, until the College disposes of the complaint against her.

"At the present time, there has been no finding made against the member," says a notation on the College's website Tuesday afternoon.

And they're off; election candidates set

Incumbent Mayors in Petrolia, Warwick and Brooke-Alvinston face challenges

There will not be a race for municipal council in Dawn-Euphemia, Enniskillen and Oil Springs this year.

The communities have all acclaimed their municipal leaders after the nomination deadline closed Friday.

But there are a number of races to watch in Central Lambton

PETROLIA

Petrolia Mayor Brad Loosley will face former town administrator Richard Poore in the race for the top spot on council.

The municipal election nomination period has just closed and Loosley and Poore are the two candidates for the position.

There has also been a flurry of entries to the race for councillor; Chad Hyatt, Debb Pitel – a suicide prevention advocate and Allison Mevis who was one of the people who recently tried to get Petrolia council to deal with drainage issues before approving the zoning for a townhouse complex – are among 11 people vying for six positions. They face all of the incumbent councillors - Joel Field, Grant Purdy, Marty Souch and Wade Deighton – with the exception of Don Welten who withdrew his nomination due to

health reasons.

There are now three people running for the top job in Plympton-Wyoming vacated as Lonny Napper retires. Current Councillor Tim Wilkins has filed his papers to run for mayor. He faces Muriel Wright and Gary Atikinson in the race.

Netty McEwen has been acclaimed as deputy mayor. The long-time councillor is also a former municipal administrator.

In the race for councillor in Plympton-Wyoming there are some new faces. Kristen Rodrigues, John VanKlaveren and Alex Boughen joined the race for four council positions Thursday.

Incumbents Mike Vasey and Bob Woolvett are also up for re-election. Conner Weed filed his nomination papers with minutes to spare. Weed ran for council in 2018 as did Mike Thompson, a municipal administrator in Petrolia, who filed his papers in June. Randy Dayman - who voiced concern about the fast pace of development and its affects on the infrastructure, is also listed as a candidate for council.

WARWICK TOWNSHIP

In Warwick, the race for mayor pits current Mayor Jackie Rombouts against former Mayor Todd Case.

There are a number of new faces on the ballot for the four councillor positions. Thursday, Joe Manning joined the list of eight people now running for councillor positions.

Incumbent councillors Colin Mitchell. Wayne Morris, Todd White and Jerry Westgate are all on the ballot as is former councillor John Cowenberg, and newcomers Sharon Plunkett and Bill Davies.

BROOKE-ALVINSTON

Incumbent Mayor Dave Ferguson faces a challenge from current Councillor Jamie Armstrong in the race for the top job.

Incumbent councillors Frank Nemcek, Jeannette Douglas and Wayne Deans are up for re-election. But they have some

company on the ballot.

Former Inwood Fire Chief and president of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture Don McCabe, Les Douglas – who ran in 2018, Vanessa Benoit – who ran both municipally in 2018 and for the NDP in the provincial election, Jenny Redick – the organizer of the Tanner Redick Memorial Two Pitch Tournament - Craig Sanders and Gregory Hilliard, a political newcomer who has voiced concern about a number of council actions over the past four years, including the enforcement of the pool fence bylaw are all seeking one of the four councillor positions.

DAWN-EUPHEMIA

Incumbent Mayor Al Broad is unopposed for the top job.

Four people filed their papers for the four available council seats. Jason Myer, Ann Gray, Paul LeBoeuf and Mark McGuire have all filed nomination papers and will be declared the official council Monday when the candidates are certified.

Noticeably absent from the list of potential councillors at this point is long time council member Leslea Williams. She's served on municipal council for 40 years.

She was unavailable for comment on her decision at presstime Tuesday.

ENNISKILLEN

In Enniskillen, the current council are all on the list of unofficial candidates - with no other challengers the entire council will be acclaimed Monday when the list is certified. Mayor Kevin Marriott and Councillors Judy Krall, Mary Lynne McCallum, Wally VanDun and Chad Burke will continue to serve on council.

OIL SPRINGS

The entire Oil Springs council will also be acclaimed with four people looking to fill the four councillor seats and no challenge mounted to Incumbent Mayor Ian Veen.

Council incumbents Larry Wagner, Connie McFadden and Adam Veen have all filed to run for another term Jordon Newport – a newcomer to local politics - has also filed his papers.

ST CLAIR TOWNSHIP

Three people, Tracy Kingston, Jeff Agar and Chad Shymoko are vying for the mayor's chair with the retirement of longtime Mayor Steve Arnold.

Incumbent Steve Miller is the lone candidate for the deputy mayor's job.

Six people are running in ward one, including incumbent Pat Brown. Charles Mortley-Woods, Cathy Langis, Holly Foster, Bill Moran and Michelle Maitland have all filed nomination papers.

There will also be an election for councillors in Ward two as Brad Langstaff filed his nomination papers today. He'll run against Bill Myers and Gary Martin. SCHOOL BOARD ELECTIONS

While some councils have been acclaimed, there will be elections in all communities for the four school boards.

Supporters of the English Public Board (Lambton-Kent District School Board) will have three candidates to chose from; Heather Skolly of Petrolia, Greg Agar of St. Clair Township and Kathryn Shailer a life long educator and former VP of academics at Mount Royal University who now lives in Brooke-Alvinston.

There will be no election for the Catholic School voters. Incumbent Mat Roop will represent the region.

In the French Separate School Board, Sylvie C. Barbeau-Chmielewski will face Meghan Reale for the region's trustee seat. In the French Public Board, David Andre Paradis from Chatham-Kent is the new trustee for the regional board.

Election day is Oct. 24.

Editorial

So much for common sense

The words common sense and government rarely are found together in the same sentence. You won't find them in this editorial either.

The federal commission responsible for the riding boundaries has released its proposal for Ontario and you need a satelite, a swiss army knife and a protractor to figure out just who will be part of which riding. The lines appear to have been drawn by someone with a penchant for a purple marker and a little too much

What is clear is residents in Lambton County will have three MPs (and later MPPs since the provincial law requires the use of the same boundaries) representing its citizens. Two of the three ridings don't even acknowledge Lambton in its title. Lambton would be represented by the MPs from Sarnia-Lambton Bkejwanong, South Huron Shores and Elgin-Middlesex-Thames.

Sarnia-Lambton-Bkejwanong would stretch from Sarnia down to Walpole Island - as it used to - and add in Wallaceburg and part of Dresden in Chatham -Kent. Elgin-Middlesex-Thames - what's currently Lambton-Kent-Middlesex - would still included Warwick, and Brooke-Alvinston, but only part of Dawn-Euphemia would be in that riding. And Forest and Lambton Shores would be in South Huron Shores.

If the proposals go through, no doubt there will be some confusion when the first election is held with the new ridings.

It will also make it interesting for Lambton County and health care organizations like Bluewater Health, as they try to get help from the feds and province for projects like housing and health care. They'll now have to lobby three MPs instead of two.

MP Marilyn Gladu says the commission's goal is to have about 117,000 people represented by one MP. The new Sarnia-Lambton-Bwjenong riding will be 127,000.

Here's a wild thought - Lambton County has 123,399 people according to the 2016 Census - wouldn't it make sense to have just one person represent that one community. Apparently no. See the first sentence above.



Lambton county could be represented by three different MPs and MPPs if a proposal for riding boundaries is ap-

A federal commission looks at the riding boundaries every 10 years and alters them to make sure each member of Parliament represents roughly the same number of people. This time around, Sarnia-Lambton MP Marilyn Gladu says the commission was trying to build riding boundaries so each MPP would represent about 117,000 people. Gladu is spearheading review of the boundary proposal for the federal Conservative party.

Under the plan, Sarnia-Lambton

would grow to include Walpole Island, as well as parts of Wallaceburg and Dresden. It would be called and be called Sarnia-Lambton Bkejwanong. The Lambton-Kent-Middlesex riding would be replaced with Elgin Middlesex Thames. It would include Warwick, Brooke-Alvinston and parts of Dawn-Euphemia as well as parts of Chatham-Kent, Elgin and Strathroy.

Gladu says the proposal puts Forest and Lambton Shores in a riding called South Huron Shores.

The MP has been talking with some community leaders, particularly the indigenous communities in the riding. Bkewanong and Kettle and Stoney Point have join programs because they are in the same riding, she says, and they are concerned about their future.

The MP says Bkewanong was part of the Sarnia-Lambton riding in the past, but she expects another office would be needed to serve the needs of the south should the boundary proposals be approved for the next federal election. The province follows suit with the boundary redistribution.

Gladu is hosting a meeting about the proposed changes Aug. 30 on Zoom. Public consultations will also be virtual in late September. You will have to register to give a presentation. "Changes can be made, but only if people add their voice now, when the public hearings are being held. This is the only time that there's input from the public," says Gladu adding changes were "made in the last go round in 2012."

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PW vows to work with brewery after social media storm

A Plympton-Wyoming brewery says it's working with the municipality to keep its taproom open.

The news comes after a weekend firestorm on social media after Mary and Joe Donkers of Stonepickers Brewery near Forest said they were closing the taproom after the town's building and planning departments came required 18 changes to the taproom to meet local regulations including adding a firewall around a steam-heated brew house. The Donkers said the only danger of fire at their brewery is already behind a firewall.

The rest of the requirements, they wrote, were "are beyond the scope of our current and planned operations. Remote areas like Forest do not have services like cities do, and the installation of these services come at the

expense of the owner...Our original business plan was to move the taproom to another location within five years. However, with ownership changes and economic effects of the pandemic, relocation is not a viable option at this time." The Donkers said they would be shutting the taproom after Thanksgiving.

The announcement led to loud criticism of the municipality. "This is absolutely ridiculous that PW has imposed these demands, especially after the last two devastating years for businesses," wrote Michelle Bidner.

"(With) the ramifications for all those Joe and Mary support - the food trucks, local restaurants, the musicians and the taproom workers - it is so sad that solutions and common sense cannot prevail," said Cathy Johnson.

Megan Filion said it was "very disheartening" the municipality wouldn't find a way to work with the Donkers.

The post garnered hundreds of negative comments.

But by Tuesday, the business said it had worked out its concerns with the municipality and the taproom will remain open.

Plympton-Wyoming CAO Carolyn Tripp said the business originally opened as a value-added business to an agricultural application - since the brewery grown, the requirements had changed.

"We did meet with them Monday, there were some misunderstandings with what they were required to do," she said. Tripp said adding the meeting with the Donkers was very cordial Monday. The concern over building a firewall has been addressed. "If you don't brew the beer while the taproom is open, you don't need the firewall," said Tripp. "The rules are valid, it depends on how they're operating... dictate which rules apply to them."

at the issues including low hanging tree branches which stretch over sidewalks which need to be trimmed.


There are also long weeds under the teeter-totter and climber at East End Park, said McFadden. She worries people will not use it because of its state of disrepair.

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






"There are many memories people have of the building," said Joe Manning, chair of the 150th anniversary of Watford Committee. Legion needs \$300k of work

The Petrolia Legion is on a mission to make its hall accessible to all.

The organization needs to raise between \$250,000 to \$300,000 for the work.

"The halls is not accessible," said Legion President Alex Billings.

The building was constructed in the early 1950s with an addition in 1967. Much of the work was done by volunteers at that time. A stairlift is available to get people up and down the stairs at the front entrance, leading to the upper and lower halls.

to the upper and lower halls.

Robert White, who serves as the poppy chair and has taken the lead on this project, said those using wheelchairs aren't able to use the washrooms or get in and out of the chair lift which allows some to get up and down the stairs.

The Legion plans to install an elevated platform, which can transport a wheelchair up the stairs.

In the front of the building, a ramp will be installed with the front deck level with the door.

A universal bathroom for both sexes will be added, which can give the space

needed for someone with mobility issues. The organization has a timeline of one year to get this work done, as it must be in compliance with government regulations by July 2023.

The issue has caused problems in the past. There have been people who could not rent the hall due to their mobility issues, said White.

The Legion is one of the biggest halls in the community for functions with the capacity being 230 in the upstairs hall, 70 in the club room and 50 in the president's room.

The Legion currently has between 125 and 130 members, which is a far cry from the 400 members it had in 1967 when the building's addition was constructed.

That makes raising the funds difficult. "We are burnt out," White said of the volunteers who work to keep the Legion functioning. This is not much different than many other local organizations.

Saturday, the legion is hosting a car show in the parking lot with the Sarnia Street Cruisers between 10 am and 2 pm. There will also be a dart tournament in September.

All proceeds will go to the building fund to support the renovations.







The odds makers had the 32 year-old McClow, as the favourite heading into the fight.


Both men are 6'3 in height, but McClow outweighed the 36 year-old Young coming in at 500 lbs. to Young's 440 lbs.


