# Rent and run LITTLEST PLOWMEN

A Petrolia council candidate faces online heat for renting a room to run; practice legally OK

A Petrolia councillor seeking re-election is trying to set the record straight about where he lives.

A social media post questioned why Grant Purdy's address is the same as fellow councillor, Wade Deighton, on the official list of candidates running for the Oct. 24 municipal election.

One resident on social media called it "intentional deception ... that should be brought to light" and another saying it was "shady dealings."

Another social media post added "the candidates all keep talking about transparency. I've yet to see much of it in this past council.'

Purdy, in a social media post, explained during his second term of council, he divorced and needed a place to stay. At the time, Councillor Ross O'Hara offered him a room to rent. O'Hara is moving soon, and the housing situation in Petrolia is difficult he says.

With the housing market prices soaring, and little options for apartments for non-seniors in Petrolia, it was/is not feasible to purchase a home at this time – but is something I'm working on and plan to achieve," he wrote.

# Teacher appeals conviction

A former Petrolia elementary school teacher will be in court in December to launch an appeal after being convicted of sexual exploitation.

Boere was found guilty of sexual exploitation in a Sarnia court on Jan. 28 after four encounters with a teenaged boy over the summer of 2019. Sexual exploitation charges are laid when a person is in a position of trust or authority to a minor according to the Criminal Code.

Boere was an elementary school teacher in Petrolia at Hillcrest but the teen was not her student. There is a publication ban on any evidence which might identify the teen including how they knew each other.

Court heard the encounters began after the break up of Boere's marriage. There were two other sexual encounters, one which the judge found sexual touching had taken place the other where there was intercourse.

Boere was sentenced to one year in jail for the crime Instead of spending time in jail, Boere appeared in bail court where she was released with conditions until her appeal is heard. Boere will return to court Dec. 9 to set a date in the appeal process.

# Is it business or politics? Plympton-Wyoming council nix's tree day event

Plympton-Wyoming council turned down a request from mayoral candidate Tim Wilkins' business to use a local park during the election campaign.

Wyoming Tree Service holds a tree planting seminar each year on National Tree Day and planned to hold a seminar in Kings Square Park Sept. 21.

Wilkins says the company has been holding the 'Tree Talk' on National Tree Day for about 18 years. Last year it moved to a municipal park after the local school boards pandemic protocols wouldn't allow the company to hold the seminar.

The company paid a fee of over \$300 to use the park, plants two trees there and trims others in the area. Wilkins says the business

was charged a fee then because there was a picnic shelter. This year, Wilkins business would have had the park for free since there is only play equipment there.

But when the rental agreement came to council Wednesday, there were concerns about optics. Gary Atkinson, who is also running for the top job, questioned whether Wilkins should be using a local park during an election campaign.

"I think it's a really good idea. I think it's something that the community really needs. The concept is good. But I sometimes question the ownership of the company because you're entered into the municipal election ... Would you consider postponing it till after the election?"

Wright added "she looks at it as an unfair advantage and it will be more appropriate if you defer this until after October 24." Wilkins

says the event is held because it is National Tree Day.

Councillor Mike Vasey also thought the timing was off. "I understand you did this last year Tim. And we appreciate that but you also weren't running for mayor last year ... you're on the line that you've got two other candidates that you're running against and then your company is putting something on in town and we're giving you the park to do it"

But Mayor Lonny Napper disagreed saying the company was only being "civic minded."

Wilkins said this is not a campaign event and the other two mayoral candidates, Atkinson and Wright, as well as members of council and candidates were welcome to attend. He added if a council member had a concern they should go to the Integrity

Commissioner.

After council pulled the plug on the rental, Wilkins told *The Independent* he'll approach

Petrolia council to see if council will allow the event in one of the town's parks.

# Purdy's run okayed by Petrolia's clerk

Councillor Wade Deighton offered to rent Purdy a room. Under the Municipal Act to run for municipal office you must either own or rent property in the municipality or be the spouse of someone who owns property. That can include a business property.

business property.

The 2022 Candidates Guide to Ontario
Municipal Council Elections says "To run for a
position on council you must be eligible to vote
in that municipality. On the day you file your
nomination, you must be a Canadian citizen aged
18 or older, and qualify as a resident or nonresident elector."

The voters' guide clarifies there are three ways to qualify to vote; "if you live in the

municipality. You may own, rent, live in shared accommodation where you do not pay rent or live in the municipality but do not have a fixed address."

Purdy says he consulted the Integrity Commissioner to make sure his living arrangements – split between Deighton's home and a house in Marthaville – was legal under the Municipal Act.

He added he is "disheartened" that people on social media – including former Mayor John McCharles – did not reach out to him and ask directly "instead of perpetuating misinformation."

Purdy's nomination for his third term on Petrolia council was certified by the town clerk.

A popular Halloween fundraiser is moving to Petrolia. The town's annual Harvest Days events will include Fiery Faces.


The event - which took a two year hiatus during the pandemic - raises money for community groups. In 2019, Lunches for Learning benefitted from the event held in Wyoming.

# Inwood may get community garden

There may soon be a community garden project in Inwood.

Stephen Harrott recently wrote to council suggesting a community garden be built around the Inwood Library "to establish a learning and teaching demonstration with a variety of plots displaying different gardening techniques: some raised beds at various heights to accommodate everyone, young and old, mobile and not so much, vertical, square foot, SPIN (Small Plot Intensive), food forest and a small fruit tree orchard."

Community planning meetings are already underway, but Harrott was looking for municipal approval for the idea. "It is intended that no municipal resources would be required except perhaps access to water and a community notice board," he wrote to council.

"Projects like this have proven to build neighbourhood cohesion by bringing the community together, building trusting relationships, giving residents a more meaningful sense of belonging to the community, experiencing a higher quality of life, gaining a sense of accomplishment, greater physical and mental well-being and transforming underutilized space to grow food which may not be available where groceries are normally purchased."

Harrott says there are people in the community interested in the project who are involved in the planning meetings. It's hoped with municipal and county approval the construction of the garden could begin this fall.

There seems to be interest for the project, however staff, in a report to council for Thursday's meeting, suggests the Inwood Park may be a better location, with more room and light and storage area for tools.

Lambton County Library officials also suggested they use the backyard of the Inwood Library for programming when the weather is good, since the building is so small.

Administrator Janet Denkers suggested council consider a community garden policy to make sure municipal employees don't end up taking care of it

The proposal goes to council Thursday.

## **Third tornado hits Central Lambton**

For the third time this summer, the Northern Tornadoes project says Central Lambton has been hit by a tornado.

The team, based at Western University, says the storm which blew through Ontario Aug. 29 became a tornado in Payne - a hamlet in St. Clair Township just south of Nova Chemicals.

The team found damage to trees and barns but no injuries were reported. There was also a clear path the tornado took in a field near Highway 40.

Officials estimate winds hit about 125 km/h and the storm hit land for about 4.5 kilometres with a width of about 250 meters.

St. Clair Township Mayor Steve Arnold says the municipality's works garage on Moore Line also sustained

damage. The hoop roof was torn to shreds and will cost \$250,000 to repair.

The hydro also failed in the area with some homeowners in the dark 34 hours.

# Charlotte's Corner



## **Back-to-School Health Tips**

As children head back-to-school this year, many are welcoming the sense of normalcy for our kids even though the pandemic isn't over. We're seeing COVID-19 restrictions loosen, including dropping the requirement to wear a face mask in most non-clinical settings.

Before the pandemic, the fall and back-to-school season was always a time where we saw a ramp up of respiratory viruses, as more and more people gather inside again. The average child aged 2 to 7, gets one cold per month in the fall and winter. Here are some health tips to help keep you and your children in optimal health through the back-to-school season:

- Ensuring your children are up-to-date on their vaccinations, including the COVID-19 vaccine and the flu shot when it becomes available
- Encourage hand-washing regularly throughout the school day, and when they arrive home from school
- Regular washing and disinfecting of water bottles, back packs, lunch bags, etc.

In the emergency department, we often see a lot of worried parents throughout the fall and winter months whose children are displaying cold & flu symptoms. We always remind patients and parents that most infections with cough and runny nose are viral and do not require antibiotic treatment. These viruses are best treated with rest, good nutrition, and over-the-counter medication for symptom relief.

Bacterial infections, like strep throat do require antibiotics to clear up. If you have



just a sore throat without a runny nose or cough then seek medical attention. The fall also brings a lot of earaches in children. In my experience, over 90% of pediatric earaches are resolved within three days. If it persists, I recommend seeking medical attention.

I hope these helpful tips can prepare you and your family for the busy backto-school season. Wishing all Petrolia students a great first week back!

# The political games have begun

While you have been enjoying the summer, the municipal elections have been taking shape. Now that fall is upon us, it's clear politicians and their supporters are ready for what will be the most important two months of the campaign.

There have been some political shots fired which lead us to believe the next two months will be very interesting

In Petrolia, Grant Purdy, who is looking for his third term, and Wade Deighton - who is seeking term number two - were singled out for criticism after people noticed their address is the same. Purdy said he sold his home and now rents a room from Deighton while living there and in Enniskillen.

Some on social media called it "shady dealings" and "intentional deception" even though Purdy's nomination was approved by the clerk - who is bound by law to make sure the rules are followed.

While it's fair for voters to ask what's going on, the Municipal Act makes it clear you don't have to own a home to be elected in a municipality.

It's also fair for voters to make a decision based on the fact someone admits they live only part of the time in the municipality they seek to serve.

In Plympton-Wyoming, Councillor Tim Wilkins' business request was turned down the use of a local park. Councillors worried it gave him an unfair advantage with the voters during the campaign. Wilkins encouraged them to attend the tree planting event in September- but still the answer was no.

It strikes us that most voters wouldn't have thought of using a park to plant trees as an unfair advantage, but perhaps some would.

It's clear after watching these two incidents unfold, that the elections in Central Lambton will be more than just a little interesting. There is always behind the scenes lobbying and jockeying for public opinion, but as seasoned watchers of Central Lambton municipalities, it seems the political gamesmen ship has arrived on the scene early showing for some, the races are tight enough that they're doing everything they can to get ahead of the others before election day.

In about 1840, John Wilkes came from Brantford and established a mill at a spot along the Sydenham River. By 1888, Wilkesport was the head of navigation on the Sydenham River and was named after the Wilkes Brothers who were lumber dealers. It was a thriving hamlet of three hotels, three general stores, three blacksmith shops, one grist mill, one saw mill, one water power mill, one shoe store, one furniture store, one harness shop, one butcher shop, one jail. Three steamers, the Silver Spray, The Haney, and the Manitoba, a passenger boat plied the Sydenham. The Manitoba made weekly trips to Wallaceburg.

ronto's gems is its waterfront trails. You can hop on your bike and travel right across Toronto as part of the 3,600 kilometres of trails the municipality maintains.

Downtown, where people walk almost everywhere, there are cycling traffic lights, just to make sure you don't run someone down.

Granted, these routes aren't a ride in the country; the view is nice, but there are some hard-core cyclists in a hurry to get where they're going.

While I'd love 3,600 kilometres of bike trails in the region, that's not realistic.

What is realistic is to expect the people you elect to actually THINK about non-motorized transportation during the planning of

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# New book highlights VPP, local artists

Maddison Bell wants kids to know all about the theatre and the community of people who work there.

Bell, who is the assistant to co-artistic director David Rogers at Victoria Playhouse Petrolia, has written a children's book called Victoria's Playhouse. It's about a little girl who discovers the Petrolia theatre and learns about everyone who works there.

The author grew up in Bright's Grove, but until she came to Petrolia in 2016 for a summer job at the theatre, she didn't even know the VPP existed.

"When I was a little girl like we would go to the theatre my mom would take me to Toronto to see like The Lion King ... I was always a dancer, but I was not particularly into the singing and acting part of things, but that was just something you did," Bell tells *The Independent*.

In the summer of 2016, while she was attending Wayne State University for dance, Bell came to Petrolia to audition for Scotland Sings. And she was floored by what she found.

"This has been around the corner from my house for this long? Like I just can't even believe I missed it. I felt so silly."

Bell also found a warm and accepting

community at the VPP. "There's so much kindness at the core of the arts community and at the theatre. It sincerely is their most important value ... just being kind to one another and I just felt ... a sense of belonging. I want children to feel that way, too'

So, Bell wrote a story about Victoria who arrives at the theatre and meets "all these vibrant characters who encouraged her fascination with the theatre. And then she learns that each new friend has a unique talent that will guide her in putting on a show of her


"And at the theatre, she finds that dreaming big is a good thing, and that you'll always be supported.

It's a mirror of what happened to Bell when she came to VPP.

In the book, Bell uses her real-life coworkers including Rogers, David Hogan and cast members such as Fiddler Jesse Grandmont and Music Director Mark Payne to guide Victoria through the theatre. Bell illustrated the book herself and that drew raves from her co-workers.

"They loved it. David Hogan kept saying 'Look! I'm a character in a book!

While the book is meant to inspire and teach kids about the theatre, it was also therapeutic for Bell. She illustrated Victoria's Playhouse



during the pandemic, when she couldn't be with her theatre family.

"I kind of felt like it was a way to stay close to the theatre because I was drawing my colleagues every day, hilariously.

And she says the book is a "time capsule.

"I wanted to capture this moment in time," says Bell. "Life moves fast. And I didn't know where life would take me and I just, wanted to remember this one (moment), big time."

The book is available at the VPP during performances, some Petrolia stores and at maddisonbell.ca.

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## Charity ball tournament for murder victim's kids gets PW support

Plympton-Wyoming council decided to waive the fees for a charity baseball tournament at the Camlachie Community Centre.

Councillor Tim Wilkins suggested Warwick - where Storr lived - also has many ball diamonds and then his home municipality would be able to contribute.

Council agreed to waive the \$678 fee by a vote of five to two.

# Businesses and residents having their say on downtown

Petrolia wants to know what merchants and citizens think could improve the downtown.

Recently, the town and Sarnia-Lambton Economic Partnership began a downtown revitalization project, with the help of a Rural Economic Development Grant.

Laurissa Ellsworth, director of marketing, arts and communications. for the town says one of the first plans of attack is to survey the business community. Petrolia is in the middle of transitioning to a Business Improvement Association board of directors. Members have been talking to retailers about the plan and about 85 businesses are willing to be members of the organization.

downtown area using an online survey. "We're close to 40 per cent of the

businesses have completed so that's

pretty good. And then once I have that, we'll be able to kind of be a little bit more clear to the business as a whole."

Ellsworth says there is also a survey to see what residents would like to see in the downtown. It's available online through the town's social media connections or by phone at 519-332-1820.

The town is also planning two community sessions to talk about the vision for downtown.

They'll be held at the Y in Petrolia on Sept. 28 and 29.

# Why pay when kids play elsewhere asks Oil Springs

Councillor Matt Strangway doesn't have a problem with the Village of Oil Springs paying a user fee for Petrolia's Greenwood Recreation Centre, but he's voicing concern about how the fee is calculated and the amount of time kids actually spend on the ice in

The user fee with the Town of Petrolia has been a bone of contention with the Oil Spring Council for years. Strangway understands the need for the annual fee as Oil Springs doesn't have an arena. Petrolia, which maintains Greenwood, bills the village yearly for the Oil Springs athletes who

use the arena. Last year, the village didn't pay the fee.

Strangway, at a recent village council meeting, said hockey teams are only playing their home games in Petrolia, and are holding practices in Alvinston and Watford, due to ice not being available in Petrolia.

"It royally burns me," said Strangway.

He voiced his concerns about the lack of ice time at Petrolia's Greenwood Recreation Centre, after a letter was received from the Petrolia's Director of Facilities and Community Services Dave Menzies.

In it, Menzies says the local sports organizations - like Petrolia Minor Hockey and Petrolia Figure Skating - have not been able to supply the Town of Petrolia firm numbers on how many kids from other municipalities have been using the arena.

Instead Petrolia decided to take the average number of participants over the last five years to determine the amount. Petrolia says about 15 Oil Springs registrations were paid and billed the village \$1,500.

Mayor Ian Veen said there should be a user fee, but feel the minor sports organizations should charge the parents directly during registration. Therefore only those who use the facility would be asked to pay.

The council will be sending a letter to Petrolia registering its displeasure about the lack of ice time for players.


