Court transcript tells different version of Petrolia councillor's 2018 charge withdrawal

Souch was charged after investigation of town truck

It appears a Petrolia council member who faced criminal charges during the last municipal election didn't tell the full story of why those charges were dropped.

In August 2018, just after the nominations for the municipal election closed, Marty Souch was charged with obtaining a document by false pretence. It stemmed from a two-year quest to figure out what happened to a town vehicle which had been damaged. Souch believed an employee using the truck after hours hit some posts.

During his search, Souch requested information through the Information and Privacy Commission, but was turned down.

He revealed to *The Independent* at the time

that he had an estimate for the repair of the truck.

A citizen complained and the police investigated, charging Souch with the unusual charge.

On election night, Souch told *The Independent* he had been in court that morning where the crown withdrew the charge "unconditionally saying there wasn't a reasonable chance of conviction.

But that's not exactly the tale the transcript of the proceeding tells.

Repairs to Highland Glen boat launch underway

Work is finally underway to repair the Highland Glen boat ramp. Gordon Marine began work Friday.

The boat launch was closed in 2019 after high water and winds damaged the steel groins around the ramp. The conservation authority hired an engineer to look at

the damage to the ramp and also the banks of the park which were collapsing. At the time, Aecom Engineering said it would take about \$3 million over a number of years to fix the damage.

Plympton-Wyoming council pushed to have the project moved forward, but the St. Clair Conservation Authority delayed the project. The town then went to the authority to work out a

management agreement which will, in time, lead to Plympton-Wyoming owning the park again.

In April, council approved a \$105,000 contract with Gordon Marine to fix the launch - the only one between Sarnia and Grand Bend. It was hoped at the time the launch would be open by the summer.

But it took some time for approvals from Oceans and

Fisheries and the conservation authority.

At the Sept. 14 meeting, CAO Carolyn Tripp told council the final approvals had been granted and the contractor would begin work this week.

Adam Sobanski, the director of public works, said work was already underway. It could take two to four weeks to complete depending on the amount of

damage on site.

He's hopeful boaters may be able to launch by October.

Souch: 'I admitted to nothing'

A court transcript obtained by *The Independent* shows Souch appeared in London on Oct. 22, 2018 before Justice of the Peace D. Issac. David Nichol was Assistant Crown Attorney and Souch was represented by S. Donahue, who was duty counsel at the time.

In the court transcript - which *The Independent* verified is an accurate transcription of the recorded session - Nichol says "This individual has completed the Direct Accountability Program. The Crown is requesting the charges be withdrawn."

The Justice of the Peace then agrees to withdrawing the charges.

The Direct Accountability Program is an alternative to prosecution for people with no or limited prior involvement in the adult court system who have been charged with minor offences.

The John Howard Society of Ontario explains; "The accused person is held accountable through community based sanctions. To be eligible the person must be willing to accept responsibility for actions that led to the charge, be willing to make amends for their offence through an assigned task or sanction and complete an agreement which outline the terms to be met."

Former Petrolia CAO Manny Baron also used the Direct Accountability Program just one month before Souch. Baron was charged with breach of trust in the wake of a scandal where he rented buildings he owned via a numbered company, back to the town. Baron resigned after an investigation by the Integrity Commissioner in 2017.

The court case was resolved when Baron admitted responsibility through the program and paid the Petrolia Community Foundation \$1,000 as restitution.

Souch, in an interview with *The Independent* Tuesday, denied he went through the Direct Accountability Program.

"I didn't know anything about how it works," he said of the program through the court system. And they, (the crown

attorney's office) when they came to me, told me that there was nothing there. They didn't have enough evidence to bring these charges through.

"There was not enough evidence in which to lay the charges and they were being withdrawn, and they would never come to court and it was done. They had no-no evidence of anything."

The Independent asked Souch if he was involved in the Direct Accountability Program, "absolutely not ... I admitted to nothing."

The Independent could not find a record of what, if any, restitution, Souch gave.

Souch also tells *The Independent* he did not attend court when the charges were withdrawn

However, the court transcript records Souch speaking during the hearing.

After the court agreed to withdraw the charge, Nichol says; "I believe Mr. Souch may seek a publication ban, though I don't know what section of the Criminal Code would allow for a publication ban to be placed on this."

Nichol goes on to explain that the court documents are not to be published. To which Souch is recorded as replying "Okay. Perfect. Thank you."

Any member of the public can receive a transcription of any court case by paying a fee.

While Souch was not prohibited from running in the election because of the charge, it did hang over him and he was unable to attend one of two debates.

It was held at Victoria Hall and his bail conditions prohibited him from being in the building.

Souch went on to win a seat on council garnering 11 per cent of the vote - 1,092 votes in all.

Election night 2018, Souch told *The Independent*, "With the obstacles and the hurdles I had to jump over ... I think people knew I was telling the truth all along and I was thankful they had the faith in me."

Souch is seeking re-election in the Oct. 24 vote.

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Fiddick returns to court in October

The criminal case against a Petrolia nursing home owner will return to court in late October.

Michael Fiddick faces nine criminal charges including assault and sexual assault. The owner and administrator of Fiddick's Nursing and Retirement Home, was first charged by Lambton OPP May 22 with three counts of assault, sexual assault, overcoming resistance by attempting to choke or strangle, and mischief.

The most serious of the charges – sexual assault – can carry a prison term of up to 10 years.

He also faces three charges of transferring a restricted weapon.

Fiddick was represented in Sarnia Court Monday for a brief appearance. His case was ordered to return Oct. 31.

The owner of the long term care home is not working at the Petrolia home at this time, according to the company's social media site.

'The end of democracy' says Weber

Lambton Shores Mayor Bill Weber calls it the ending of democracy.

Weber, at county council Sept. 7, was speaking against new powers the province was on the verge of passing which gives mayors in the cities of Toronto and Ottawa the ability to overrule council and would have the ability to hire and fire senior staff. The province wants mayors to be able to push through housing projects.

Weber, a former warden of Lambton, says the act is taking the province down the wrong path. "It is the ending of democracy," he told county councillors. "One person, one vote has always been the way it has been."
Weber added "I have not seen the evidence

of having a strong mayor will build more homes. I don't see that a mayor should have the opportunity to hire and fire CAOs or others."

Weber asked councillors to approve writing to the premier, the local MPPs and the Minister of Municipal Affairs hoping to stop the legislation. All but Sarnia Mayor Mike Bradley agreed. Bradley says he's long advocated for more power for municipalities. While Lambton councillors agreed to send a letter, the legislation passed at Queen's Park the next day with both local MPPs voting in favour of the new powers.

'He has erased everything and it is done'

The race for mayor in Plympton-Wyoming is heating up after allegations of sign tampering and a confrontation after a council meeting.

But one candidate for mayor in Plympton-Wyoming isn't saying whether she took down the election signs of one of her opponents.

Gary Atkinson, Tim Wilkins and Muriel Wright are in the running for the town's top job after the retirement of long-serving Mayor Lonny Napper.

Wright, who was the deputy mayor, is a long-time council member while Atkinson and Wilkins have served one term on council.

The Independent learned from several sources last week a resident took a video Muriel Wright taking down the campaign signs of Tim Wilkins on Egremont Road. Some were thrown into a nearby ditch, others allegedly were put in the candidate's trunk. The Independent contacted the citizen however she declined to comment on the video.

can be charged with the criminal offense of mischief according to the OPP

Plympton-Wyoming Clerk Erin Kwarciak said there had been no formal complaints of sign tampering come across her desk.

However, many at town hall were aware of the incident. Several sources tell us Wilkins angrily accused Wright of destroying signs after the Sept. 14 council meeting ended. It was described as a shouting match.

The Independent went to Wright about the report and the candidate for mayor neither confirmed nor denied the incident. "Tim and I have agreed not to talk about it; end of story and we're moving on. There is - he has erased everything and it is done. Thank you."

Wright then hung up.

The Independent reached out to Wilkins for comment but he declined.

Trailer trash talking: candidate explains signs in Brooke-Alvinston

An election campaign sign in Brooke-Alvinston is raising a few eyebrows.

Greg Hilliard is one of nine people running for four council seats in the Central Lambton municipality. His signs have a distinct look - suggesting he wants to be elected as the trailer park supervisor/councillor.

On social media, residents of the municipality questioned what the trailer park reference was about with some asking if it was for real.

"I guess mocking the community you want to win a seat on council for and control your taxpayers' money is now a campaign strategy," wrote one.

Hillard - who clashed with this council early in its term about a requirement to get a pool fence in 20 days to be in compliance with the local bylaws - says the signs have been misunderstood. "The whole reference to trailer park supervisors more reference to what a circus arts council has become." he says.

"They certainly some on there that like to take themselves extremely seriously. And let's be honest, it's a small town politics, we're neighbors. When you're a member of the Council or the

mayor and want to speak down to your neighbors, it's time for change."

Hillard says the slight was not intended toward the community.

"That is not the intent of the signs; the intent is again to take a shot at the mayor and some of the members on council."

And while the signs may have caused some poor first impressions, Hillard

says it has provoked a conversation.

"At least now we're talking, I got their attention and whether they agree with my platform and agree with what I'm saying or they don't, at least they're going to hear my message. And then they can make that decision whether they want to vote for me or whether they want to vote for somebody else."

Local Terry Fox Runs show power of research

Jackson Mitchell is living proof of the power of cancer research.

The Grade 3 Oil Springs student was charming the crowd at the Terry Fox Run in Petrolia. The Lambton Central Elementary School students spent much of the last school year battling a brain tumor, but on Sunday, he was all smiles as he participated in the survivors walk donning a red t-shirt worn by those who have survived cancer. He helped to carry a "We are the Ribbon of Life" banner and made sure to give each survivor got a well deserved high five before the official Terry Fox Run got underway.

And there were a lot of fives to give with over 170 people either running, biking or walking the route through the streets of Petrolia Sunday.

This was the first time in two years there was an in person event, as the pandemic forced Terry Fox Run to raise money virtually. And that seems to have helped. Before the event even started, Petrolia had raised \$12,000 online, said Organizer Steve McGrail. For the first time since McGrail became organizer of the Petrolia run, the community raised over \$25,00. And there is more to come, says McGrail, since schools will also conduct their own Terry Fox Runs in

September and they will be added to each of their community totals.

There was also a silent auction with several donated items and Terry Fox t-shirts for sale, which brought further money into the cause for cancer research.

In Alvinston, residents gathered to honour Terry Fox and those they knew who had cancer.

The Terry Fox Run in Alvinston involved a five kilometre route, which started on the arena grounds and ended at AW Campbell Conservation Area, where everyone partook in a barbecue. Runners, walkers, bikers and scooters were all welcome. About \$8,000 has been raised.

Terry Fox started his Marathon of Hope in 1980 setting out on his journey to run a marathon each day in his quest to run across Canada to raise money for cancer research. His right leg was amputated in 1977 after he was diagnosed with osteosarcoma. He was fitted with an artificial leg.

Fox was forced to stop his Marathon of Hope on Sept. 1, 1980, near Thunder Bay when his cancer returned and spread to his lungs. He ended his run after 143 days and 5,373 kilometres.

He passed away in June 1981 and the first Terry Fox Run was held on Sept. 13. 1981

Rokeby fix could cost over \$1 million

Rokeby Line could be on the move; and it isn't going to be cheap.

The toe slope of Bear Creek bank at Rokeby has shifted in recent years. This has caused the shoulder of the road to slump and the guide rail is not stable. In order to move ahead, the township had to have an environmental assessment of the area.

Project Engineers Kelly Vader and Steve Jackson came before Enniskillen Township Council at its meeting on Sept. 6, to present four options to move ahead with Rokeby Line Erosion Protection Project.

Council believes moving the road to the north and protecting the toe of Bear Creek may solve the problem.

The moving of the road, along with water main and storm drainage work and conducting spot treatment to the vegetation will only be the first phase of the work. The second phase will involve further protecting the slope.

But the fix is expensive - over a million dollars if both phases of the project are complete. The cost of the first phase is estimated at \$750,417, while the second phase comes in at \$381,146.

Council heard it is possible the second phase won't have to be completed. The consultants suggested monitoring the river bank after the road has been moved.

Among the options presented to Council including moving the road 13.5 metres to the north while also protecting the slope. The second solution focused on protecting the toe of the slope by putting down 130 metres of stone, protecting the fish habitat and grading the slope. The last alternative was to do no work at all. One chosen is a hybrid of the first and second options.

While the consultants gave an estimate for the work, Jackson said the final bill would not be known until come until contractors bid on the project.

Deciding on a solution for the class environmental assessment does not tie Council to going ahead with the project. This will only allow for the class action assessment to be completed.

Council can wait up to 10 years to fix the erosion along the road using this assessment before it has to have a new assessment completed.

The flags included the White Ensign for those who fought and died at sea, the Red Ensign for those who fought and died on land and the Air Force Ensign for those and fought and died in the air.

The traditional drumhead service is

held to commemorate the beginning of Legion Week.

The drums and colours are a fitting symbol of remembrance for the fallen and for those who have answered their last drum call.

This service included all of Zone A-4 of the Royal Canadian Legion and was hosted by Alvinston Branch. Branches included in Zone A-4 are Sarnia, Watford, Forest, Petrolia, Alvinston, Thedford, Wyoming, Corunna, Grand Bend, Oil Springs and Brigden.

The origins of the drumhead service can be traced back to the 17th and 18th

It was custom before a battle that the various drums of the participating armies were assembled and used as an alter on which sacraments were placed and religious services held.

If it became apparent during a battle in those early days that all was lost, the losing army was given the opportunity to gather its dead and wounded, assemble its drums and standards and pray to its God and King before the final confrontation.

The drums and standards were then usually set on fire, as it was an act of disgrace and cowardice to let them be taken by the enemy.

The drums were used in both World Wars and the Korean War as a source of strength and unit pride.







William (Bill) George Artiss was born in Petrolia, Ontario on July 28, 1938. He passed away September 16, 2022 in the same hospital in which he was born after a long and productive life.

Fees at the Moore Sports Complex, traffic lights and the municipal golf course were hot topics as candidates for St. Clair Township council met the public.

With just over a month before Election Day on Oct. 24, 100 people were at an all-candidates meeting held at St. Joseph's Parish Hall in Corunna and hosted by the Moore Optimist Club Monday.

It is a wide open race for the mayor's race with long-time Mayor Steve Arnold retiring. Voters can choose between three candidates, Jeff Agar, Tracy Kingston and Chad Shymko.

Agar served on St. Clair Township Council from 2006 to 2018 before making an unsuccessful bid for the mayor's office in 2018. Agar works at Kel-Gor in Sarnia, is a member of the Moore Optimist Club, a past director of the Moore Agricultural Society and has been involved for several years with Mooretown Minor Hockey.

"I never have a biased opinion, "Agar said, and he wants to make sure all of the areas of the township are treated equally.

"I would love to be your next mayor, "said newcomer to politics Shymko. "I'm young and enthusiastic." He has worked at Shell for 17 years, and this is the first time he has run for an

Kingston has served as a councillor since 2014. She has also been the alternate on Lambton County Council. She the retired business person is member of several business and volunteer organizations including the Moore Optimist Club "I am not about ego or personal gain," said Kingston. "I am about caring for our community."

When the evening was opened up to questions, the candidates were asked about the membership fee at the Mooretown Pool increasing from \$198 to \$500.

Shymko proposed conducting fundraisers and getting donations from industry, so the fee doesn't have to go up any further. If it

keeps going up, nobody can afford it, he said.

Agar doesn't remember an increase like that when he served on council. He would never advocate for that kind of jump.

Kingston said council has to act on the information the township staff give them. She said the fees were not being increased enough in the past and council has to keep the facility viable. She did say the pool will need to be replaced.

Traffic light at the intersection of Hill and Queen streets in Corunna has been another issue the current council grappled with during this past term. The candidates were asked if they were in favour of putting a traffic light at this location.

Kingston said a traffic study conducted by the municipality indicates a traffic light is not needed. Council has opted to put in a pedestrian crossing instead. "We consider all angles, we don't just ignore," said Kingston.

Agar countered traffic studies don't say anything. He supported a traffic light be installed at No Frills on the St. Clair Parkway when he was on council and that turned out to be the right decision, due to future development that took place in that area.

Another resident wanted if the candidates supported more lighting at Highway 40 and Metcalf Line. St. Clair Township has voiced this need two or three times at county council without success, said Kingston. It is a place where more lighting is needed, she added.

"The county owes us," said Agar, pointing out St. Clair Township has the second highest population in Lambton. Shymko admitted to not knowing the answer.

When asked about the state of the St. Clair Parkway Golf Club, Agar said the clubhouse needs a total rebuild and is in terrible shape. He wants to see this done in a fiscally responsible way that is not a burden on taxpayers.

Shymko would like to see a five year plan being made to see the work completed. He wants to get grants for this project, so it is not a burden on taxpayers.

Kingston has been keeping an

eye on the golf course. The facility has been making money and the council has put that savings away for any future renovations.

Bylaw enforcement is also a concern. Agar agreed it has been an issue and says he has made calls about bylaw enforcement in the past and they never seem to be followed up upon. When a complaint is made, the township has to respond, he says.

Kingston says the township only has a part-time by-law officer and only deals with complaints. If residents wanted, there could be a full-time employee who can also patrol the township

COUNCILLOR CANDIDATES Also at the all-candidates meeting was candidates for Ward 1 and Ward 2 councillors. There are six

candidates in Ward 1 for three positions while there are four candidates in Ward 2 for two positions.

WARD 1

Pat Brown has served as councillor for St. Clair Township since 2018. He is retired from Arlanxeo as a construction coordinator. He was also a member of UA Local 663 Pipefitters. He says the municipality needs to attract new industries, noting the Crown Royal investment is a good

Holly Foster is owner of Holly's Heavenly Touch and a retired NCAA women's basketball referee. "When the storm gets wild in council, I can calm that storm," she said. Making sure St. Clair Township has a strategic plan is her top priority, while expanding the water treatment plant is another.

Cathy Langis is a educational assistant with the Lambton Kent School District and has served as union president. She feels safety is a top priority for her if elected, especially with the tornado that went through Mooretown. She wondered whether St. Clair Township has an emergency plan. Langis would also like to see the Neighbourhood Watch and Block Parents programs back in place as well as more lighting be installed at the parks. She will advocate for more housing for young people as

well as for a long term care home. Michelle Maitland would like to see the municipality expand its small businesses and grow as a community. With the closure of the Courtright Community Centre, she suggested a new community centre in Mooretown which can be central to Courtright and Corunna. She is a volunteer with Captain Kid Days and had previously run for a Ward 1 councillor in 2018. Bill Moran was born and raised in Lambton County but had to move away for work. He moved back to Corunna in 2018 and has since retired from the power industry. He wants to make sure infrastructure projects are shovel ready. "I don't make promises, I deliver them," said Moran.

Charles Mortley-Wood has lived in St. Clair Township since 1999. He is retired from Imperial Oil. He believes his time with managing a refinery will serve him well."I am not wanting to be someone who complains with no skin in the game," he said. Mortley-Wood is concerned about inflation and how that will affect St. Clair Township. He wants to work to grow the community and believes he can work with private and public partners to accomplish this.

WARD 2

Craig Bezaire grew up in Sombra but now resides in Port Lambton. He works for UA Local 853 and represents members daily. He

wants to make sure taxes are affordable while maintaining a superior level of service. "All issues will be considered with an open mind," said Bezaire. "I won't rest until the job is done

Brad Langstaff is a businessman in the construction industry. He wants to make sure projects that council takes on are home grown and sustainable. He wants to make sure "the new mayor's values align with the communities of Ward 1

Gary Martin is a chartered accountant and has taught at Lambton College. He has been in the president of the Lambton Federation of Agriculture since 2020. He has also served on the City of Sarnia Airport Action Working Group. "This is my home and I would like to see it prosper," said Martin

Bill Myers just completed his first term on the St. Clair Township Council.
