Food bank use up 30 per cent

The Petrolia Food Bank is hoping to combat soaring need and sagging donations with a food drive.

On Sunday, June 4, volunteers will be set up at the food bank, Krall Park and Dawn Township Community Park in Rutherford to collect donations of nonperishable food, monetary donations and gift cards. There will also be a drop off location and barbecue at Wyoming Foodland.

Petrolia Food Bank Coordinator, Sandra Hartman, says the number of people looking for help from the food bank is up at least 30 per cent this year.

Donations and monetary donations have also slowed.

"We absolutely understand with the increase in everything now, everyone is feeling the pinch and we understand this is a factor in the decrease of donations." Hartman hopes the summer

food drive curbs a seasonal trend in giving.

"Summer months are usually the slowest for donations as families aren't at churches nor school and are away, so it isn't the for front of their minds which we understand. But, the food bank is still very busy during the summers," she says.

"This food drive is to hopefully help restock our very low shelves so we are able to help all those in need throughout the summer, especially with kids at home for the summer."

The food bank is in need of any food donations – perishable or non-perishable and monetary donations including gift cards. "We are not necessarily

focusing on just lunch snacks as we are down all items for our stock at this time.

"We are just including the perishable and lunch snacks as added bonus to have on hand for the families."

Oil Hertage/Douglas needs light: PW

Kristen Rodrigues says a crumpled strip of guard rail along Oil Heritage Line should be all the proof Lambton County needs to add an overhead light or flashing beacon to the intersection at Douglas Line.

The Plympton-Wyoming councillor told her colleagues May 24 about what could have been a tragic accident which led to the twisted steel while discussing the county's reasons for leaving the intersection as it is.

Council has voiced concern about the intersection as drivers try to find away around a detour nearby Lakeshore Road just as the summer traffic heading to the lake increases. Douglas Line is not the official detour, but it is the last turn off before the construction begins. The lay of the land also contributes to the issues. The intersection is at the bottom of four hills. Drivers coming south on Oil Heritage Line can miss the bends in the road just south of the intersection. And, since it is a rural area, the intersection is particularly dangerous in the dead of night, councillors say.

Councillor Bob Woolvett brought the issue to the attention of staff and council earlier in May and asked that the county review the safety precautions at the corner. A flashing red light or an overhead light in the intersection was suggested.

Council sent a letter to the county asking for the improvements but Matt Deline, manager of public works, said the traffic counts in the area don't meet the standards the county uses for further action. SEE PW PAGE 3

Ninety-eight per cent vote no in Lambton

Grant McDonald doesn't want to travel more than he needs to access health services.

He says Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital in Petrolia is a good health facility and it should be maintained as a public facility.

The 80 year-old was one of about 400,000 across the province who voted in the Ontario Healthcare Coalition's referendum on privatizing health care services.

McDonald voted in front of Heidi's Independent Grocer Saturday. The voting booth had been set up in front of the grocery store on both Friday and Saturday as part of a citizen-led referendum to send a message to Premier Doug Ford and his government.

The citizen-led referendum comes after the Ford announced the government has plans to have 14,000 cataract surgeries conducted in private facilities under the proposed Bill 60. This is 25 percent of the wait list created during the pandemic. The next phase will have private clinics offer MRI, CT cans, colonoscopies and endoscopies, with hips and knee surgeries by 2024.

wages, drawing them from the public system. That, the health coalition says, will affect service in public hospitals.

The coalition is hoped there will be one million votes against the privation of the health care system to present to the Ford government.

Tuesday, Shirley Roebuck who represents the coalition in Sarnia-Lambton and Chatham-Kent, says the effort drew about 400,000 votes. In Lambton, there were 3,077 paper ballots cast and over 1,500 online votes.

"Ninety-eight per cent of the people do not want their health care to be private," she tells The Independent.

Roebuck says there were some issues that led to the lower than hoped for turnout. "I think people care a lot (about the issue) but I think it had to do somewhat with voting stations being cancelled at the last minute by the businesses themselves and other people just didn't know about it.

That's a lesson for us. We're going to keep trying to educate every single person. We are not done."

Wednesday, the provincial organization will bring the votes to the Ontario Legislature as a symbolic gesture and

It is feared when more services are relegated to private health clinics, the private care providers will pay staff higher Roebuck expects it will make an impact.

"We want to deliver our votes to Premier Ford. Quite frankly, any government that doesn't pay attention to 4000,000 votes of the people they represent, they don't want to be re-elected."

Three injured at Petrolia and Kimball

Three people were injured in an accident at the corner of Petrolia Line and the Kimball Road.

Around 8:20 am Tuesday, Lambton OPP and St. Clair Fire were called to the intersection after two passenger vehicles collided.

Three people were taken to hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

A 55 year-old from Wallaceburg has been

charged with failing to yield to traffic on a through highway under the Highway Traffic Act.

There have been multiple calls for action at the intersection over the last 10 years. Recently, Lambton County councillors approved \$100,000 in spending for a preliminary design and environmental assessment of a possible fix including either a roundabout or traffic lights.

Province backs away from extra farm severances

It appears the province has backed off a plan to allow farmers to sever three lots from their farm plots.

The province is updating the provincial planning statement which guides all municipalities on planning. Part of that proposal would have allowed up to three residential lots created in rural areas. But the leaders of Ontario's 12 farming organizations issued a statement condemning the idea.

The groups voiced concerned about taking farmland out of production and what the policy could do to the cost of land.

"We have significant con-

cerns regarding the speculative investment that this proposal will drive, resulting in farmland values that make farming even more unattainable for the next generation. Any policies that might open land for speculative purchase and investment need to be discouraged," the leaders of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, the National Farmers Union, the Christian Farmers Federation of Ontario, and multiple organizations representing different sectors of agriculture wrote in a joint statement earlier this month.

"To farm, we need farmland.

"Additional lot severances proposed will make it difficult or impossible for farmers to operate, expand and grow their farms.

"We do not support policies that will increase residential lot creation in prime agricultural areas or in rural areas that are actively farmed."

The groups said it put the food supply at great risk.

In the Ontario Legislature Tuesday, Agriculture Minister Lisa Thompson said the three residential lot proposal "was off the table."

And farm organizations were quick to thank the Conservative government which "worked so hard to hear the concerns of farmers as we talked about protecting farmland and why lot severances can be a problem for the rural landscape," said OFA President Peggy Brekveld in a video on social media just minutes after the minister made the comments.

"We know that we have many consultations and conversations still to come and we look forward to it. Farmland matters and farming matters."

Not everyone was opposed to the idea of allow more rural severances.

Dawn-Euphemia Mayor Al Broad said in some cases, where it not practical to use land in rural areas for farming, severances should be allowed. He says small municipalities like his need those rural residences to keep their communities alive.

Deline, in a letter to council, said flashing red beacons "should be used with considerable discretion" according to the Ontario Traffic Manual, so they don't become common place and



then are ignored.

Deline added the speed limit on Douglas has been reduced and the county would add a 'stop sign ahead' sign.

An overhead streetlight also "isn't warranted" under the standards of the Transportation Association of Canada Illumination of Isolated Rural Intersection Guidelines, Deline added.

But the county did alert the local OPP about the traffic concerns.

Rodrigues says there is clearly problem which needs attention as she explained the accident. "A transport veered, forcing a hydro truck into the guard rail - I don't know how he kept control of the vehicle...I spoke with the officer regarding this incident... HEATHER WRIGHT PHOTO

he feels personally this is a dangerous intersection because of its geography - it's a winding road and you got up and down.

"I can't find one person who doesn't believe this is an area that should have some attention to it.

"We really have to take the stand on this. This intersection should have had some attention years ago not just now and this is just amplifying it. I think we have a duty to do all we can to make sure it's safe."

Council decided to ask the county to put a flashing yellow light at the corner, add more barricades to the corner and reconsider installing an overhead light in the area.

They've also sent their concerns to the OPP.

Editorial

Safety first

Calls for some extra safety measures at the intersection of Oil Heritage Line and Douglas Line are justified.

Plympton-Wyoming councillors have been stewing about the closure of Lakeshore Road because of a bridge replacement for a couple of weeks now. There wasn't enough notice, some said. The detour was too long, said others. The county, they all said, should have had better communication so when the signs went up and the residents came calling, the local councillors would have some answers. All typical complaints when road work makes constituents unhappy.

But the one criticism they raised about the corner of Oil Heritage and Douglas Line was, in our opinion, valid.

Although it is not the official detour route, Douglas Line between Lakeshore and Oil Heritage Line is sees a lot of extra traffic as drivers come up to the Road Closed sign and take the only road they can, Douglas Line. The speed limit on the road leading up to Oil Heritage has been dropped to 50 km/h, although it seems few are following it.

Add into the mix that summer drivers are heading to the lake, and suddenly there are a lot more cars at an intersection that already has some natural hazards.

The intersection of Oil Heritage Road and Douglas Line lays at the bottom of four hills. There is a small bridge on the west side of Douglas Line and trees on the east side that slightly obscure traffic. Cars tend to inch out toward Oil Heritage to get a clear view. Even inching out it's difficult to see a car as it is about to crest a hill going 90 km/h.

That driver coming south on Oil Heritage also has a line-of-sight issue. They have to be almost right upon the intersection to realize there is a curve in the road and the hill heading south.

The county offered some traffic calming solutions but said the standards the county follows don't call for an overhead streetlight or a red beacon there. It's easy to go by the book, but we believe this deserves a more careful look. We hope municipal councillors and the county can come to some agreement to improve the conditions. Safety first, before someone gets hurt.

Lloyd moved to the outskirts of Warwick village in 1898 when he was two years old. He baseball and was an ace pitcher for the Watford team in 1917 before he enlisted in the First World War. After Cook came home, he resumed his role as pitcher for the Watford team and continued playing until the local leagues disbanded in 1942 for the Second World War. Outside of the diamond, Lloyd owned and operated the Warwick General Store with his wife, Anna. The 1939 season of the Western Counties Baseball Association, featured in our photo, saw the Watford Wire Workers meeting the Forest Lakesides in the semifinal of the playoffs. Watford lost both games against Forest with the second called in the eighth inning because of the darkness.

Remembering Ruth: reporter, photographer, lover of Alvinston

I think I must have met Ruth Leitch at a Brooke-Alvinston council meeting.

In my mind, before the pandemic, Ruth was a fixture there, listening to the shenanigans that went on around the council table. I didn't know at the time that she had been the reporter for the Glencoe Transcript years before which explained her interest in municipal politics.

To me, she seemed to be one of those people who is so engaged in the community that she just had to be there to see things unfold. In fact, I would see Ruth practically every time I went to Alvinston.

Canada Day - there was Ruth. Fair time; she had a table displaying her photographs. Church event, Ruth was likely helping out.

She always seemed to be there, talking in her gentle voice and smiling about something. Or taking photos.

One day, I was delivering newspapers to her building and we talked about the industry. She obviously enjoyed being a part of it in her time. And we talked local politics, of course.

When I think back on my conversations with her, I'm struck by how gentle she was with her words - suggesting things to me, not demanding to do things the way they used to be done like some others do. She helped me see Alvinston through her eyes. Perhaps that's why I think the memorial bench at the library is so fitting a tribute to Ruth.

PW releases statement wishing ex fire-chief the best

After a three-and-a-half month human resources investigation in Plympton-Wyoming and a week after word the two top administrators were no longer employed by the town, the municipality has finally issued a statement.

It says, in full, "Please be advised that Darryl Thompson is no longer employed by the Town of Plympton-Wyoming effective May 18, 2023. The town would like to take this opportunity to thank him for his contributions and wish him the best in his future endeavours. As this is a confidential personnel matter, the town will not be making any further

comment."

Fire Chief Darryl Thompson was placed on administrative leave and Chief Administrative Officer Carolyn Tripp went off on sick leave in mid February.

Employees were told May 18 via an email seen by The Independent that the pair no longer worked for the municipality and any questions from the public about their departures should to the Deputy CAO Norma Roddick-Preece. It's not clear why the CAO was not named in the public statement.

Council has met behind closed doors dealing with personnel and legal issues nearly a dozen times since the CAO and fire chief went on leave. A special meeting was held Feb. 15. Mayor Gary Atkinson has declined to comment on what prompted Thompson's administrative leave nor will comment about the investigation which the town undertook into the incident. We do know the town's lawyers have been involved in the three-and-a half month probe.

Atkinson said May 21 little would be released about the reasons behind the departure of the CAO and fire chief since it is a personnel issue adding a statement would be released on the issue. It was released May 22.

Atkinson also declined to answer questions about the cost of the investigation yet since the town is "still in the middle of it."

OPP warn rural banks after two robberies

The OPP is warning credit unions across Southwestern Ontario to take precautions to protect themselves after two recent robberies in West Region.

It is a warning Libro Regional Community Manager, Natalie Close says they take seriously every day.

OPP West Region Crime Units are investigating two recent credit union robberies in rural locations in Arkona on April 4 and in Grey Highlands May 21. There were similarities between the two although police aren't saying exactly what they are.

In Arkona, OPP found three masked people with a gun went into the bank at 4:50 pm and locked the doors behind them.

The group fled the building after taking cash from the vault. Police say the trio fled the building and were last seen going south on Arkona Road.

Police are asking people working in financial institutions in rural areas: • Not to touch any objects or surface that the suspect may have come in touched with in order to preserve evidence such as fingerprints, DNA or footwear.

 Observe for any suspect identifiers such as, behaviour, odours, clothing brands, or any other

identifier.

 Advise police of any suspicious persons that seem out of place, both before and after an event.

If a robbery occurs, police say employees and the public should not try to confront, attack or chase the suspects. Instead, police say, cooperate with the suspects and don't volunteer information unless asked. When it is safe, call 911.

Close says new employees receive extensive training on what to do in the case of a robbery. She wouldn't give specifics about the training, but says; "It all comes back to the safety of the staff.

"We want to make sure they're safe and out of harms way as quickly as possible. They're safety is always first and foremost."

Libro also provides support, including counselling if needed, after there has been a robbery for employees who need it. Close says Libro isn't

worried about its rural locations. She says particularly in Arkona, the community has been very supportive after the robbery.

"There is a really strong connection with our community when something like this happens," says Close. "We're so humbled by the outpouring of community support for us making sure the staff is okay. We're on high alert for each other.'

Earth Heroes want to 'create a good environment'

Ava Horwood is worried people at LCCVI and in the Petrolia area aren't doing enough to help the environment.

She hopes a new community garden near the Central Lambton Family Health Team building will help them to think about what they can do.

Horwood, a Grade 11 student at LCCVI, says she was bothered by the amount of garbage she would see on the streets of Petrolia as she walked downtown. She worries the high school doesn't have a recycling

program. So, in April, she started the environmental club called Earth Heroes. Twenty other students joined

in. With the help of \$500 grants from the Petrolia Lions, Optimists and Kiwanis Clubs, Earth Heroes decided a community garden would be a good way to raise awareness about the club and what people can do to help the environment.

Each of the plants in the garden in front of the playground has a specific purpose, including plants for pollinators such as bees.

The Earth Heroes were putting the final touches on the garden Monday afternoon.

Horwood says this is only the beginning. Earth Heroes hopes to work with the school to create an outdoor classroom next year. And she hopes to partner with the community.

"We were just looking to help LC-CVI, looking at some environmental projects in the school for next year. But we're open to working with the community to create positive environmental impact," says Horwood.

"Whether that be community service days or just working closely with Petrolia to create a good environment for everyone."

Proposed 2024 Bluewater and Mandaumin Well Drilling Project Notice of Study Commencement and Virtual Public Information Session CITY OF SARNIA AND TOWN OF PLYMPTON-WYOMING (LAMBTON COUNTY), ONTARIO ENBRIDGE GAS INC.

The Study

Enbridge Gas has retained Dillon Consulting to undertake an environmental study for the proposed 2024 Bluewater and Mandaumin Well Drilling Project in Lambton County, Ontario.

The proposed project will involve the drilling of two new observation wells. One well is to be located in the Bluewater Designated Storage Area (DSA) and the other in the Mandaumin DSA. DSAs are areas of land designated by the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) under section 36.1(1)(a) of the OEB Act, which contain geological formations suitable for the storage of natural gas underground. The observation wells constructed for this project will be used to monitor the gas content and pressure in these underground storage formations and help ensure the continued safe and reliable operation of Enbridge Gas storage facilities.

The Bluewater and Mandaumin well drilling sites are located within 2 km of one another. The Bluewater site is approximately 900 m west of the intersection of Mandaumin Road and Churchill Line in the City of Sarnia and the Mandaumin site is approximately 1,300 m northeast of the intersection of Mandaumin Road and Churchill Line in the Town of Plympton-Wyoming.

Project activities at the Bluewater and Mandaumin drilling sites will commence with the construction of a temporary gravel drilling pad measuring up to 80 m by 100 m. Upon completion of drilling activities, a permanent gravel pad measuring 8 m by 8 m will be installed around the wells. Access to the Bluewater site will require a new permanent access road that will be 5 m wide by roughly 300 m long and access to the Mandaumin site will also require a new permanent access road,

measuring 5 m wide and approximately 500 m long.

The Process

The study is being conducted in accordance with the OEB's Environmental Guidelines for the Location, Construction, and Operation of Hydrocarbon Projects and Facilities in Ontario, 8th edition (2023). The study will review the need and justification for the project, describe the existing natural, cultural and socio-economic environment, evaluate the project from a natural, cultural, and socio-economic perspective, outline safety measures, and provide appropriate measures for impact mitigation and monitoring. Pending a positive recommendation from the OEB to the Minister of Natural Resources for the issuance of well drilling licences under section 40 of the OEB Act, construction is planned to begin in spring 2024.

The mechanical chest compression device is used in resuscitation efforts. The lithium battery powered computerized unit is designed to give textbook CPR to a patient in distress. That could free up medical staff to work on the patients other needs.

The auxiliary held a community meeting to show off the unit and announced it planned to raise the \$20,000 by June. May 25, they had reached their goal.

The auxiliary will be hosting an open house June 1 at the Petrolia Legion starting at 7 pm to thank the members of the community.



Green light for worker housing on ag land

Warwick Township has paved the way for Twin Creeks Greenhouses to build new housing for its temporary foreign workers.

Mike Corneliesson says right now about 49 people are living in a number of homes near the greenhouse on Zion Line. But the company would like to build homes specifically for the workers who stay in Canada between eight and 11 months of the year to work.

Corneliesson says the homes would have common areas for cooking and relaxing but there would also be larger rooms for the workers.

"Partly COVID changed our mind a lot on how these units rebuilt," Corneliesson told council. He says the units in communities like Leamington are larger with a lot more people in one unit. During the pandemic, that allowed COVID-19 to sweep through some of the residences. Corneliesson says when it came to design the homes which will house the Watford workers, they looked at the best practices in Niagara, where the local health unit came up with some standards for the industry.

"These units are much smaller, smaller groups, we started with two metre distances between beds and try to put smaller groups in bedrooms and stuff. And I would say we're trying to build a more of a premium style housing for our workers. It's very important for us to have comfortable living spaces for them." Twin Creeks has also designed walkways to help workers get safely to the greenhouses without walking on Zion Line, where there are no sidewalks.

The company needed council's approval to rezone some of the agricultural land beside the greenhouses to build the new housing units. Council agreed to the move.

Corneliesson now will go to the township with a site plan for two new housing units. He hopes to begin construction on the buildings this year.

Petrolia officials expect Lambton County officials will now take the lead on increasing the amount of child care in the community.

That after a public meeting hosted by the county and two organizations for licensed childcare providers in Petrolia.

A group of parents came to council in April pleading for the town to set up its own municipally-run day care. The town's staff is investigating the idea but in the meantime, council approved eliminating the business licensing fee for home day cares as a way of encouraging people to open their own business.

County officials also suggested that the bulk of the 67 new spaces in Petrolia and Wyoming will be in the licensed home day care area, not in new municipal programs since the capital needs are too large.

At the May 23 council meeting, Councillor Chad Hyatt asked how the town would keep the dialogue about child care going.

Councillor Ross O'Hara, who attended the meeting, said "I don't know if we can be involved in it now. I think it is more for the county and these other organizations and the people to be involved."

Acting Mayor Joel Field suggested the county will continue to push for more spaces in the community.

"I do think the more they get out and talk about it, I think the better."

CAO Rick Charlebois added the Petrolia meeting was "part of their short term response" adding they are working on a longer term response with the province.



"It is gorgeous, it is perfect," McNally said.

There was a time for friends to pay tribute; that's when former mayor talked about how big a role Leitch played in Alvinston. McGugan called her a confidant and a friend, who helped him make his first flyer when he first ran for municipal politics in 1997.

"If there were more Ruth Leitch's, there would be less problems in this world," said McGugan.

A walk through history; Western tours Oil Springs

"You really get a sense of the oil industry from its beginnings," said History Professor Alan MacEarchern of the University of Western Ontario.

MacEarchern was one of 40 people on a tour of the historic Fairbank Oil Fields in Oil Springs on Saturday as part of the Canadian History and Environmental Summer School. Western University brings together graduate students, faculty and other scholars interested in the fields of environmental history, historical geography and environmental humanities for the tour.

The theme of the weekend was environmental history seen through the 19th century oil industry in southwestern Ontario and Pennsylvania. MacEarchern who teaches and researches Canadian history with an emphasis on environmental and climate history, said it was great to tour the oil museum and oil fields and get a sense where the first commercial oil well in North America was drilled in 1858.

The group first toured the nearby Oil

Museum of Canada, before heading into the Fairbank Oil Field under the guidance of Charlie Fairbank and Pat McGee, the fourth generation owners. The group then headed into Petrolia to see the oil history there.

MacEarchern said the group is looking back to the time in the last half of the 1800s when Oil Springs and Petrolia were at the centre of the burgeoning oil industry. He said many Canadians are surprised to find out the oil industry didn't start in Alberta adding the symposium made comparisons between the Ontario Pennsylvania's oil industries.





Port Lambton school evacuated after gas leak

There were a few tense moments at Sacred Heart School in Port Lambton Thursday.

Around 11:15 am, St. Clair Fire got the call that a contractor working at the school had cut a gas line, according to Chief Richard Boyes. "It was the contractor doing an addition to the school; obviously they didn't call before they dug," says Boyes. Sacred Heart is in the middle of a \$4.2 million expansion project which includes removing portables, building two new classrooms, new washrooms and expanding the child care centre.

After the two-inch line was cut, the contractor ran into the school and worked with the staff to evacuate the students to the backyard as they waited for the Port Lambton and Wilkesport firefighters to arrive. The students later were taken across the road to a cemetery where staff felt it was a safe distance. Parents were called to pick up their kids for the day.

When firefighters arrived – spraying water on the break to keep the leak under control, says Boyes.

Enbridge Gas arrived at about 12:30 pm and turned off the natural gas supply to the line. The chief says everyone worked together well to make sure "what was a big event, turned into a non-event."
