# Planners error on MDS causing big headaches near Camlachie

An error by Plympton-Wyoming planning staff is causing big concerns in Camlachie where a poultry barn is under construction.

But the project will move ahead as planned after the town's committee of adjustment decided the location of the barn as planned would be better for the neighbourhood.

Saul Farms has begun excavating the site for a new poultry barn at 3913 Aberarder Line in May. They'd been issued a building permit for the property, but neighbours questioned how close the building would be to 15 townhouses, 15 apartments and single family homes around Queen Street. The planning staff took another look at the calculations under the province's minimum distance standards and found that the barns and the manure pit which will be built should be double the distance from the nearest home.

"It must be stressed that the Saul's followed proper process and made their application in good faith," said Ken Melanson, Lambton's manager of planning and development services. "The planning team acknowledges the error that occurred ...The Saul's are working in good faith with team to move forward with a proposal," he told the Committee of Adjustment members Tuesday. But the neighbours are worried.

"Why is someone allowed to move in so close to residential properties and a school district...This will lessen the value of our properties here," said Tom McLaughlin in a letter to the committee.

"Considering the amount of residential neighbourhoods Plympton-Wyoming has invested in the Camlachie area - I'm surprised that this farm has even got the green light to go this far," wrote Ryan Smith.

Kelly Saul, who is building the barn with his father, said they chose the site because it was the "ideal candidate to build" with natural gas, municipal water, three phase hydro, access to their woodlot and good drainage.

Saul says when Plympton-Wyoming Planner Sarah Baldwin gave the okay for the development, the family moved forward. But on May 23, Saul got a call from Baldwin saying she made an error in calculating the minimum distance standards. The province requires farm buildings be 320 m from the nearest home. The nearest home is about 200m.

The county recommended the family apply for a minor variance to move forward in the spot. Jim Saul said he felt "coerced" to apply.

Kelly Saul told the committee he's a seventh generation farmer who is putting down roots and starting a family. "We do not want a fight in our community.

"We would never have started building here...had planning done its job."

Petrolia's mayor will continue on a medical leave of absence until the end of the year.


Town council met privately Monday night to discuss the matter and then approved Brad Loosley's leave of absence extension until the end of the year.

# Alvinston one of the stops for mobile clinic

People in Brooke-Alvinston will soon find help for mental health closer to home.

The Canadian Mental Health Association in Lambton-Kent is about two put two mobile care units on the road and it plans to make one of its stops in Brooke-Alvinston.

make one of its stops in Brooke-Alvinston. Nicole Polak of CMHA Lambton-Kent says two RVs have been "fitted it with medical treatment area and a counseling area because it was the intention is to provide physical health and mental health and addiction services to where it is necessary.

"We've identified some key areas where transportation has been an issue for those that are requiring more services. So our goal is to provide early intervention to help prevent crisis escalation, hospital admissions, or providing culturally competent and safe manner," she added.

Andria Appeldoorn, director of fund development for CMHA, says rural areas tend to have access issues.

"So it might be transportation, it might even be that they're not comfortable walking into a doctor's office, or a hospital. So you know, really trying to meet people where they're at. We're very focused on client and family centered care," she told Brooke-Alvinston councillors Thursday.

"If you're at a place where you're ready to reach out to care and you don't feel comfortable or respected, or even able to access the care that's available to you, you're less likely to reach out for care the next time," Appeldoorn added.

In Lambton, the plan is to use the mobile clinic staffed with paramedics in Brooke-Alvinston, Watford, Thedford and Sarnia. The staff will deal with any physical or mental health need, Appeldoorn added saying people won't need an appointment to visit the clinic.

Brooke-Alvinston council gave CMHA approval to bring the unit to the community and use the Brooke-Alvinston-Inwood Community Centre parking lot.

Appeldoorn says the CMHA is still working out all the kinks of the program and planning a route. It's not clear exactly when the mobile units will be on the road.

The second RV mobile health clinic will operate in the Chatham-Kent communities of Chatham, Thamesville, Wheatley and Wallaceburg.

The clinics will also visit the communities of Kettle and Stony Point and the Delaware Nation near Thamesville.

### Principal investigating after anti-trans grad demo

LCCVI's principal is investigating his options after a graduate flashed a T-Shirt with an anti-trans slogan during the graduation ceremony.

About 178 students crossed the stage at the Petrolia high school Thursday night to be recognized for four years of work.

Toward the end of the presentation of diplomas, one student received his diploma, unzipped his graduation robe, smiled and showed the crowd a black T-shirt with the words "there is only two genders" to the cheers of some of the students at the ceremony.

Sources say the student has been selling

the shirts online for some time.

"It's very upsetting for me," Principal Greg Nemcek tells *The Independent*. "I take my school to heart. It hurts."

Nemcek plans to investigate the incident and see what repercussions there may be for the student.

The incident, Nemcek agreed, underlines how tough it is to break biases and promote inclusivity.

"It's an ongoing educational issue – even for me. It's very tough," he says.

The incident came the same day the school and the Town of Petrolia officially unveiled a PRIDE sidewalk at the corner of Queen and Dufferin Streets. Before the official unveiling, skid marks could be seen on the fresh paint.

# Editorial

### Planning blunder a lesson

Our front page story about a planning mistake which led to a discussion about whether a poultry barn should be built near Camlachie is a good reminder of how important good planning is and why some of the new rules proposed by the province are simply not a good

The Saul family is building a barn on agriculture land they own. Normally, they wouldn't need public input on building a farm building on farm land. But a Plympton-Wyoming planner made a big mistake and didn't properly calculate how close the nearest home was to the building. Under provincial rules, livestock buildings have "minimun distance setbacks" to reduce the chance of the sights, sounds and smells of farming bothering the neighbours. The planners mistake meant the barn would be much closer to the nearby homes. The county suggested the family ask for a minor variance to the property to allow the shorter distances, since construction was already underway.

That process allowed the public to have a say it was clear that many people didn't understand the farmer had every right to do what he was doing.

To be clear, this situation was set in motion years ago when the lakeshore area opened up to residential growth. Politicians knew then there would be problems between neighbours. The planner's mistake and the county's remedy just allowed residents of what was once farmland to weigh in on agricultural practices.

Many planning decisions have been placed solely in the hands of municipal planners by the provincial government. They do make mistakes and it is concerning that sometimes, these mistakes won't come to a public body to be rectified.

And then, there was the plan, which the premier says is off the table now, which would have allowed even more residential housing in agricultural areas. That would only serve to have more people concerned about barns and livestock in the community and it certainly wouldn't make for good neighbours.

Hopefully, when government is through changing planning rules, we won't all be surprised by what is developing next door and start to become planning experts. Planning issues are dry and boring until the decision of a bureaucrat or politician affects you directly, as the residents in Camlachie found out.



# Celebrating academic excellence: five named Nicol scholars

LCCVI celebrated academic excellence naming five students as Nicol scholars.

Leah Davis-Lumley, Carson Love, Kiera Maw, Riane McEachern and Tristan Nemcek will receive the 2023 Helen Kavanagh Nicol Scholarships June 7. The Nicol Scholarship is awarded to the top academic students who participate in community and school life by a panel of judges which includes local ministers, politicians and school representatives. It was set up by Harold Nicol who went to LCCVI in 1914, before entering the military to join the troops in the First World War when he was just 14. When he returned, he took a college business course and worked with Western Electric which later became AT&T in Chicago.

Nicol had amassed a fortune of over \$2 million. Without a family, he decided to set up the scholarship fund for LCCVI in his mother's name.

Each year, a panel of members of the Petrolia community, school and the Nicol Foundation pour over applications from the high school's top students to determine who will receive the \$10,000 US scholarships. This year four monetary awards were given out and one student Riane McEacheran was named a Nicol Scholar without a

McEacheran will be attending Western University to obtain a bachelor of science in nursing. It's a career she had not considered until

"It's a way to connect with people. I like to talk, I like to chitchat. And it's a pretty intimate job. I spend all day, every day with people and that's kind

of what I feel fulfilled doing is talking to people connecting. For nurses, that's what your job is - to connect with those patients and those families and make an impact on a life on a daily

McEacheran says she has "very minimal experience in the medical field; I'm kind of jumping all in with my degree. It's something that I was really drawn to this last year in high school, because I really didn't know what I wanted to do. ... I was like, nothing was really sticking out to me until I was talking to a nurse about what her day-to-day looks like. And I was like, 'I think that's something I actually want to do.' And I started to look into it and here we are."

Kiera Maw will be also be moving to London, attending King's University College at Western University for the child and youth studies program.

"I've always wanted to work with children, whether in social work or in school...I'm doing my co-op right now in a Grade One class so I'm kind of leaning towards teaching.

Maw says she's honoured by this award. "I'm really super proud and excited to be a Nicol scholar. You see the wall in our school and I'm just super honored to be recognized and be able to be a part of that community because it's just a community filled with great leadership and great character."

Tristan Nemcek, who recently received a full scholarship to Huron College at Western and is also part of the 2023 Nicol class, agrees.

"You look at the Nichol Legacy Wall and you see the names and you see what those people stand for in their life, it's an honor to be a part of that. It shows your hard work paid off and it's something that you work towards

your entire high school to finally be recognized as Nicol scholar. It's quite an honor." Nemcek hopes to work in the front office of a professional sports team in the future.

Leah Davis-Lumley plans to attend Western University for political science en route to a law degree and hopefully practicing family law.

"I've learned a lot about advocacy and the need for change in society and it's really drawn me to that field. I just want to end up at the end of the day, being able to help people in the community and make people's lives better by advocating for them."

Davis-Lumley adds it's an honour to be named a Nicol scholar and the bursary will go a long way to help her realize her goals.

"It's a really great resource and opportunity for me to be able to pursue my dreams. It's helped a lot of people in the community and it will help me be able to come back one day and, hopefully, give back," she says.

"A lot of the teachers here are actually. Nicol recipients. So. I hope that if things don't work out for me in the field of law, that I will come back here and hopefully teach law, like Mr. (Joel) Campbell, who's been a great mentor for me all throughout my high school."

Carson Love will be attending the University of Windsor in September taking mechanical engineering programs, specifically the aerospace branch. Love hopes one day to work for NASA. "When I was younger I was always interested in space," he says adding in high school he leaned into chemistry, physics and engineering.

And he too is proud to be a Nicol scholar. "It is definitely a great honour ... It shows that all my hard work over the past few years paid off."





# Oil Springs approves five per cent tax hike

Taxpayers in Oil Springs will see a five percent increase to their property tax bill after council officially passed the village's budget June 6.

The \$1,048,000 budget includes \$100,000 for policing and \$98,000 for payments on debentures.

Money was also set aside for sidewalk repair, including on Elizabeth Street between Victoria and James streets. Discussion between the council members involved not spending \$3,500 budgeted for the repair by leaving it as is or tearing up the section. The council decided to go about the work as planned.

One of the projects the municipality wants to

undertake this year is the resurfacing of Oil Springs Line.

The council also wants to replace the ball booth washrooms.

The skateboard park also needs some work. This can only be accomplished if the municipality secures a provincial government grant or has a local organization like the Optimist Club of Oil Springs provide some funding.

Council agreed to have Ray Dobbin of R. Dobbin Engineering compile an asset management plan.

It has been 10 years since Oil Springs compiled its last asset management plan, with Dobbin also taking on that project.

There was \$3,500 set aside for each of the municipalities three parks for pea stone and mulch.

# MDS mistake by planner leads neighbours to question barn site

But with the mistake in calculating how far the barn can be from homes, the county suggested to bring an outside planning agency to look at the issue and see if the building should move ahead.

NPG Planning said, basically, no. "The general intent and purpose of this (MDS) requirement is to.... address and minimize impact from the livestock facilities and support livestock facilities in a manner that minimizes the potential for complaints. The requested variance creates a reduction in the distance to the existing residential homes that is almost a 50 per cent reduction. The extent of the reduction is such that the potential for impact and complaints has increased," the planners wrote.

Because of the minor variance request, the public had an opportunity to comment and some people living in the area are concerned a poultry barn

would be moving in next door.

Joanne Wise lives in the nearby apartment complex. "I have been surprised and troubled by the lack of transparency about plans to construct two 22,000 plus square-foot poultry barns with adjacent manure storage in close proximity to more than 30 family homes," she wrote adding it was difficult to get the information she needed to understand the new development.

And she worried the family would still be able to build the barn in the area anyway meeting the requirements, likely across the road from her townhouse.

Melanson says that could happen. "There is a very real area that is compliant to MDS - the property owners can apply for a permit in the area and would receive it without a public process," he told the committee. Melanson added the official plan recognizes the importance of agriculture and when housing and farming clash in planning issues, the plan states "priority will be given to agricultural uses.'

Jim Saul confirmed they planned to move forward with a poultry barn in

another location on the property and "that location will be less desirable to you than where we currently are," he told the roomful of residents at the meeting. "This project will continue to completion.'

At least some members of the committee felt the variance should not be granted. Jennifer Turks said the committee has no choice under provincial rules to follow the MDS standards. "It's not just a provincial policy, it is there to protect the residents and the applicants," she said noting she had "lost confidence in some of the planning staff" because of the issue.

But the majority of the committee felt the alternative location - across the road from the housing complex would not be any better, and the fact the manure pit would be covered to reduce odour, were good reasons to over ride the MDS standards.

Deputy Mayor Netty McEwen noted that while some members of the committee felt the standards were set in stone, many municipalities have overridden the guidelines through committee of adjustment decisions in the past.

# Watford natural gas plant build starts this year

Waste Management says its new renewable natural gas project should be up and running by 2025.

The company officially launched its \$50 million expansion at the Twin Creeks Landfill just outside of Watford. The company has been working with Warwick Township on the project, which turns methane into natural gas to heat homes, for several months.

Engineering Manager Wayne
Jenken said the start of construction
of the renewable natural gas
infrastructure project will begin
later this year with the approval
of permits expected in place by
the end of the year. Jenken said
things like site preparation can be
conducted until the construction can
get fully underway as they await

permit approvals. The new facility is expected to be commission in 2024 with it full operational by 2025.

The project is expected to employ 75 construction workers and will add six to 10 full time employees to the Twin Creeks Landfill site workforce when it is fully operational.

The new project will convert landfill gas captured from the Twin Creeks site into pipeline quality gas for injection into the nearby commercial gas transmission and distribution network. Once it is fully operational, the facility is estimated to produce as much as two million MMBtu of renewable natural gas per year. This could be enough energy to heat 35,000 homes in Ontario.

Waste Management Canada Area Vice President Tracy Black called this project apart of a "renewable energy revolution," touting Waste Management as a leader in landfill gas. Waste Management currently has 16 renewable natural gas plants across North America with an announcement last year that 17 more will be built. This includes two in Canada, Twin Creeks and another in Quebec.

Warwick Township Mayor Todd Case called it a good day for the municipality, mentioning how ironic it was is there is a shortage of natural gas in the community. He hoped sometime soon, there would be a further announcement that there will be natural gas expansion into Warwick Township.

"If we all work together, we can achieve so much," said Sarnia-Lambton MPP Bob Bailey, as he brought greetings from the provincial government.

# Parents plead guilty in death of nine month-old

The parents of a ninemonth old who died in a Mooretown home have been sentenced – one to prison and one to house arrest.

Nov. 20, 2020 OPP officers and emergency medical services were called to a house on Penrise Street in Mooretown. Nine monthold Tressa MacPherson, daughter of the pair, was found unresponsive and passed away that day.

The OPP Criminal Investigation Branch

conducted the investigation which resulted in Tressa's parents being arrested nearly 10 months later.

Brock MacPherson, 31 of St. Clair and Elizabeth McPhail, 32 of Sarnia, were arrested charged with manslaughter at the time.

The manslaughter charges were later dropped when forensic testing found the baby had high levels of fentanyl in her stomach although testing couldn't determine if she had ingested the substance or inhaled it.

June 5, MacPherson plead guilty to criminal negligence causing death and was sentenced to two years in prison and is hoping to access drug rehab programs while there. He'll also be on probation for two years

once his sentence is served.

McPhail plead guilty to failing to providing the necessaries of life and has been given a two year conditional sentence and will be on probation for one year.



# Former Plympton-Wyoming CAO has a new job in North Middlesex

Plympton-Wyoming's former CAO has found a new job. North Middlesex – a community which includes Parkhill – has hired Carolyn Tripp to be its next chief administrative officer.

Tripp was on a leave of absence from the Town of Plympton-Wyoming since mid-February at the same time as the then fire chief, Darryl Thompson. Mayor Gary Atkinson said she was on a medical leave.

By May 18, staff had been told the pair were no longer employed by the town. Several days later, when the municipality wished Thompson well in his future endeavors, there was no mention of Tripp.

June 7, North Middlesex issued a news release saying Tripp would be the next CAO adding the hiring "followed council's extensive recruitment and selection process that commenced in January of 2023.

"The process followed was fair, based on merit and included a comprehensive assessment of the skills, experience, knowledge and qualifications of candidates. Council concluded that Carolyn is the best qualified to have an immediate impact on the municipality and its community."

Mayor Brian Ropp added in the same release "Her leadership style and range of municipal experience will be a much needed and welcome addition to the municipality."

Tripp had been employed in Plympton-Wyoming since 2016 after leaving Midland in what she described as a conflict with the council of Midland.

# Lambton-Kent public board plans for \$2.6 million deficit

Trustees of Lambton Kent District School Board passed a budget projecting a deficit of \$2.6 million. And there will be reductions in staffing to help deal with the losses.

It is the first time the public board finds itself with a projected deficit.

There have been significant pressures on the budget. There have been changes to the transportation funding model, a change in funding Indigenous education and the elimination of the COVID-19 Learning Recovery Plan. Lambton-Kent's provincial funding has been cut in all three areas.

This was outlined in a report presented to trustees by Lambton Kent's Associate Director of Corporate Services Brian McKay. Trustees had a final look at the document June 6 and endorsed it.

A deficit is being projected in Indigenous education of \$1.6 million, while transportations services sits with a \$1.2 million deficit. The Lambton-Kent received \$3.3 million in COVID-19 funding which is now

The provincial government allows for school boards to carry deficits of no more than one percent of the organization's budget. McKay said one percent of the school's budget is \$2.7 million, so the projected deficit is within what is allowed.

He stressed this is just an estimate at this time. An increase in enrolment would mean more revenue in the school board's coffers. The Ministry of Education made changes to funding formulas and staff will be working to fully understanding these changes, he

Trustees also passed a deficit elimination plan, which is required when a budget, which is not balanced is passed.

Currently trustees receive quarterly reports on the financial situation of the school district from McKay. Trustees could make decisions based on these

reports in the coming school year, depending on the financial health of the organization.

The school board is careful that it doesn't impact educational programming for students, said McKay.

And while educational programming was not impacted, according to McKay, there will be other impacts. Reductions in supply staff, plant operations and retirement gratuities were made to reduce the impacts of these losses in funding, said McKay.

After McKay first outlined the funding issues in May, the office of the Minister of Education disputed many of the school board's projections of lost provincial funding, after a previous story was published by *The Independent*.

Officials in the minister's office said the province had increased the grants per student by 1.9 per cent this year, resulting in \$5.4 million in revenue and suggested revenue for transportation is also up nearly \$1 million.





# Brigden area family growing for others for a decade

For 10 years, the Piggott family near Brigden has been growing grain, but they're not getting paid for it

The 12-acre plot of land they plant each year is a grow project for the Canadian Foodgrains Bank.

Gary, Grant, and Bryan Piggott as well as Connie Classen are in charge of the Forget Me Not project sponsored by Brigden United Church and Grace United Church in Sarnia. Henry Reinders, the Ontario and Quebec Regional Representative for the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, stopped by the farm Tuesday to get a look at this years crop and explained the concept. "They grow the crop and sell the crop on the local market, and then the proceeds come to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank as a donation." The donations to Canadian Foodgrain Bank is matched by the Canadian government at a rate of \$4 for every dollar raised for food project.

The donations, like the one from Piggott's farm spread around the world to countries such as Pakistan,

Turkey, Syria, and Lebanon where natural disasters or crises have occurred. The most recent area that the Foodgrains Bank has donated to is the Horn of Africa where there is an ongoing drought.

Starting a project is not difficult according to Reinders: "You need to have a farmer or someone who is interested and access to some land...The land acquisition is a challenge, but if you've got a person who's got the desire [then] it's not that hard to get a church backing you...Once you've got those ingredients together, it can fall into

place very quickly."
There are around 30

and Sarnia, and there
are just over 200 'Grow
Projects' in Canada as a
whole.

### County OKs new drop-in center

Lambton County hopes to meet the needs of homeless people in Sarnia with a new drop in center.

The Housing and Homelessness Hub will be at the former Laurel-Lea St. Matthew's Presbyterian Church on Exmouth Street. It will be open weekdays from 12 pm to 4:30 pm to help people access snacks, restrooms, quiet spaces, computers and phones.

Officials add there will be people on site to help with accessing housing, harm reduction programs, mental health services and referrals to outside services including getting identification.

Melissa Fitzpatrick, the manager of homelessness prevent, says its hoped the center will be a "safe and inclusive space for those experiencing homelessness to access critical supports."

Recently, Sarnia City/County Councillor Chrissy McRoberts questioned the services provided to those who are living rough. While officials acknowledge the pilot project is a good start, there may be changes made as they see what services the users might need.

The center will be open until at least March.

# Banner year for Lancers track and field team at OFSAA

It's been a seven year medal drought for LCCVI at the provincial track and field championship, but in 2023 it poured.

Five LCCVI athletes made it to the OFSAA champion-ship and had top 15 finishes including three top three performances.

It's the first OFSAA track and field medals won since Marissa Mueller won gold for javelin in 2016.

Hunter Campbell won LCCVI's first medal in the Junior Men's Discus competition Thursday.

Campbell and his roommate for the weekend,
Hunter Mitchell, were keeping things light heading up to the competition watching the Bubble Guppies and Curious George.

"I was watching the most random kids shows and stuff, had to do that. And then I just got dialed in for the rest of the day. So, I went downstairs in the hotel gym and I did some bike up, staring down. I'm just visualizing all day so when I go in that circle, I was calm and ready," he told *The Independent*.

Campbell added there was "a lot of mentoring and a lot of visualizing and preparation going into that meet. So I'm really happy to all the hard work paid off."

Campbell threw 55.58m for the win. Last year he placed fourth with a throw of 43.02m.

Mitchell's time to shine came next, competing in the Novice Men's 100m Hurdle Sprint where he nabbed the silver with a time of 14.45s, 0.19 off the winning time.

Mitchell says he leaned in to the win.

"Once you hit that last hurdle, it's about three or four steps until you hit the finish line, so you just got to put your head down and go hard until you hit the line."

Ironically, the hurdles were not Mitchell's first choice in track.

"I used to do sprints and (the coaches) just thought I'd be a good hurdler, so they just kind of started making me do hurdles," he says. "I clicked with hurdles and I'm sticking with hurdles."

Friday, Charlie Shaw beat his personal best in the 1500m by four seconds in the Senior Men's competition. He came fifth with a time of 3:57.89, less than five seconds behind the winner.

"I ran a good race. I knew I definitely like had the potential to run faster because up until then, I just kind of ran as fast as I had to.

"In the finals, I was just like all out, like pedal to the metal, full out - it was the OFSAA final and that's what you're supposed to do."

Saturday was a busy day at the provincial meet.

Grade 11 student Jack Helps competed in the Senior Men's Javelin placing 11th with a throw of 45.13m.

Helps says he felt confident going into the competition knowing "there's some throwing a lot farther, but we're all in the same range."

James Grant made it to the finals of the Novice Men's

800m and placed eighth overall.

"At first I didn't think I could get finals, but then when I got it, no, I was not really satisfied with the race," he said Tuesday reflecting on the competition.

But Grant says it was an important learning experience that he'll use as he competes next year including "not sticking so hard on the inside and make sure I make my passes at the right timing so I don't over do myself for later in the race."

Meantime, Shaw - the only Grade 12 student at OFSAA for LCCVI - also had one more chance to win OFSAA glory with the 800m Saturday. Shaw had considered the 1500m his best race

"I thought because I had a good cross country season, I was like, 'Okay, I have a bit more endurance. 'Like, because the 800 is a lot of just speed, but I was like, I still have the good endurance, so I think I can be good at the 15(00m) on the track."

But the 800m proved to be Shaw's race at OFSAA. "The 800 was just a mess. It's the fastest race that everyone breaks lanes, so it just gets pushy, you get shove-y. I ran like a complete... maniac." I was pushing. I was shoving. A couple of people after the race said,

'Hey, you boxed me' and I was like, 'yep. - what are you gonna do? But that's just that's just the nature of the race. It's just so fast you really only have one move and I guess I timed it right."

Shaw clocked in at 1:55.25, two-thirds of a second behind the winner to claim the bronze.

The five Lancers are proud of the school's showing at OFSAA this year.

"Lancers kind of cleaned up this year, like we had three people go last year. And now we got three metals this year. So next year, we better be doing even better," says Shaw.

He's the only athlete who won't be returning next year. Shaw will be running cross country and track at the University of Guelph next year.

He and Campbell also plan to compete throughout the summer.

Bill led a remarkably rich life dedicated to his family and service to his community. He met his future wife, Jeanann Katherine Andrew, in high school. She recognized a gem in the rough and the two married shortly after graduation - a loving partnership which endured 61 years. The couple lived briefly in Sarnia, Ontario until Bill began training as a nuclear technician. He was hired as a First Operator at the las Point Nuclear ing Station and moved his family to Port Elgin, Ontario in 1966. Bill and Jeanann's family grew to include three children: Heather Anne (1963); Thomas Andrew (1966); and Jennifer Elizabeth (1969). In 1970 Bill joined a team of Ontario Hydro nuclear engineers who helped commission a new CANDU reactor in India. Following his return to Ontario, Bill worked briefly in Port Elgin before relocating again to Fredericton, New Brunswick where he helped plan the commissioning of the Point Lepreau Nuclear Generating Station. on the Parent's Advisory Council of the Rothesay Middle School, led the formation of the Fundy Solid Waste Action Committee, the installation of a new wastewater treatment facility and the construction of the new Rothesay Town Hall. He served as a Rothesay Town Council member for several years before serving as mayor for two terms from 1993-2001 and deputy mayor for another two terms. Bill played an instrumental role in the eventual amalgamation of Rothesay, East Riverside-Kingshurst, Fairvale, Renforth and Wells into one governing body. In addition to his life spent in community service, Bill stayed active in the Canadian nuclear industry following retirement from NB Power. He formed his own consulting company, traveling twice to Romania to work on CANDU projects in their newlyformed democratic republic. 



# National Indigenous Peoples Day 2023



OR GENERATIONS, many Indigenous groups and communities have celebrated their culture and heritage on June 21 or around that time of year because of the significance of the summer solstice as the longest day of the year.

National Aboriginal Day, now **National Indigenous Peoples Day**, was announced in 1996 by then Governor General of Canada, Roméo LeBlanc, through the Proclamation Declaring June 21 of Each Year as National Aboriginal Day. This was the result of consultations and statements of support for such a day made by various Indigenous groups:

 in 1982, the National Indian Brotherhood, now the Assembly of First Nations, called for the creation of National Aboriginal Solidarity Day

- in 1995, the Sacred Assembly, a national conference of Indigenous and non-Indigenous people chaired by Elijah Harper, called for a national holiday to celebrate the contributions of Indigenous Peoples
- also in 1995, the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples recommended the designation of a National First Peoples Day
- On June 21, 2017, the Prime Minister issued a statement announcing the intention to rename this day National Indigenous Peoples Day.

In various visual elements illustrating Indigenous cultures, the sun represents the summer solstice.

First Nations, Inuit and Métis as well as the four elements of nature (earth, water, fire and air) are represented by different symbols and colours.

The visual is supported by a multicoloured smoke\* reminding us of Indigenous spirituality but also the colours of the rainbow, symbol of inclusion and diversity of all First Nations, Inuit and Métis communities and their members.

\*Smoke is used in different ways by all three Indigenous groups in Canada. Whether it is to smoke fish and meat, to burn sage and tobacco, or for sacred ceremonies or celebrations, it is a significant symbol in Indigenous cultures.
