

# PW settles with fired firefighter

Plympton-Wyoming has settled a lawsuit launched by a former firefighter who said the town failed to investigate complaints about harassment.

But the town is saying little about the deal reached with Carrie Ann Wilson in a news release issued Tuesday.

Wilson filed a \$120,000 lawsuit against the municipality in July 2022 after a series of actions which led to her dismissal during the tenure of former fire chief Steve Clemens.

According to Wilson's statement of claim, after a fire truck crashed in a field, another senior firefighter had launched a verbal assault that left her "afraid for her safety."

Clemens, she said, had promised to investigate, but that probe ended in chaos with firefighters being let go and protests by citizens.

# Councillors, **Alvinston Optimist** under the microscope, again

Two members of Brooke-Alvinston council are under the microscope for their ties to a local service club.

It's the second time complaints have been launched against council members who also serve with the Alvinston Optimist Club.

In Jan. 2021, when Brooke-Alvinston decided to build a pavilion at the Brooke-Alvinston-Inwood Community Centre, the municipality went to the Integrity Commissioner with the same concerns after a public complaint. Now both Councillor Jenny Redick and Deputy Mayor Frank Nemcek are the subject of a complaint which Robert Swayze is again looking into. And Redick is frustrated by the move.

# Loosley hopes for early comeback

Petrolia Mayor Brad Loosley has always know heart problems run in his family. But when doctors told him he needed open heart surgery earlier this year, he was surprised.

The second-term mayor has been keeping a low profile lately, taking a leave of absence from council three months ago when doctors first told him he would need bypass surgery. Last week, council extended the leave until the end of the year, but Loosley isn't expecting to be gone that long.

He just needed some extra time to deal with a cardiac arrhythmia - basically an irregular heart beat - which has left him short of breath when talking or climbing stairs.

While the mayor's doctors only began active testing about a year and a half ago, Loosley says he's been aware of his heart health for some time since heart disease runs in his family.

"My dad died with a heart attack. My older brother passed away a year ago, he had heart problems. My younger brother's had stents put in," he told *The Independent* during an interview at his home Tuesday.

He and wife, Wendy, had just become patients of Dr. Enoch Daniel, who suggested they should take a deeper look just to make sure everything was alright.

Loosley went to the Dr. George Farag - Sarnia's main cardiologist - for some testing and later to London for more tests.

"The one day I was there, they wouldn't put the dye in it because they said there was way too much calcium around my heart ... so they couldn't see it. So then I went saw Dr. Farag again a couple of weeks later, he said 'there's something

wrong. I'm going to send you back for an angiogram."

Loosley says the procedure didn't take too long, but it took a while for the doctor to return. And when he did, he didn't have good news. "He came out and said 'you need open heart surgery' - so they showed me that picture of my heart and I could see where the lines were blocked or stopped so the blood wasn't getting to the other side of the heart."

Three weeks later, Loosley was in an operating room for six hours as surgeons repaired his heart. Five days later, he was headed to his son's home where Jay and his wife, Tina, a paramedic and nurse, could help care for him for the first couple of weeks.

Loosley says it took a while to breathe normally again - during the procedure, the lungs are collapsed and it takes some time and exercise to recover. And he was improving, although his voice was raspy because of the medical equipment. Then, Loosley found he was suddenly breathless.

"I'm walking. I can walk at a slow pace but as soon as I speed it up, holy cow or go up the stairs too fast," Loosley says shaking his head.

Doctors in Sarnia recognized the problem right away, saying his heart was simply going too fast.

Wendy says the top two chambers are "fluttering" and the bottom two are trying to keep up.

The arrhythmia can be fixed by stopping the heart.

"They will stop the heart and then they restarted with electric shocks... to try and get me back on my proper rhythm," he says. That's scheduled for late July.

"I don't expect to be off till Christmas," Loosley says. "There's no way. I just gotta get over this. And the reason I asked for the extension because of this cardioversion thing in July; I want to make sure everything's okay with that.

"I've had a few scares (with shortness of breath) that have told me I gotta slow down."

So, the mayor has been reading more novels than he ever has before.

He's also out for short walks with his wife three times a day and doing the exercises assigned by his doctors to regain his strength.

And he's been getting regular updates about council from Acting Mayor Joel Field.

"I read the papers, I got my iPad. I read the agendas and stuff to keep up with them. I skim it, but I don't get into details," he says admitting it hasn't been easy to slow down.

"I've always been kind of hyper...this is a big adjustment for me."





# Firefighter lawsuit settled 'to both parties satisfaction'

Wilson, according to the legal claim, discovered a camera left running in the Wyoming firehouse in 2017, early in Clemens career. She alleged the former fire chief was trying to find those still loyal to the former chief, who stepped away from the role of Wyoming district fire chief controversy when he was passed over for the job Clemens eventually filled.

The town hired a lawyer to investigate while Clemens was on leave and cleared him of any wrongdoing.

Wilson's claim says she went to the chief with two claims of harassment, one at a fire scene where a senior officer "shouldered his way" past her and yelled at her, another when the pumper truck she was in tipped into a ditch on a call. The same officer "berated her" for the incident at the call. According to the claim, the other firefighters restrained the man during the yelling match.

While Clemens said there would be an investigation, the scope of it morphed and eventually four

firefighters, Wilson and three other senior members of the Wyoming department, were fired. That lead to protest by citizens as they tried to understand what actually had transpired.

Since then, the town has settled with the three male officers involved, thanking them all for their service. But Wilson claims of wrongful dismissal remained unresolved. So, in July, a lawsuit was filed.

After nearly a year of legal discussion, the town announced Tuesday it had reached agreement with Wilson on her lawsuit in a one paragraph news release.

It reads in part, "The Town of Plympton-Wyoming would like to thank Ms. Wilson for her years of dedicated service to the community. In addition, it is confirmed that Ms. Wilson's departure from the Town was effected on a 'without cause' basis. As this matter has been resolved to both parties' satisfaction, neither the Town nor Ms. Wilson will be making any further comments."

The town did not say what the legal

# PW residents get their say on short-term rentals

The use of short-term rentals has been a hot political topic not only for those within Lambton County, but throughout Canada.

The Town of Plympton-Wyoming wants to know how people feel about short-term rentals and how it should be regulated.

"First we want to know, do people even want this," said County of Lambton Senior Planner Sarah Baldwin during an open house held at the Camlachie Community Centre on Tuesday after-

And even on a warm Tuesday afternoon, the event

drew some interest. There were as many as 15 people attending the open house in the first hour. Residents were given stickers and asked to answer questions on the panels placed around the room using the stickers to answer.

Some of the questions involved whether licensing short term rentals was important to them, whether they should only be allowed in specific zoning and whether the number of people staying at a short term rental should be limited.

The Town of Plympton-Wyoming conducted an online survey about the issue in April and May and

received 218 responses.

Another set of open houses is to be held on July 18. Baldwin said if the Town of Plympton Wyoming wants to go into more depth about gathering people's opinions

about the issue, the open houses in July can delve into what people would like to see with regulations.

The information be given to council with a decision expected in the fall.

# Integrity commissioner probes council/service club members

Redick says this complaint apparently came after council passed a contract with the Alvinston Optimist for the use of the pavilion.

Redick and Nemcek, both Optimist members, voted in favour of the deal, as did the rest of council

Sometime after the vote, a complaint was launched, which Clerk Janet Denkers says is now in the hands of the Integrity Commissioner. She's not clear if a full investigation is already underway.

But Redick is confused by the action, saying this matter was deal with under the former council.

In Dec. 2020, council moved ahead agreeing to move forward with a pavilion project from the Optimists.

A letter, addressed to the mayor and council and included in the minutes the next meeting, questioned whether the Optimist members were in conflict over moving the project forward. Council was split on the decision.

Council reviewed it in Jan. 2021 and

decided to ask Integrity Commissioner Robert Swayze to weigh in.

By February, he responded that then Councillor Jamie Armstrong and Nemcek were able to make decision on the project.

"They are both members of the club but I understand they are volunteers and not paid as members. I also understand that neither of them is in the building business and will not benefit in any way from the construction of the building except as members of the community," he wrote.

"In my opinion, the two members do not have a pecuniary interest in the construction of the building and therefore do not contravene the MCIA (Municipal Conflict of Interest Act.) It is not required that they declare a conflict on any related matter coming before council."

Swayze added if they feel they can't be impartial they could chose to declare a conflict, but that would mean their vote would be against the project. Redick says this appears to be

virtually the same situation since the rental agreement would see money returned to the municipality, not the councillors.

"I went back and looked, the Integrity Commissioner at the time found no pecuniary interest, because there was no exchange of money. I wasn' benefiting it from it, neither was my family," she tells The Independent. "I just find it's a real shame that it has to happen again.

With small municipalities that don't have the bodies to go around to do good things for our community, and you rely on user groups and volunteers; if we didn't have the volunteers and the user groups that we have, we would be like a ghost town."

Redick adds politics attracts the same type of community-minded people as those who join service clubs.

"We want better the community; that's why I went on council I want to better my community. That's why I joined the Optimist because they do so much for the municipality."

# Editorial

## Same issue, likely same result

You can sense Brooke-Alvinston Councillor Jenny Redick's frustration as she explains the complaint she faces over her conduct.

Redick and Deputy Mayor Frank Nemcek are under the microscope of the Integrity Commission after another complaint about service club members who also serve on council voting on issues which affect the service club.

It must be a sensitive topic in the town because this is the second time in the last two years it has been raised.

Redick and Nemcek are both members of council and members of the Alvinston Optimist Club. The club, over the past five years or so, has worked to improve the arena and let's say the discussions have been prickly at times.

In Dec. 2020, after council, in a split decision, agreed to the Optimists' plans for a pavilion, a resident wrote to the mayor and council asking whether then Councillor Jamie Armstrong and Nemeck - both Optimists - were in conflict making the decision. Council decided to ask the Integrity Commissioner - who is of course paid by taxpayers dollars to investigate whether politicians are following the Municipal Conflict of Interest Act.

The commissioner didn't do a deep dive into the issue; instead he asked the pair if they were going to make any money from the project. The answer was no.

Unless someone is personally benefiting financially from a decision, the commissioner said, there is no conflict.

Last month, Redick and Nemcek were again centred out as Optimist members when an user agreement with the club for the pavilion was passed. And now the commissioner is looking into the same issue again at the taxpayers' expense.

It's clear the Optimist members who are on council championed the cause then and now but that, according to the Integrity Commissioner in 2021, is not a problem.

If voters have a problem with Optimist members voting for Optimist projects, they should elect council members who aren't Optimist members instead of wasting taxpayers dollars for a second opinion which will surely have the same result.



# **OPP investigating dugout incident at Greenwood**

Lambton OPP are investigating after two dugouts at Greenwood Park were damaged.

But town officials are saying little about the event or whether anyone was injured in the incident.

Sources told *The Independent* that children were on the roof of the dugouts in May. That in itself is not unusual - teens can often be seen climbing on top of the dugouts during town events such as fireworks.

But this time, sources say, at least one of the concrete dugouts collapsed. It's believed two of the people involved were injured and taken to hospital.

Today, the dugouts are gone and two wooden benches remain.

Petrolia's Chief Administrative Officer, Rick Charlebois, in an email to The Independent, said "We have

no comment, as it is an active police investigation.

"It is true that there are benches in place of the dugouts currently, and as we can obtain quotes and more detailed information regarding replacement options we will be coming to council with a report for their consideration.'

Lambton OPP were not immediately available to comment on the investiga-

Lily Duff had "no idea" Dawn-Euphemia council was about to name her Senior of the Year.

"They told me I was coming to sign for a drain, that's all I knew about."

It was not until Mayor Alan Broad read out her name that Duff, 91, realized she was the 2023 recipient the

Duff has lived in Dawn-Euphemia for over 60 years. When she isn't completing typical farm work like driving the tractor and doing cattle chores, Duff knits clothing for those in need.

"It's mostly the knitting that I do... I'm always at the church. But I don't do a lot anymore because I feel I've had my day of it. But I'm thankful for the health I have."

In the past year, Duff has made over 100 baby blankets and donated them to

hospital patients. She also knits baby afghans and hats for the McMaster Children's Hospital in Hamilton which are then given to high-risk neo-natal babies in the NICU.

Regardless of her many accomplishments, Broad said Duff's "most important attribute is her kindness. She is humble and does not tell many people of her random acts of kindness.

"Living on her own in the country at this age and driving shows her independence and determination many of her age are not do so," Broad says.

"She's a 91 year-old woman who is making a difference."

Duff was stunned by the award, downplaying her role in the commun-

ity.
"That is nice. I can't believe it. I'm shocked."

"It's more something to do because I don't feel like I want to be doing housework all the time. And so this

# Krall Park washrooms over budget, put on hold

Krall Park will not be getting new washrooms, at least this year.

This came after the bids on the project were reviewed at the Enniskillen Township meeting on June 19 and were well over budget.

Mayor Kevin Marriott says one of the bids came in over \$160,000 over budget at approximately \$490,000. The budgeted amount for the project was

At this point the township is going

to review all options from downsizing the existing project, to renovating what is already there. Enniskillen had constructed new washrooms at the Marthaville Park last year and Marriott said the company who did that work would be approached to give an estimate on what had been built at Marthaville. Council can then see the full extent of how inflation has affected

Another option is to look at mobile washrooms. These units are big, have washrooms for both men and women and have running water, he said

The mayor said the senior levels of government have already said making changes to the project will mean a delay of three to six months, so this will delay the project until at least next year.

Enniskillen Township received an Ontario Community Improvement Program grant in February 2021. The federal government was to contribute \$121,550, while the provincial government was kicking in \$101,281 and the township covering the remainder. The existing washrooms are approximately 50 years old.





Manning says he's been suprised by some of the history of the community he has learned since the 150 Committee began its work.

"I always knew that there was smaller settlement here and another one outside of town. With the way that the railroad came through, splitting in two Saunders Corners and Brown's Corners... it was actually almost instantly that Watford started migrating to the tracks as opposed to the little settlements and even though that was like 20 years before Watford

was founded, it was built up almost instantly and that was kind of neat," he says.

Manning also learned the site of the Dollar Store was once a factory. "Seeing things that were there that you didn't realize were there and it's kind of like a fun, little mysteries and trying to solve them like that."

The committee also learned the interesting origins of the first fairground building. "The Crystal Palace being in Watford, which is a really neat looking building, it used to sit where our arena is. We found out that actually it was a military building built for the Fenian wars in Warwick and it was actually brought to Watford to become a fairground," Manning recounts. And there is some urban legends attached to the building as well. Manning says its said the settlers "picked it up and they had people

carry it almost all the way here."

Manning says there will be lots of interesting history on display this weekend, with families contributing old photos to share with the community for the special event. Many of those were from the 100th anniversary celebrations.


- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease a 12 cup muffin pan or line with paper baking cups.

# 'Record breaking crowds' at Alvinston Pro Rodeo say organizers



## Lambton looks at rural transport

Warwick Mayor Todd Case wants to take another look at a regional bus service.

Case raised the issue recently at Lambton County Council after hearing from his constituents.

The issue was considered over five years ago, but nothing materialized. Case says recently people have been approaching him about the idea, saying seniors and college students alike could use a service that brings them to Sarnia.

Case believes they're seeing the new municipal service operate in the Strathroy area and want a similar service here.

"I may have heard about it, maybe, you know, maybe half a dozen times in my previous 18 years. But I've heard about it in the last little while from a few different folks."

Case says while a rural transportation system could help existing residents, it could also be a tool for attracting others.

"People choose to live in some of these smaller communities and quite like the lifestyle and if we could figure out a transportation system that could get them from A to B, making a lot easier to be able to continue living in an area like that. And they may even attract more people that may want to live in the small town rural part of the county, knowing that they can connect to their job," he says.

County council asked staff to review the past study and bring it back to the politicians to discuss future options for a rural transport system.

It's Seniors' Month and the OPP is warning the elderly are the biggest targets of scams.


The Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre says seniors lost \$138 million in 2022 and only five to 10 per cent of the victims report the crime.

McGugan was always looking for the next great thing including growing identity preserved beans to the international market for over 40 years He was also was one of the earliest proponents of conservation tillage and he planted comparative research plots on his farm to help prove its effectiveness to other crop producers.

The pair have been active in the community with the local agricultural society, Lambton Rural Child Care and Anne as a member of the Women's Institute for years.

Don- who was active in both municipal and farm politics for decades - was

also part of the group to organize the Central Lambton Family Health Team.

The Dickensons are being honoured for their dedication to preserving the land, raising quality animals and helping to grow strong leaders in the farm community.

# Author, researcher wants Workman's murder case reviewed

On the 150th anniversary of the hanging of Mooretown resident Elizabeth Workman for the murder of her allegedly abusive husband, local author and researcher Bob McCarthy is calling on the federal government to review the case.

McCarthy has carefully researched her case and written several books about it after examining the trial papers and finding evidence that Elizabeth Workman was a victim of domestic abuse.

Workman is the only woman to be executed in Sarnia despite calls for clemency and a petition signed by 1,500 men and 60 women insisting she deserved mercy.

It was an issue in 1873 and it's still an issue, McCarthy said.

"Abuse of women is not a new problem. The jury said, we think she's guilty but shouldn't be executed. The jury asked for mercy."

The trial transcript from the court proceedings in Sarnia described Elizabeth Workman as "a sober industrious woman of good character who worked hard to support her husband and child though often deprived by her husband of her earnings as soon as obtained."

It went on to say that James Workman, her husband, "often forcibly took the earnings of his wife and spent it in drunkenness and debauchery and often beat and threatened

the life of his said wife."

That in itself, is evidence enough to suggest Elizabeth Workman was abused. said

McCarthy. He spoke to about 75 people at

three venues on Monday including St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Sarnia, Mooretown's library and The Book Keeper in Sarnia.

McCarthy is looking for signatures on a new petition asking that the government review the case and hopes the petition will be presented to Governor General Mary Simon. Copies are available at The Book Keeper at Northgate Plaza.

Workman is the only woman ever found guilty and executed under Canadian law following a trial where the judge or jury recommended mercy.

When she was hung on June 19, 1873 in the same location as Wagg's Restaurant today, her body

was dropped in a hole dug below. McCarthy believes it is still there.

Jennifer Vansteenkiste, executive director of the Women's Interval Home, endorses McCarthy's effort and believes a review of the Workman case is important, even 150 years later.

"When Bob is successful in overturning Elizabeth Workman's conviction, this will be yet another example of how justice comes too

late for victims of intimate partner violence," Vansteenkiste said. Bill C-233 or Keira's Law (The

Judicial Education on Intimate Partner Violence and Coercive Control), calls for intimate partner violence and coercive control training for all federal judges, she

"Bob's petition will strengthen the call for provincial judges to receive the same training.

Vansteenkiste said McCarthy has documented an important piece of local history that "demonstrates the complexities of intimate partner violence and how it can result in tragedy for both the victim and the perpetrator."
