Waylon's mom launches \$9M lawsuit

The mother of the Petrolia toddler who nearly drowned after falling into a pool at day care says he has "suffered permanent impairment and significant disability" when doors in the Petrolia home were left open to air out a basement after a flood.

Gillian Burnett has filed a \$9 million lawsuit on behalf of her son, Waylon Saunders, and her family in the wake of the incident.

Waylon was 20 months old when he returned to daycare as his mom went back to work. Burnett placed the toddler and his sister in care with Paula Maness Slaght at a home on Juniper Crescent.

On Jan. 24, Waylon went out of a door in the back of the home and ended up in the pool for about five minutes. Firefighters and health care providers at Petrolia's Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital worked for three hours to revive him. When this heart began to beat again, he was transferred to hospital in London where he was placed in a coma in the hopes he would recover.

Waylon was given just a 10 per cent chance to live. After two weeks, he was up and walking and released.

The lawsuit filed in court last week, says the affects of the near drowning will be long lasting. "There are many unknowns about his

immediate and long-term health as a result of the brain trauma he suffered," writes lawyer Matthew Dale in the suit naming Slaght, the owners of the home, Dani, Brooklyn, Robert and Maria Maola, and the Sarnia-Lambton Childrens' Aid Society.

"He has suffered deterioration of behaviour, cognition and communicative skills. He has been left with paralysis on his left side, potential blindness in his left eye, communications changes, and issues with his fine motor skills," the suit alleges adding the toddler has "suffered permanent impairment and significant disability."

Petrolia won't build child care center

If there is to be a new child care center built in Petrolia, Lambton County will have do it. But the town would offer land to get the job done.

That's from a report to council from staff on a request from parents for the town to open a facility to ease the day care crisis in the community.

The Petrolia Advocacy Group came to council in March saying there are about 340 children in the town of day care age but only 85 child care spaces. Parents, they said, were applying for day care as soon as they found out they were expecting however a space wasn't available by the time the child was born and parental leave

They advocated building a centre similar to what Goderich built 35 years ago.

There are more childcare options on the

way. A new federal/provincial program will create 541 new day care spaces in Lambton – 67 are slated for Petrolia and Wyoming. County officials say they will focusing on licensing home day care providers since the province is offering only \$90 per square foot to build new child care centres when the going construction rate is up to \$400 per square foot.

Monday, in an extensive report to council, staff estimates it would cost between \$3 and \$5 million to build a child care center for 49 children. It's also estimated the center would run at a deficit of about \$850,000 for the first ten years requiring a 15 per cent tax increase to cover the costs.

Staff added there are no specific programs for child care centers for municipalities, that money is funnelled through the County of Lambton.

Instead, staff suggested a number of ways Petrolia could help ease the crisis.

Town-run day care not feasable

Day care advocates say building not the only solution to child care crisis in Petrolia

Staff suggested, and council agreed, to lobby the provincial government to allow licensed providers to give care to two children for before and after school care. That, says the report, would provide much needed care and also encourage unlicensed day cares to become licensed subject to the county's regulation system.

Council also agreed to offer land to Lambton County at the Oil Heritage Community Centre to build a child care centre if they needed it.

Chief Administrative Officer, Rick Charlebois, says Lambton County's first question to him when he inquired about day care sites was "do you have land?"

Councillor Ross O'Hara expressed concern about the plan saying the town should not take over any building for child care since it would incur an operating deficit which would have to be paid by local taxpayers.

Kate Wagar of the advocacy group was sitting in the council chambers. She was disappointed the town decided against moving forward with a municipal centre but had some hope.

"Anything that has the potential to come to fruition, I'm going to support. Obviously, timing is of the essence, though, I mean, the situation is getting literally worse by the month. ... A build would take a really, really long time - minimum of five years - before

we would see something. So, it's just a little bit discouraging," she says.

And Wagar says the situation for families looking for child care gets worse by the

As for the new spaces for before and after school care, Wagar says "I do appreciate that being looked into, however, they did say specifically for licensed ...if you think of how many licensed home childcare providers are within our town, does that even do anything for Petrolia? Yeah, maybe 10 students, maybe 12?"

Wagar says the advocacy group is not about to give up on the idea of more child care in Petrolia. She says the town needs to think about repurposing other buildings or working in concert with the Petrolia Y to provide spaces sooner rather than later.

Wagar says county officials at a May 16 presentation about licensed home day cares said "their big word was creativity. 'We can work creatively, we can make any home a home daycare.' If you're that creative, okay, let's take those creativity wheels and let's look at what other options we have."

Wagar says the advocacy group wants the town to help move the issue forward.

"I think we just have to let them know like, 'okay, the county says, we can't do it this way.' But we've thought maybe we can offer it this way and see if that's a workaround.

"We're not looking to do something, you know, illegal or unsafe or anything; we don't want to go against legislation or anything but there has to be another way," says Wagar.

"We can't just do things the way that we've always done because we've always done them that way, if that way isn't working anymore.

Lawsuit filed after toddler falls in pool

The lawsuit adds the boy's care is expected to cost \$1 million.

The legal action sheds some light on what may have happened that day. "It appears Ms Slaght left the doors of the home open to the backyard swimming pool to air out the defendant premises following a basement flood," it contends.

Slaght has also been charged with criminal negligence causing bodily harm in the incident. The allegations in the lawsuit and criminal charges have not been proven in court yet.

Burnett's suit, which was filed on behalf of Waylon, his father, siblings and grandparents, says Slagt failed to provide 'adequate supervision, allowing for apparent hazards to exist, failing to prevent or attempt to prevent injury to Waylon.

It also accuses the 50 year-old of "being an incompetent childcare service provider, lacking in reasonable skill, judgement, education, training or experience and who ought not to have attempted to operate a child care service and supervise children... and creating a perpetuating a situation of danger from which Waylon was unable to extricate himself.'

The civil suit also says Maolas - the owners of the home - "failed to maintain the premises in a reasonably safe condition" and failed "to take any active measures to address the cause of the unsafe condition, failing to take reasonable care to prevent injury to Waylon when they knew or ought to have known of the unsafe condition caused by the unsecured swimming pool."

The lawsuit also accuses them of "failing to inspect the premises" since they are "responsible for its physical maintenance

and ensure the safety of people there." And there was a troubling accusation

leveled against the Sarnia-Lambton Children's Aid Society. The lawsuit alleges the CAS failed "to conduct any or any adequate investigation of Ms Slaght and her suitability to provide care for children" and failing to inspect the premises, to ensure there was in an and danger, failing to investigate or otherwise act in response

to previous

complaints or reports of child neglect." Burnett's lawsuit calls that a "gross dereliction of duty."

CAS Executive Director Dawn Flegel tells *The Independent* the organization has not yet received the lawsuit but will file a statement of defense when it does.

Flegel could not speak to the allegations of failing to investigate previous complaints from the same day care provider.

Campbell House may be demolished

It appears time may be running out for the original home of the man who donated the land for the AW Campbell Conservation Area

Nearly two years after a structural engineer told the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority the home perched at the top of the hill near the entry to the Alvinston area park needed extensive work done so it wouldn't collapse, the board of directors agreed to ask Brooke-Alvinston council for a permit to demolish the house.

And it's not sitting well with local councillors.

In July 2022, Dejan Popovic, a senior structural engineer at VPN Engineering completed a report of the historic home of Archie Campbell, the man who donated 308 acres for the AW Campbell Conservation Area. He said: "Leaving the house in the current condition is not an option. It will inevitably lead to further gradual deterioration and eventual collapse of the structure. The collapse, partial or overall, will likely happen abruptly and without a warning once the remaining residual strength, or the integrity, or the stability of the system are exhausted... significant parts of the structural system like, foundation walls and roof structure need to be completely replaced."

But the community, including some of Campbell's relatives asked for time to raise money to restore the home, saying it was a registered historic building and one of the last original farmhouses in the area.

Friends of Campbell Park organized the repair of the roof and sealed up some of the problem areas shortly after the board of directors gave a reprieve to the property. But Thursday, staff returned to the board with the same report and a history of the fight to save the building. The report also outlined that replacing the heritage structure with

a replica building would likely cost up to \$520,000.

"The building has no current or future planned use and the cost of restoration or constructing a replica is not feasible for the authority," said Greg Wilcox, manager of conservation areas.

Without much discussion, the board agreed to apply for a permit to demolish the house.

At Brooke-Alvinston council the same day, Councillor Don McCabe talked about the decision.

"I'm extremely disappointed that Campbell House has gotten to the state it is in because to me, it's just a complete disregard for the heritage designation that was placed by Ross McCabe and council of the day at that time plus all the demolition of anything further west ...everything back up in there now is toast," he says.

Deputy Mayor Frank Nemcek - who served on the conservation authority board when the issue came up - said this is the latest in a series of buildings at the park which have been neglected then torn down.

"We tried to save the old sugar shack, they tore it down. We tried to keep the old train station; its gone," Nemcek says.

"So, the only thing we had left was the Campbell House and when that first came to the board, what two three or a couple years ago now, it was set in stone, they just let us talk on."

Nemcek says the authority still has to ask for the demolition permit and both he and McCabe believe there should be some conditions on it to ensure Archie Campbell's legacy is not forgotten.

Nemcek says even though the building is in tough shape, people still come to the area to have their photos taken in front of the historic home.

"It's such a beautiful spot there and now I guess, it's gonna be all grass," he says. "When the time comes, I'd like to see some stipulations put down on it."

PW officially owns Highland Glen, McEwen

It's official; Plympton-Wyoming now owns both Highland Glen and McEwen Park - pending any appeals.

The St. Clair Region Conservation Authority approved two agreements which see the municipality take over the Lake Huron parks in their jurisdiction for just one dollar.

It is a deal which is four years in the making.

The former township of Plympton turned over McEwen Park - it was then called Plympton Park - to the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority in the 1980s for \$1. It also turned over Highland Glen. The idea was the conservation authority was better equipped to care for the lakefront park.

But in May 2019, the town council wasn't satisfied with the condition of McEwen Conservation Area and started negotiations to take over the management and eventually the ownership of the park.

Then, the conservation authority shut down the boat

ramp at Highland Glen. After two seasons without lake access, councillors decided the municipality should ask for control at Highland Glen as well so the town could fix the boat launch - something the conservation authority said was going to be too expensive.

The authority agreed to the ideas and operating agreements were worked out which allowed Plympton-Wyoming to complete repairs on the boat launch earlier this year.

But the official ownership of the land remained with the conservation authority; the deal needed the approval of the provincial government and that was taking some time.

Thursday, the board of directors was finally able to sign the agreements. Provincial legislation changed; the minister's approval was no longer necessary.

The agreements do, however, restrict what the town will be able to do with the land. The sale aims to protect the naturalized state of the land. No commercial, residential or industrial development will be allowed. There will be no commercial logging and it can't be used for commercial or sport hunting. If that happens, the authority could take legal action, according to the agreement.

There has to be a less expensive day care alternative

Penny Kearney knows there are families who may never find a space at the Petrolia nursery school she

The wait list at the Petrolia cooperative is so long, a family can apply the minute they learn they're expecting a child and still not have a place to bring their child once parental leave ends nearly two years

The situation at Kiddies Korner isn't unusual in Lambton. There are few options for families other than begging family to help out when both parents want or need to work.

So, it's not surprising there was disappointment when the Town of Petrolia came to the conclusion it was too expensive to build a municipal child care centre.

The staff looked at a facility in Goderich which has been providing service for over 30 years and found they ran a deficit - similar to what the town's arena and community centre run each year - which is covered by taxpayers money. The report said that deficit would likely mean a double digit tax increase. Not something politicians nor taxpayers really want to hear.

But, perhaps what town staff envisioned wasn't completely necessary. We've often seen municipal governments build offices, arenas and community centers far more elaborate than necessary. We'd suggest that building a brand new building is beyond our means, but that doesn't mean a municipally run centre is out of the question.

The town already contracts out services to the Southwestern Ontario YMCA at the Oil Heritage Centre, they run child care centers all over the province. Perhaps they would have ideas on how the town could use an existing space or well build modules to set up a day care.

While we appreciate a multi-million dollar facility is out of Petrolia taxpayers price range, there should be more exploration of alternatives. Without that, it will become harder to attract young families to Petrolia and to keep those who are already here.

Back to Brooke Central in September

Students and staff at Brooke Central Public School will be back in their classes in Alvinston when the next school year begins again on Sept. 5.

Lambton Kent District School Board trustees were given the good news at its meeting June 20.

Associate Director Brian McKay said the emergency project will cost \$1.3 million, within the budget set aside for the project.

Work on the sections of Brooke Central built in 1960 and 1967 was completed by the end of May. Superintendent Gary Girardi said the school board consulted with staff, the community and the school council to decide on what would be the best time to officially return to the school. While a return in June was an option it was decided to have the last day of school on June 27 with the remaining three days in June used to packing up classrooms and moving materials back to Brooke Central.

"I believe the community will be happy to back in their school," said Trustee Jane Bryce.

Physical education classes moved outside in June for the senior students who remained at the newer section of the school as the gym was closed for further roof repair. The main office at Brooke Central was also reopened in early June.

There will be the closure of classrooms in the newer section of the school on July 3 to allow for roof work over the summer.

Lambton Kent District School Board moved classes out of the building in November when an engineer's report revealed the roof in the older sections of the school map would collapse if there is a snowfall greater than 12 inches of snow.

The school board was preparing for routine summer roof maintenance at the school at the time of the discovery.

Students have been attended classes at Lambton Central and East Lambton public schools with students in Grade 6 to 8 remaining at Brooke Central.

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Lightning strike likely cause of Croton fire

A lightning strike is the likely cause of an early morning fire Monday which destroyed a hay barn in Croton near Dresden.

Emma Butler of J&E Meats said in a social media post this morning they received a call around 4 am that their hay and straw barn was on fire.

"We were all holding our breath that the burning debris wouldn't get carried to the nearby barn where our cattle and sheep are," she said.

Crews from the Dresden and Thamesville fire departments arrived and were able to contain the damage to the hay and straw barn.

Butler calls it a "devastating loss for our farm" since the barn contained the "entire crop of hay and all of our straw for our animals.

"There was no salvaging of any of the hundreds of bales of hay or straw and the equipment inside the shed.

"The only silver lining to this is that it is almost wheat season so we should soon hopefully get some more

hay crop," Butler added. The family has been encouraged by the concern of neighbours. "We are so grateful to the Dresden and Thamesville fire departments for controlling the burn and doing all they could to manage it."



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Vandalism caused dugout collapse: Menzies

Vandalism appears to have been the cause of the collapse of dugouts at Greenwood Park in Petrolia.

Lambton OPP are investigating after two dugouts the diamond south of the Petrolia Lion's hall collapsed sometime around the May long weekend.

Sources have told The Independent that children were on the roof of the dugouts. Teens can often be seen climbing on top of the dugouts during town events such as fireworks. But this time, sources say, at least one of the concrete dugouts collapsed. It's believed two of the people involved were injured and taken to hospital.

The dugouts have been removed and two wooden benches remain.

Petrolia's Chief Administrative Officer, Rick Charlebois, in an email to The Independent, said last week "We have no comment, as it is an active police investigation.

"It is true that there are benches in place of the dugouts currently, and as we can obtain quotes and more detailed information regarding replacement options we will be coming to council with a report for their consideration.'

Minutes of the Petrolia Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee in Monday night's council package show committee members were also concerned, asking questions about the collapse of the dugouts as well.

"Nicole Gould asked about the rumour regarding the dugout collapse at Greenoowd Diamond #2," the minutes state "and inquired about the proper inspection for the dugouts."

The minutes continued saying Dave Menzies, the director of parks, recreation and facilities, told the group about the incident saying "vandalism occurred causing the dugout collapse.

"Dave (Menzies) explained that dugouts and playground equipment is inspected on a monthly basis and that new more modern dugouts will be installed in the near future.'

The status of the police investigation is not clear.

The Independent has inquired three times by email to the Lambton OPP about the incident over the past week and have yet to receive any information about the investigation.

WM wants to bring excess soil to Watford

It remains to be seen if Warwick Township has hit pay dirt again with the Twin Creeks landfill.

Waste Management officials have approached council asking it to start discussions about allowing up to 11 million tons of soil over the course of a number of years, to be accepted at the Watford area site. That would be above and beyond the 1.4 millions of tonnes of household waste it already accepts each year. Warwick Township has an agreement with WM which sees it paid per tonne of garbage brought into the landfill and the bringing in soil would add to it.

Wayne Jenken, WM Landfill Engineering Manager, says it is looking to forge an agreement in a new area - excess soil.

Jenken told council Monday the province has recently changed regulations surrounding soils, how it can be used at the landfill site and how it can be reused in the community.

WM uses excess soil - which includes contaminated soils, shredded auto parts and wood chips to help cover the household waste which comes to the site. But Jenken says the company has a hard time attracting the soil it needs for the job.

Waste Management wants to reduce the rate it charges for excess soil to attract more for its daily cover needs. Jenken says it wants to bring in about 168,000 metric tonnes a year. And new provincial regulations will allow the landfill to use the excess soil for things such as screening berms as well.

The company estimates it could bring in up to 11 million metric tonnes to use on site, if the municipality would approve the move, a "site specific fill management plan in consideration of non-potable groundwater standards" and negotiate

a new revenue sharing agreement to allow the Twin Creeks landfill to accept the excess soils for reuse.

Jenken says there is a need in central Ontario for the service and there is a real market opportunity for WM to provide it.

And Jenken says there is a possiblity the company could resell up to five million metric tonnes of the excess soil to other users.

Jenken says the plan is in the very early stages of development and proposed township representives would meet with WM officials to work out revenue sharing agreements first. Then the company would put together a plan for the municipality to review.

If Warwick approved the move, Waste Management would need a site plan amendment to accept the excess soil in Watford and an amendment to the Environmental Certificate of Approval.

In his obituary, the family said Triest was a life-long proud farmer and later in life loved meeting his friends at the local co-op for coffee in the morning.


And, the obituary notes, he was a member of the Alvinston Ecumenical Choir, the St. Matthew's Choir and the St. Charles Choir for 71 years.

John and Jeannie Minten met Kelly and Frances Olson by chance during an Alaskan cruise. Little did the couples know they had a hometown in common - kind of.

The Mintens, from Watford, Ontario, were talking to the Olsons of North Dakota on that cruise ship in 2019 when they found out they, too, were from Watford but in the US.

They were delighted by the coincidence. "They told us where they were from and when we told them where we were from, we were just going like, 'whoa, we gotta take pictures," says John.

But that was just the beginning of the story. It turned out the two towns shared more than just a name connection.

Frances later told the Mintens, Watford, North Dakota was actually named by a man from Watford, Ontario.

"North Dakota was about 40 years behind Watford, Ontario," she said. "There were similarities because you ended up here because the railroad, we ended up because of the railroad.

"The railroad was supposed to be going from Lewistown, Montana to Rockford, North Dakota, got to what's now Watford and stopped because of the gearing up for the war effort needing the steel and all that kind of stuff and it never did go any further. So, the county seat was five miles east town called Schafer. And gradually people started moving from Schafer to the end of the railroad.

"Well, you had we had a doctor in Schafer, his name was Bob Morris. He was born here and this Watford and he suggested the name for the new village of Watson, which was accepted. And then this post was approved it but then a few years later, they're added city because mail was getting mixed up between white and Woolford."

Olson adds the towns were quite similar, farm communities with some trades and eventually the oil industry.

Olson also found a photo of Dr Morris' office which eventually moved to Watford, although its not clear how the Ontario man ended up in North Dakota in the early 1900s.

The Olsons and Mintens kept in touch and Frances sent the Minten's a copy about her Watford's history. When the Watford 150 Committee was set up to plan the party, John set out to connect with Frances - who is a history buff. After a little sleuthing, he found her number and invited her to come for the weekend.

So, Frances and Kelly drove 22 hours to be part of Watford, Ontario's 150th celebration.

"I love this kind of stuff," says Frances, who works at her local museum.

The North Dakota couple arrived in time for the Friday opening ceremonies and Saturday took in all the sites, particularly enjoying watching the Searson Sawmill at work.

Sunday night, they were the guests of honour at the final community banquet before they started making their way back to the other, much younger Watford.







Petrolia councillors could soon be able to attend meetings remotely.


The town has agreed to move ahead with a new audio/visual system in the council chambers to broadcast meetings live to YouTube.

Town staff originally estimated the equipment would cost \$60,000. The town budgetted \$40,000 this year and planned to complete it in 2024.

But Monday, Laurissa Ellsworth, manager of marketing arts and commuications, told council the contractor's final cost for phase one would be about \$41,000. However, adding equipment to allow presentations to be shown and allow hybrid meetings - the second phase - would cost an additional \$15,000.

Council agreed to move ahead with the full project with the money coming from the 2022 budget surplus.

Council would have to change its official procedures if it wishes to have hybrid meetings.

New Brigden day care fills a big need

Penny Kearney knows there is a big need for day care.

That's why the director of the Kiddies Korner Co-Op from Petrolia was smiling widely Saturday as the school showed off its new building in Brigden.

Board members Ross George and Mark Steadman, both members of the Masonic Lodge in Brigden, told Kearney the group was selling their building and Kiddies Korner should expand into the community which has a large number of young families.


The board agreed and a twoyear project began. Funding for the \$300,000 renovation came from Lambton County. "It was literally gutted, top to bottom... completely gutted right down to the bare walls and bones."

The first floor, which can have 16 children a day, opened in November with 28 families finding spots for their children. Saturday, Kearney and board members showed the community the upstairs of the new

facility with 16 more spaces which will be ready for another 28 families once the furniature arrives.

And while a large number of families are finding a place for their children with the Brigden opening, Kearney knows more needs to be done.

"We have an a huge waitlist at both sites. Petrolia is full," she says adding there are more than 60 families on the Petrolia waiting list which likely will never get a spot because the list is simply too long.

Mosquito Larviciding set to begin in Lambton County

Catch basin larviciding is set to begin late June and will continue until September 2023. Lambton Public Health will be monitoring and larviciding catch basins on public property, under the authority of the local Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Karolyn Dueck, to control vector mosquito larvae that have the ability to transmit West Nile virus.

Larvicide will be applied by Pestalto Environmental Health Services Inc., a Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks licensed operator with licensed pesticide exterminators and qualified pesticide technicians, contracted by Lambton Public Health.

Within this time period three separate applications of the pellet formula of the larvicide: Altosid Pellets (PCP#21809, pellet), Mosquiron 0.12 CRD (PCP#31079, ingot) will be applied at 21+ day intervals. It will be placed in up to 16,500 catch basins in urban settings in Lambton County.

The Larvicide B.t.i (Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis): VectoBac 200G (PCP#18158, granule), VectoBac 1200L (PCP#21062, liquid), will be used in affected stagnant water on public lands in Urban areas in Lambton County where there is ample evidence of vector mosquito larvae present.

Please Prepare to Stop

Pestalto technicians wearing safety vests, will apply larvicide by hand to roadside catch basins while on a motorized scooter that has a "Slow-Moving Vehicle" sign, along with an MOECP 2023 Applicator sticker on the vehicle. Passenger vehicles may also be used and will be equipped with the same signage, along with a flashing beacon and Pestalto insignia.

Applicators will be drive along the right side of the lanes close to the curb, making frequent stops, and apply a paint dot to the catch basin grate to indicate a treatment has occurred. We ask that if you see an applicator along the side of the road, you slow down, and move over if safe to do so.

Prevention - Reduce Mosquito Breeding Sites

- Reduce the amount of stagnant water on your property
- · Keep roof eaves clear of debris
- Drain water from containers or toys

Personal protection includes the use of insect repellent (DEET or Icaridin) during peak times or locations where mosquitoes are active.



McGrail says he learned to skate on a backyard rink his dad, Steve, built when he was just three with mom, Lisa, teaching him how to skate backwards.


McGrail says he "logged a lot of hours on that backyard rink."

Brigden's Heath cracks top ten at men's invitational



When disaster strikes, Lambton's ham radio operators are ready

Local Journalism Initiative

In times of a disaster when communications have been severed, ham radio operators can pull out their equipment and establish communications again in a matter of minutes.

The Lambton County Radio Club was taking part in the annual Field Day to demonstrate their abilities in case of a disaster. Set up at Krall Park in Enniskillen Township, the club was demonstrating its capabilities in case of an emergency and being able to operate off the grid with alternative sources of energy, said Club President Chuck Chivers.

The Lambton club had its ham radios set up for 24 hours starting on Saturday into Sunday afternoon.

Club members were actively talking to ham radio operators all over the word, including individuals as far away as Greece and Russia.

"While this is a hobby, it is also a service, said Keith Baker, a club member.

When there is an emergency and communications are down, ham radio operators can assist, he says.

When cell service and the internet are out, ham radio operators can have communications in place in the matter of minutes using shortwave radios, an antenna and wires strung in the park.

The Lambton club had four stations at the park where each could pick up other ham radios participating in field day.

"You never know who you are going to talk to," said Baker.

Sarnia Astronaut Chris Hadfield, Musician Joe Walsh of The Eagles and Actor Tim Allen are all ham radio operators who are given a unique call sign.

When Hadfield was stationed at the international space station, he used ham radio technology to talk with people in Canada.

Ham radio enthusiasts come from all walks of life, said Baker, who said one of the most interesting parts of the hobby is the number of people you can meet around the world. Even though they are all volunteers, they are licensed by

Industry Canada for the work they do during emergencies.

And while ham radios may seem old school, many may be surprised to learn technologies such as cell phones and satellite television were developed through the use of ham radios, said Baker.

Field Day is the most popular one day event held by ham radio operators in Canada and the United States. There are as many as 35,000 ham radio operators participating in Canada and the United States during Field Day each year.

There are 50 members of the Lambton County Radio Club with a lot of years of experience. Chivers has 25 years, while Baker, a retired United States Air Force officer, has 45 years. New members are always welcome.
