Enniskillen tanks fire truck deal

The purchase of a \$1.47 million pumper/tanker truck for the Petrolia and North Enniskillen Fire Department will not be going ahead. And it's not clear what happens next.

Petrolia approved the purchase of the dual purpose fire truck Aug. 16. But Enniskillen Township rejected the purchase at its Aug. 21 meeting.

The municipalities jointly fund the department and Enniskillen would foot 40 per cent of the bill.

The cost of the truck was one of the big issues.

"We can't just go to the money tree. We need to budget for it," said Councillor Mary-Lynne McCallum, noting the tanker was to be replaced in 2026 while the pumper is to be replaced in 2029.

The management committee of the Petrolia and North Enniskillen Fire Department recommend replacing two aging trucks, the tanker and pumper, with one unit. The truck would have been ordered now and delivered in 2026. The old trucks are to be sold within six months of the new unit in 2026.

The concern for some councillors was the additional cost of purchasing a dual use vehicle instead of simply buying what is traditionally the lower cost tanker.

Historic rain leaves extensive damage

Roads buckled, basements flooded with

rain and sewage, and campers were left stranded after a historic rainfall dumped up to eight inches of rain in Central Lambton. And officials in Warwick Township will be looking at provincial funding saying the Aug. 23 rain caused hundreds of thousands of dollars in damage.

Environment Canada had predicted significant rain for Aug. 23, but the first sign of how much rain was actually falling was a call to Warwick Fire Rescue. A car hit the ditch in heavy flooding on Highway 402 and the couple couldn't get out. Chief

Brad Goodhill had never seen anything like it; the major highway at Arkona Road was covered.

"The water kept rising, faster than I could ever imagine," he tells *The Independent*. Firefighters were able to help the couple

out of their partially submerged car without special equipment. But to the west, the water was a meter deep on the east and westbound lanes at Sexton Line according to Goodhill.

There, vehicles had stalled out trying to get through the water. "To this day I can't believe we didn't have more accidents because vehicles were coming in there at 100 km/h," he says.

Storm dropped eight inches of rain in Warwick

An estimated 180 mm of rain fell Aug. 23 in heavy downpours. Ditches in Brooke-Alvinston near Forest Road were filled to the top of their culverts the next day and, in some places, water could be seen running off the surface of fields making small waterfalls.

In other spots including Ebenezer Line, water pooled in corn and bean fields. The extent of damage to agricultural crops isn't known yet.

On Lasalle Line near Old Walnut Road, some crops were still covered in water from a nearby creek a day later. By the dirt on the leaves, it appears the water rose about half way up the stalks.

The flooding is a scenario playing out across Sydenham's water shed. Ken Phillips of the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority said people camping at AW Campbell Conservation Area were unable to drive out of the park for days. The main road flooded and engineers were brought in Friday to make sure the water had not damaged the road or bridge. It reopened Monday.

At the Warwick Conservation Area, Warwick Fire Rescue and Township workers helped clear the water from the road which stranded half the campground. They were able to get out of the conservation area Thursday afternoon.

The Sydenham also caused problems at the Shetland Conservation Area as the river overflowed into the campground. Some people towed their trailers to higher ground. Others watched as the water swamped their units.

Peggy King operates the Bentpath Getaway next to the conservation area. She estimates the water was at least five feet deep in the field adjacent to the river near the park.

Warwick Township sustained the biggest hit of the storm. Mayor Todd Case declared a state of emergency Aug. 24.

Case says hundreds of thousands of dollars of damage has been done to roads in the community. Almost every gravel road in the township was damaged by the rain. Many were washed out. The newly paved Zion Line had a major buckle in the roadway which will likely need to be rebuilt. Engineers were assessing the damage Monday.

The damage is much higher when you consider the countless homeowners in the municipality whose basements filled with water and raw sewage.

Case heard from more than 60 homeowners Aug. 23 and 24 who either had floods in their homes or roads in their neighbourhood in need of repairs.

During the heaviest rainfall, the Ontario Clean Water Agency, which operates the townships sewage treatment plant, completed a controlled release of sewage onto Lasalle Line fields to help deal with the volume of water flooding the community. But that still wasn't enough to stop sewage from seeping into some Watford basements.

The mayor said disaster restoration companies were in town helping those affected, but with major storms in nearby Glencoe and Essex, many people waited days to even get a call back to set an appointment.

That concerned Councillor Wayne Morris who raised the issude during an special council meeting Monday. He said there may be homeowners unable to get proper disaster restoration services, either because they didn't have insurance or because they couldn't find someone to do the work

There may be some added assistance for homeowners in the offing. Amanda Gubbels, CAO of Warwick Township, says the municipality learned of a program for homeowners - Disaster Recovery Assistance for Ontarians - which may apply in Warwick. Provincial officials were in the community Monday assessing the damage, however at press time, Gubbels said it wasn't clear yet whether the province

would declare Warwick residents eligible for the program which helps cover some of the costs of disasters.

Case says by declaring the state of emergency, the township will likely be able to access funding from the provincial government to help ease the financial burden of the storm.


Warwick is tracking its expenses at the municipal level to take advantage of the Municipal Disaster Recovery Assistance program. The township will need to spend three per cent of its budget on storm related damage - about \$80,000 - to access the provincial funding.

Town officials are sure there will be far more spent than that, with the mayor pegging the damage at hundreds of thousands of dollars.

While there is a lot of damage yet to be fixed, Case paid tribute Monday to everyone who pitched in to help during the emergency saying firefighters, town employees and residents worked together. "The community really did come together."

And he thanked Lambton-Kent-Middlesex MPP Monte
McNaughton who helped guide
the municipality to provincial
assistance and neighbouring
communities - such as
Plympton-Wyoming - which
offered the use of equipment
and staff to help repair the
roads.

Fire truck deal tanked by Enniskillen

Enniskillen Councillor Wally Van Dun was also against the purchase of the truck, saying he had tried to research the cost of just a tanker by talking to sales representatives and looking at websites. He hasn't received a price yet.

Petrolia and North Enniskillen Fire Chief Jay Arns told council it would cost \$975,000 to purchase a tanker.

He believes it is fiscally responsible to purchase the combined unit. Buying two fire trucks would be significantly more money in the end, – an estimated \$1.4 million – while prices have increased by 40 percent in the past year due to inflation, he said.

Van Dun couldn't believe the fire department couldn't get a tanker that would be lower than \$975,000.

Arns said the department's existing 1996 tanker is past its expected 25 year life cycle. In terms of the bigger picture, purchasing the new unit would increase safety, as the new combined unit would be better up to

Aside from the cost of the new tanker/ pumper unit, there is still concern Enniskillen is paying more than its fair share of the fire costs.

date with safety regulations.

Enniskillen Township currently pays 40

percent of the cost of the fire department and Deputy Mayor Judy Krall wants to see Enniskillen's portion lowered to better reflect the number of calls in the municipality compared to Petrolia. Over the past five years it varied from 25 to 35 per cent of the calls.

Had Enniskillen approved the new vehicle, it would have been on the hook for 40 percent of the cost of the new truck, which would be just over \$600,000.

Petrolia's Acting Mayor Joel Field is disappointed Enniskillen's decision. The town was aware of Enniskillen's concerns about the cost sharing agreement.

The councils of Petrolia and Enniskillen have met once about the fire department's funding but there were no follow-up meetings set up.

Field says there was no indication the concerns might scuttle the plans to buy more equipment.

"I wish we knew that prior to getting to this point," said Field.

While it's clear the purchase can't go ahead without Enniskillen's approval, it's not clear what the fire department will do now. The tanker truck is due to be retired from the fleet in 2026 and Arns says it will take three years to order a new vehicle.

Fire funding wake up call

It really should not have been a surprise when Enniskillen Township councillors said no to a new \$1.4 million pumper/tanker truck. But it was.

The chief of the Petrolia/North Enniskillen department went to Petrolia council with the plan for the \$1.4 million vehicle in mid-August and made the case that by purchasing the combination vehicle, the department would be able to provide more efficient services - particularly in the rural areas - and would save money in the long run since the dual purpose vehicle would replace two aging units.

Town councillors hopped on board, giving the department approval to order the vehicle knowing the nearly \$900,000 Petrolia owes won't be due until 2026.

And, perhaps to some politicians in Petrolia, it seemed like a done deal.

But they had clearly underestimated the concerns voiced for a couple of months by Enniskillen councillors.

Deputy Mayor Judy Krall did some number crunching during budget in March and found while Enniskillen pays 40 per cent of all costs at the department, it only generated between 23 and 32 per cent of the fire calls in each the last eight years.

Enniskillen wanted to talk about it with Petrolia and, indeed, they met to talk about it. But apparently, the acting mayor didn't think it was huge issue - certainly not big enough that Enniskillen would actually turn down the pumper/tanker.

Perhaps no one did the math. Assuming Krall's projections are correct, if the township could negotiate a better cost sharing agreement with Petrolia, it would stand to save between \$15,000 and \$32,000 per year just on operating costs. The big savings come on the capital costs. On this fire truck alone, if a new revenue sharing agreement was drafted based on Krall's numbers, Enniskillen's nearly \$600,000 bill for the pumper/tanker between \$112,000 and \$238,000 less.

That's a lot of cash for a small municipality so it is really no wonder Enniskillen councillors turned down the \$1.4 million truck.

And perhaps, in the back of a few Enniskillen councillors' minds, there is the thought that this might be just the wake up call Petrolia needs to revisit the funding arrangement.

Remembering Zach - a good salesman, a better man

Zach Junkin made an impression on me even before we met.

I was looking for a salesperson and scanning resumes. In a sea of people who simply listed their experience and education, Zach stood out. His resume started "A few days ago, I was listening to one of Brian Tracy's audiobooks, and I realized I could be doing more with my free time: I could be helping a Sales Manager hit their targets so they can finally go on that once-in-a-lifetime vacation they've been planning. Or finally purchase that property they've been dreaming of.'

'This guy is either full of baloney or a really good salesman' I thought to

So, I scheduled an interview and met him at a coffee shop. What should have been maybe a half-hour interview turned into an hour-and-a-half. I got to know him a bit and he learned a little about my aspirations. We talked about the newspaper business, his former

hometown of Pelham, his family particularly his dad's political life - and his own run for mayor. He was engaging and a thoughtful listener.

We agreed to a part-time arrangement so he could fit sales into his life. Zach was very excited about it - turns out he'd really wanted to be in sales.

The first couple of months was a bit frustrating on the sales front but that was okay - everyone needs time to develop their skills.

And besides it was a time to get to know Zach and his life; about his wife, Brooke, whom he cared for while she was desperately ill with their second child; about his little girl whom he was crazy about and about his eventual frenzied move to Port Lambton.

Through it all he was always smiling and thoughtful.

We all looked forward to Zach coming into the office. And then Aug. 18, he didn't come through the doors. We didn't really think much of it - sometimes he spent his time in the field making sales calls.

But by Tuesday, we learned Zach had died suddenly of natural causes in his home. He was 34. Even though my staff had the funeral announcement, their email to me while I was on vacation asked "Is this true?" I still

ask that question. Zach - our colleaguewas a husband and father first but was so much more than we knew - MMA fighter, a tree-hugger in the very best way, an adventurer - and as it turns out Zach was a good salesman. But even better, Zach was a really good man. And he will be missed.

Two-thirds want Airbnb rules in PW

Plympton-Wyoming councillors aren't quite ready to start writing the rules for short term rentals.

The town has been looking at regulating the 'Airbnb' industry for a number of months after fielding complaints and petitions to deal with people renting homes in residential areas, clogging streets and making lots of noise.

Monday, Planner Randi Burke, presented a report on the public engagement on the issue. Over 67 per cent of the 219 people who answered an online survey want some form of regulation. Sixty-three per cent said there should be a limit to the number of people staying in the accommodations and half said the town should limit the number of licences available

in Plympton-Wyoming.

And while Mayor Gary Atkinson has long supported the idea of regulations, when it came time for council to direct staff to start drafting a bylaw, some were hesitant.

Councillor Bob Woolvett suggested the town needs to be careful drafting the bylaw because some people depend on the income of the short term rentals to keep their homes.

Councillor John VanKlaveren added he wouldn't want to see the town spend a lot of money on enforcement of any proposed bylaw, saying that could be contracted out to property management companies.

And there were people in the council chambers who either wanted council to tread lightly on drafting new rules or ban short term rentals completely.

Councillor Alex Boughen, who in his


job at Lambton Shores helped draft that municipality's short term rental bylaw, suggested council doesn't really know what it wants yet.

"I don't think we can send staff away as of right now saying 'go put together a bylaw,' because we haven't told them anything of what we're looking for. We haven't told them what we want the definition short term to be. We haven't told them if we want to exempt owner/occupied (short term rentals) for permanent residents from the bylaw.

"I just feel like it's going be a waste of resources and staff time if we send them away without a clear understanding or at least a rough idea of what we as council want to see."

Boughen suggested, and council agreed, to have a special meeting on the issue, then have staff draft a bylaw and bring that to the public.

Battery storage project in the works for Enniskillen again

There is another battery storage power project in the works for Enniskillen.

And this time, the company and the family planning to host the site want to give the municipality plenty of time to consider it.

Compass Energy Consulting is proposing to construct the battery storage unit on 20 acres of the south east corner of 4703 Churchill Line, a property owned by Rita and Tony Felder.

The company is expects the power storage unit will be able to hold between 200 and 300 megawatts of hydro, but won't know for certain until Hydro One says the available line capacity in mid September.

Compass Energy and owners of the Churchill Line property plan told council Aug 21 they plan to come to Enniskillen council Sept. 18 to talk about the project.

It's clear the company is aiming for a longer, more transparent process

than the last proposed battery storage project.

At a meeting last February, Oil City residents crowded into the council chambers to register their overwhelming disapproval of the proposed construction of a battery storage facility on Courtright Line near Oil City. Many said they weren't aware of the project until reading an article in *The Independent* about the proposal.

Many were concerned how close the site was to Oil City.

At the time, council decided not to give its endorsement of the project. Without that, the Ontario Energy Board would not consider it.

While its not clear when this year the province will be asking for new proposals for energy storage in southern Ontario, Compass Energy President Jonathan Cheszes was clearly trying to get ahead of the announcement and secure the municipality's support early.

Cheszes said after the presentation is made to council on Sept. 18, company officials would be door knocking

on properties, which are within two kilometres from 4703 Churchill Line, which will include some homes in Wyoming. He hoped to have door knocking conducted on Sept. 19 and 20.

Resident will be asked to attend an open house in October and Cheszes hoped Council can make a decision by early November on whether it approves of the project.

If council gives its approval, the township will negotiate an agreement with the company for such things as road maintenance, noise, lighting and a community benefit component.

Council members advised Cheszes to not use bulk mail when sending out the invitations to the open house to residents.

This was done for the Oil City open house and many say they were not notified properly, because the invitations were seen as junk mail. Instead the invitations should be addressed to each residence.

Former mayor Inglis was 'a proud Lancer'

A former reeve of Petrolia and the teacher who educated a generation of Nicol scholars about the man behind the scholarship has passed away.

Doug Inglis died Sunday at Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital in Petrolia.

Inglis was born in St. Thomas and went to the University of Western Ontario before landing in Petrolia where he taught history, geography and the law.


He was also active as curling junior football and hockey coach.

After he retired, İnglis published a biography of Harold Robert Nicol – the founder of the highly sought after Helen Kavanagh Nicol Scholarship at LCCVI.

Each June, as the top students at the high school were honoured, Inglis would take a few moments to tell the scholars about the man who made their scholarship possible.

Inglis also wrote columns for both the Petrolia Topic and the Sarnia Observer.

One death caused by Aug 23 storm

Brice Stephenson and Jocelyn Polster saw the water rising at Bridgeview Park and went home to get their paddle board.

The couple could be seen paddling around Bridgeview North Thursday where normally there was dry ground. Stephenson even tried to surf on a floating picnic table.

Just a few hours later, the park was closed as the water from Wednesday's heavy rainfall rushed down the Sydenham River and its tributaries and overflowed the banks of Bear Creek. The water was estimated to be about seven feet above normal.

The rising flood waters also affected the

other end of town. Petrolia officials closed Glenview Drive between Kerr and First Street because of the flooding on Bear Creek. It was reopened Friday morning.

Brooke-Alvinston was also dealing with flooding. Administrator Janet Denkers says that while the damage wasn't nearly as extensive as in Warwick, public works employees were repairing gravel roads damaged in the heavy rains throughout the municipality.

And not far from Alvinston, on Dundonald Road near Glencoe, a Mississauga truck driver lost his life in the storm. Middlesex OPP say the road beneath the rig collapsed about three meters. The 56 year-old man was pronounced dead at the scene.

Flooded well - test the water says public health

Lambton Public Health is encouraging residents with private wells to test their water supply if their well has been flooded after Wednesday's heavy rain.

These high levels of rain could result in harmful bacteria and that could make well water unsafe to drink.

Public health suggests using bottled water for drinking and cooking until you can have your well tested. Or you can boil your tap water for a full minute. The well should be disinfected and tested at least three times, at one-week intervals, before the water is used for drinking.

The test for bacteria and water sample kits are free. Water samples must be dropped off within 24 hours of being taken. You can get test kits at Lambton Public Health in Point Edward or at the lab at Bluewater Health CEE in Petrolia.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Warwick will consider a proposed Zoning By-law Amendment to enabled regulations to facilitate Surplus Farm Dwelling Severances. The amendment is being considered under Section 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, as amended. The meeting will take place on September 25, 2023 at 4PM in Council Chambers at the Township Office located at 5280 Nauvoo Road in Watford and will be livestreamed to the Warwick Township YouTube channel.

THE PROPOSED ZONING BY-LAW AMENDMENT would create definitions to regulate and enable the ability of landowners to severe a residential dwelling from farmland because of farm consolidation. This is further to policy updates to enable the process of Surplus Farm Dwellings approved with the recent Official Plan update in 2021. As this amendment affects all properties zoned Agriculture within the Township, no key map has been provided as this amendment is Township-wide.

NO OTHER APPLICATIONS have been received at this time.

ANY PERSON may attend the council meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of, or in opposition to, the proposed Zoning By-law Amendment. 
Heavy rains swamp Central Lambton

New youth mental wellness hub 'a ray of hope'

Two young women who helped establish the new Youth Wellness Hub may have said it best: Sarnia-Lambton now has world class mental health services with the right professionals ready to help at the right time.

That's how Janessa Labadie and Maura Cook put it during the hub's official ribbon cutting ceremony that they emceed on Aug. 22.

Among 250 guests was Labadie's grandfather, Sarnia-Lambton MPP Bob Bailey, whose government is supporting the Youth Wellness Hub with \$450,000 in operating funds annually.

For local youth struggling with mental health and substance abuse – and those closest to them – the opening presents renewed hope, said lead donor and golf icon Mike Weir.

He had a catch in his throat as he talked about his dream that the \$3-million downtown facility will be a place where local youth aged 12 – 25 will seek help in a crisis. "It's pretty emotional," he said "It's been a long road through COVID to get to where we are today. But I'm just so proud of our community for coming together like this." he said. "We have great support for our youth now... that's all we want for them, that they can realize their own potential."

About six years ago, a group of Sarnians and

mental health services providers recognized too many youth were falling through the cracks. Overdoses, drug use, homelessness and suicide are chronic problems plaguing local young adults.

Existing agencies couldn't keep up with demand. Wait lists for critical services were lengthy.

A "wellness hub" concept was developed to bring all mental health and substance abuse services under one roof for easy access, quick assessment and, importantly, fast delivery.

The need was recognized and donors were sought, explained Kathy Alexander, executive director of the Bluewater Health Foundation.

Weir, who grew up in Sarnia, kick-started the fundraising effort with a \$1.2 million donation. Rather than wait for the provincial government to decide if Sarnia-Lambton would get a wellness hub, the community rallied to get one established.

Lambton County stepped up and rented a building in the commercial core for \$1 a year. Then, the provincial government would provide funding to operate and staff the hub.

What is important is the welcoming environment that provides immediate assessments and cuts down on the frustration that builds when people have to repeat their difficult stories and wait months for service, Alexander said.

As the parent of a child with mental health

challenges, Lambton County Deputy Warden Sarnia City/County Councillor Brian White agreed the hub will be a game changer. "It's extremely difficult as parents when you see your young people hurting, and you have no answers, and you reach out to an agency that says there's a six-month wait list," he said. "Quite often there's no shelter from the storm...and as a parent, you can feel very much isolated." He called the new hub an incredible space.

"This really matters," said White. "To the families and to the youth, I want you to know, after all the struggles, eventually people will hear and sometimes there is a ray of hope."

Directly across the street, at 142 Lochiel St., is a new youth activity centre that takes referrals from the Youth Wellness Hub. Weir Active is a two-year pilot project to demonstrate that play and movement have a place in mental wellness, says project manager

Kendel Ross.

Activities vary from yoga and meditation to weights and lawn games and are free to those aged 12 – 25 who register at the hub.

"For me, doing something active...when I'm struggling myself, is a huge plus in my life," said Weir. "I think youth, when they find (activity) for themselves – whatever that is – it will be a great part of overall wellbeing."
