Respite cabin may take first clients in January

A cabin to give first responders and farmers a place to deal with mental health issues is slated to open in January

That's according to Diane Bergsma whose family opened the doors to the Three Oaks Cabin to neighbours and friends Saturday to see the progress made on the respite facility.

Diane and her husband, Al, and their family have been working on the project since the death by suicide of their son, Dalles. The young farmer and volunteer firefighter died in 2020.

Dalles' death stunned the community. But research shows farmers and first responders are particularly vulnerable to mental health issues. A University of Guelph study conducted in 2022 by Dr. Andria Jones-Bitton shows one in four farmers contemplated suicide over a 12-month period. First responders also have a higher risk of developing post traumatic stress disorder and other mental health challenges which can lead to suicide.

The family wanted to do something to help others with the struggles Dalles faced and within a month, Diane and Al had a plan at the township office to build the cabin. "It is purpose in the pain," said Bergsma during a tour of the cabin.

There is much to be done at the 1,400 square foot log cabin tucked in the woods in Dawn-Euphemia before the first person comes to stay. The trim and

the floors are still a work in progress. And the three-bedroom facility needs a hydro hookup.

But Bergsma expects the first clients will be able to book a stay in January. People staying at the cabin will have access to resources from the National Farmers Mental Health Alliance. Each

person will work through mindful exercises set out in the resources and reconnect with nature in the bush. A mental health professional will follow up with the person once they leave the cabin.

Bergsma said when individuals reach out for help, they only get one crack at it. She feels the follow-up call is very important to find out what is further needed to help each person.

Petrolia Scotiabank closing as bank cuts 2,700 jobs nationwide

A fixture in Petrolia's downtown for more than a century will be closing its doors in the next six months.

While the company has yet to publicly announce the closure, employees were told last week the branch on Petrolia Line is closing.

The news came around the same time Scotiabank announced it would be cutting about three per cent of its global workforce. That works out to about 2,700 staff members across the country.

A company news alert says the changes are being made "as a result of the Bank's end-to-end digitization, automation, and changes in customers' day-to-day banking preferences, as well as ongoing efforts to streamline operational processes and create capacity to invest in key growth opportunities."

Scotiabank alerted stockholders of the news saying the layoffs would cost about \$247 million in restructuring charges such as severance and about \$63 million in charges "related to the consolidation and exit of certain real estate"

The Scotiabank building in Petrolia the year before. was built in 1911 and has been The Independent

premises and service contracts. We expect the savings on the above items to be achieved throughout fiscal 2024 and anticipate full runrate benefits in fiscal 2025," the bank said in a statement.

In August, Scotiabank released its third quarter profits; it made \$2.2 billion in the last three months, down from \$2.61 billion the year before.

The Independent reached out to Scotiabank to find

out when the bank would close, how many people work at the Petrolia branch and whether they would lose their jobs or go on to work at another branch. At press time, Scotiabank had yet to respond to emails and phone calls.

Two sources with knowledge of the announcement confirmed the branch would be closed, possibly in the next six months. Customers looking to open accounts were told any new business would soon merge with Scotiabank in Bright's Grove.



Cyber attack stalls services at Bluewater Health in Sarnia and Petrolia

Bluewater Health sites in Sarnia and Petrolia are among five southwestern Ontario hospitals facing a cyber attack which is disrupting patient services.

TransForm Shared Service Organization is a non-profit which provides IT, supply chain and accounts payable services to hospitals in Windsor, Chatham and Lambton.

Monday afternoon, it said hospitals in Windsor and Essex were experiencing email and patient record problems.

Late Monday, the media relations office said in a news release "we have determined that our member hospitals (including Bluewater Health in Petrolia and Sarnia) are experiencing a cyber attack."

TransForm, according to its website, works with five hospitals, 12 community organizations and Ontario Health teams in the area. It has 10,000 electronic devices and handles over 1,000 patient related messages a day.

"Unfortunately, this incident is impacting their provision of care in various ways. For those patients who have care scheduled in the next few days, the hospitals will contact you directly, if possible, to reschedule or provide alternate arrangements."

Bluewater Health, in a news release posted on its website added "for those patients who have care scheduled in the next few days, we will contact you directly, if possible, to reschedule or provide alternate arrangements. Unfortunately, we may not be able to reach all patients, and we request your understanding if we are required to reschedule care in person at our facilities."

It's not immediately clear what type of patient care is being rescheduled as the hospitals across southwestern Ontario deal with the issue. The Central Lambton Family Health Team shared on social media Monday that Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital was "closed to non urgent outpatient labs and diagnostic services at this time due to technical issues."

TransForm says it is investigating the cause and scope of the cyber attack "including whether patient information was compromised."

The Independent reached out to Bluewater Health Tuesday to find out how long services will be impacted however our calls were not returned.

May 28, 2021, Lambton County officials dealt with a cyber attack. It was four days before county staff could access emails.

In that case, officials said, the hackers were looking for ransom.

The OPP was investigating the breach, however it is not clear at press time whether charges were ever laid.

The services offered at the cabin will be free, something Bergsma says the support from the community has allowed the Three Oaks Cabin to do.

Bookings for stays at the cabin are not being taken yet, but Bergsma is seeing a lot of demand.

Right now the focus is to help farmers and first responders, but the scope can be expanded in the future, said Bergsma. "The sky is the limit."

The cabin contains a multi-purpose room which will also be available for meetings or events centred around mental health.

An open house was held on Saturday afternoon where approximately 250 people were in attendance.

Many were supporters and partners who have contributed to the project. Three oaks trees were also planted on the property, in recognition of the facility's name.

At this point, Bergsma says she is depleted as the construction nears completion. It has been an emotional process for her, but when asked what Dalles would have thought about this facility, Bergsma said, "He would have said don't make it about me." He would have wanted it to be about how Three Oaks Cabins will serve the many people in need.

Councillor Debb Pitel said the students had a lot of great ideas and welcomed them to become a part of the Youth Advisory Committee in the future.

Petrolia day cares inspected

It appears Petrolia's move to drop home business licensing fees for people providing day care has made some impact.

The town, like most communities in Canada, does not have nearly enough licenced day care providers. Parents went to council in the spring saying there are 340 children in the town who are day care age but only 85 licenced spots.

A new federal/provincial program will create 67 new spaces in the town, but the advocates say that will only provide licenced day care for a quarter of the children in Petrolia.

At the request of the parent group, the town researched setting up its own municipally run day care facility, but found it would be upwards of \$5 million to build.

Instead, Deputy Clerk Jessica Smith recommended "council waive the \$250 Home Occupation Business Licence fee and the Petrolia portion of the fire inspection fee for a period of one year. This would apply to applicants interested in obtaining a Home Occupation Business Licence for a home-based child care operation only. It is our hope that this will remove a barrier

and provide incentive to those currently operating without a Home Occupation Business Licence to obtain one," she wrote noting to obtain the license, operators have to have an inspection by the fire department building officials and public health.

Council agreed to the move in April. Monday, Smith said five day care providers have already taken advantage of the offer. Three were existing day cares and two were new operations.

Smith says that means that at least 10 new spaces were created since April. She told The Independent each of the new operators said they had a full roster of clients before they opened for business.

And she's pleased five home day cares have now been inspected by the fire department, building officials and public health to "ensure they are safe for the public to occupy."

While the concerns about lack of day care spaces in the community are long standing, the push for more licenced day care came after a young child fell into a pool while at day care in Petrolia. The little boy was revived but still has health problems. His family launched a lawsuit and OPP laid charges against the day care provider.

The case is still in court.

EDITORIAL

Disheartening

The coming closure of the Scotiabank in Petrolia's downtown is disheartening on many levels.

First, it is disheartening when we think about the employees who serve there. They may find other work when the branch closes in the next six months, even with Scotiabank, but it still causes disruption in their lives and likely some anxiety.

It's disheartening for scores of businesses which have used the bank for decades. One customer we heard from recently signed on for more services and now worries how inconvenient it will be to travel to another community to do in person banking.

We're guess the company will lose some of those business customers simply because they won't have time to travel to Bright's Grove, Sarnia or Watford to do business during the day.

We're not sure Scotiabank will even feel that financial loss considering it earned \$2.2 billion in three months this year and that was less than normal.

It's disheartening for older customers who are less likely to bank online. Petrolia has been encouraging housing developments within walking distance of the downtown specifically so seniors can walk to whatever businesses they need to go to. Again, we're guessing Scotiabank would lose customers but that would be tougher for elders who don't always do well with change than it would be for the bank.

It is disheartening for the message it sends about Petrolia, a message which is clearly false. If you examine other bank closures around rural southern Ontario it is usually happens where the business community is already struggling. Clearly the economy is tough but Petrolia has a very healthy downtown.

And it is disheartening because while we're sure there will be a huge outcry from the public and the politicians, there will be meetings with bank officials, pleas to remain in the community, all of that is most likely to make not one bit of difference.

As all banks shrink so they can preserve their huge profit margins, they're closing small branches.

Every community vows to save the bank. Every political leader in those communities tries to stop it. Every time, the bank "listens" to the community. And every time, the bank closes.

Just ask Wyoming. Or Alvinston.

Petrolia 150 Legacy project costs more than double

A new bandshell in Petrolia's Victoria Park is going to be a lot more than first expected.

But officials with the Petrolia 150 Committee - which is building the facility which will include a new public accessible washroom as a legacy project - is confident fundraising will bridge the gap between the \$200,000 of tax dollars already set aside for the project and the \$438,000 price tag.

At the Oct. 12 meeting, Laurissa Ellsworth, director of marketing, arts and communications told council while there was interest in the project, only one builder submitted a bid - Wellington Builders out of Forest. And it was over double the cost anticipated.

"It was budgeted based on projects of a similar type list ...when the budget was created. Unfortunately, as mentioned, things have changed at this point," she told council. Councillor Ross O'Hara suggested the town was "asking for a lot of work from what we budgeted for."

Ellsworth says the Petrolia 150 committee is confident the extra money can be raised to pay for the project through revenue generated at events and from merchandise sold through the anniversary year.

"I'm confident," she said when asked if the goal was reasonable. She says the plan for fundraising is strong and "I can sleep at night."

Consultant says spend \$125K on sidewalks

There may be a lot more work on your sidewalks in Petrolia in 2024.

This year, Petrolia spent about \$30,000 to fix sidewalks. But 2024 could see the town spend \$125,000 a year to improve the aging infrastructure if council follows the recommendations by an engineer to improve the town's walkablity.

In a number of different town surveys, residents said they were looking for better sidewalks.

Recently, the town hired BM Ross and Associates to create a sidewalk connectivity study. It found that the town needed to spend more than \$4.25 million to fix aging sidewalks, widen those that are narrow, build sidewalks in several subdivisions where they were never planned and possibly provide up to six trail connections including linking Petrolia to the Lorne C. Henderson Conservation Area and with a trail north to Wyoming.

Jordan Fohkens of BM Ross said when the report was first presented that about 30 per cent of the town's sidewalks are undersized including

several along major roads where there isn't a boulevard to buffer the traffic. He estimated there is about 1.6 kilometres of sidewalks in that category.

Oct. 12, he presented his final report which said the town needs to spend about \$125,000 per year to fix some of the problems.

Fohkens says the sidewalk projects should be done at the same time as some of the roads are rebuilt to save money but priority should be placed on certain areas. For example, he wants to see another sidewalk on Maple Street by Queen Elizabeth II school next year.

Oil Heritage Road north of Derby Street would also get sidewalks in 2024 under the plan and so would Pettibone, when the street is recon-

Fohkens also suggested building sidewalks near Ecole Hillcrest on the east end in 2025. He's also suggesting the town works to fill the gaps in sidewalks connecting newer subdivisions without sidewalks to the older part of the town with them. He says investing \$125,000 per year would mean about 5.7 km of sidewalks could be built in the next 10 years.

Warwick okays backflow valve subsidy plan

Warwick Township hopes a new grant program will encourage people to install backwater valves in homes will prevent flood damage in the future.

On Aug. 23, between six and eight inches of rain fell in just over six hours. The rain was considered more than a century storm. The township declared a state of emergency as roads flooded and many homeowners in Watford ended up with flood water and in some cases, sewage in their basements. In September, council asked staff to come up with a plan to give grants to homeowners who wanted to install the backup valves, which would stop flood water and sewage from entering homes through the sump pumps.

Andrew Maver, Public Works Manager, also suggested in his report that sump pumps be disconnected from the sanitary sewer to reduce the chance of the sewage system being overwhelmed.

Maver looked at the programs in other municipalities, including Plympton Wyoming for guidelines. Council agreed to set aside \$60,000 a year so homeowners could receive up to \$3,000 to make the switch. Homeowners in Watford who were flooded and have made the changes already, can receive the funding retroactively if they have their receipts.

Timmies owner says \$116k parking not needed

The owner of the Watford Tim Hortons says there is no need for a paved parking spot for transports in front of his business.

Warwick Township has been exploring how to make the intersection at Nauvoo and Confederation Roads where the restaurant is located - safer. Traffic pylons have been placed in front of the building on Nauvoo on both sides of the road to discourage trucks from parking there while going to get a coffee. There was concern the sight lines for drivers was being impaired by the parked trucks.

But Matthew Hoogenboom said in a letter to council there has never been an accident at the corner that he is aware of due to the trucks.

"We are a 50km hour zone - no different than the intersections in town where shoulder parking is permitted. In fact, there doesn't seem to be anything more than the standard set back parking rules in town for all corners. Why are sight lines not an issue there, but they are at our corner when traffic should be flowing at the same speed?"

"The opportunity for danger should be no greater at our corner than what it is in town since traffic is expected to flow at the same speed."

Hoogenboom says "under no circumstances has my company

ever requested paving or for special treatment be given to or for us. We have simply asked for the construction pylons to be removed since they are an eyesore to both our business and the town.'

Hoogenboom did note the Watford Tim Hortons was one of the first businesses to open up for truckers to stop to use washrooms during the pandemic.

"We think truckers deserve a chance to quickly pull over to the side of the road the same way they could in town and use our washroom and if they choose get a coffee or food. We have a lot of trucks going through town with the dump facilities and I think we need to find a way to make things work for

The restaurant owner said "we would be fine if the gravel shoulder was left and a few gravel spots were given to the truckers and camper trailers to pull over and use the facilities." as long as the No Parking signs "50 feet back

from the corner" be removed to allow the parking.

Mayor Todd Case took note of the letter during the Oct. 12 meeting.

Warwick Township council asked Lambton County to consider putting up traffic lights at Nauvoo and Confederation and creating transport parking on both sides of the road.

At the Aug. 14 council meeting, Steven Taylor, of BT Engineering which was working on the project for the county said the intersection doesn't meet provincial standards for traffic lights. Taylor added having trucks park on both sides of the street "may result in reduced sight lines" for drivers.

Taylor estimated it would cost \$116,211 to build an oversized parking spot on the west side of Nauvoo and extending the sidewalk to the spot. It would cost \$206,000 to create spots on both sides. Council will look at the recommendation during the 2024 budget.



"We felt that it was a good thing to do again," says Kingston.


"We had a lot of positive feedback; the first thing out of people's mouth was 'Are you going to do it next year?' So, we'll have enough to run the festival again and it will be September 21."

There is one more event slated to

mark the 200th anniversary of the Corunna survey. Nov. 1, the group will unveil some new historic sign board at the Clock Tower Square.

Kingston adds the group is also completing its collection for the time capsule. It plans to hold an essay contest with the winner given the honour of opening it in 50 years.

Unlike some time capsules, the one marking Corunna's 200th anniversary won't be buried in the ground. It will find a home at the St. Clair offices for the next half century.

Regional virtual addictions program shelved as funding ended

A virtual program which helped hundreds of people in southwestern Ontario deal with their addictions has been shelved after the provincial government ended the funding which made it possible.

Finding the \$285,000 needed to keep it running each year has been impossible according to Laird Brush.

The executive director of the Westover Treatment center has been on a mission to make people aware that a program which literally saved lives has stopped operating, hoping to find \$285,000 to fund it.

Planning for the program was in the works before anyone heard the word COVID. But during the pandemic, the province offered cash to set up virtual programs. Westover jumped at the chance and started up the virtual program.

"The virtual program was built and designed and implemented to address historical barriers to treatment."

And it smashed down a number of those barriers which kept people from seeking treatment at Westover's residential program.

"We're getting people from all over the

province and even outside the province. We were getting clients that wouldn't ... necessarily succeed in residential treatment." That includes people with anxiety who wouldn't do well away from home, young mothers, and people serving time under house arrest. "So, it basically eliminated any barrier you could think of."

And people didn't have to wait for a referral; they could just call and be put on a list for the program. "It had a very short wait list," said Brush

The program wouldn't have been possible without the provincial funding. Brush says Westover didn't even have WIFI when the pandemic started. The provincial funding allowed the treatment center to get online, buy some Chromebooks to help those who didn't have computers at home, a smart board for the virtual sessions and hire two counsellors.

"We had over 400 clients access services through their virtual day program (VDP) and we've had clients speak here at the center that have celebrated two years of continuous sobriety, just as a result of going through the VDP."

While Brush had hard data to show the virtual program was helping more people at a lower cost, the province ended the COVID

funding and there was nothing to replace it. Despite visits to the Minister of Addictions and Mental Health and ministry staff, Brush hasn't been able to secure new funding. Westover continued running the program until August, using the charity's reserves to fund it and hoping for some level of government to

"Î hesitate to say shut it down - because I'm still advocating and approaching the ministry to try and get funding when it becomes available for us... So far, no luck."

The end of the program means more people will only have the residential program as an option. And, Brush says, it also led to layoffs. Two counsellors hired specifically to meet the virtual demand had to be let go.

"I managed to recruit two brilliant addiction counselors for that program, and then have to turn around and lay them off....it just doesn't sit well."

Particularly when Brush knows the highlyeffective program doesn't need a huge cash infusion to improve hundreds of lives.

"I can reach just as many people through our virtual program for the price of \$285,000.

"I mean, to me, it's just insane that people don't sees that this is an obvious, worthwhile investment."

LCCVI's Zelenchuk going to OFSAA

More than a year ago, 15 year-old Yarko Zelenchuk fled war-torn Ukraine with his family. Today, the Grade 10 student at LCCVI is excelling on the tennis court.

Zelenchuk captured second place in the boys' singles SWOSSAA championships in Chatham Oct. 18, falling to Chimnay Damani of Sarnia's Northern Collegiate.

The win was a world away from where Zelenchuk was just 17 months ago - living with his family in Lviv, one of the largest cities in Ukraine.

Russia invaded the Ukraine on Feb. 24, 2022 and by June 2022, the same month the Zelenchuk family arrived in Canada, Russian forces had occupied 20 percent of the Ukraine. By April 2023, an estimated eight million Ukrainians have been displaced inside Ukraine and more than 8.2 million fled the country.

Zelenchuk arrived in Canada on June 1, 2022, with his mother, Natalia, and younger brother, Darii, a Grade 6 student at St. Philip Catholic School in Petrolia. His father, Adrian, joined the family a short time later. His sister, Myroslava attends the University of Tulsa, where she also plays tennis.

Zelenchuk has relatives in the United States, but the family came to Canada because it was easier to obtain a visa. They came to the Petrolia area because a host family was found near Petrolia on a farm. The Zelenchuks stayed there a few months until they found accommodations in Petrolia.

The Zelenchuks lived in Lviv, a city 70 kilometres from the Polish border. It hasn't been touched much by the war so far, as the war is mostly on the western part of the country near the Russian border.

Zelenchuk said Lviv is double the size of London, Ontario. You can sometimes hear a bomb burst in the distance, he said.

He still has relatives in the Ukraine, as his uncle and his 19 year-old cousin are in the Ukraine army. His grandmother also remains in the country, not wanting to leave her home or any of her family members who are fighting the Russians.

That means he will be separated from his extended family for some time. Zelenchuk believes the war will drag and even then he doubts he will return since the bombing has devastated much of the country, he said.

For now he is concentrating on tennis.

His father introduced him to the sport when he was a child. His sister Myroslava also helps him to improve when she stays with the family in Petrolia when she is not at university.

Zelenchuk credits Coach Pete Mueller and his son, Matt, with helping him to improve.

Matt, a Western University student who has been playing since he was a teen, made his comeback in tennis this summer by winning the Ontario Tennis Association's Men's Open 350 tournament in St. Thomas, after recovering from a car accident.

Mueller met the Zelenchuks when they first arrived.

Myroslava needed someone to hit tennis balls with, so his son, Matt, stepped up.

Zelenchuk was also playing and was getting some coaching. Mueller says Myroslava was translating for him at the time, so Mueller says, the teen has come a long way with his English. He then joined the high school's tennis program in September.

"I am so proud of Yarko," said Coach Mueller, saying Zelenchuk is the first to make it to OFSAA in tennis since the COVID-19 pandemic began.

It is quite difficult to make it to OFSAA, said Mueller as it involves winning a series of tournaments.

In the first two tournaments, you must place in the top four to advance to the next level, with SWOSSAA having only the top two advance.

"I am just trying to prove myself," he said, as Zelenchuk looks to the upcoming OFSAA championship. He has never competed at this level before, so he is sure he will be nervous heading into competition. He has no expectations about how he will do but can gain experience and use it as a springboard as he looks to return to the provincial competition in later years.

He would love to continue to play tennis at the university level and hopefully play professionally in the future.

But first, to OFSAA after his second place finish at SWOSSAA. And that will take some work, the teen says after losing twice to Damani - including in the final.

"I lost to him mentally," said Zelenchuk. He was winning early in the final, but it began to rain, which threw him off, he says.

The top two advance to OFSAA in June 2024, which may give Zelenchuk another chance to face Damani.

His mental game is something Zelenchuk says he needs to work on as he prepares over the next few months.

For now, Zelenchuk is enjoying Petrolia saying people are friendly and the community is quiet and clean. And being part of the tennis team has helped him overcome his shyness.

Zelenchuk is also enjoying his time at LCCVI.

"I never thought school could be so enjoyable,' said Zelenchuk.



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


