Patient, staff info stolen in hack

Hospitals, IT company work with OPP, INTERPOL and FBI as hackers demand ransom **Heather Wright**

Bluewater Health says patient and staff information has been taken in the cyber attack which has crippled hospital IT systems for a week.

Oct. 25, TransForm Shared Service Organization - which runs IT, billing and supply services for five hospitals in Chatham-Kent, Essex and Lambton – including Charlotte Eleanor Englehart Hospital in Petrolia – and other health organizations in the region announced it was having IT problems linked to a cyber attack. Patients were notified that some appointments would be cancelled and staff was registering patients still being seen with pen and paper.

Late Friday, TransForm said police were investigating the hack and that there was no estimate when services at the hospital will return to normal. The Independent has reached out to Bluewater Health multiple times since Oct. 26 to determine how many and what type of patient services were cancelled. Our calls have not been returned.

Tuesday, in a joint statement, the hospitals and TransForm said patient data had been compromised. And the organization confirmed some patient and staff data has been stolen.

'Working with leading cyber security experts, we have determined through our investigation that, unfortunately, certain patient, employee and professional staff data has been taken and there is the possibility that the actors responsible for this attack may publish some of the stolen data," the statement reads. "We continue to investigate to determine the exact data impacted, and any individuals whose data was affected by this cyber attack will be notified in accordance with the law."

The statement adds "we can confirm that we are victims of a ransomware attack." Ransomware is designed to deny a user or organization access to files on their computer. The hackers then demand a ransom payment for the decryption key as the easiest and cheapest way to regain access to the files.

"We are working closely with law enforcement – including local police departments, Ontario Provincial Police, INTERPOL and FBI – and we have notified all relevant regulatory organizations including the Ontario Information and Privacy Commissioner."

TransForm says it is "continuing to work around the clock to restore systems" and "expect to have updates" in the coming week.

Petrolia politicians want meeting with Scotiabank

Petrolia politicians want a face-to-face meeting with Scotiabank officials after learning the local branch will be closed. Employees of the Petrolia Line branch were told in mid-October the 112 yearold fixture on Petrolia Line would be closing. Clients were being told the accounts would be "merging" with the Bright's Grove branch. Sources say

the branch will close in the next six months.

The news came around the same time Scotiabank announced it would be cutting about three per cent of its global workforce - about 2,700 staff members across the country.

Scotiabank said the changes are being made "as a result of the bank's end-to-end digitization, automation, and changes in customers' day-to-day banking preferences, as well as ongoing efforts to streamline operational processes and create capacity to invest in key growth opportunities.

The company, which made \$2.2 billion last quarter, says the layoffs and sell off of real estate will cost about \$310 million with the cost savings being realized in 2025.

Acting Mayor Joel Field is disappointed Scotiabank is leaving Petrolia.



OPP recover 36 guns near St. Clair River

Lambton OPP say 36 handguns were found near Port Lambton thanks to a tip.

Early Thursday morning, the OPP Border Enforcement Security Task Force got a tip about a jet ski with two people on board in the St. Člair River in the Port Lambton Area near Old River Road. Old River Road runs from Brander Park to the marina near the north tip of Walpole Island.

The OPP, including officers from Corunna, the Canine Unit, the Emergency Response Team and Walpole Island police searched the area and found 36 illegal firearms.

Officers believe the suspects may have fled the area on foot. Investigators are seeking information from the public that may help identify the suspects and locate the missing jet ski.

Det. Insp. Lee Fulford of the OPP Organized Crime Enforcement Bureau says illegal firearms are used by organized crime. "Any tip from the public, no matter how small, may be the missing piece that officers need to solve this investigation and to prevent future firearms smuggling incidents."

Campbell House 'not salvageable'

Conservation authority looks to appeal denial of building permit

Steve Miller doesn't think the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority should spend anymore time or money on trying to save a historic home at AW Campbell Conservation Area in Alvinston.

The St. Clair Township deputy mayor recently expressed his frustration about the ongoing battle between the authority and Brooke-Alvinston and the Friends of Campbell House.

Brooke-Alvinston council turned down a formal request for a demolition permit for the historic home of Archie Campbell who donated the land for the park decades ago. The building is one of the oldest farmhouses in the area. But it has fallen into disrepair over the last 20 years.

In September 2021, the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority voted to take down the home. But the board set the matter aside after the Friends of Campbell House was formed, hoping to restore the home for community use.

Oct. 26, Ken Phillips, general manager of the St. Clair Region Conservation Authority, told the board he had not made any progress getting the group to explain what it was doing and how it would fund any repairs.

A letter had been sent to Brooke-Alvinston asking for a demolition permit for the property, but Deputy Mayor Frank Nemcek and other members of council said the municipality should delay the demolition so the Friends of Campbell House had a chance to devise a plan.

Sept. 28, council received the official request and turned it down, tabling it for three years "while every feasible avenue is pursued to restore and maintain this valuable heritage asset for the use and enjoyment of the community."

That includes clarifying the legislation - which recently has changed - and who has financial accountability for the maintenance and restoration of the house; exploring options for fundraising and developing a three to five year plan to complete the most urgent repairs.

But the SCRCA board is not about to let that happen.

"We have spent a lot of time and money on Campbell House," Miller said. "If Brooke-Alvinston can spend all the time and money they want on it, but I don't think our staff should spend any more time. We have an engineer's report saying basically it is not salvageable, so when does this end?

"I think it should end now."

Board Member Emery Huzska agreed. "In this case, I think we've done our due diligence. I strongly support the position of the board to investigate all options before we finally said goodbye to the building."

Saying he believes the authority has done all it can, Huzska said the board should authorize staff to appeal the denial of the building permit to the appropriate authority including the Ontario Land Tribunal.

Board member Anne Marie Gilles tried one last time to find a solution. "Can we not gift it to the municipality because really, they're the ones that are going to be using it, promoting it, helping to bring tourism to the municipality because of it and we are basically we're partners," she said.

But Phillips said the municipality would have to secure the building. "The snow fencing installed around the Campbell house has not been effective in keeping visitors from entering the building. More substantial fencing should be considered if the building is to remain (for three years or longer) without significant structural repairs," he wrote in a report to the board. He suggested that costs would be in the thousands of dollars. And Phillips says the Friends of Campbell House have been unwilling to talk about footing that bill.

And there was concern at Brooke-Alvinston about the potential costs also. Clerk Janet Denkers, in a report to council in September, said the municipality's insurance agents said since the property belongs to the SCRCA, the conservation authority is liable and hold the insurance costs.

But she reminded council the conservation authority is funded by the member municipalities and the SCRCA does pass along costs for individual parks to the host municipality.

"The SCRCA could also seek legal opinion whereby those costs could be passed down to municipalities in the watershed," she wrote.

The board agreed the permit had to be appealled. It's unclear at this point where that appeal would be sent.

Petrolia Mayor Brad Loosley will be back on the job Nov. 1.

Loosley, who was re-elected last October, has been on medical leave since April. The mayor had bypass surgery.

When his leave was announced, the Councillor Joel Field stepped up to fill the duties as acting mayor

"I definitely enjoyed it," Field told *The Independent* during one of his last official duties as acting mayor – the beginning of the Royal Canadian Legion's Poppy Campaign. "It wasn't the way I wanted to step in as first opportunity as a mayor, but it's definitely given me the knowledge and some experience to understand

if it's the next step. I definitely enjoyed the opportunity but I'm happy that Mayor Loosley is back healthy again."

Field says the job was a lot busier than the councillor position. "I had more calls because they wanted to speak to the mayor."

While Field was serving as acting mayor, council voted to reinstate the position of deputy mayor and appoint Field to the position when the mayor returned. It was a position Field should have held when he was first elected in 2011 as the top vote getter. The new position will be appointed by council at the recommendation of the mayor.

"I'm definitely excited about the new role as deputy mayor and I plan to continue serving the community the best I can and step up whenever needed."

Council okays hardball mound at Alvinston diamond

The head of Alvinston's Minor Ball Association says a portable pitchers mound won't draw young people to play hardball.

Jason Migchels spoke to Brooke-Alvinston briefly as it discussed whether to purchase a portable mound instead of turning one of Alvinston's diamonds into a hardball diamond. Migchels said there are seven hardball teams in Alvinston and he'd like to see a U18 team established. "The

proposal for the mound in the first place was to show that our association was serious about hardball." But he added a portable mound wouldn't attract the older players.

Councillor Jenny Redick voiced concern that a permanent mound would mean only hardball could use it and she opposed the move.

But council agreed to move ahead adding the mound would be dirt and could be removed if necessary in the future.

The push to raise rural taxes

If you look at Stephen Ikert's charts, successive Ontario governments seem to have accomplished what they planned to do all along - despite years of complaints from rural Ontario.

Ikert is the treasurer in Brooke-Alvinston. He wrote a report which outlines how the provincial government has over the last 12 years whittled away at the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund to the point where the municipality gets about \$1.2 million less in 2024 than it did in 2012.

He estimated about \$8.6 million in provincial funding which would have gone to Brooke-Alvinston was redirected to larger cities.

And that left only one thing for municipal councillors to do - as Ikert's handy chart showed - raise taxes. As the OMPF money disappeared, municipal taxes in Brooke-Alvinston went up to compensate for the lost dollars

Rural politicians have told us over the years that their municipalities weren't getting grants because "our taxes are too low" according to provincial bean counters

Of course, they're not calculating the services in those communities; Brooke-Alvinston - nor any other rural Lambton municipality - doesn't have transit or big swimming pools, outdoor ice pads for residents to use or professional firefighters - all things you find in a larger city with higher taxes.

In rural Ontario, firefighters are "volunteers" even though they have to meet professional standards. If a community wants an outdoor ice rink, the local service club starts raising cash to make it happen. And in Brooke-Alvinston local service clubs raise money to support the existing municipal arena - likely because the municipality has far less provincial funding to support it.

While municipalities have to raise taxes to cover the deficit, they also cut costs; usually roads and bridges are the first projects put off because they're the most expensive

We like Enniskillen Mayor Kevin Marriott's idea that the province provide more grants to repair roads and bridges. It's a matter of public safety and you'd think governments would see the value in that. But perhaps not since Marriott is still waiting for that to happen.

Maybe he needs a chart or two to convince them.

Another year, more funding cuts for rural Lambton

Another year, another loss.

What was decried as unfair over the past decade is now noted and lamented, but without any calls for the provincial government to restore the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund to its original purpose - helping rural communities. The grant funding replaced the farm tax credit. But starting with the Ontario Liberals, successive governments have chipped away at the grant, giving small rural municipalities less money and granting to larger cities in a funding model that still has administrators across the province scratching their heads while trying to figure out how the government comes up with

The 2024 yearly grants came out with little fanfare and in Brooke-Alvinston, the township Treasurer Stephen Ikert noted the province will provide \$56,200 less in 2024 than it did this year. That's a drop of about 12.4 per cent.

Since 2012, Ikert told council, the municipality has lost \$1.2 million in funding. If it had been paid at the same level as 2012, Brooke-Alvinston would have received a total of \$8.6 million more over the last 11 years.

"In 2012 our OMPF funding was equivalent to \$1,537 per household; in 2024 it will be equivalent to \$375 per household in Brooke-Alvinston," he noted in a report to council Oct. 26.

Across the county, particularly in small urban municipalities, everyone is seeing some of the provincial funding disappear.

Dawn-Euphemia's OMPF grant is dropping by just over \$10,000 this year to \$237,600.

Enniskillen loses about \$3,100 with a grant of \$306,500 this year.

Lambton Shores will receive about \$1,759,000, about \$41,000 less than

Oil Springs, which has the highest per capita OMPF grant at \$585 per household, will receive \$180,000 this year - \$900 less than last year.

St. Clair Township will receive about \$14,000 less on its \$958,000 grant.

And Sarnia will receive a smaller piece of the pie this year with a grant of \$ 3,567,200 - about \$34,200 less than 2023.

The only municipalities receiving an increase are Petrolia, Plympton-Wyoming and Warwick.

Petrolia sees the largest funding jump - it receives \$39,200 more in 2024, taking in \$919,100.

Plympton-Wyoming, one of the fastest growing municipalities in Lambton, will receive \$822,200 in funding in 2024 - about \$13,600 more than 2023.

And Warwick breaks almost even, getting an extra 900 bucks on its \$418,900 grant.

When *The Independent* contacted Lambton County Warden and Enniskillen Mayor Kevin Marriott, he

had not yet heard the grants had been released.

"Usually, (Clerk) Duncan (McTavish) tells me when they come in."

Marriott was among dozens of rural leaders who leaned on Doug Ford in the 2018 to restore the funding. When Ford became premier, the cuts kept coming. And the rural leaders kept asking for something to be done.

"I bring it up every time I get a chance," says Marriott of the continuous funding reductions. "I never, ever get an answer."

Marriott seems resigned to the province clawing back the grant. "I've suggested bringing back road and bridge grants instead. But both levels of government don't want to talk about roads and bridges anymore.

Short term rental rules get legal look next

Rules to govern short term rentals in Plympton-Wyoming are one step closer to reality.

Council got its first look at the proposed bylaw Monday, suggested some changes and clarifications and agreed to have lawyers take a look at the bylaw before holding a public meeting.

The draft bylaw says no one can operate an AirBnB type rental without a \$700 licence. Operating without out one could lead to a \$1,400 fine. Trailers, boats or accessory buildings can't be used. Owners have to respond to any calls from bylaw enforcement investigating problems within an half hour and have someone onsite in an

And there is a whole list of items designed to prevent noise and parking disturbances including no loud indoor music, revving of car engines and fireworks.

The draft bylaw also limits the number

of dogs on the property to three and the number of people to up to 10.

While many councillors question some of the items - including the suggestion every short term rental have a landline telephone most believed there should be a way to give local residents who live in the rental a break on the licencing fees.

But Deputy Mayor Netty McEwen suggested going another route. She had recently read the municipality of Lakeshore banned all short term rentals. She suggested Plympton-Wyoming "consider not allowing short term rentals in our municipality in residental areas that are not owner operated. It would eliminate a lot of problems," she told council.

The other STR are "commercial operations" and should be taxed that way she added.

McEwen's idea was briefly discussed, but council voted instead to continue preparing

For more than 100 years, the Fairbank family of Petrolia and Oil Springs has preserved the WWI uniforms worn by Maj. C.O. Fairbank.



The full-length Great Coat of heavy wool, a shorter winter jacket, an officer's uniform with pants and three hats donated recently are in addition to another of his grandfather's uniforms at the Heritage Museum.

"My grandfather's uniforms have become artifacts that tell the larger story of the incredible sacrifices Canadians made during this horrific war," says Fairbank.

"The men were husbands, fathers, sons, brothers and all of Canada was affected."

Lambton Heritage Museum's Curator/ Supervisor, Dana Thorne, was pleased when the Fairbank family made this donation.

"There is also archival material relating to his service in the Great War at the Lambton County Archives, including transcriptions of his diary and photographs of Fairbank and his fellow soldiers in uniform. With the addition of these new uniforms and hats, we have a very clear picture of Fairbank's military service during a crucial period of our history."

In 1916, Maj. Fairbank was reeve of Lambton County and had long been known as Dr. Fairbank.

He had oil lands in California and also headed the 70th Battalion.

Initially, he was to recruit but felt compelled to have first-hand knowledge of the war. At the age of 58 he left for overseas, leaving this wife Clara and the Fairbank mansion where the youngest of

his four sons was only a year old. Initially he

was stationed in England, then transferred to the 18th Battalion and from the trenches, he witnessed the Battle of the Somme where almost 25,000 soldiers from Canada and Newfoundland died.



He returned

home in November 1916 and as the year concluded, he wrote in his journal, "The old year is gone with its scenes of carnage and desolation and misery. May the new year bring victory to the Allies that will assure peace in the future."

The war ended in 1918 at the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month.

Maj. Fairbank became Petrolia's mayor in 1919 and he died at the age of 66 in 1925.





At the going down of the sun and in the morning ... We Remember; Saturday November 11, 2023 The Two Minutes of Silence

The Two Minutes of Silence is a poignant moment in the Remembrance Day Service that incorporates symbolic association in a brief, non-religious ceremony.

The Last Post

A bugler plays The Last Post, signifying the calling home of the spirits of the Fallen to rest. The Last Post originally was played to signal the camp was secured for the night. It was also played to call out to wounded or separated soldiers at the end of a battle, to guide them home to safety and rest.

Two Minutes of Silence

At the stroke of eleven, Canadians across the country join to collectively pause for two minutes of silence to honour, thank and remember the Fallen. This sacred moment also symbolizes Canada standing sentry in silence as the Fallen rest.

The Lament

At the National Remembrance Day Ceremony, a bagpiper plays The Lament, symbolizing the sounds of spouses and children crying over their dead.

The Rouse

The end of the two minutes of silence is signalled by the bugler playing the Rouse. The Rouse was originally used to wake soldiers. In this ceremony the Rouse wakes the Fallen and rises them above their mortal duties to rest in peace.


The Act of Remembrance

To which all participants respond with "We will remember them."





Sombra calendar shows historic barns disappearing from the landscape

Take a drive in any rural area in southern Ontario, and you will come across an older barn or two in various states of disrepair.

But there aren't as many as there once was according to Darrell Randall - a member of the Sombra Museum Board.

Around the turn of the century, a volunteer photographer went throughout the former Sombra Township taking shots of the various barns.

There were 240 barns

documented at the time, and the Sombra Museum created a calendar it sold as a fundraiser.

Randall recently gave a presentation about the heritage of the old barns featured in the calendar.

In 2000, the museum created a calendar using the photos of the barns as a fundraiser for the organization. Another calendar was created this year as a fundraiser for the museum, but this time there are less barns to choose from with 80 barns being demolished since the turn of the millennium with another 40 in

poor shape. During that time, Randall was one of those who took down a barn he owned that was not in good shape.

Many of the barns offer some unique architecture and heritage, said Randall, as most were built with materials, which were found right on the farm. He is not a fan of municipalities giving heritage designations to buildings or sites. If these structures are to be preserved, it will be up to the barn owners, Randall said. The only way these older barns will remain in the future is if they are repurposed.

Most of the barns that still remain were constructed in the early 1900s, but the oldest one dates back to the 1880s.

Randall has been renovating and repurposing his own barn, a structure that turned 100 this year being built in 1923 by his great aunt and uncle.

He is using the front of the barn as a shop with the back being used for storage. He held an open house on Oct. 1 to showcase the barn, which is situated on his farm on Lambton Line.

Randall is quite proud of the work he has done and says this is

definitely his favourite barn in the area, but he might have a bias.

Council urged to take arena training

Terry Piche says municipal governments "learned hard lessons" about arena safety in Canada and he wants municipalities like Brooke-Alvinston to learn from them.

The head of the Ontario Recreation Facilities Association spoke with Brooke-Alvinston Thursday saying the Technical Safety Standards Association regulates arenas as "unattended refrigeration plants." Municipalities have had "loose compliance to the rules," he says. But after three arena workers in BC died because of a leak in an aging ammonia system, the TSSA wants municipal governments to understand the systems and make sure they have emergency plans in place.

Piche says councillors, under the rules are considered the owners of the 'plant' so he suggested training for both staff and municipal leaders. Piche says the staff "represents you day by day and has control over the building but council is required to define the response...to set a chain of command when there is an incident."

Piche says his organization offers free training to municipal councillors and there are paid programs for existing staff. And he urged council to "hire people with the proper skills" including certified arena technicians in the future.

Deputy Mayor Frank Nemcek questioned the cost of the training and hiring people with specialized training, saying municipal arenas already lose money.

Piche suggested "raise user fees by 30 per cent to get the proper standards."

When Nemcek objected to the idea, Piche said many municipalities are in the same boat as Brooke-Alvinston, with arenas which are in the red and now are also aging.

"I predict you'll see the decommissioning and bulldozing of arenas...because municipalities (across Ontario) can't afford them.

"They don't want to pay to keep it, but they don't want it torn down either."

COVID and flu shots ready

You can now receive a flu shot and the most recent COVID-19 vaccine.

The province is making the vaccines available at public health units, primary health care provides and some pharmacies starting today. The new COVID-19 vaccine is specifically designed to target the XBB variant and was approved by Health Canada earlier this fall.

You can receive the next COVID-19 dose if it has been six months since your last vaccine or COVID-19 infection.

Officials add the flu shot and the COVID-19 vaccine can be administered at the same time.

Meantime, Lambton Public Health has switched up its reporting of the COVID-19 virus. It has launched the Seasonal Infectious Diseases Bulletin providing weekly updates on respiratory and enteric disease activity, including COVID-19 and influenza.

"We recognize that there is an overwhelming amount of information online about respiratory virus activity. In response, our aim is to offer Lambton County residents a singular, dependable resource for local data on respiratory and enteric virus activity," said Epidemiologist Siobhan Churchill in a news release.




